Annual Canvass of Branford Electors

The Branford Registrar of Voters duties do not stop after any Election and/or Primary. We first would like to take this opportunity to thank the Electors of Branford for exercising their right to vote in the November 8, 2016 Presidential Election. The Town of Branford has 19,335 eligible voters. Branford residents registered for this election by using the State of Connecticut online registration, by registering at the DMV when they changed their address within Branford or in connection with their out of town move within Connecticut. Residents also registered in person either at the Town Clerk's Office or the Registrar of Voters Office, by mailing in a Mail-In Application to register as a new voter in Branford, and/or by notifying us of their change of name, party, or address change in Branford.

After any Election or Primary the State of Connecticut may require a Re-Canvass of the Election or an Audit of the machines. January brings the State's mandated Annual Canvass of Electors to determine any changes to the Electors' residency in Branford. This will be conducted between January 3, 2017 and May 1, 2017 and is to be completed in May. During this period the Registrars choose to use a combination of methods to ensure that the Canvass of Electors is to be as accurate as possible to keep Branford's Electors list current and up to date. The methods used are: 1. The National Change of Address (NCOA) of the U.S. Postal Service; 2. By telephone; and 3. By mail. This is to determine if an Elector has an address change (with in town), has moved to another town in Connecticut, or has moved out of the State of Connecticut. Branford Electors will be notified of their possible change of address during this period and Electors themselves verify that the change has been made correctly.

This is in preparation for this year's Municipal Election on November 7, 2017.


Our office would like to inform you of a few easy ways for you to register and/or keep your voter record up to date:

1. In Person in the Registrar of Voters Office, at 40 Kirkham Street any Tuesday or Thursday 10:00 am to 3:00 pm or in the Town Clerks Office Monday through Friday 8:30 am to 4:30 pm.

2. By requesting a Mail-In Application from the Registrar of Voters Office at 203-483-3998.

3. By visiting The Town of Branford's website (Branford-ct.gov) under the Town Departments Registrar of Voters page.

a. Click on Mail In Voter Registration Application to print out the application. Mail it to Branford Town Hall, P.O. Box 150, Branford CT 06405.



b. Click on the Link "ONLINE VOTER REGISTRA-TION." It will take you to the Secretary of The State of Connecticut's website. You can register to vote for the first time, or update your voter information, change your name and/or address.


For either the Mail-In Application, the Online Registration, or if you registered with the DMV, you are not a voter until your application is approved by the Registrars of Voters. You will receive an acceptance letter from the Branford Registrar of Voters Office that also notifies you of your polling location. For further information you can click on the "STATE VOTER LOOK UP" on either the Branford Registrars of Voters Town site or the CT Secretary of State's site to check your current voter registration status at any time.

Are you a United States Citizen? Are you Registered to Vote in Branford? Have you changed your Name and/or Address? Are you 17 years old and will be 18 by Election Day?

IMPORTANT! Keep your voter record up to date.

Property Taxes Due

All Branford taxpayers are reminded that the second installment of real estate and personal property bills are due on January 1, 2017 and payable by February 1, 2017 without interest. We do not mail bills for the second installment as the bill you received in June consists of coupons for both the July and January payments. If you would like to pay before January 1st, you may pay in advance at any time before then. Supplemental motor vehicle bills will be mailed at the end of December. You will receive a bill if you registered a car in Branford after October 1, 2015 and before September 30, 2016. That bill will be pro-rated from the time the car was registered up to September 30, 2016.

Payments may be made online at www. branford-ct.gov (there is a fee for this service); by mail to Tax Collector, PO Box 136, Branford CT 06405; or in person at the Tax Office. Outer Island

Some of you may still not know that you are part owner of one of the Thimble Islands off the shore of Stony Creek?

Well, you are as a citizen of the United States. This is because Elizabeth Hird with her husband, Basil Rauch, Professor of History at Columbia University, purchased the island in 1964 as a summer retreat. And later in 1995, Elizabeth donated the island in her deceased husband's memory to the US Fish and Wildlife Service (Stewart B. McKinney National Wildlife Refuge) to ensure that the island's natural resources would be protected and that access for education and research would be continued.


Since the island's dedication as a wildlife preserve in 1995, the US Fish & Wildlife Service along with the Connecticut State University System, and the Friends of Outer Island have conducted research and education programs for the public. Guided tours of the island are especially valuable for educators who wish to connect their teaching to the wonders of the natural world, and the uniqueness of Long Island Sound. Thus, this beautiful special island is an ecological preserve and refuge for migratory birds off the coast of Branford. And anyone can visit it from Memorial Day to just after Labor Day.

You can see and learn about it now and until you go on to Outer Island next summer by going to two websites. The first is outerisland.org. At that site you can begin to see and learn about your island which will show an overview of the whole island. Then you can go on to our website which is http://www. friendsofouterisland.org/. You will learn and see who we are and what our mission is.

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Town of Branford Snow Removal Policy

Help us, Help you

With winter upon us, the Town of Branford Public Works Department is asking for your cooperation in assisting to provide maximum service to all our residents in helping us keep our roads safe.

Parking: During snow storms there is "No Parking" on the even numbered side of the road by Town Ordinance (sec. 223-1 & sec. 223-2). Vehicles parked on the even side of the road will be asked to move so snow plows can get down the roads. Failure to move a vehicle could result in having it towed at the owner's expense.

Parking Ban: During a substantial snowfall, a parking ban may be enacted which would require no parking on both sides of the road. Parking ban announcements will be made through the local media.

Sidewalks: Town ordinance states that property owners are responsible for cleaning all snow and ice from sidewalks adjacent to their property within eight hours of the end of the snowfall or precipitation (sec. 216-42). The Public Works Department suggests that residents wait until Town plows have pushed back snow to curb line before clearing sidewalk areas. This generally happens after snow has stopped.

Road Hazards: Residents and private contractors should take note that Town Ordinance prohibits snow to be placed on any public highway in such a manner as to impede or inconvenience travel on any roadway (sec. 216-42b).

Contractors: Residents are also responsible for their contractor's actions. Residents or private contractors will also be held responsible for any curb damage done as a result of plowing snow across roadways.

Driveways: Residents should also keep in mind that snow plows are designed to remove snow from the roadway to the edge of the road. It is likely that the plow will leave behind a windrow of snow in front of the driveways. Residents are responsible for removing the snow.

Mailboxes: The Public Works Department suggests residents make certain their mailboxes are at least 42 inches above the roadway and set back slightly from the edge of the road so that postal carriers can reach them, behind either the face of the curb or the edge of the road. Our department does not replace mailboxes that are displaced by snow or slush from plows. If contact with a plow can be shown, then it would be replaced.

Storm Drains: The department strongly urges each homeowner to keep the storm drain in front of or close to their home free and clear of any leaves or debris causing the drain to become clogged and not drain properly.

Branford Folk Music Society



Renowned Fiddler At Branford Folk Dec. 10

Branford will be host to one of the world's foremost folk fiddlers on Dec. 10 when Bruce Molsky pays a return visit to

the Branford Folk Music Society for a concert in the auditorium of the First Congregational Church of Branford, 1009 Main St., on the town's green. The concert will begin at 8 pm. Admission is \$25 for non-members, \$20 for members and \$5 for children age 12 and under. For more information, call 203-488-7715 or access the society's Web page at www.branfordfolk.org/

It's been six years since Molsky's last standing-room-only Branford Folk appearance. He's one of the most revered "multi-hyphenated career" ambassadors for America's old-time mountain music. Musicologists consider Molsky one of the most influential American folk fiddlers of this generation. Not only renowned throughout the world as a master fiddler, he also is a remarkable guitarist, banjo player and vocalist.

His high-spirited music melds the archaic mountain sounds of Appalachia, the power of blues and the rhythmic intricacies of

traditional African music. A Minneapolis Star-Tribune music critic called him "old-time music's answer to Ry Cooder - a commanding musician with a voracious appetite for traditional music styles."

He's a self-described "street kid" from the Bronx who bailed on college and big city life for a cold-water cabin in Virginia in the 1970s. His mission? To soak up the passion that was dramatically upending his parent's life plan for him – authentic Appalachian mountain music - at the feet of its legendary pioneers, old masters who are now long gone. For decades, he's been a globetrotting performer, ethnomusicologist and educator, a recording artist with an expansive discography including seven solo albums, well over a dozen collaborations and two Grammy nominations. He's also the classic "musician's musician" - a man who's received high praise from diverse fans and collaborators like Linda Ronstadt, Mark Knopfler, Celtic giants Donal Lunny and Andy Irvine, jazz artist Bill Frisell and Dobro master Jerry Douglas. In short he's a true country gentleman aptly dubbed "the Rembrandt of Appalachian fiddlers" by virtuoso violinist and sometimes bandmate Darol Anger.



Community Forest Commission



The primary mission of the Community Forest Commission (CFC) is to protect and increase the number of native trees in Branford via a planting program, developing a tree management plan, and educating our citizens on the value of trees and how to care for them. For the fall, watering of newly planted trees is critical: 25 gallons once a week for 3 years. Evergreens need watering in the winter.

Many of the trees in Branford are INCORRECTLY mulched by landscapers: "volcano" mulching - the mulch is piled against the tree trunk instead of having NO contact with the bark. This encourages diseases in the bark, rodent infestation and impedes water getting to the tree roots.

Native trees support our insects, birds and mammals whereas non-native plants may not support any wildlife. Many studies have shown how the presence of trees improves human health. Additionally, trees help clean our streams and rivers, conserve energy in the winter, cool buildings and sidewalks in the summer, combat global warming, decrease noise pollution, increase property value and have many other benefits.

Current members of the CFC are: Joann Minicozzi, Louise LaMontagne, Nancy Mancini, Shirley McCarthy, Chris Woerner and ex officio: Tom Brennan and Diana Ross.

The CFC has a memorial tree program which can be found on the Town's website under Inland Wetland and Natural Resources. This site is also a resource for references and lists of native trees, shrubs and flowers beneficial to our pollinators, birds, and other wildlife.



This is just one of the many heartwarming and grateful reactions that Branford Food Pantry volunteers receive each year from neighbors who receive complete holiday meals for Thanksgiving and Christmas.

Right now, the Pantry is in the middle of its annual drive to raise funds to purchase food from the CT Food Bank (at very low cost) and to supplement this food with retail purchasing. "Last year, we spent \$47,000 on supplemental purchase," explains Vice President, Jay Webb. "These funds also help us provide the fixings - groceries and turkeys - for a complete dinner to Branford families who need help during the Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays. An important element of these meals is donated turkeys. We need at least 500 12-16 pound turkeys!"

Please help! During two recent years, we ran out and had to give out chickens because turkeys in volume are not available at the last minute.

In addition to family groceries, children are provided a snack package that can be used for school days. A new program, Feed Branford Kids, provides weekend food when subsidized school meals are not available. These meals are distributed anonymously by the schools. Over 230,000 pounds of food are distributed by the Branford Food Pantry annually.

BRANFORD PARKS ARE NOW SMOKE FREE: A Win-Win for Everyone!!!

For the health of the Branford Community and in keeping with the Branford Parks and Recreation Department's philosophy of providing "... positive leisure time and promoting physical and emotional enrichment" we are pleased to announce that the Branford Recreation Board has adopted a no smoking policy for all parks governed by the Branford Parks & Recreation Department.

Exposure to secondhand smoke is unhealthy, even in outdoor spaces. Studies have found that levels of second-hand smoke in outdoor areas can be equal to amounts found inside where smoking is allowed. The U.S. Surgeon General's report in 2010 concluded there is no risk-free level of exposure to second-hand smoke. Exposure to concentrated amounts of second-hand smoke outdoors can cause respiratory irritation and may trigger asthma attacks.

This no smoking policy will help to provide a healthier and safer environment for the residents of Branford.

According to the Center for Disease Control (CDC), second hand smoke is a serious health hazard – there is no safe level of exposure to second hand smoke. As a result, it is recognized that many businesses, cities and towns are moving to more expansive smoke free zones. This no smoking policy will help to provide a healthier and safer environment for the residents of Branford.

The policy now in effect is as follows: "Smoking is prohibited at all properties under the control of the Branford Recreational Department at all times, including but not limited to; buildings, grounds, entrances, sidewalks, parking lots and beaches. Smoking is defined as the use of; cigarettes, pipes, cigars and other devises that produce smoke including electronic cigarettes and water pipes."

What are the benefits of smoke and tobacco-free parks?

- Creates healthy and safe environments for Branford residents and visitors, especially children and youth.
- Protects parks and natural areas from potential risk of fires.
- Protects parks and natural areas from environmental degradation caused by littering of cigarette butts and other tobacco-related waste.
- Supports individuals who are trying to quit smoking or tobacco use or have already quit.
- Reduces exposure of children and youth to smoking and tobacco use, protecting their health and discouraging them from starting a habit that is difficult to quit.
- Parks are established to promote healthy activities.



Leaf Collection & Holiday Schedule

Curbside leaf collection will continue through the week of December 15th. For the leaves to be collected, they must be in a brown paper leaf bag, or loose in a garbage can.

Do not use plastic bags. The Town will not pick up leaves in plastic bags. Leaves should not be raked into the streets, piled at the curb, placed in wetlands, streams, storm drains, or on Branford Land Trust Property.

Your leaves will be picked up on the same day as your regular recycling collection, though by a separate truck. Residents are reminded not to include branches and also to keep the leaves free of litter and other materials which will not decompose. These materials contaminate the compost which your leaves are turned into at the Transfer Station and which is available to Branford residents for free!

Holiday Wrapping Paper Program

The Solid Waste and Recycling Department is excited to continue the very successful Holiday Wrapping Paper Recycling Program for this upcoming holiday season. The program annually results in an additional 18 tons of materials being recycled that otherwise would be burned as trash! Many thanks are due to Etta Hanlon, a Branford High School student, for her continued hard work in bringing her concept to fruition.

Specially marked bags will be available at various locations throughout town, including Town Hall, the Senior Center, our Libraries, Community House and the Transfer Station for collecting your recyclable holiday paper. Simply fill your bag as you open your gifts (please see below for a list of acceptable materials). And then place your filled bag(s) out with your normal recyclables for collection, or bring them directly to the Transfer Station. If you do not have one of the specially marked bags, your holiday paper can still be recycled by placing it in the same bag/ bundle as your newspapers and magazines.

We must stress that only paper products can be placed in these bags. Wrapping paper made of foil or plastic (Mylar) are not acceptable. Neither are ribbons or bows that are not made of paper. A good rule of thumb is, "If it rips, it fits."

Acceptable Materials:	Unacceptable Materials:
PAPER wrapping paper	Any non-paper products
Paperboard/ gift boxes	Plastic, Foil or Mylar wrapping paper
Tissue paper	Bows or ribbons
Holiday cards and envelopes	Styrofoam or Plastic Packaging *Corrugated cardboard

Please recycle your corrugated cardboard along with your other recyclables - just not in this bag

Remember that recycling not only saves our environment, but also our tax dollars too! For every ton of trash that is recycled, the Town saves over \$100. Please recycle.



Branford Launches New Campaign to Recycle More Plastic Bags, Wraps

The Solid Waste & Recycling Department is happy to announce that we now accept clean and dry plastic film for recycling at the Transfer Station. This bin is in addition to the many plastic film recycling bins located at a number of local grocery stores and retail chain stores.

Plastic film is thin polyethylene plastic used for wraps, packaging or commercial/retail use bags. It's sometimes called stretch film. Polyethylene (PE) film may carry a #2 HDPE or #4 LDPE mark. Also, any bag or wrap with the How2Recycle label can be put in the bin. Generally, if plastic film stretches when you pull it with your fingers, it's okay to recycle it.

Please remember that plastic bags and film are still **not acceptable** in your curbside recycling bins as collecting them with bottles and containers generally leaves them too dirty and wet to be recycled. Additionally, bags and films can jam sorting machinery, creating problems for the businesses that sort recyclables.

Can I recycle it if ...?

The plastic is colored? YES. Colored material is not a problem for recycling.

It tears like paper? NO. This type of plastic is currently not accepted in bag recycling bins.

It crinkles loudly (like candy wrappers, flower bouquet wrap or chip bags) when I mash it in my hand? NO. Please do not include, as it is not currently acceptable for recycling.

It has labels or tape? YES, but labels, tape, and adhesive strips SHOULD BE REMOVED prior to putting it in the recycling bin. The integrity of the bag isn't important - the recycler just wants the clean plastic.

It is thicker, stiff plastic like pet food bags or bedding bags (including anything with a zipper)? NO. These are not the same type of plastic as what recyclers want, so DO NOT include. It is silvery or metallic (like some snack packaging or printer ink cartridge packages)? NO. This is not acceptable. If it says it's degradable or compostable AND recyclable? NO. Currently, these bags cannot be placed in drop-off bins. The recyclers reprocessing bags don't want the products they are making to degrade over time so these bags are not acceptable.


It is dirty, has crumbs, or is wet? NO. Recyclers need the bags and film to be CLEAN and DRY. Please don't include dirty or wet bags, or any material that has food or other residues. If in doubt, throw it out!

Over 89 billion plastic bags, sacks, and wraps are used every year. Plastic bags can be recycled into many products. Most plastic bags are recycled into composite lumber but can also be reprocessed into small pellets, or post-consumer resin, which can become feed stock for a variety of products...such as new bags, pallets, containers, crates and pipe.

Again, plastic bags cannot be recycled with your curbside recycling. Please see the Solid Waste & Recycling Department web page at www.branford-ct.gov for additional information.

The Musical Art Society of Branford is a cultural arts group that was founded in 1920 by Alice Collins and a group of local music teachers. (In 1919, Alice married Jeremiah J. Collins who was an owner of the Collins & Freeman Hardware Store in Branford, where Alice resided until her death in 1972). The original group met monthly in members' homes for their own musical entertainment. In past years, auditions were required for membership, but in recent years the group has expanded to include not only musicians but all music lovers, and auditions are no longer held. New members are always welcome! Dues are \$20 per year for an individual or \$30 for a household, and new members can join at any concert or by contacting a member.

The mission of the group is to promote and support excellence in music in the community. They occasionally meet in private homes for concerts and musicales, but most often present diverse artists in public spaces such as the Blackstone Library and various churches and concert halls in town. The group gives a music scholarship each year to a graduating high school senior planning to study music at the college level. The scholarship is funded by members' dues, donations, and an annual scholarship fundraiser concert. In addition to the scholarship, MAS sponsors several free concerts each year which are open to the public, presenting music of many genres. Past years have included jazz, classical, bluegrass, choral, folk, Celtic, et al.

Saint Mary School


