

First Selectman's Corner

The Town has been busy over the summer months with a variety of projects, including road, bridge and sidewalk repairs, as well as upgrades to a number of facilities so that we can continue to provide the best services and programs to our residents and businesses. The town center has seen tree pruning, removal and replacement, while the Academy has re-opened for public use with a newly restored cupola on its roof, and plans for a new Senior Center are progressing. Ecology Park at Tabor Road and Marshall Drive has opened to rave reviews and has already become a destination for its panoramic views of the Town and Long Island Sound.

State infrastructure projects around town continue to advance, as well. The expansion of Branford's train station is entering its last stages with construction of a new platform on the north side of the tracks and a connecting pedestrian bridge, while DOT continues with its plans for the replacement of the North Branford Road bridge [Rte. 139]. This project follows the completion of the improvements to the intersection of Rte. 139 at School Ground and Valley Roads, and the new bridge installation on School Ground Road itself. Meanwhile, DOT is moving forward with plans to replace the Sybil Creek bridge, at the juncture of South Montowese Street and Sybil Avenue.

And although all the summer activities have wrapped up, the school season is in full swing and some of us are already anticipating the holiday season, be sure to stay out and about town where there's something for everyone. We are very pleased to see the first Branford Arts Festival taking place on September 19th on the green, just before

the ever-popular Blackstone Library book sale. And the Branford Garden club will once again be bringing scarecrows-on-the-green from October 17th through November 1st, while an entire season of music, singing and stage performances will be brought to us by the Musical Art Society, Branford Folk Music Society, Round Table Players and others. Details on those activities and

more are contained in the following pages, and I encourage everyone to support those organizations as well as enjoy our shoreline trails, and as the brilliant colors of autumn take hold.

Musical Art Society Upcoming Fall 2015 Events

The Musical Art Society of Branford is a cultural arts group that was founded in 1920 by Alice Collins and a group of local music teachers. (In 1919, Alice married Jeremiah J. Collins who was an owner of the Collins & Freeman Hardware Store in Branford, where Alice resided until her death in 1972). The original group met monthly in members' homes for their own musical entertainment. In past years, auditions were required for membership, but in recent years the group has expanded to include not only musicians but all music lovers, and auditions are no longer held. New members are always welcome! Dues are \$20 per year for an individual or \$30 for a household, and new members can join at any concert or by contacting a member.

The mission of the group is to promote and support excellence in music in the community. They occasionally meet in private homes for concerts and musicales, but most often present diverse artists in public spaces such as the Blackstone Library and various churches and concert halls in town.

The group gives a music scholarship each year to a graduating high school senior planning to study music at the college level, funded by members' dues, donations, and an annual scholarship fundraiser concert. In addition to the scholarship, MAS sponsors several free concerts each year which are open to the public, presenting music of many genres. Past years have included jazz, classical, bluegrass, choral, folk, Celtic, et al.



Cecil Sharp Show / Branford Folk Music Society

England's Brian Peters and America's Jeff Davis have both graced the stage of the Branford Folk Music Society coffeehouse in the past as solo performers and now they return together on Oct.10 for "Sharp's Appalachian Harvest", a special multimedia show devoted to the astounding collection of folk songs and music gathered by Cecil Sharp and his collaborator Maud Karpeles in the Southern Appalachians over three summers in 1916, 1917 and 1918. The two English folklorists ventured into the heart of the mountains to seek out old British ballads still being sung in remote mountain settlements, and their haul of over 1,600 pieces is one of the greatest folk song collections ever made.

The concert will take place at 8 p.m. in the auditorium of the First Congregational Church of Branford, 1009 Main Street on the Branford Green. Light refreshments are served. For information, call 203-488-7715 or access the society's Web page at www.branfordfolk.org. In their presentation, Davis and Peters, two respected performers and researchers of traditional folk song and music, sing and play some of the musical highlights of Sharp's harvest, accompanied by readings from his diaries describing vividly the hardships and triumphs of song collecting, and a slide display of his terrific photographs of the singers and of mountain life. The music chosen ranges from old ballads to American breakdowns, dance tunes, children's songs and gospel numbers. Davis and Peters have been performing together on both sides of the Atlantic on and off for 16 years. Although Peters

music is essentially English folk, while Davis's work is often categorized as American old-time, the two share a love for old songs in general, and the folk music of one another's countries, so that they work



together intuitively as a duo. To Peter's multi-instrumental skills on concertina, melodeon and guitar are added Davis's talents on fiddle, banjo, mandocello and guitar, while their voices blend beautifully in harmony.

The Branford Folk Music Society is marking its 42nd year as a community group, offering monthly traditional folk music concerts from September through May and a monthly "house hoot" open to the public. The current 2015-16 concert season kicked off Sept. 12 with Grammy Award winners Jay Ungar and Molly Mason, a duo that exemplifies the heart and soul of American folk and acoustic music. Jay and Molly achieved international fame when their performance of Jay's composition "Ashokan Farewell" became the musical hallmark of Ken Burns' acclaimed PBS documentary "The Civil War."

Veteran Additional Exemption Program - Income Based

This is a reminder for Veterans to apply for an Additional Veteran Exemption based on Income. The exemption is based upon certain income levels and marital status. There are two programs available to veterans. One is a State Program §12-811 and reference in subsection b under §170aa and the other is a Local Option Veteran Program §12-81f.

Application for the state additional exemption and the local option additional exemption are filed with the Assessor's Office in the Town of which the veteran resides. The filing period is from February 1st through October 1st of 2015. Once a veteran is approved for the additional exemption he/she must submit an application on a biennial basis. Income received

by both a husband and his wife is considered in determining the eligibility of married persons for the exemption. If a person is legally separated pursuant to CGS \$46b-40, as of December 31st, 2014, he or she is treated as single for purposes of this program. Under these additional exemption programs provided by subsection b under \$12-170aa, \$12-81l and \$12-81f, a veteran must meet several requirements to qualify for these additional exemptions. The Veteran must have filed a DD214 or other proof of eligibility on the Land records by September 30th, 2015 as stated in \$12-93 and meet the requirements under \$12-81 subsection 19, 20, 21, 22, 23 and 24. All income received in the calendar year of

2014 must be filed in the proper manner with the Assessor at application time. The Veteran and/or spouse's domicile, must be where they reside and located in the Town of Branford for the exemption to be applied. If the Veteran does not own real estate in the Town of Branford the veteran's domicile must be in the Town of Branford and have their Motor Vehicles registered in the Town of Branford.

Please telephone the Assessor's Office for additional requirements and any questions between 8:30 A.M. and 4:30 P.M. Monday through Friday at (203) 488-2039. Before applying you may want to telephone to learn the information that must be provided to make application.

Local Parkinson's Exercise Program

for me." The Beat PD Today program is an affordable exercise class based on national research around the benefit of exercise to alleviate Parkinson's symptoms and slow the progression of the disease. Every workout is scalable to each individual within the group class. The Beat PD Today program focuses on full functional body movements that we use in everyday life. Our sessions use a variety of basic equipment such as ropes, TRX, kettle bells, BOSUs, weights and medicine balls. We create work-outs in each session specific to the group's needs. The classes will encourage brain stimulation, challenge balance and stability and teach proper technique and form - all in an encouraging group setting. Classes are every Tuesday from 2pm-3pm in Branford at the Orchard House, 421 Shore Drive. Pre-registration is required by calling 860.463.3747 or email info@beatpdtoday.com. Branford Economic Development Commission

The Commission continues to work closely with a variety of businesses and commercial interests on a number of development projects. It hosted a presentation by Bausch+Ströbel, a major pharmaceutical packaging manufacturer. After its presentation and a discussion with company officials, the commission voted to fully support the company's application before the Planning & Zoning Commission for its proposed 58,000 s/f facility on Rte. 139. On behalf of the commission, staff will work with the development team to help streamline the approval and permitting process and to assist in accessing any funding that might be available.

The commission also participated in several statewide and regional events showcasing the town as a business location. In June it was part of the *Community Investment Corporation's* [CIC] annual meeting held in Branford which highlighted the transformation of the former MIF site from brownfield to a state of the art manufacturing facility. CIC is a major SBA lender throughout Connecticut and Rhode

Island and has been involved in numerous business development projects in Branford.

The commission also hosted a monthly meeting for regional economic development professionals, as well as a quarterly meeting for the statewide economic development officials. The EDC also hosted the Connecticut CCIM chapter for a symposium on flood insurance for commercial properties, a topic of great interest to a shoreline town. These events with a variety of professionals and officials integral to development projects help to promote the town as a premier location for advanced manufacturing, biotech, and other industries.

And a follow up to the biotech symposium it held with Jackson Laboratories in the spring at the Blackstone Library, it co-sponsored a CURE event for new and expanding biotech companies. CURE is the state's association for the bioscience industry and provides technical and other services to both start-ups and mature companies.

Also, at a recent meeting the EDC presented *Ford of Branford* with its "Business Recognition Award". The EDC periodically presents the award to a Branford business that is a leader in its field and that contributes to making Branford a better place to live and work. The Ford brand of automobiles has been sold in Branford

for more than 80 years, and for more than ten of those years, brothers Dennis and Craig Zoufaly have owned and operated Ford Branford as part of their family's "Zee Automotive Group".

Personal Property Declarations

This is notification that the Personal Property Declaration for the 2015 GRAND LIST needs to be filed in the Assessor's Office by November 2nd, 2015. This was mailed by the Assessor's Office the beginning of September 2015.

All business owners of taxable personal property are required to file declarations of such property with the Assessor of the town where the property is located on the Assessment Date of October 1st, or with the Assessor of the town where the property has established situs in accordance with the 'three month rule'. This requirement applies to residents (§12-41) or nonresidents (§12-43) of the municipality where the property is located.

Property owners must file a Personal Property Declaration regarding their taxable personal property with the local assessor on or before November first, in accordance with §12-41. A declaration's postmark date, as defined in §1-2a, determines the timeliness of its filing. Section 12-42 also provides that when the first day of November is a Saturday or Sunday, the declaration may be filed or postmarked on the next business day. Pursuant to \$12-41(c), declaration shall include but are not limited to the following types of property: disposals, all leased equipment, leasehold improvements, commercial furniture, fixtures, machinery and supplies owned by the any manufacturer, wholesales, and/or retailer. This subsection specifies that personal property located in factories, stores, offices, hotels, restaurants, recreational halls, taverns, utility companies, all businesses, and etc. must be included on the declaration as filed by the owner. Please read Subsection (b) of \$12-41 which provides that registered vehicles, may be included if they are subject to taxation by a town other than the town in which they are registered. Motor vehicles registered in another state and unregistered motor vehicles must be reported if they are garaged in a city or town in this state, pursuant to \$12-71b(g).

To avoid receiving a penalty for improper filing ALL PAGES of the form must be filled out completely including but not limited to Leased Equipment and Disposed Assets. If you have questions please telephone the Assessor's Office at (203)-488-2039 between 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. and they will be glad to help you with the form. We will even have someone inspect the business for a listing of assets.

Branford Compassion Club was founded eighteen years ago by a handful of Branford residents to care for the growing number of stray and feral cats in their town and along the shoreline.

Today, the 501(c)3 non-profit feline rescue organization operates a shelter for homeless and abandoned felines at 2037 Foxon Road in North Branford. Since its opening in February 2011, Branford Compassion Club Feline Rescue and Adoption Center has found homes for more than 975 felines. This is an amazing number, as the shelter is only open to the public on Saturdays from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. and is run solely by volunteers.

Adoption applicants are fully screened to assure that felines are placed with responsible owners. Many of the adult cats have had sad beginnings and deserve loving permanent indoor homes. All cats are tested, neutered, and vaccinated before adoption. The cost for veterinary care and operating a shelter is great.

The organization relies on generous donations, adoption fees, small grants and fundraisers to cover the operating costs and veterinary expenses. Branford Compassion Club holds numerous offsite fundraisers throughout the year as well as four food and supply drives at the shelter. Branford Fire Department

The Branford Fire Department is an organization comprised

of career and volunteer professionals whose mission is to "provide the services necessary to minimize loss of life and/or property threatened by the hazards of fire, explosions, medical, chemical, and rescue related emergencies, through fire suppression, code enforcement, and conscientious prevention and education". Operating out of five stations strategically located to provide for rapid response to any emergency, our people are highly trained, selflessly dedicated, compassionate responders who I am honored to have been selected to lead.

Branford Fire Department is overseen by a board of six fire commissioners, created by public act on March 6, 1923. Each commissioner is a volunteer selected from the electorate and appointed by the first selectman to serve three-year terms. Current board members are Robert Massey Jr. (chairman), Madeline Clem, Albert Carfora, Kathy Fox, David LaCroix, and Paul Riccio. First organized in the late 1890s to protect citizens from the ravages of fire, Branford Fire Department has evolved into an all hazard emergency resource. BFD responds to over 6000 calls

annually, the majority of which are medical emergencies. The early interventions and pre-hospital care provided by our EMTs and Paramedics significantly contribute to positive outcomes for our patients.

Branford Fire Department considers every month to be fire prevention month; however, each October along with Branford educators and other allied professionals, we place special emphasis on public education. This year's fire prevention theme is "Hear the beep where you sleep," focusing on smoke detectors and home fire safety. We have partnered with the American Red Cross to reach out to the most vulnerable members of our community but wish each of you to consider the following:

Seven times a day, someone in this country dies in a home fire. The American Red Cross is launching a nationwide campaign to reduce the number of home fire deaths and injuries by 25 percent over the next five years.

• The number of residential fire deaths actually increased by nearly 15% in 2013. Smoke alarms cut the risk of death from a fire in half.

Please consider these steps which you can take to protect yourselves and your loved ones.

- Every household should develop a fire escape plan and practice it several times a year and at different times of the day.
- Include two ways to get out of every room and consider escape ladders for sleeping areas or homes on the second floor or above.
- Pick a place outside for everyone to meet and make sure everyone knows where it is.
- Practice that home fire drill until everyone in the household can do it in less than two minutes.
- Install smoke alarms on every level of the home, inside bedrooms and outside sleeping areas. Test them every month and replace the batteries at least once a year.

Uniform Screening Panel, the gold standard for newborn screening nationally. Approval is expected at the Secretary's Committee on Heritable Diseases in Newborns and Children meeting, August 27th at NIH in Maryland. As I write, I look forward to attending in support of and in anticipation of this positive decision and hope to have great news to share with you in the winter edition of Branford Events.

Many thanks to our enthusiastic Brian's Hope supporters on social media for signing the petition to save the boys from adrenoleukodystrophy and for sharing important information. You can see the public service announcement and two other videos regarding newborn screening for ALD that Brian and I participated in at http://brianshope.org/ald/educational-videos/. Knowledge really is power.

Additionally, the Genetic Advisory Committee in Tennessee voted to add ALD to their state's screening panel. Their process is regulatory, eliminating the need for legislation. Brian and I had an informational meeting with the Director, Deputy Director and Chief of Staff of Public Health in Rhode Island, advocating for newborn screening there. I could not have been more proud of Brian, wide-eyed and responsive at one end of the conference table, opposite the Director, doing his work as a patient advocate. One state at a time...

Next on our agenda is our favorite day of the year, The 19th Annual Hammerfest Sprint Triathlon, September 20th at the beautiful Owenego. Relays welcome! The swim goes off at 7:30 and it's a spectacular scene. Sunrise on the Sound is worth getting up for. There's still time to sign up as an athlete, a volunteer, donor or come as a spectator and enjoy the mid-morning cookout. Ron Glick will be providing some energizing music and "the voice of summer", Mark Gilhuly, will be our announcer, keeping all up to the moment with his enthusiasm and avid support of Brian's Hope.

New to the triathlon this year is a bone marrow drive. Representatives from the Rhode Island Blood Center will be there for anyone who might be interested in joining the National Bone Marrow Registry. Branford Solid Waste And Recycling

Beginning the week of October 19th and thru the week of December 14th, the Town will be collecting leaves curbside weekly. For the leaves to be collected, they must be in a brown paper leaf bag, or loose in a garbage can.

Do not use plastic bags; the Town will not pick up leaves in plastic bags. Leaves should not be raked into the streets, piled at the curb, placed in wetlands, streams, storm drains, or onto Branford Land Trust Property.

Your leaves will be picked up on the same day as your regular recycling collection, though by a separate truck. Residents are reminded not to include branches and also to keep the leaves free of litter and other materials which will not decompose. These materials contaminate the compost which your leaves are turned into at the Transfer Station and which is available to Branford residents for free.

Holiday Closings: The Transfer Station will be closed on Monday October 12 in observance on Columbus Day; all curbside collections will be delayed one day that week. Also Wednesday November 11th in observance of Veteran's Day; Wednesday and Thursday collections will be delayed one day that week.

Who We Are

The Branford Food Pantry is a 100% volunteer organization, started in 1978, that provides groceries to Branford families in need. In addition to family groceries, children are provided a snack package that can be used for school days. A new program, Feed Branford Kids, provides weekend food when school subsidized meals are not available; these meals are distributed anonymously by the schools. Over 230,000 pounds of food are distributed annually. Check our website: www.branfordfoodpantry.org.

What's Happening

FUND RAISING - The fall is our time of action. To keep programs going we are kicking off the annual fund drive that allows the Food Pantry to purchase food from the CT Food Bank (at very low cost) and to supplement that food with retail purchasing that cost \$52,254 last year. Town Of Branford Snow Removal Policy

Help us, Help you. With winter upon us, the Town of Branford Public Works Department is asking for your cooperation in assisting to provide maximum service to all our residents in helping us keep our roads safe.

Parking: During snow storms there is "No Parking" on the even numbered side of the road by Town Ordinance (sec 223-1 & sec 223-2). Vehicles parked on the even side of the road will be asked to move so snow plows can get down the roads. Failure to move a vehicle could result in having it towed at the owner's expense.

Parking Ban: During a substantial snowfall a parking ban may be enacted which would require no parking on both sides of the road. Parking bans announcements will be made through the local media.

Sidewalks: Town ordinance states that property owners are responsible for cleaning all snow and ice from sidewalks adjacent to their property within eight hours of the end of the snowfall or precipitation (sec 216-42). The Public Works Department suggest that residents wait until Town plows have pushed back snow to curb line before clearing sidewalk areas. This generally happens after snow has stopped.

Road Hazards: Residents and private contractors should take note that Town Ordinance prohibits snow to be placed on any public highway in such a manner as to impede or inconvenience

travel on any roadway (sec 216-42b).

Contractors: Residents are also responsible for their contractor's actions. Residents or private contractors will also be held responsible for any curb damage done as a result of plowing snow across roadways.

also receive awards.

Driveways: Residents should also keep in mind that snow plows are designed to remove snow from the roadway to the edge of the road. It is likely that the plow will leave behind a windrow of snow in front of the driveways. Residents are responsible for removing the snow.

Mailboxes: The Public Works Department suggest residents make certain their mailboxes are at least 42 inches above the roadway and set back slightly from the edge of the road so that postal carriers can reach it, behind either the face of the curb or the edge of the road. Our department does not replace mailboxes that are displaced by snow or slush from plows. If contact with a plow can be shown, then it would be replaced.

Storm Drains: This department strongly urges each homeowner to keep the storm drain in front of or close to their home free and clear of any leaves or debris causing the drain to become clogged and not drain properly.






