How Chester Works

As your First Selectman, I serve as the Chief Executive Officer of Chester, and as a non-voting member of all town boards, commissions and committees. My duties include those of chief of police, road superintendent, and the management of the day to day activities of the Board of Selectmen and the town government as a whole. Myself, Carolyn Linn and Charlene Janecek (your elected Board of Selectmen), meet at least twice a month to discuss details of day to day administration as well as to make policy decisions.

You, as the residents and taxpayers of the Town of Chester, are the legislative body of the government. That means that you, the members of our community come together at Town Meeting to legislate policy and budgets for local government. Why am I telling you this? Because important things get decided at Town Meeting – how money is spent, what construction projects get pursued, how we set priorities as a town. The release of \$100,000 for a preliminary library design, the purchase of new computers or police radios, the signing of a construction agreement or purchase of a town vehicle – these are all decisions made at Town Meeting during the past few years. Sadly, historically there is not a great turnout at a Town Meeting. The last one, in February, had about twelve local residents attend. Please remember you have a say in how your town is managed. We want to listen to you – come be part of the conversation. The next Town Meeting will be in April at the Town Hall. It will be posted on the website and in the newspaper, as well as reminders sent in the townwide email. I hope to see you there.

SmartER Appointments Now Available at Shoreline Medical Center

Why spend your time in the ER waiting room when you could be waiting in the comfort of your own home instead?

The new, innovative SmartER appointment system provides easier access to the Shoreline Medical Center Emergency Department — letting you schedule your ER visit for non-life threatening emergencies up to eight hours in advance.

According to Michael Saxe, M.D., Chair of the Department of Emergency Medicine at Middlesex Hospital, "With people's often hectic schedules, making an appointment on the SmartER website can improve convenience, help reduce waiting time in the Emergency Department, and allow patients quicker access to medical care for non-emergency injuries or illnesses, once they arrive."

Some examples of non-life threatening emergencies include sore throat, earaches, minor cuts, minor strains or sprains, mild diarrhea, or sports injuries. For any medical problem that is life threatening, dial 911 immediately.


Bridge Replacement



A Suggestion From The Tax Collector

Because there is a new huge program at DMV, I believe everyone should be checking their MV registrations now and making sure that you are not showing up on the delinquent list with the Department of Motor Vehicles. Even though, you have probably paid all your MV taxes (I do hope), it is wise to check ahead of time, before your next registration is due, to make sure that there are no compliance issues. It is an easy process to do, if you do things online. Just jot down your license number and write down your plate number and go to the DMV website: www.ct.gov/dmv. Click on the spot that says Motor Vehicles and then click on "INDIVIDUAL" and then go down a few lines to: Check on tax and insurance issues. This spot will probably help with any parking tickets anywhere in the state, also.

A square box will pop up and you input first your license number, and second input the plate number and third input what type registration that vehicle has. It could be "passenger", "combination", "historic" formerly called "antique" or "trailer" or if it is a small trailer, might be under "camp trailer". There are other selections, too, and you have to know what type your MV is listed under to have this be an accurate search. This type registration is listed on your registration form, which is probably

in the glove compartment of your vehicle. You then click search and in seconds the computer will let you know if you owe any taxes and to which town. It might not show up as owing in Chester, and so then you have your work cut out for you to follow up with that Tax Collector in a different town, to see what is owed or if that info in DMV records is correct or not.

It is so much smarter to be proactive in this and have it done before your registration is up for renewal. It will save you from frantic running around to get this cleared up with a deadline. Instead, do it now, and verify that you are all set with all the towns in the State of CT. You would be wise to do it with each and every motor vehicle that you own, but do it for at least one motor vehicle. And also do it for each family member who has a registration in their name. A few minutes now will save aggravation in the future. I am recommending this since we have had a family member show up as delinquent in a different town, and it was a town he had never lived in before, or ever registered a MV there. And so, he had to work with that other town and that other Tax Collector to find out how to get his name cleared before his registration was due shortly.

In 99% of the cases, you will find you are all set, but it is possible, that a wrong initial or a slightly different birthdate became linked to your name and your MV. This could be very easy to occur, since all the technical companies have been trying to help Tax Collectors get tax bills paid, and could have linked a name with a slightly different name. In the case of my family, his initial letter "C" was linked with "E" and the birthdate was just a few days different. It is all luckily straightened out now, but it took several phone call messages and several emails to finally get someone who had never been late before with taxes or registrations to be totally clear to be able to register his MV. Check now and avoid the rush later! And if you have a name like Smith or even Meyer, I would definitely do this process sooner and not later!

The deadline to register and, if you are unaffiliated, to enroll with a party and vote in the primary, is April 21 if done by mail or online and April 25 by noon if done in person at Town Hall. You can check your registration online at http://www.sots.ct.gov/sots/cwp/view. asp?a=3172&q=512796 or by calling our office at 860-526-0013 ext 211.

The polls will be open on April 26 from 6:00 am until 8:00 pm at Town Hall, 203 Middlesex Avenue.

November 8 is Election Day. To avoid long lines please register to vote before the election. Registration can be done in person at Town Hall during regular hours, by mail, or online with the Secretary of the State's website https://voterregistration.ct.gov/ OLVR/welcome.do.

The Registrars of Voters will be conducting the 2016 canvass in May. If you receive a letter from our office and do not respond, your name will be put on the inactive list. If you wish to vote in the November 8 election, you will have to fill out a reinstatement card which is available in our office on Thursdays between 2:00 pm and 4:00 pm or at the polls prior to voting.

New Dementia Caregiver Group Formed at The Saybrook at Haddam

Caring for a family member or loved one suffering from dementia requires patience, fortitude, and a network of much-needed support from others in similar situations. To help caregivers develop this network, better understand the disease, and reduce stress and anxiety associated with dementia care, The Saybrook at Haddam has created a new monthly Caregivers' Support Group. The group, which is open to the public, offers caregivers as well as family and friends of persons with dementia an opportunity to share information, talk through challenges, and learn more about local resources. Meeting dates and times vary, so interested individuals should contact Brooke Conley at 860-345-3779 for details.

Each meeting of the support group will focus on one of the many stages of dementia or issues surrounding those suffering from dementia, as well as general caregiving concerns of members. Recent research or relevant articles will be discussed along with personal stories and experiences (including humorous ones). Group members are encouraged to suggest themes and topics for the meetings based on their specific needs.

"It is very powerful and therapeutic for caregivers to spend time and share experiences with people who also are facing dementia in their families," said Brooke Conley, The Saybrook at Haddam's licensed clinical social worker who created and moderates the group. "Just having a community to talk to, learn from, and laugh with can bring a sense of reassurance and relief to caregivers, and can improve day-to-day life for those with dementia."

Attendees at the group's first meeting said they were happy to know they were not alone and were eager to build and strengthen connections with others. Those who are new to dementia care were pleased to talk directly with others who have coped with dementia for longer periods of time. The exchanges were helpful on many levels.

"Since Safe Harbor opened in 2011, we have worked one-on-one with family members to help them understand dementia, to try to relieve some of the anxiety families feel, and to work with them to enjoy happy visits with their loved ones," Conley said. "Now with this larger Caregivers' Support Group, we can share our knowledge base with the greater community, build a larger community, and hopefully improve lives for dementia patients and caregivers."



Absentee ballots for the April 26 Presidential Primary became available Tuesday, April 5. If you are a Democratic or Republican voter and are going to be out of town during the hours of voting from 6 am to 8 pm you can see the Town Clerk for an absentee ballot.


March Was Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month

Colorectal cancer occurs in the colon (large intestine) or the rectum. It is the second leading cancer killer in the United States. However, if everyone over the age of 50 received regular screening then over 60% of the deaths from this cancer would be avoided.

Who Gets Colorectal Cancer?

Both men and women can get it. It is usually found in people over age 50 and your risk increases with age. You may be at high risk for getting it if a close family member has had colorectal polyps or cancer. Other risk factors are inflammatory bowel disease and a genetic syndrome of familial adenomatous polyposis.

Screening Can Save Lives

Having a colonoscopy beginning at age 50 could save your life. Colorectal cancer begins as a polyp or growth in the colon or rectum. Over time the polyp can develop into a cancer. If the polyps are found during the colonoscopy they can be removed and the cancer will be prevented. In addition, if cancer is found and it is found early then the chance of being cured is improved.

What are the Symptoms of Colorectal Cancer?

In many cases there are none so you may not know it is there. That is why regular screening is so important. If symptoms do occur they be present as blood in the stool, or persistent stomach pain, or weight loss for no reason.

Types of Screening Tests

Talk to your doctor about which screening test is best for you. The most common one is a colonoscopy where a flexible lighted tube is passed into the rectum and colon to visualize any polyps or growths. There are other types of tests so ask your doctor about each one.

Wires Down and/or Power Outage Protocol

First and foremost, if you see wires down ASSUME THEY ARE LIVE and do not go within ten feet of them. Do not touch anything that is touching them, electricity travels. If you are in a vehicle with wires touching it DO NOT ATTEMPT to exit the vehicle and call 911.

Did you know that there are almost 75 farms in Middlesex County alone!? Ever wonder if there was an easier way to find the farms, learn about what products they sell and find the best times to visit?

The Lower Connecticut River Valley Council of Governments Regional Agriculture Council – the first formed in the state – has taken a step that will make it easier to find where to buy such fresh food!

Using an "Ag Viability" grant provided by the Connecticut Department of Agriculture, the Regional Ag Council has launched a website titled "Know Your Farmers" in an effort to introduce many of the farms and farmers from Middlesex County to the public. The public will be able search for fresh food by town, by farm and by product. The website will also provide notices of



events occurring at our local farms and will include a page sharing recipes. The Ag Council, whose members are all local farmers themselves, will include a "Farm of the Month" which will tell the story of a farm and the people who pour their blood, sweat and tears into the land.


