notices and ways you can help. This is truly an exciting time in Clinton, so take the time to enjoy it.





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Morgan Building Committee

In April, in a town wide referendum, an appropriation of \$64,750,000 was approved for the construction of a new Morgan School. Since that time, the project has been moving forward and several steps have been taken to accomplish that goal.

The Morgan School Building Committee is comprised of Chairman Gerry Vece, David Townsend, Sally Heffernan, Jeff Stevens, Pete Nye, Dennis Donovan, John Giannotti, Peggy Velsor Sullivan, Peter Chow and Ethelene DiBona.

On April 27, the closing was held to purchase the Richards property on Route 81 where the new 135,000 square foot building will be situated. The location has many educational and logistical advantages, including the connection to the Ethel Peters Complex, which will afford the students the opportunity to walk to the sports complex for athletic events and mentoring and interacting with the elementary grade children. In addition, the new school will be moved away

from the Interstate and the Outlet stores, which will improve safety and security.

An architectural firm, Newman Associates, has been chosen and is in the early stages of design. Construction is scheduled to begin in the first quarter of 2014. Completion of the new school was originally targeted for the end of 2015. If all goes according to plan, an earlier occupancy could be realized.

The new architects will hold open meetings to receive input from the public, and subcommittees will be formed with participation from interested community members.

The grant application and updated budget sheet, along with educational specifications prepared by School Superintendent Jack Cross, were submitted to the state before the June 30, 2012 deadline.

The Committee is currently in the process of hiring a construction management company, owner's representative and commissioning agent.



Water Pollution Control Commission

This spring the Water Pollution Control Commission incurred several major changes in its membership composition. Hal Dolan was elected Chairman following the resignation of former Chairs, Lynn Pinder and Michael MacDonald. Also, due to resignations, the WPCC currently has two vacancies. Citizens interested in participating in the development of solving Clinton's pollution problems should contact the First Selectman's office or the Democratic Town Committee.

The WPCC continues to work along two tracks with CDM Smith the commission's consulting engineering firm. The first is finding land suitable for recharging treated wastewater into the ground. To date over 200 properties have been researched, of which 22 have been walked; monitoring wells were installed on four, with legal action pending to gain access to two remaining properties. Two of the above monitored sites are capable of recharging approximately 100,000 gallons per day. The town's total estimated dispersal requirement is up to 600,000 gallons per day.

Clinton's wastewater difficulties are centered in six areas, and are caused by land consisting of bed rock, wetlands, high water table and/or poor soils, all of which prohibit adequate drainage.

The second track involves prioritizing which of the areas should be addressed first. All are under mandate by the Connecticut Department of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP) for correction. Within each area we are currently evaluating locations to determine on a street by street basis which septic systems comply with the Public Health Code, which need remediation, and those which require transporting the wastewater off site for treatment and dispersal into the groundwater.

The WPCC work is conducted with the advice and guidance of Connecticut River Area Health District (CRAHD), the Department of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP) and local knowledge.

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"Give the Boys a Bath"

Clinton's coming 350th anniversary provides an opportunity to reacquaint ourselves with Clinton's heritage. Charles Morgan, Abraham Pierson, and those volunteers who served during the Civil War helped to make our town what it is today.

In each instance, these fine citizens and their families sacrificed time, talent and treasure for the good of the entire community. It is our charge as the current inhabitants of Clinton, to honor and tend to the memory of these historically important figures. For these reasons, I tasked my three children, who are Scouts, to perform a community service to honor the above. Their project is to organize and fundraise for a restoration and preservation of the three statues in town. The Scouts have aptly named their project "Give the Boys a Bath." You will see banners in front of the Pierson School with this slogan.

A professional cleaning of the statues has not occurred since they were erected. The restoration and preservation cost is estimated to be approximately \$28,000. The work will be done by ConservArt, a professional company which specializes in these types of projects. The work entails cleaning, recoloring (to a uniform color) and coating the

Morgan and Pierson bronze statues. The entire Civil War monument will be cleaned. The work will also repair broken stone on the Civil War monument, as well as solve the issue of rusting pins in the statue.

Morgan, Pierson and the volunteers during the Civil War gave freely of themselves. In this spirit we intend to collect private money to fund this project. It is our goal to collect two dollars from each of the 14,000 citizens of Clinton. Corporate and private business donations are welcomed. Donations may be sent to "Give the Boys a Bath" care of Liberty Bank, 8 East Main Street, Clinton, CT 06413. Any donations not used will be forwarded to the Clinton Pretty Committee.

Our goal is to have the funds collected by March 1, 2013 and work to be completed by Memorial Day 2013. A fall-back completion date will be July 4, 2013, if weather does not cooperate.

So search your car, couch, or under your bed and send that two dollars to "Give the Boys a Bath"! Let our town's historical figures know they are appreciated for another one hundred years.

Local M.D. Named Full-Time Hospice Medical Director

When people think of hospice care, they often focus on death and dying. But according to Middlesex Hospital's new, full-time Hospice Medical Director (and Haddam resident) Bill Zeidler, M.D., the essence of hospice care isn't about dying.

"One of the big misconceptions out there is that a lot of people think that hospice is just about dying. It's truly not. It's truly about trying to live to the best of one's ability until the moment you die," said Dr. Zeidler.

And Dr. Zeidler should know. He has been certified in the specialty of hospice and palliative care since 1997. He is also a founding member of the American Academy of Hospice and Palliative Care Physicians.

Modern-day hospice care in the United States only started back in the mid- to late-1970s, explains Dr. Zeidler. He adds, "It's seen amazing growth since then. This means that a lot of people are coming to understand the worth of hospice and palliative care."

A recent Wall Street Journal article stated that, according to the National Hospice and Palliative Care Organization, an estimated 1.58 million patients received hospice care from more than 5,000 programs nationwide in 2010, more than double the number of patients served a decade earlier. More than 40 percent of all deaths in the United States that year were under the care of hospice, which provides medical care, pain management and emotional and spiritual support to patients with terminal illnesses.

The Middlesex Hospice and Palliative Care program began as an inpatient unit at the Hospital back in the mid-1980s. At that time, Dr. Zeidler became its first, part-time medical director. The original, six-bed inpatient unit has now expanded to a 12-bed hospice and palliative care unit and the program also provides hospice care in the home setting throughout Middlesex County and beyond.

Dr. Zeidler has a long history with Middlesex Hospital. He became a Family Practice Resident in 1975. In 1978, upon graduating from the program, he set up a private family medicine practice in Higganum. In 1997, he became a member of the Middlesex Hospital Primary Care network with offices on

Saybrook Road in Middletown. Dr. Zeidler left his primary care practice this year to become the Hospital's first, full-time Hospice Medical Director. As such, Dr. Zeidler will be caring for virtually all the Hospice patients on the inpatient unit, and some in the home and in area nursing homes as well.



But, according to Dr. Zeidler, "My function is part of a large, interdisciplinary care team that includes inpatient and homecare nurses, social workers, physical therapists and occupational therapists. We use the expertise of pharmacists, who are well trained in pain medications. We have wonderful volunteers who serve a whole host of functions, from playing music on the unit to creating legacy stories about patients' lives for their families to cherish. There are clergy members who are also a key part of what we do; along with the many home health aides and patient care technicians who are also part of the caregiver team."

Dr. Zeidler admits that managing a patient's pain is an important aspect of hospice care. But he adds that the ultimate goal is to control the pain, while still keeping the patient as alert and oriented. This not only benefits the patient, but the family as well.

"When we get the patient's pain under control, the patient often relaxes, which means the family can relax as well," Dr. Zeidler added.

Dr. Zeidler is looking forward to his new, expanded role in the Hospice and Palliative Care program, and for good reason.

"It's a wonderful program and it is truly amazing how much patients and families benefit from it. The message is that we're just trying to make things a little bit better for patients, and significantly better for the family. And the more support you give the patient, family and other loved ones, the better everyone does. Often, we are actually able to bring some joy into their lives during a very difficult situation."


Clinton Chamber to Host U.S. Coast Guard Band

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Shellfishing in Clinton - Setting the Record Straight

There is a lot of enthusiasm about the prospect of shellfishing in Clinton. For those spending time on or around Clinton Harbor, it is apparent that the oyster population is thriving and there are reports of increased clam populations.

The restoration of shellfish populations and reintroducing commercial and recreational shellfishing to Clinton has been the goal of the Clinton Shellfish Commission since receiving a \$29,500 grant in January 2007. The Commision has been actively working year round since then toward this goal. Though progress is visible, there are still many conditions that must be met before the State will approve recreational shell fishing within the Town's shellfish juristiction.

Currently, recreational shellfishing in Clinton is strictly prohibited by the State. Under no circumstances should any shellfish from Clinton waters be caught by the public and consumed, as there is potential to adversely affect the health of those who consume it.

To date, the State Department of Agriculture, Bureau of Aquaculture is unwilling to reclassify shellfish beds from "Prohibited" status until the Town and residents meet additional requirements. Tropical storm Irene negatively affected the shoreline and numerous cesspools that are impacted by tidal cycles, have been discovered in disrepair or against code. These systems need to be addressed by property owners. Not only will inaction continue to hinder

shellfish efforts, but also contributes to beach closures.

There are two main commercial activities going on. The Town has a lease with Indian River Shellfish Co. of 10 acres in the Hammock River for oyster farming. The second activity is a lease in the inner harbor to Indian River Shellfish Co. by the Town of Madison. Pole lot markers with red and yellow flags are required and should be noticeable in the harbor.

As we move ahead toward our goal of opening Clintons' shellfish beds to for recreational shellfishing, residents can contribute toward the Commission's efforts in several ways:

- ·Do not move, harvest or consume any shellfish from Clinton waters
- •Do not transport or introduce any shellfish into Clinton waters. Transporting any shellfish from neighboring Towns and States has potential to introduce disease and negatively impact entire populations, not just Clinton Harbor but Long Island Sound as well.
- ·Property owners must resolve any cesspool and septic system issues, particularly along shoreline neighborhoods.

The Clinton Shellfish Commission is composed of 7 volunteers appointed by the Board of Selectman. There are currently openings on the Commission. If you are interested in serving on the commission or for general volunteer opportunities, please contact the First Selectman's office.

Where we have been and what to look for in 2012-13

As we look ahead to the 2012-2013 school year, it is amazing to reflect on what was accomplished in 2011-2012. Despite a stormy start with Tropical Storm Irene tearing through our community, it also served as a symbol of how our community works together to get things done and move forward. While weathering the storm, we came together as a community to forge ahead with a commitment to invest in the community both in terms of education and long-term economic development. The school community is extremely grateful and proud to have the opportunity to build a new, state-of-the-art high school facility that will serve as the symbol of progress and a spark for this great shoreline community.

The driving force for Clinton Public Schools over the past several years has been to focus on unifying efforts to ensure continuity of learning experiences and expectations for students. The framework for this effort is rooted in our K-12 curriculum renewal process, a process that engages teachers and administrators from every grade level in the research, development and implementation of the student learning expectations in all subjects. In addition to the work in curriculum, other major initiatives targeted containing costs, advancing technology to enhance instruction, and implementing a new teacher evaluation and professional learning program. Finally, 2011-2012 proved to be a year of remarkable recognitions for the district, beginning the year with the Joel Elementary Principal, Claudia Norman, being awarded the University of Connecticut Neag School of Education's Outstanding School Administrator of the Year and the Jared Eliot Middle School being awarded the New England League of Middle School's (NELMS) Spotlight Award. In 2012, Jared Eliot Middle School was one of three middle schools throughout New England recognized for meeting the NELMS criteria for providing outstanding middle school education programs.

Curriculum Renewal - In the last four years the curriculum renewal process, led by Assistant Superintendent, Maryann O'Donnell, has researched, rewritten, and implemented eight of thirteen core subjects with Art, Music, and Family and Consumer Science on tap for 2012-2013. This work has been critical to bringing continuity and consistency to the teaching and learning experiences in Clinton. It has paid big dividends for teachers and students. For teachers, it has served as a framework for ongoing professional development in instructional practices and the infusion of technology as a critical tool for teaching and learning. For students, it has elevated expectations for learning and created an assurance of common learning experiences. While not our sole measure of progress, this work on curriculum has reaped improved student performance on the state assessments, Connecticut Mastery Tests (CMT) and Connecticut Academic Performance Test (CAPT). The main focus has been to set

clear expectations for what students need to learn and be able to use or demonstrate. As a result of curriculum renewal, the district developed a set of Foundation Skills and Competencies that will serve as a criterion for all students to be able to demonstrate proficiency.

Budget - In the past several years, the Board of Education and the district administrative team have worked diligently to contain budgets and minimize the impact on academic programming. Through contract negotiations with bargaining groups as well as negotiations with the transportation company, insurance broker, photocopying and printer service providers, utility providers and nursing services, we have been able to keep the Board of Education's operating budget to under a 1% increase in each of the last two years. We have done this while continuing to advance the curriculum implementation described above and to enhance student performance.

Technology - The use of technology as a teaching and learning tool has become critical to the educational environment. The district has been able to stay on course with its three-year technology plan with the support of the Capital Expenditure Committee.

As a result, we have established a four-year replacement and upgrade plan and have expanded the integration of SmartBoards and other interactive technology tools at all levels. In addition, the technology department has outfitted all four schools with wireless capability in preparation for the installation of fiber to all schools. These enhancements support curriculum implementation and the resources that come with new program materials.

Teacher Evaluation and Professional Learning - As mentioned above, the district implemented a new teacher evaluation plan in 2011-2012. The plan is modeled after the state teacher competencies and is designed to increase teacher participation in both self-evaluation and providing evidence of performance in each of the six domains of teaching. The model increases the frequency for building administrators to observe classroom instruction and establishes descriptive criteria for levels of performance. The primary goal of all evaluation plans is to improve student performance. Other teacher evaluation plans fall short in the ability for teachers to honestly reflect and assess areas of strengths and areas for growth without fear of consequences. The new district plan actively engages teachers in this form of reflection and analysis so that action steps can be taken to improve performance. One of the most exciting benefits of this new plan has been the increased buzz about "best practices" for instruction and assessment methods, and a renewed vigor around strategies for engaging students in being more responsible for their own learning. Review of first year data would suggest that we have effectively implemented the new plan.

Awards and Accomplishments - Although space is too limited here to list all of the district accomplishments, it is important to share a few. In addition to the awards mentioned above, Clinton was selected to host Connecticut's Council of Language Teachers' (COLT) annual Rhyme Celebration. This celebration focuses on advancing the study of world languages in public schools, especially at the elementary grades.

Joel Elementary School hosted its first annual Awesome Arts Night, featuring painting, collage, sculpture and music, reinstituted the annual Family Math Night, affording families an evening of experiences with a variety of interactive math activities and games, and piloted Volunteer Reading with students. The school's literacy specialists presented at the Connecticut Reading Association Conference and have been invited back to present in 2012-2013.

The Pierson School sent a student to the national spelling bee competition in Washington D.C., four students reached the state level Invention Convention, and Pierson's CANStruction entry received honorable mention and was displayed at the Durham Fair. In addition, staff facilitated a number of events including the musical The Music Man, Marine Science Day, Clinton History Hike, and the Nutmeg Reading Challenge.

In addition to the Spotlight Award, Eliot Middle School was one of only 266 schools nationally to achieve the Gold Level Status in the 2012 MATHCOUNTS Club program; six band and choral students were selected for the Connecticut Music Educators Association's (CMEA) regional middle school music festival; and an Eliot Middle School student won the Lady Liberty Essay Scholarship Contest. Her essay was one of two selected from over 1,400 middle school and high school submissions to win the \$5,000 scholarship.

Morgan students and faculty were also very busy and accomplished in 2011-2012. Groups of students served as ambassadors in their travels to Canada and Washington D. C. and served as researchers at the Mystic Seaport. Students ran the third annual Poetry Out Loud Contest, sending a finalist to the state competition. Physics students earned prizes at the annual Lake Compounce Physics Day competition. More students participated in Advance Placement courses earning college credit including 9 of 11 AP Spanish students who scored high enough to earn college credit. In addition, seven Morgan students earned All-State recognition in varsity sports and the girls' volleyball team was Shoreline Champions for the 20th year. Several Morgan teachers were also recognized for their leadership in the integration of technology in the classroom winning the CT Educators Computer Association Award and being selected to participate in the Microsoft Partners in Learning Forum. In addition, a Morgan science teacher was selected by the National Science Teachers Association (NSTA) to represent Connecticut in a yearlong Science Teacher Academy, and a world language teacher was selected by the United States Department of State to receive a fellowship to study Mandarin in China for seven weeks this summer.

District-wide we are also very pleased with continued improvement in student performance on state and national assessments. We continue to see progress on the Connecticut Mastery Test (CMT) administered annually to students in grades 3 through 8, as well as on the Connecticut Academic Performance Tests (CAPT) administered to all tenth grade students.

Looking ahead to 2012 – 2013 there are a number of exciting initiatives in store for the district.

Curriculum, Instruction and Assessment - Connecticut has adopted the national Common Core State Standards for language arts and math. We will continue our work in aligning our curriculum efforts to the state's model. We will be introducing a new language arts anthology in kindergarten through grade 5. The new program, called Journeys, supports our continued effort to assure continuity of learning experiences for all students. The Curriculum Renewal Teams will be preparing the art, music, and family and consumer sciences curricula for Board of Education adoption; implementing the technology education and physical education/health curricula at all levels; and developing the information technology and science curricula using the most recent national standards.

Professional Learning and Technology - The district will continue its efforts in integrating the use of technology as a learning resource and instructional tool. By the end of September, all four schools will have fiber-optic access enableing students and staff to fully utilize the wireless capacity in each school. Speed and access will have a tremendous impact on the ways we are able to more readily apply technology resources in the classroom. Work on developing common assessments at each grade level, aligned with the District's Foundation Skills and Competencies, will be a major focus at each school. The purpose for this work is to assure that all students have multiple opportunities to demonstrate proficiency in all of the skills and competencies. We will also be implementing components of the District's Safe School Climate Plan in our efforts to maintain a positive school environment in all schools. Finally, teachers and administrators will continue the implementation of the new Teacher Evaluation Plan.

Opportunities for Community Involvement - This continues to be an area that we are committed to enhancing and improving. Those who have visited our district website in the past several months will recognize a new look and the efforts made to make the district website a useful source. The homepage hosts the district calendar of events, district and community announcements, as well as updates from the superintendent and pictures and video of our students in action in the Clinton Celebrates section. We now have the ability for anyone to subscribe to receive email updates on

any changes to the website. In addition to improving our capacity to share information, we will also be looking to engage the community in the New Morgan Building project. Once we are underway in the fall, please be looking for a schedule of times when the Morgan Building Committee and the architect design team will be holding forums for community input. Lastly, as an outgrowth of the Community Conversation held last spring, and as part of our ongoing efforts to improve the quality of education in Clinton, I will be establishing a council to review and evaluate the district's mission and vision. Although much has been done in the last four years to refocus teaching and learning on preparing students for the world beyond high school, we recognize the importance of establishing links with the community and garnering a commitment for continued improvement of the educational opportunities Clinton affords for students.

We are about to embark on a new school year; the school facilities have been cleaned and prepped. Teachers, administrators and all the supporting staff are excited and anxious for a new school year. 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
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
