First Selectwoman's Corner

HOW WE DO THINGS HERE - THE IMPORTANT STUFF

The 58th U.S. Presidential election is almost here. Although this is only my eleventh chance to vote for an American President, I have never known a campaign season to be as fraught with anxiety, anger, fear, half truths and poor behavior as this one seems to be. Local elections tend to be more about the person running than the party he or she belongs to, and for most of our statutory town governments, campaigns can be more cooperative and policy-based than accusatory. No matter our disagreements, we remain neighbors and friends who can talk about the issues. We get used to this.

So I was naively disappointed recently when I attempted to introduce myself to an individual volunteering at a Republican campaign booth at the Chester Fair. Much to my surprise, the individual refused to shake my hand, give me his name, or speak to me in any way other than to tell me he knew I was a Democrat and he had no interest in having a conversation with a Democrat. To his credit, the Republican candidate thanked the volunteer for his help, but told him clearly that "that is not the way we do things here."

Now the signs are going up for our local candidates for state representative and state senate. On the way to Valley Regional High School last week, already some of the signs had been vandalized. Besides being an opportunity for a conversation with my youngest daughter, the lack of respect for other people's property or for views that are not one's own was striking. I hope that we can stop and remind ourselves that we are all neighbors in the same loving community. Honest discourse, lively debate,

even uncomfortable silence are all acceptable forms of disagreement. Vandalism, disrespect, and criminal activity are divisive methods which will have effects that last far beyond the November election.



is being reactivated and a small working group is researching the needs of the historic Chester Meeting House. The Economic Development Commission is working with our Development Office to streamline procedures and develop checklists for new Chester businesses. We are working on publishing descriptions of all of the volunteer positions in Chester with a link on the town website. Please get involved – we need you!

In the last Chester Events, I mentioned that we are looking for ways to broadcast our local government meetings for added accessibility. Are there any budding videographers out there who might be interested in volunteering a few hours per month and learning how to work with our local public access television to air the video? If so, please contact Jenny in my office for more information.

STRATEGIC PLANNING

We are on the way to planning for the future of Chester. Watch

for news about an interactive "visioning" process throughout the fall. The Board of Finance and Board of Selectmen are working toward the goal to develop an overall umbrella for a ten year strategic plan. 
CHESTER'S OWN "ANTIQUES ROADSHOW"



Energy Assistance - Operation Fuel

ENERGY ASSISTANCE

As the weather turns colder, statewide energy assistance programs that help residents with heating bills and conserving energy will begin. Programs are available from September 15 through March 30. Connecticut Energy Assistance Program (CEAP) helps income eligible households pay their heating bills. State Appropriated Fuel Assistance (SAFA) helps the elderly and disabled individuals with their heating bills. If you received assistance last winter, you must reapply each year to receive additional assistance.

Deliverable fuel applicants (oil, propane, kerosene, coal, wood) are urged to apply early, as deliveries will begin November 15th. To make an appointment to fill out an application, please contact Rosie Bininger at 526-0013 x213, Monday, Wednesday, and Thursday mornings or leave a message with your name, phone number, and the best time to reach you.

OPERATION FUEL

Operation Fuel is a statewide private, nonprofit organization that provides emergency energy assistance to low income and moderate income, elderly, and disabled households, which are either ineligible for government energy assistance or have exhausted their benefits. Eligibility is determined by Chester Social Services and is based upon review of a client's

completed application and satisfactory documentation of household's income, liquid assets, and crisis situation. For the 2016-2017 program year, household income for a 12-month period must fall between 151% of the federal poverty guidelines and 100% of the state median household income.

The Operation Fuel season begins December 1, 2016 and runs through May 30, 2017 or when funding runs out.

This is a reminder that absentee ballots become available on Friday, October 7, 2016 for the Presidential Election, which is on Tuesday, November 8, 2016.

Anyone in the following categories is eligible to acquire an absentee ballot from the Town Clerk's Office: a. Is in active service in the armed forces, b. Is absent from town during voting hours, c. Is ill,

- d. Is physically disabled,
- e. Has religious tenets, or
- f. Is working at the polls in another town.

Please know that there is an application process that has to be filled out first before you can be given an absentee ballot.

From Your Tax Collector

2016 Income Tax Info for the Federal Government

Yes, I know it is a bit early for thinking about income taxes, but I wanted you all to know that the full year of 2016 tax information is online and easy to find. So if you cannot find all of your receipts, you do NOT have to call the tax office.

If you use a computer, you just have to go to the Chester Town website at www.chesterct.org and go to SERVICES and then to the section labeled Tax Collector, and on that site there is a direct link to tax information paid to the Town of Chester. Last year, only the July 2015 through December 2015 information was on this site. But this year, the full year of payments are listed. All the information is then available to be printed!

It is very easy to research. Once you are on this special link, a user friendly screen appears that asks for a name. This step is very important – you must type a full last name and then a space and at least the first initial of the person whose taxes you are researching. For example, in my case, you would type Meyer M and you would find what I paid in motor vehicle taxes during 2016. You would also see if something did not get paid. So, this is extremely important if you travel and you think you might have missed a payment, or you just want to double check that you did indeed pay everything required. However, with this above step, you would not find my house taxes. You would have to type Meyer J for that. This is a slight inconvenience, since you would have to know exactly how the house tax is listed and even though my name is on the deed and on the taxes, the information is listed with my husband's name first. So, I would need to search twice to find everything that we paid for the year. In the case of not knowing the exact order of names, you could search by street address. You just change the option box on the left of the screen and ask for "taxes by location." In this case, be sure to put the house number in the first section of search requirements, and then the street (or any part of the street name) in the second search box. Do not use Middlesex Turnpike, for example, since those are listed under Middlesex Ave. So, just use Middlesex. You can use a shorter version for streets, such as just Midd, since there are no other streets in town starting with Midd, but our own Route 154. In the search by street, less is better. So, don't type the word Street out, or the word Lane - just the name of the road is enough. And do not use any punctuation at all. Never use a comma between names. It is really an easy process, especially after you have tried it once or twice.

Some people who misplace their bills are using this method to have a paper to mail in with their payment.

Chester Harbor Management Commission

MOTHERHOOD, APPLE PIE AND CLEAN WATER Chester is in the forefront of clean water in the River and Chester Creek.

The Harbor Management Commission has, for years, been testing the water quality in Chester Creek. Mooring fees fund this testing. One of the problems discovered by Jacobson Engineering, for poor water quality in the upper Creek area, was pigeons roosting under the Main Street Bridge.

Through cooperation of the Department of Transportation (DOT) and the Department of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP) we were able to add bird protection into the bridge design. The Chester Harbor Management Commission is proud

to announce the new Main Street Bridge has been outfitted with bird spikes to deter birds for roosting.

Also, the Commission, in collaboration with the Town of Essex. manages the lower Connecticut River Pump Out Boat Program. We run two boats from the East Haddam Bridge to (but not into) Long Island Sound. Chester, with over 850 boats in its seven yacht clubs and marinas, holds the lead in pump outs (Old Saybrook in gallons). During the 2016 boating season we will have offloaded over 90,000 gallons of material from recreational boats, keeping and improving water quality.

Gypsy Moth Egg Masses

The gypsy moth caterpillars have been gone for several months and the white male moths have also disappeared and died. So, we can heave a sigh of relief. But you may be wondering what you can do between now and early May when a new generation of caterpillars hatches. We can hope for a wet spring to spread

the fungus which kills the caterpillars.

But you can do something this fall or winter to reduce the population of next year's caterpillars: destroy all the egg masses you can find. It will be easier to do this later in the fall when the leaves are off the trees so you can see them

more easily, but before early May when the new generation hatches.

The egg masses are tear shaped, about 1 to 2 inches long, look like buff yellow-brown felt, and are firm to the touch (old egg masses persist after hatching and are squishy). Each contains

between 600 and 1500 eggs. They can be found on tree trunks and branches, of course, but also on anything else which was outdoors in late July and early August when the female moths were laying eggs. So look everywhere: fences, firewood, stone walls, children's play scapes, and even the sides of the house, behind shutters, on the foundation. EVERYWHERE! Also, before putting away portable lawn

furniture, look carefully for egg masses on these.

Don't just scrape them on the ground. They will most likely still hatch. Wear gloves (some people get a rash from handling them) and using something like an old putty knife, scrape the masses into a paper bag or a can. When you have collected all you can find or reach safely,

burn the bag or fill the can with soapy water and let it soak for several days.

Don't pour it down a storm drain! Dispose of the water and masses in a safe way.

If the spring is dry, there will still be gypsy moths, but you can hope that your actions will have reduced the number somewhat.


