
#### **Town Center Master Plan Approved**

At the special Town Meeting held July 23rd, residents approved the master plan for Chester Village and the Center District. This adoption is the culmination of a year's work by the Main Street Project Committee. The Plan is a long range guide for the design and construction of drainage, pavement, curbing, sidewalks and lighting along the 2,300 foot section of Main Street from Water Street to Middlesex Avenue. The master plan recommends a phased approach to this streetscape work coordinated with the replacement of the Main Street Bridge by the Department of Transportation, now scheduled for January 2016.

Following the adoption of the master plan the Main Street Committee moved quickly to solicit the qualifications of engineering firms to prepare Phase I construction plans and bid documents. Phase I extends from Laurel Hill Cemetery to Middlesex Avenue, approximately 1,700 feet. This section of Main Street will be less complicated than the construction proposed within the commercial center. The goal will be to secure sufficient funding to begin construction of Phase I in late Spring 2014 and complete work by Fall 2015 prior to the start of the Main Street Bridge replacement.

#### Board of Selectmen Support Cedar Swamp Protection by DEEP

Cedar Swamp Road extends from Baker Road in Chester approximately 4,700 feet through the Cockaponset State Forest into Deep River at Shailer Pond. The majority of the road is under the control of DEEP's Forestry Division, approximately 1,200 feet is owned by the Town of Chester.

Department of Interior. The swamp's water level and water flow are being damaged by vehicles using Cedar Swamp Road causing rutting, erosion and sediment. On September 3rd the Board of Selectmen approved DEEP's proposal to regrade short sections of the unimproved road and construct low flow culvert crossings to allow the natural fill and drainage of the swamp's water level. The Chester Conservation Commission advised the Board of Selectmen to support DEEP's plan and

also install gates and signs cautioning that Cedar Swamp Road is suited only for 4-wheel drive vehicles. The project will be done by DEEP's Forestry Division in Spring 2014.

#### Summer Construction Projects Completed at Cedar Lake and Chester Elementary School

In July the Park and Recreation Commission completed the installation of a new 420 square foot storage building at Pelletier Park. Volunteers Randy Netsch and Brian Buckley donated their expertise and time to assist with the building's design, set up and relocation of the seasonal toilet facilities. Chester Public Works Department assisted with site preparation and the demolition of the old bath house structure.

At Chester Elementary School 7,565 square feet of the gabled roof was replaced and aluminum cover was applied to protect exposed wood rake and fascia areas. This work was funded from the Town's fiscal year 2013-2014 capital budget, the total project cost was \$43,620.

Also completed at the Elementary School was the installation of a 9.25 kW solar photovoltaic roof system. This project was funded by a \$32,000 grant from the Clean Energy Finance Investment Authority and an \$8,000 match from the Town. The solar system is estimated to produce about 6,300 kwh of power at an annual savings of \$1,500 off the school's electric bill, this is a 12.5 percent return on the Town's \$8,000 investment.

#### **Remove Dangerous Road Obstructions**

Residents are requested to remove dangerous obstructions from the edge of Town roads. Portable basketball stands and trash receptacles pose hazardous conditions for drivers along our narrow streets, especially at night time. Larger emergency vehicles, Town snow plows and box delivery trucks need wider and higher clearance. Please remove these dangerous obstacles and keep Chester's roads safe.

# Chester Joins C-PACE Program

At a special Town Meeting July 23rd Chester approved participation in the C-PACE, Commercial Property Assessed Clean Energy program. This program is a partnership between municipalities and the State's Clean Energy Finance Investment Authority, CEFIA, that facilitates loans to private business owners to pay for renewable and energy efficiency building improvements. CEFIA works with private lenders to set up the loan financing to be less or equal to the cost of the energy saving improvements.

The Town of Chester's role is to collect and remit the loan payments to CEFIA. The energy improvement loans are treated as a benefit assessment similar to a property lien for a sewer assessment. The Town is held harmless for delinquent loans.

The C-PACE loans are available to commercial property and residential uses with 5 or more dwelling units.

The energy improvements that are eligible for low interest loans include high efficiency lighting, HVAC upgrades and controls, high efficiency boilers, furnaces and chillers, solar systems and building energy management systems.

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
# Troop 13 - Chester/Deep River Boy Scouts

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# Animal Control Officer News

Mother Nature will either bring lots of rain, or nothing at all. Old Man Winter may bring a few inches of snow or two feet of the white fluffy stuff. So let's prepare our pets for anything and while we're at it, let's get ready ourselves.

Now is a good time to check around the house and outbuildings for small holes where any small animal could get in and make it their winter home; they may be doing that now before waiting for the last minute. And as we get set for Fall and Winter, we are also reminded that while fall clean up can be fun, it can be dangerous to our pets. Pets are playful in the leaves, so be sure to check your pets and yourself for ticks. Kids will be trick or treating and playing outdoors in all kinds of weather, so watch your pets.

One more thing I would like to address. As I watched the news on television the other day, an animal control officer was arrested for cruelty to animals in his care, caught on camera. This does not happen in our pound. I give loving care to all the animals in our pound. They are walked twice a day, they receive clean water and food, and when needed the animals receive medical care. So when you call for a stray dog that showed up at your home, rest assured they will be taken care of in the best possible way. All dogs that are picked up without tags are advertised in the newspaper and held in the pound. If they are unclaimed after seven days they are put up for adoption.

So, be mindful of your pets and have yourself some fun and safe holidays!



# **Septic Tank Pump Outs**

Property owners are reminded to have their septic tanks pumped out and inspected a maximum of every five years and sooner if there is heavy usage.

The Town of Chester does have an ordinance that requires all septic tanks to be pumped out every five years as a safeguard for the entire septic system and to also benefit the property owner from potential costs with repairing or replacing the septic system. It is much more economical to pay a small expense for preventative maintenance than to have to pay substantial costs for a repair!

Referees must be at least 14 years of age and may be compensated at a rate of \$14 per game. All coaching and referee candidates must meet reference and background check requirements, attend an orientation on Tuesday, November 12 from 6:00 to 7:00 pm at the Town Hall, and complete first aid training within one year of beginning to coach or referee. First aid classes are offered free of charge.

Adult Recreational Basketball. This program meets from December 3 through March 13 at the Chester Elementary School multipurpose room on Tuesdays and Thursdays, from 7:15-9:00 pm. There is no basketball on school vacation days, when the school closes due to severe weather, or when there are special school events in the evening. Registration is required BEFORE playing. The registration fee is \$10 for Chester residents and \$15 for nonresidents.

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# Chester Parks - Wonderful Areas to Observe Fall Colors

Cedar Lake. The Town of Chester owns Cedar Lake and maintains two public beaches on its shores. The area of the lake is about 80 acres and is fed by two springs and two inlet streams with outflow into the Pattaconk Brook. The lake is about 60 feet deep in the middle. The Town owns approximately one third of the shore. Another third is owned by Camp Hazen YMCA. The remainder is private residences and State owned property, including a boat launch. Chester's main beach, on West Main Street, has a 50,000 square foot swimming area that is as deep as 20 feet. The park at the shore is named Robert H. Pelletier Park in memory of the Chester resident who was the Head Lifeguard for more than two decades. The park area is 0.7 acres and includes seasonal lifeguard coverage, picnic tables, a pavilion, grills, and a food concession. The smaller waterfront facility is located on Cedar Lake Road and was named Lake View Park in 2012. It is unstaffed and has no designated swimming area. The beaches require patrons to have a permit.

North Quarter Park. North Quarter Park is a 22 acre, multiuse facility, located at the corner of Main Street and Middlesex Avenue. It includes a playground, picnic area, volleyball net, baseball field, and a multi-use practice field in a wooded setting. The northern section of the park has a well-maintained .5 mile nature trail loop. The end of the trail offers beautiful views of the wildlife and habitat of the Chester Creek. A variety of water fowl, birds, and vegetation can be seen along the trail and in the creek.

is located at the end of Parker's Point Road on the Connecticut River. It offers boat trailer parking and a picnic area with a beautiful view. The shore is a favorite winter eagle viewing location. A permit is required for parking.

L'hommedieu Park. This old mill site is located on Spring

Parker's Point Boat Launch. This .6 acre boat launch facility

**L'hommedieu Park.** This old mill site is located on Spring Street, along the Pattaconk Brook. It is a peaceful setting with a dam, rushing waters, a picnic table, and views of Mallards, Wood Ducks, Great Blue Heron, and beavers. A historic narrative is located in the park.

**Chester Creek Overlook.** The overlook is a .4 acre waterfront spot with a deck, seating area, and parking lot on the Chester Creek, just a stone's throw from the Connecticut River. It is located at the end of Railroad Avenue. The Town dock at the overlook houses marine rescue and law enforcement watercraft.

Chester Elementary School Baseball Fields. Three baseball fields are maintained by the Parks and Recreation Department at Chester Elementary School, on Ridge Road. The property was originally donated to the Town in 1928 by Jessie C. Bates, Hilton C. Brooks, and William P. Holden for athletic fields. The fields may be available for group usage by submitting the Group Use Application for Chester Park Facilities form.

**DOG OWNERS:** Please abide by the statutes of our State and ordinances of our Town. Dogs are not permitted on playgrounds or beach parks, except guide dogs. Dogs in other areas of the parks must be controlled by a leash. Dogs may not roam on the property. Any waste material deposited by your dog must be removed before leaving the immediate area.

# A Note from Public Works

#### **FALLING LEAVES...**

The Town of Chester does not have leaf pickup. Therefore, the options are...

- mulching your leaves for compost,
- raking them to a corner of your yard,
- or hiring someone to take care of your leaves.

Do not rake your leaves into the road way – this will only plug up the drains and the result will be water damage or flooding when it rains.

It is not too early to think about WINTER...

- Please remember to move your vehicles off the streets during winter storms for efficient snow plowing.
- Please do not place your garbage receptacles into the street as the road crews will need to plow your street– keep receptacles at the inside end of your driveway otherwise the plow will have to go around and not be able to plow the snow completely from in front of your driveway.
- Sand and salt will be available at the Town Garage on Grote Road. Please, only one pail per household.
- Please remove any basketball hoops from the roadside and town right of way – they could potentially be caught and destroyed by the plow going by.

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# News from the Chester Historical Society

**Transportation Exhibit & Steamboat Program.** Many townsfolk and visitors have been stopping by to visit the Chester Museum at The Mill since it opened on Memorial Day weekend. As summer was turning to fall, we were welcoming nearly 50 visitors a weekend.


The museum will be open every Saturday and Sunday through October 27, from 10 am to 4 pm. It'll also be open on Thanksgiving weekend, Friday and Saturday, Nov. 29 and 30, providing just the entertainment you need for your holiday visitors. The museum will then be closed until May 2014. And don't forget – admission is free.

Our first floor exhibit, "Over the River & Through the Woods," gives a picture of early transportation (roads, train, trolley, ferry and steamboats) in Chester. In addition, the award-winning permanent exhibit, "Streams of Change: Life & Industry along the Pattaconk," telling the story of how the Chester community lived and prospered throughout changing economic conditions, is open on the second floor.

In connection with our transportation exhibit, Brenda Milkofsky, currently Interim Director of the Connecticut River Museum, will address the checkered progress of steam navigation on the Connecticut River in an illustrated talk on Sunday, Oct. 6 at 4 pm in the Chester Meeting House. The Connecticut Valley contributed more than its share of steamboat inventors and also developers of the commercial combinations that allowed this risky business to survive from 1823 until 1931. During that time, this important improvement in travel transformed American life by connecting people and places through easy, inexpensive and often elegant vessels that reflected constantly changing technology.

Other Fall Happenings. Also this fall, the Chester Historical Society is hosting its 10th Antiques Appraisal on Nov. 9 (see separate articles in this magazine). And the Robbie Collomore Concert Series will celebrate its 40th anniversary season with its first two concerts – in October and November (see separate article in this magazine).

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# Tax Collecting Responsibilities During the Fall

Looking forward to the fall, and cooler temps and beautiful fall colors, we will be continuing to collect the delinquent taxes and the taxes from people who have set up payment plans. To each of those, remember to continue to pay, because you cannot catch up unless you are paying toward your bill. We are rooting for each of them that paying becomes easier and not harder for them. Our office will also be busy preparing WPCA usage bills and the assessment bills for properties along the sewer line. These bills will be going out mid September, and due anytime in October. Pay attention to our hours of just Tues & Thurs from 9-12 and 1-4 and Wednesdays just 9-12 noon. Payments could be mailed to the Tax Collector, PO Box 314, Chester, CT 06412-0314. This year, the last day to pay without penalty will be Nov 1st, but that is a Friday. We do not plan on being in the office that day. But you certainly could stop in town hall and leave your payment in an envelope in the locked box on the second floor across from the elevator, and the box is clearly marked: TAX COLLECTOR. Be sure to place your check which must be signed and dated and recorded with the accurate amount, in an envelope.

Our duties, during October, also include registering approximately 110 aircraft and mailing out the decals for those same aircraft based at Chester Airport. All information must match the FAA formal registration and requires us to cross reference a lot of info.

So, as you can see, we are always busy in the tax office, but still willing to speak with anyone with a tax question or their plan for paying off late bills. We look forward to continuing to help any taxpayer that we can. But, this coming December, we might have to have some TAX SALES on properties that have back taxes. Good luck to each who are trying to catch up and trying to avoid losing their property. It is a process we do NOT want to have to pursue if at all possible. # Public Service Announcement from the Town Clerk's Office

**NEW LEGISLATION**: Public Act 12-57, "An Act Concerning Permanent Absentee Ballot Status for the Permanently Disabled" created permanent absentee balloting status for certain individuals and became effective January 1, 2013.

**IN GENERAL:** to be eligible for permanent absentee ballot status, an elector must file with the Town Clerk an absentee ballot application together with a doctor's certificate stating that they have a permanent disability and are unable to appear in person at their polling place. The doctor's note should be on letterhead. There is no prescribed form – the doctor's note and the absent ballot application would satisfy the requirement of the law.

Permanent absentee ballot status enables the elector to receive an absentee ballot for each election, primary, and referendum in the municipality in which they are eligible to vote. Absentee ballots are available 21 days before a Primary and 31 days before an Election.

**ELIGIBILITY:** In January of each year the Registrars of Voters will send written notice to each elector with permanent absentee ballot status to determine if the elector continues to reside at the address on the permanent absentee ballot application. If the elector fails to respond to the notice, the permanent absentee ballot status will be removed, but the elector will remain on the voter registration list.

## Energy Assistance

As the weather turns colder, statewide energy assistance programs that help residents with heating bills and conserving energy will begin. Programs are available from September 1 through March 31. Connecticut Energy Assistance Program (CEAP) helps income eligible households pay their heating bills. State Appropriated Fuel Assistance (SAFA) helps the elderly and disabled individuals with their heating bills. If you received assistance last winter, you must reapply each year to receive assistance. Deliverable fuel applicants, (oil, propane, kerosene, coal, wood) are urged to apply early, as deliveries will begin November 15th. To make an appointment to fill out an application, please contact Rosie Bininger at (860) 526-0013 x213, Monday, Wednesday, Thursday mornings or leave a message with your name, phone number, and best time to reach you.

#### **OPERATION FUEL**

Operation Fuel is a statewide private, nonprofit organization that provides emergency energy assistance to: low income and moderate income, elderly, and disabled households, which are either ineligible for government energy assistance or have exhausted their benefits. Eligibility is determined by Chester Social Services and is based upon review of a client's completed application and satisfactory documentation of household's income, liquid assets, and crisis situation. For the 2013-2014 program year, household income for a 12-month period must fall between 151% of the federal poverty guidelines and 100% of the state median household income.

The Operation Fuel season begins December 1, 2013 and runs through May 30, 2014 or when funding runs out. Contact Human Services (860-526-0013 X213) to see if you qualify.

For your skin's health, it is essential to eat organically grown fruits and vegetables rich in antioxidants such as vitamin C (bell pepper, parsley, broccoli, strawberries, cauliflower, papaya, kiwifruit, lemon), vitamin E (sunflower seeds, swiss chard, almonds, spinach, olives), carotenoids (sweet potatoes, spinach, kale, carrots, roman lettuce, cantaloupe, bell pepper) and flavonoids (blueberries, raspberries, strawberries, plums, raisins, cranberries, celery, apples, lemon), as well as foods rich in omega 3-fatty acids including fish such as salmon, tuna, sardines and cod, in addition to flaxseeds and walnuts. Omega 3 inhibits the production of inflammatory compounds involved in the progression of skin conditions. Good hydration with high quality water is necessary for skin health.

To have beautiful, wrinkle free skin on your face avoid sugar and alcohol. Alcohol will lead your body to dehydration and dryness of your skin, eating too much sugar will lead to wrinkles and sagging. Too much sugar in your bloodstream will start to attack your skin. All that sugar attaches to protein molecules, collagen and elastin, and it turns those beautiful supple skin cells into rigid things causing sagging and wrinkling, everything we don't want on our face.

Regular exercises and massage sessions will help with appropriate blood circulation.

The skin needs protection from continued exposure to sunlight to prevent premature aging and cancerous changes. If you can, do your outdoor activities before 10 am or after 2 pm, when the ultraviolet rays are less intense. In case of sunburn, use natural remedies to help the healing process of the skin. The fat content of milk is soothing, so milk makes a great compress for sunburn pain. To speed the process of healing, eat more foods rich in vitamin C. Keep an aloe vera plant in your house, when you get sunburn, break and open a leaf then apply the clear gel inside directly to your tender skin. Apply as often as needed for relief. Also a baking soda bath is great for soothing sunburn. Appropriate applications of sunscreen before and during time spent in the sun, especially after swimming, can prevent skin damage.


# Robbie Collomore Concert Series Opens 40th Season

# Leaf Disposal

With Fall upon us, the Chester Inland Wetlands Agency urges that residents properly dispose of leaves. Leaves cannot be discarded in stream banks, lakes, or ponds where they cause filling and aquatic growth. Putting this kind of material in such areas adds phosphorus and other nutrients directly to waterways. Phosphorus is a fertilizer that promotes aquatic plant growth such as algae. In the past some residents have deposited their leaves on the top of the bank of Jennings Pond on the south side of West Main Street. In addition to adding nutrients to the pond, this type of disposal causes filling of storm drains. All Chester residents are encouraged to find more proper methods of leaf disposal.

Composting of leaves and other yard waste such as weeds and twigs is a good alternative. The finished compost can be returned to the soil in the garden, or can be used as mulch around shrubs and other plants. There are many sources of information about composting. The Cooperative Extension System has many pamphlets available. Many gardening books in our library have information about composting. Also in our library is a copy of the video , Home Composting: "Turning Your Spoils to Soil," produced by the Connecticut Department of Environmental Protection Recycling Program, an excellent resource.

Leaves, as well as brush and grass clippings, can be disposed of at the Deep River Transfer Station on Winthrop Road in Deep River. You can call the transfer station at (860) 526-6047 for details.

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# A Note from the Assessor

The October 1, 2013 town-wide revaluation is well under way. Property inspections should conclude by the end of September. Notices of the new assessments will be issued in mid-November and will include information on opportunities to meet with representatives of the revaluation company in December. Also, the Board of Assessment Appeals will hold hearings in April of 2014. Applications to appeal must be submitted by March 20, 2014.

All persons having taxable personal property such as unregistered motor vehicles, horses and ponies, farm equipment, or any furniture, fixtures and equipment used in the operation of a business, must declare the personal property by November 1, 2013. Declaration forms are available at the Assessor's office. They will also be mailed to all businesses and residents who have declared property in the past. As per CGS 12-41 declarants filing a late or incomplete form will incur a 25% penalty. Please be aware that if you have taxable personal property and do not declare it, state statutes allow the assessor to add it at an estimated amount plus a 25% penalty.

Applications for Farm and Forest (Public Act 490) will be accepted from September 1 until December 31st, 2013. Forms are available in the Assessor's office.

Any person who acquired a new motor vehicle after October 1, 2012 will receive a supplemental motor vehicle bill for their new vehicle by January 2014. These bills will be prorated, based on the date of registration, for the twelve month period starting October 2012 and ending September 2013. Vehicle acquired in August and September do not receive supplemental bills.

New Veterans seeking exemption must record their honorable discharge papers (DD214) with the Town Clerk by October 1, 2013. Active duty military personnel who have served 90 days or more may also be eligible for an exemption and should contact the Assessor's office prior to October 1 for more details.

Do you ever watch the commercials for buying gold and wonder if there's any money in the gold necklaces in your jewelry box?


Have you wondered about the value of that old stamp collection your dad left you or the sterling silver flatware your kids don't want to inherit from you?

# Chester Fife and Drum Corps 1868 A Piece of Chester History



The founder of The Chester Fife & Drum Corps was a local man by the name of Daniel Silliman. According to his

grand-daughter's diary, the Chester Fife and Drum Corps was organized in 1867 but incorporated in 1868. The Corps is celebrating its 145th year and is making plans for celebrating the 150 Anniversary. They are one of the oldest continuous Fife and Drum Corps in the United States.

The Chester Fife and Drum Corps have had many notables amongst its membership. With respect to Daniel Silliman, entire families like the Watrous family and the Narducci family were noted for many years of membership as well as Acton Osling who was a distinguished drummer in his day. Oliver Buell, from the 1867 membership record, just happens to have one of his descendants still in the corps today. Don Buell is continuing the honor by following in the footsteps of his father; Ralph and Uncle Dave Buell.

The Chester Drum Corps would like to honor three of our members who will be attending college and to pursue their education: Megan Cordeau who will be attending Eastern Connecticut State University; Julia Beaulieu will be attending UCONN and Kaila Moonan who will be starting her teaching internship at a local school. Congratulations to all of them and see you at Torchlight and in the line-of-march in 2014. WOW.

The corps is led by Drum Major Frenchy Cordeau, President Brian Schiller, Drum Sergeant Don Buell, Fife Sergeant Mare Harlow, Color Guard Sergeant Carlos Uphold and Bass Corporal Frank Jasinski.

In 1959, a Hollywood movie was made in Chester CT, starring Doris Day, Ernie Kovacs, and Jack Lemmon by the name of "It Happened to Jane." The Chester Fife and Drum Corps had a cameo appearance at the end of the movie to celebrate an event and the piece that was played then is still being played the same way now.

During the Chester Fife & Drum Corps 145 plus years of continuous active service, the Corps has appeared at the World's Fair in Switzerland, had the honor of representing the United States of America as the 1st ever American Fife & Drum Corps to march and perform in the Scottish Highland Games in 1985. This particular honor led to a requested command performance at the residence of the Duke and Duchess of Argyle. The Drum Corps has also marched in presidential inaugural parades and has notably raised havoc with a particular chandelier while performing inside the White House.

One of the unique attributes of this corps is that they are neither a Senior Corps nor a Junior Corps, but rather a Combination Corps. Some of our junior members compete in their respective fields. This past month was the 2013 CT State Championships where Megan Cordeau, for the second year, won in the Junior Women's Division on Bass drum. She will be competing in the Northeastern Championships.





#### PREPARE FOR HURRICANES

• Get a kit of emergency supplies and prepare a portable kit in case you have to evacuate.

- Familiarize yourself with the terms that are used to identify a hurricane.
- A hurricane watch means a hurricane is possible in your area. Be prepared to evacuate.
- Monitor local radio and television news outlets or listen to NOAA Weather Radio for the latest developments.
- A hurricane warning is when a hurricane is expected in your area. If local authorities advise you to evacuate, leave immediately.

#### PREPARE TO SECURE YOUR PROPERTY:

- Cover all of your home's windows with pre-cut ply wood or hurricane shutters to protect your windows from high winds.
- Plan to bring in all outdoor furniture, decorations, garbage cans and anything else that is not tied down.
  - Keep all trees and shrubs well trimmed.
- If you have a car, fill the gas tank in case you have to evacuate.

#### **PLAN TO EVACUATE**

- Plan how you will leave and where you will go if you are advised to evacuate.
- If you do not have a car, plan alternate means of evacuating.
- Plan places where your family will meet, both within and outside of your immediate neighborhood.
- Identify several places you could go in an emergency, a friend's home in another town, a motel or public shelter.
- If you have a car, keep a half tank of gas in it at all times in case you need to evacuate.
- Become familiar with alternate routes and other means of transportation out of your area.
  - Take your emergency supply kit.


