

First Selectwoman's Corner

2018-2019 Budget

Thank you to all who came out and approved our 2016-2017 budget this year. The Boards of Selectmen, Finance and Education worked together to put together a budget that is fiscally responsible, prudent and responsive to the taxpayers: ensures the continued maintenance of our town services and infrastructure, and allows for improvement to some of our best loved treasures, such as North Quarter Park and the Meeting House.

We were able to retain much of our state revenue, although some portions are controversial and will likely be threatened in future years as well. Our overall goal with the budget is to have enough revenue growth and keep expenses low enough to avoid any large spikes in the mill rate. In the end, the Board of Finance set the mill rate for 2018/2019 at 27.11; an increase of .75.

Connecticut River Area Health District

I hope you will all join me in congratulating Chester's sanitarian, Lee Vito and our Health Director, Dr. Konrad Kotrady on their respective retirements. As a consequence, we have spent the past several months researching the best service possible to ensure Chester's continued public health protection and sanitary services. I am happy to announce that, as of July 1, 2018, Chester will become the newest member town of the Connecticut River Area Health District, or CRAHD, currently headquartered in Old Saybrook. We will continue to maintain our sanitarian

property records at Town Hall and will have a dedicated sanitarian in the Land Use office on Monday and Wednesday mornings and at least one Tuesday evening per month. Watch the Chester website for more information about schedules. Additionally, the Health Dis-

trict is available to Chester on a full time basis for services such as emergent inspections, well and other types of contamination, public health education and emergency response public health coverage. The sanitarian can be reached in Town Hall at 860-526-0013 x206. Welcome CRAHD and best of luck to Lee and Konrad in their new adventures!

boaters and swimmers, and were contributing to the excessive nourishment of our beautiful watershed. We have put funding in our budget on a continuing basis to be able to keep a minimum level of maintenance over the years, and anticipate having to repeat this hydro-raking or a similar process every two to three years. Enjoy!

SustainableCT

As you are no doubt well aware, Chester's ETeam, Conservation Commission, Cedar Lake Watershed Committee, Chester Merchants and many others have been very active in working to reduce energy consumption, protect our natural resources and keep our town thriving culturally. With the recent formation of the Sustainable CT certification program, towns in CT will be able to learn from each other and have a roadmap for success. I am please to announce that Chester has joined this voluntary statewide initiative and is in the process of forming a Sustainable Chester Committee. Chester Harbor Management Commission



Your Chester Harbor Management Commission is doing our part in: Keeping The River Clean ... One Boat At A Time.

We manage the Lower Connecticut River Pumpout Boat Program. Our fleet, services the recreational boats, in the River, from the East Haddam Bridge to Old Saybrook. The program is funded under the Federal Clean Vessel Act. In Connecticut it is managed by the Department of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP). The Town of Essex is the fiduciary. We are a success story here in Connecticut and have received two national awards for innovations in the Program. Our gallonage off-loaded from boats here represents 8.65% of the total coastal (and Candlewood Lake) fixed stations and other mobile operations. In the last three years we have grown by 51%. In 2017, from the 115,623 gallons of waste we collected, we were able to eliminate 535 tons of material, including 96.49 pounds of nitrogen, (the pollution [illness and disease causing] agent) from entering the River.

2018 looks to be another very busy season.







Tax Office

THE PERFECT STORM as related to taxes and the tax office!

At this busy time of tax collecting, I would like to remind all of you why it is so important to pay taxes on time, especially MV taxes. Here's why: Back in March, during our large noreaster, a young lady was pulled over by the police since her car was not registered. She was polite to the police officer, and in turn, he was polite back to her. She explained that she did not know her MV was not registered since she had never received the paperwork from DMV. He informed her that she was also late paying her taxes, and again, she told him she had never received a tax bill. The tax office had just closed, and would not reopen until Tuesday.

Our office is not open most Mondays, but I happened to go into the office, and this very distressed but polite young woman came in with her "driver" since she could not drive her unregistered MV until things were cleared up. I was able to tell her how much her taxes were and she paid with cash, but I could not release her with DMV because even though the power had come back to Town Hall, one day after the storm, we had no internet, and that is how you release late paying taxpayers. She was going to have to WAIT LONGER & continue to have her "driver" take her places.

When we still did not have internet on that Tuesday, I was going to drive to Haddam Town Hall and use their internet to release her with DMV. You cannot use home computers for this technical process and you cannot let anyone else use your user name or password because of the very serious and restrictive contract that Tax Collectors signed with the DMV. So because her mail had actually never reached her, and we had 3 envelopes returned to us, showing they had been returned, she had not received either item. Therefore she had been driving an unregistered MV with delinquent taxes.

At noon on Tuesday, internet was restored, and so I did not have to go to Haddam. A word to the wise, pay your taxes on time and call the Tax Collector in July and maybe also in January. If you do NOT receive your MV taxes, to make sure you have no taxes due! Check online for MV registration info!

Do NOT get caught in the PERFECT STORM ruining your driving ability and maybe getting ticketed!

What You Can Do To Help Keep Our Streams and Lakes Clean

Do you have any idea where stormwater and material that get into Chester's roadside catch basins and storm drains go? The answer is that they end up in our lakes and streams and may eventually discharge into the Connecticut River and Long Island Sound. The problem is that stormwater often carries all sorts of pollutants that wash off pavement and our lawns (pesticides, lawn fertilizer, road sand, salt, pathogens from pet waste , etc.) or that are "dumped" into catch basins (used motor oil, grass clippings, paint, etc.).

Polluted stormwater is called non-point source pollution. It's pollution that has many but not clearly identifiable sources. It is the most common type of water pollution and the most difficult to control.

In Chester there are over 500 stormwater catch basins. The town has mapped the locations of all catch basins and stormwater outfalls and is required by the State periodically to test the quality of the stormwater to insure there are no significant pollution problems.

Here are a few things we all can do to help minimize pollutants getting into stormwater and polluting our water bodies: Avoid using pesticides and herbicides that are harmful to aquatic life.

Don't over fertilize your lawn – the grass can't use the excess nutrients and it saves you money – apply fertilizer at the right time of year and use organic fertilizer if possible.

Have your septic tank pumped every 5 years as required by town ordinance.

Never ever dump anything into a catch basin and don't sweep grass clippings into the street.

Collect roof runoff in rain barrels and use it to water landscape plantings.

your children while they are in the water, and do not leave them unattended at the facility. Drowning is the second leading cause of trauma deaths for ages 1-19 years old and the third leading cause of ALL deaths of children 0-4 years of age. There are 3,533 fatal (non-boating related) drownings annually in the United States. This is about 10 drowning deaths per day.

We would like all patrons to realize that no one is permitted in the water if they are under the influence of drugs or alcohol, or while they are chewing gum or eating. Among adolescents and adults, alcohol use is involved in up to 70% of deaths associated with water recreation.

Please remember that head first entries are not permitted at our swimming facilities. This includes throwing children into the water. Head-first entries are the leading cause of sports related spinal injuries.



Seeking Volunteers for Well Water Testing in Deep River Quadrangle

Residents of rural New England principally rely on ground water extracted from fractured crystalline and sedimentary bedrock for their domestic well water. Despite the importance and reliance on this critical resource, little is known about the water supply or background water quality conditions.

Currently, there is no statewide program that monitors or tracks domestic well development or water quality conditions in Connecticut; however, given the density of wells and the frequency of testing, this information will be crucial in providing a clear understanding of the subsurface and the quality of water delivered to our taps.

Dr. Metcalf from Eastern Connecticut State University, in cooperation with the Department of Energy and Environmental Protection, the Connecticut Geological Survey, and the Connecticut Department of Public Health, is seeking volunteers for water quality sampling at no cost to the home owner. This information will provide the most current background levels in water quality which will be analyzed and compared to mineralogical and lithological data obtained for the same study area. The knowledge gained from this approach benefit many and provides a unique means to understand the dynamic and complex fractured bedrock groundwater system.





Age-Related Macular Degeneration


Age-Related Macular Degeneration (AMD) is the leading cause of severe vision loss in adults over the age of 50. This eye disease occurs when there are changes to the macula, a small portion of the retina that's located on the inside back layer of the eye. Commonly, older people develop macular degeneration as a natural part of the aging process. AMD causes loss of central vision and it can occur in two forms: wet and dry. With macular degeneration, you may experience symptoms such as blurriness, dark areas or distortion of your central vision, or permanent loss of your central



vision. It usually does not affect your peripheral vision. For example, with advanced macular degeneration you could be able to see the outline of a clock, yet you may not be able to see the hands of the clock to tell what time it is. The majority of people with macular degeneration experience the dry form, which does not have a known treatment, but many people benefit from a vitamin regimen. Unfortunately, vision loss cannot be reversed. The less common wet form may respond to lasers and medical injections if caught and treated early. Smoking and high blood pressure are often associated with the wet form of macular degeneration.

If you have been diagnosed with dry macular degeneration, you should use a chart called an Amsler grid every day to monitor your vision. Dry macular degeneration can quickly change into the more damaging wet form. If you notice any change of vision, you should contact your ophthalmologist immediately.

Middlesex Hospital Strengthens Breast Program

With the addition of nationally recognized breast surgeon Kristen Zarfos, Middlesex Hospital is investing in its breast program and enhancing the services it offers. Dr. Zarfos joins Dr. Andrea Malon, medical director of the Middlesex Hospital Cancer Center, and Dr. Chia-Chi Wang, a surgical oncologist, as surgeons who treat women who have breast cancer. Together, the trio - with years of surgery experience between them provide compassionate, individualized care, and they aim to strengthen an already robust breast program.

All three surgeons are part of the Middlesex Hospital Surgical Alliance, and their goal is to coordinate care in a way that helps patients better navigate cancer diagnoses and treatments - in a way that eases fears and makes the process a little easier.

Dr. Zarfos is no stranger to Middlesex Hospital. Her first job after residency was at Middlesex, where she worked from 1987 to 1999. During that time, she became a leader in the national fight to force health insurers to cover hospital stays

for mastectomy patients, and she remains a passionate advocate for women's health issues.

Since early detection is key when it comes to all types of cancer, detection technology is at the forefront of Middlesex Hospital's breast program. The hospital offers 3D mammography machines at all of its Radiology locations. These 3D machines detect 40 percent more invasive cancers than 2D machines, which are no longer used by the hospital. Middlesex also offers dual-head molecular breast imaging, which uses a radioactive tracer to better detect breast cancer cells in women with dense breast tissue.

In addition, services like genetic counseling are available to Middlesex patients, and caring nurse navigators at Middlesex Hospital Cancer Center help patients throughout their experience. The Cancer Center has locations in Middletown and Westbrook.





Cruise Blues & Brews Festival



The last word...

Joey Logano – Inspiring others to do for others

Professional NASCAR driver Joey Logano started his racing career right here in Connecticut racing quarter midget cars and quickly made a name for himself. Starting at the age of six, the Middletown, CT native started winning championship after championship – to the point that, by the time he was 15, he was already on the radar with NASCAR racing legends. Now, he's always to be reckoned with on the NASCAR racing scene, competing fulltime in the Monster Energy NASCAR series and part-time in the NASCAR Xfinity series.

THE STATS ARE IMPRESSIVE.

- Youngest driver to win a NASCAR Xfinity Series race - winning at Kentucky Speedway in 2008 when he was just 18 years, 21 days old and in only his third Xfinity Series start.
- 2009 Monster Energy NASCAR Cup Series Rookie of the Year
- Won the Daytona 500 in 2015 Second youngest driver to win this race.
- 49 combined wins in NASCAR's top-three series

There is, of course, the glitz and the glamor that pervades NASCAR as a whole. And there's the occasional race-action controversy. And there are the ups and downs. After early successes (leading to the nickname, "Sliced Bread") and nearly winning a championship in 2016, Joey failed to make the playoffs in 2017. This year could mark a turnaround. Joey notched a win at Talladega Superspeedway in April, which ended a nearly year-long winless streak and, as of press time, he is fifth in the NASCAR Championship Point Standings.

But there's more to the 28-year-old than that. Joey and his wife Brittany, whom he married in 2014, welcomed their first child into the world this past January. Joey and Brittany have also been very committed to giving back. In a previous conversation, Joey mentioned, "If we can touch a few people's lives and help them become contributing members of our community and the world, it's really going to make a difference and it starts one person at a time." That's the crux of the Joey Logano Foundation that invests in organizations offering second chances to children and young adults during times of crisis and works to inspire others to live a life of generosity.

WHY SECOND CHANCES?

First, there was a life-changing visit to Joplin, Missouri in 2011 where Joey helped to rebuild a home for a local family following the tornado that devastated the area. That family needed a second chance. Little did Joey know that he would soon need his own second chance. He had been driving the No. 20 Toyota Camry for Joe Gibbs Racing since the 2009 season, but that ended in 2012. He received his second chance when he was picked up by Penske Racing in 2012. The following year, the Joey Logano Foundation was established.

Since 2013, the foundation has invested almost \$2.7 million in various organizations across the country. Programs include inviting children who are facing tough situations (whether physically and/or emotionally) annually to a NASCAR race to be part of the crew for the day, supporting non-profit organizations during the 10-week NASCAR playoffs in each playoff race market, assembling and donating comfort care backpacks to foster and/or terminally ill children, and an annual fundraiser in Connecticut, called Driving Hope Home. A portion of the Driving Hope Home proceeds are donated to The Ronald McDonald House of Connecticut with the remaining proceeds donated to reputable charities the foundation supports to offer children in need a first or second chance. In its 5th year, Driving Hope Home will be held at Foxwoods Resort in Mashantucket, CT on July 18th and 19th. "It's our responsibility. You have to do it. If we we're not going to do it, who else is going to be an advocate for these kids," says Brittany, who notes that first chances are important too. "They need a first opportunity in life. If we can shed light to this and inspire others to do the same, we can have a bigger impact than the two of us. That's our goal."

There is no doubt that Joey is a fierce competitor and a pure NASCAR racing talent. But don't overlook the other side. "When you are able to make a difference like that, you can see it in that person's face, how much it affects their lives - there's no better feeling than that," he observes. "I can talk about race wins as much as I want and how great that is but there's nothing better than that win - when you're are able to affect something. That's a bigger win than any racetrack can get you."
