### First Selectman's Corner

This issue of "Branford Events" is arriving in your mail box just as our summer season is about to take off. On the following pages you will find announcements, information, and details on the Branford Festival, the Father's Day Road Race, the high school's graduation ceremony on the green, our popular summer jazz concerts, and more. This issue also contains information to help you safely enjoy the summer, as well as to keep you up to date on various town initiatives and projects.

Although "Super Storm Sandy" and her winter partner "Nemo" may be distant memories for most, we continue to work with FEMA on federal reimbursements for the town's emergency expenses during the storms. And while we work to close out the post-storm reporting, we are turning our focus on the longer range issue of coastal resiliency in the face of sea level rise and global climate change. We have established a mechanism to study and recommend changes to our regulatory offices that will be designed to promote public safety and to protect our environment and property.

I am pleased to announce that three new department heads have joined town hall's ranks. Dan McGowan has taken on the management of the town's Transfer Station on East Main Street and its solid waste and recycling operations. Dan had been with the town's Inland Wetlands office and has a background in environmental services. Emil Coviello is the town's new director of public works. Emil comes to Branford with an extensive

background in public works operations and other municipal services. And, most recently, Alice Pentz began in early May as the new director of the Willoughby Wallace Library in Stony Creek, bringing years of library management experience with her.

Meanwhile, a new public work facility continues as a town priority. Soon after




the public works building committee issued its report and recommendation, another viable site was identified. The parcel was not available last year when the town issued its RFP, but once it was brought to town hall's attention an initial review indicated that the eight acre property met the criteria established by the committee, it was submitted for consideration. As a result, it is now under review and, pending any serious flaws being discovered, a dialogue will commence with the appropriate town agencies and officials.

The Amtrak Bridge project continues to progress towards completion, with DOT expecting to have the new bridge and widened roadway finished by the end of this construction season, which runs to late fall. In addition to that project, DOT is also getting closer to beginning its work on the School Ground Road and North Branford Road bridges.

A third project in that part of town will be the redesign of the intersection where those two roads meet with Valley Road, at the town line with North Branford. Inspection of the bridges revealed they are in subpar condition for the traffic volumes on those roads, while the intersection is located on a curve at the bottom of blind descent and has long been a safety hazard. DOT has completed its public meetings on the projects and is in contact with property owners in the area; with the design work nearing completion, DOT expects to begin work later in this construction season.

# From the Tax Collector's Office

A reminder to all Branford taxpayers, especially new residents, that tax bills for the 2012 Grand List year will be mailed at the end of June. The first installment of real estate and personal property taxes, and all motor vehicle taxes are due July 1st and will be considered delinquent if paid or postmarked after August 1st. Interest reverts back to the July 1st due date and is charged at a rate of 1-1/2% each month per Connecticut state statute.

You may now print a duplicate bill or pay on line at www.branford-ct.gov. "View/ Pay Tax Bills". Put in your last name and first initial to locate your bills. Payment may be done by credit card (fee of approximately 3% will be applied)

or by electronic check (ACH) for a fee of .95. If you owe prior year taxes, you must first call the tax office at 203-315-0672. You may pay by mail to: Tax Collector, PO Box 136, Branford, CT 06405 or in person at the tax office Monday through Friday 8:30 am - 4:30 pm (except holidays).

If you are having difficulty paying your taxes, please call 203-315-0672 and speak with the Tax Collector who will help you work out a payment arrangement.

## Floodplain Management

#### New Flood Insurance Rate Maps are coming!

This is a reminder of FEMA's announcement that new Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRM) have been developed for coastal areas of Branford and will be effective as of July 8, 2013.

These new maps have changed the limits of both AE zones and VE zones primarily by extending these zones further inland as well as changing the Base Flood Elevations of many of these zones. We estimate that several hundred properties may be added to the flood zone as a result of these changes.

People who do not currently have flood insurance, because they were close to, but not previously determined to be in a flood zone, are encouraged to consult the maps to see if they will be in the flood zone with the new maps. Buying flood insurance prior to the new maps becoming effective could mean lower rates for you, whereas if you are required to buy flood insurance after the new maps become effective you may not be eligible for reduced rates.

The FIRM maps are to become effective on July 8 and are available on the Town of Branford website for you to view [www.branford-ct.gov]. The maps are also available in the engineering department located on the second floor in Town Hall. Please contact your insurance agent regarding flood insurance and rates. The Town Engineer, who is also the

Floodplain Manager, does not make flood zone determinations for insurance purposes, but has resources available to assist you with understanding the FIRM maps.

Changes have also occurred to the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) and may substantially affect your flood insurance rates. The Bigger-Waters National Flood Insurance Reform act of 2012 provides long-term changes to the NFIP. For example, rates for certain secondary homes in high-risk areas will increase 25 percent per year over the next 4 years starting in 2013. Policy rates for all properties could increase based on one or all of the following circumstances: change of ownership, lapse of coverage, change in risk, and substantial damage or improvement to a building.

To ask questions and get information about flood insurance, call the NFIP Help Center at 1-800-427-4661 or visit www.FloodSmart.gov. The best way to lower your rates and your risk, is to raise your building above the Base Flood Elevation and meet current building code and floodplain management requirements.

The Branford Town Engineer and Building Official can help you with information about local codes and permit requirements.

### **Building Department**

#### Sensible Ways to Enjoy Your Swimming Pool

Along with summer and warmer weather fast approaching, many of us own or a least know someone who owns a swimming pool or outdoor spa that will soon be opened for the season. Swimming pools are installed and designed for many years of enjoyment so taking the time to conduct theses simple checks as an informed consumer is part of a plan to ensure safe use for years to come. Please also remember there is no substitute for adult supervision when owning a pool, someone's life or death may depend on you!

When the decision is made to open your pool or spa, a good general rule is to inspect your pool area and equipment as part of the process. Visually inspect your equipment, check and replace anything that looks broken, frayed, corroded or worn when connecting or starting up your equipment. Check and test your equipment power supply including GFCI breaker, means of disconnect and proper pump grounding before powering up any equipment.

Walk your entire pool barrier, check for any rust or corrosion that can compromise your fencing and allow unwarranted access. All pool area access points of your barrier system, including gates and doors, should be inspected and tested for proper performance. Test to ensure the self-closing and latching performance of such gates.

If you have recently installed a swimming pool within the past years and want to know if your pool or spa project has been properly inspected by the town Building department, please feel free to contact us at 203.315.0674. We would be happy to assist you with that process. Please remember one key role of the Building department is to help protect you, as the consumer.

# The Impact of the Branford Community Foundation

The Branford Community Foundation (BCF) started in 1979 with a small boy and a swing set. Five-year-old Darin Etzel was ill with a rare

blood disease and needed a bone marrow transplant. "At that time," says Darin's father, Dave Etzel, "there were only three hospitals in the country that did that procedure." So Darin and his parents went to Sloan Kettering in New York City, the closest facility to home. Dave and his wife, Mary Margaret, took an apartment in the city to be with Darin while he underwent this latest medical effort to restore his health. Friends from Branford traveled to New York to donate blood and offer support to Darin and his parents. These friends wanted Darin to have something special to look forward to at the end of this difficult time, so they raised \$770 to buy him a terrific swing set. "The swing set," says Dave, "was hope for the future." Sadly, Darin developed complications and died on January 1, 1980. In his memory, his family wanted to carry into the greater community, the "hope for the future" that their friends had wanted for them. The Branford Community Foundation began with the \$770 raised for Darin's swing set.

The BCF is governed by a board of directors selected for knowledge of the education, cultural, civic, moral, public and other charitable needs of the Branford community and serves without compensation.

"The Branford Community Foundation works every day to help address the most pressing issues facing our community, including emergency fuel and food assistance; youth development; environmental education and preservation; and the arts. Community foundations impact lives, solve problems, and improve futures," said Eunice Lasala, BCF President. "In a down economy, with limited resources and a growing need for services to help families in need, we are more determined than ever to bring our community partners together to find innovative and effective solutions to some of our most challenging social problems."

Community foundations such as BCF are independent, public entities that steward philanthropic resources from institutional and individual donors to local nonprofits that are the heart of strong, vibrant communities. Community foundations represent one of the fastest-growing forms of philanthropy in the United States. Every state in the United States is home to at least one community foundation - whether large or small, urban and rural - that is advancing solutions to a wide range of social issues. In fact, the 2011 Columbus Survey found that despite the recession, giving by the nation's 100 largest community foundations actually increased slightly in 2010 to \$3.7 billion and exceeded

pre-recession levels seen in 2006 and 2007.

BCF works hard to respond to community needs, and the Board continually looks for ways to improve the process of the Foundation's giving. To that end, the organization recently implemented new policy and procedures to make BCF grant-making more effective. The application form has been modified and the review process for grant request has been streamlined; grant requests will now be evaluated quarterly (03/31; 06/30; 09/30 and 12/31). The modifications to the application now adhere to national and Connecticut state standards and capture more meaningful data.

### Branford Wastewater

#### Where safety is our first concern.

The Branford Wastewater Treatment Plant has the never ending challenge of keeping the effluent, that goes into the Branford River and then into Long Island Sound, as clean as possible. Meeting that challenge are sixteen dedicated municipal employees, with various skill sets and training that help keep the total system safe, efficient, running smoothly and operational costs low. The plant, upgraded several years ago, has been recognized by the Natural Resources Defense Council with an award for the positive impact it has had on the quality of beaches in Branford and the shoreline. Another significant result of the plants design and operation is in the revenue it generates for the town as part of the Long Island Sound Nitrogen Reduction Program, with the last payment to town totally more than \$117,000.

We are governed by the town's Board of Selectmen and its Water Pollution Control Authority, and permitted by the CT State Department of Energy and Environmental Protection [D.E.E.P.]. The treatment plant, located at 75 Block Island Road, treats a design of 4.5 mgd of wastewater flows generated by Branford as well as some wastewater from North Branford. Our operation includes more than 100 miles

of pipe providing service to nearly three quarters of the town. Septic disposal, boat and RV waste for Branford residents are also accommodated at the plant.

At this time our five-year permit is up for renewal in September, and our application to the state D.E.E.P. is already on file with them for their review.

Needless to say, it was been a rough season on our infrastructure from all the past storms that mother nature delivered. We are pleased that the facility and the crew persevered and kept the system running throughout all the wind, rain and power outages we experienced.

We are pleased to say that 90% of the relining of the East Main Street gravity line coming from the Rt.139 Pump station is completed. At this time, we are waiting on the new outflow chamber to be rebuilt. This is necessary due to the toll that the hydrogen sulfide gas has taken on the reinforced concrete chamber that is currently in place.

At the same time, various pump station upgrades are in the planning stages right now and hopefully come to fruition in the not too distant future.
