

Housing And Development Update

Branford Housing Authority

The Town of Branford has been awarded \$448,500 from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's Small Cities Community Development Block Grant Program, which provides grants to eligible municipalities for economic development, affordable housing, community facilities and other revitalization projects. The Small Cities Program is administered by the Connecticut Department of Housing. The Branford Housing Authority will undertake renovations at Parkside Villages 1 and 2 Senior Housing complexes. The work scope includes improving the site lighting, pavement reconstruction and provision of emergency generators for the community rooms. The project will impact 90 units of housing. Bids have been received and work should start in the Spring of 2015 to the chosen recipient. A feasibility study to improve and add additional subsidized housing for the elderly and disabled has identified possible additional housing at Parkside Village I & II with supportive services.

Atlantic Wharf - Planned Development District

A development team has been approved for a Master Plan to construct a Planned Development District (PDD) which includes

construction of ten (10) buildings, with approximately 12,000 square feet of commercial space, approximately 10,000 square feet of restaurant space and approximately 205 residential dwelling on the site of the old Atlantic Wire Company on the corner of Montowese and Meadow Street. The Transit Oriented Development (TOD) will clean up a brownfield site, improve a dangerous intersection and provide upscale market rate rental apartment housing for young millennials and empty nest Baby Boomers along with commercial space near the Branford River.

Transit Oriented Development (TOD)

The South Central Regional Council of Governments is undertaking a regional TOD feasibility study for municipalities along the Metro North /Shoreline East rail corridor. The study will provide local baseline data and essential mapping for communities to utilize to advance efforts to provide safer, more efficient pedestrian and bicycle connectivity between the town rail stations, destination attractions, residential hubs and town centers. The study is timely with increased development along Meadow Street with the new Stony Creek Brewery, Admiral Wharf and the Anchor Reef Development plans.

Veteran Additional Exemption Program - Income Based

This is a reminder for Veterans to apply for an Additional Veteran Exemption based on Income. The exemption is based upon certain income levels and marital status. There are two programs available to veterans. One is a State Program \$12-811 and reference in subsection b under \$170aa and the other is a Local Option Veteran Program \$12-81f.

Application for the state additional exemption and the local option additional exemption are filed with the Assessor's Office in the Town of which the veteran resides. The filing period is from February 1st through October 1st of 2015. Once a veteran is approved for the additional exemption he/she must submit an application on a biennial basis. Income received by both a husband and his wife is considered in determining the eligibility of married persons for the exemption. If a person is legally separated pursuant to CGS §46b-40, as of the December 31st, 2014, he or she is treated as single for purposes of this program. Under these additional exemption programs provided by subsection b under §12-170aa, §12-81l and § 12-81f, a veteran must

meet several requirements to qualify for these additional exemptions. The Veteran must have filed a DD214 or other proof of eligibility on the Land records by September 30th, 2015 as stated in \$12-93 and meet the requirements under \$12-81 subsection 19, 20, 21, 22, 23 and 24. All income received in the calendar year of 2014 must be filed in the proper manner with the Assessor at application time. The Veteran and/or spouse's domicile, must be where they reside and located in the Town of Branford for the exemption to be applied. If the Veteran does not own real estate in the Town of Branford and have their Motor Vehicles registered in the Town of Branford.

Homeowner Benefit For Elderly And Totally Disabled

Now is the time for homeowners to apply for a benefit program for the elderly and totally disabled pursuant to \$12-170aa. The benefit takes the form of a credit that appears on an eligible person's tax bill this July of 2015. The benefit amount is based upon graduated levels of income and a person's marital status.

Application for this benefit under §12-170aa is filed with the Assessor's Office in the town in which the elderly or totally disabled person resides. The filing period is from February 1st through May 15th of 2015. Once a person is approved for this benefit he/she must submit an application

on a biennial basis. Income received by both a husband and his wife is considered in determining the eligibility of married persons for the benefit. If a person is legally separated pursuant to CGS §46b-40, as of the December 31st, 2014, he or she is treated as single for purposes of this program.

Under this benefit program provided by \$12-170aa, an applicant or his spouse must, as of the October 1st, 2014 assessment date must meet several requirements to qualify for this program. Including but not limited to the age requirement

of the elderly who must be 65 years of age prior to December 31st, preceding the date of making application and/or be the surviving spouse of a person who had been receiving a benefit who has attained age 50 or older as of the December 31st preceding the application for the benefit.

Please telephone the Assessor's Office for additional requirements and any questions between 8:30 am and 4:30 pm. Monday through Friday at (203) 488-2039. Before applying you may want to telephone to learn the information that must be provided to make application.

Leaf Collection

Beginning the week of March 30th and thru the week of May 15th, the Town will be collecting leaves curbside on alternating weeks. For the leaves to be collected, they must be in a brown paper leaf bag, or loose in a garbage can. Do not use plastic bags; the Town will not pick up leaves in plastic bags. Leaves should not be raked into the streets, piled at the curb, placed in wetlands, streams, storm drains, or on Branford Land Trust Property. Your leaves will be picked up on the same day as your regular recycling collection, though by a separate truck. Residents are reminded not to include branches and also to keep the leaves free of litter and other materials which will not decompose. These materials contaminate the compost which your leaves are turned

into at the Transfer Station and which is available to Branford residents for free. Brown paper leaf bags can usually be found at the following Branford stores: Big Y, Branford Building Supplies, Caron's Corner, Richlin's, Stop & Shop, Walgreen's and Wal-Mart. **Holiday Closings:** The Transfer Station will be closed on Saturday April 4 in observance on Good Friday. Also Monday May 25th in observance of Memorial Day and all curbside collections will be delayed one day that week.

The Community Forest Commission

The Community Forest Commission is composed of Peggy Carpenter, Louise Lamontagne, Nancy Mancini, Shirley McCarthy and Chris Woerner and Town officials Diana Ross and Tom Brennan.

Its primary mission is to preserve and increase the number of trees in Branford via a planting program as well as educating our citizens on the value of trees: Trees renew our air supply by absorbing carbon dioxide and producing oxygen (one tree produces nearly 260 pounds of oxygen each year). Tree roots stabilize the soil, prevent erosion, and improve water quality; trees reduce storm run-off and the possibility of flooding. Shade trees can make buildings up to 20 degrees cooler in the summer. Trees

decrease noise pollution, functioning as sound barriers. Trees are critical food and shelter for wildlife.

Proper care includes not mulching up against the tree trunk and any pruning should be conducted by a knowledgeable person, such as an arborist. The death of one 70-year old tree would return over three tons of carbon to the atmosphere. Trees are the longest living organisms on earth.

This year, Public Works will plant approximately 40 native trees. Native trees and plants help our ecosystem. A native oak supports well over 500 species whereas a non-native Bradford pear supports none.

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Branford's Education Hall of Fame 2015 Inductees

Since its birth in 1998, Branford's Education Hall of Fame has taken a broad view of the term "education" as they have recognized individuals whose work has enhanced, expanded and facilitated learning in our community. On Tuesday, February 3, 2015, ten individuals were selected for admission to the Hall of Fame. Eighty-six individuals participated in the selection process.

Selected from a list of over one hundred nominees, the 2015 Hall of Fame inductees are Terry Ahern, retired Branford High School social studies teacher; Laura Burban, Director of Branford's Dan Cosgrove Animal Shelter; Rhonda Butler, licensed child care provider and day care director; Michelina Fazzino, retired Branford High School chemistry teacher; Ellen Levy Greenberg, teacher in the Linda B. Chipkin Early Years program at Indian Neck School; Diane Kaczynski, retired Mary T. Tisko second grade teacher and reading specialist; Pam Mahon, occupational therapist who provides services to Branford Public School children through ACES and Susan Swart, retired teacher and reading specialist at Mary T. Tisko School.

Rosalie Pinkham, elementary school teacher and professor of Elementary School Education at Southern Connecticut State University and Elwyn "Cappy" Thayer, at the Center School for 70 years, will be inducted posthumously.

The induction dinner will be held at Woodwinds Restaurant in Branford on Thursday, April 23, at 5:30 PM. Ticket information will be available in early March. The names of inductees to Branford's Education Hall of Fame are inscribed on bookplates in library books the organization donates each year to the Branford Public School libraries. The Hall of Fame has named this process "The Susan Spear School Library Book Project" in honor of a longtime Branford teacher and Branford Board of Education member who developed the concept. Over the years approximately 1,300 books for school libraries and have been donated.

Renowned folksinger Gordon Bok, characterized by Time magazine as the "poet laureate of those who go down to the sea," will perform in concert on Saturday, April 18 at 8 p.m. at the Branford Folk Music Society's monthly coffeehouse in the auditorium of the First Congregational Church of Branford, 1009 Main Street on the Branford Green. Bok, who hails from Camden, Maine, has been preserving the musical traditions of the sea for five decades as a performer.

At its January meeting the Branford Economic Development Commission presented K&G Printing with its "Business Recognition Award". The EDC periodically presents the award to a Branford business that is a leader in its field and that contributes to making Branford a better place to live and work.

Romauldas "Romi" Kaminskas and Roger Guay have been serving the shoreline and the Branford community for nearly forty years from their East Main Street location. Commission members praised K&G, noting that whether it's a new start-up or an established manufacturer, K&G provides its customers with the same undivided attention and first rate service. And in an age of social media and marketing, K&G remains the first thought most businesses have when needing copies or bound reports.

The EDC has voiced its support for the proposed "Atlantic Wharf" development as the project proceeds through the town's approval process. Plans call to transform the 7½ acres of the former Atlantic Wire property into a transit oriented, mixed-used complex of residential units and ground level commercial space. At a recent EDC meeting, the "Atlantic Wharf" development team presented its master plan and renderings to the commission and then engaged in a Q&A session. Further approvals will be required by P&Z as the project proceeds through its various stages of development.

Meanwhile, the EDC continues with its efforts to attract and support biotech development in Branford. EDC chairman Perry Maresca and EDC members Rich Sgueglia and Joe Gordon joined First Selectman Jamie Cosgrove, Representative Lonnie Reed and others on a recent tour of the new Mt. Sinai Genetic Testing Lab on Commercial Street. The event was hosted by the lab's managing director Todd Arnold, Andrew Kasarskis, co-director of the Icahn Institute for Genomics in New York, and Ginny Kozlowski of New Haven's regional REX Development. Mt. Sinai opened its doors last and began its genomics testing work at the 16,500 s/f facility on Commercial St. First Selectman Jamie Cosgrove said town officials worked quickly to fast-track the permits necessary for the lab to open. Todd Arnold said that with a current staffing level of 20, company officials expect that number to more than double in the coming year, adding "we can really thrive in Branford."
