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

"We've listened to feedback about ways to enhance the experience and educational value of the Festival," says Barbara Hanson, Festival Chair, "and we chose Children and Families: We Are All Connected as this year's theme to complement the celebration. 

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## Hammonasset in the 1940s

Every sunny Sunday from Hartford, my parents, sister, grandmother, and I went to Hammonasset Beach. Grandma and Mom packed food, my sister and I took pails, shovels, and toy boats.



We drove through four towns to reach Madison. I saw Hammonasset State Park on a stretch of road before we turned right into the entrance. Through bushes and trees – there it was. Our resort. The sky met the water, and no buildings marred the view. We parked and got a table for lunch. Grandma always found one nearest the boardwalk with a water view. She plunked her wood lunch basket down and the table belonged to us for the day. I couldn't wait for the grown-up business to finish to get in the water.



We changed in the aging wooden bathhouse. To secure clothes you could, for a small fee, get a key to lock them up. Grandma and Mom wore the white cord "necklace" which held the long key. The key's number matched the locker number. The bathhouses, concession area, boardwalks, and ramps built of wood in the 1920s, had grayed by the 1940s. Railings flanked the ramps, and boardwalks all built high off the sand, provided play areas and relief from the heat. The boardwalk made itself felt as the day passed. Its wood blistered our feet, and we took some home as slivers.

My sister and I tiptoed over the scorching gauntlet of sand and pebbles, using corners of other sunbathers' towels to relieve, for an instant, the torture of getting to the water. We launched our boats, and as they bobbed up and down on the waves, hovered over them making sure they didn't float out to sea.

Around 4:30 we gathered our belongings and and headed to the bathhouses built under the pavillion's concession and picnic areas. There, pulling on a long chain, we showered in cold water. Grandma held Jan and me under to make sure the sand and salt water was left at Hammonasset. The sand slid off and fell between the glistening cracks of the wet wood, returning to the beach under the bathhouses.

"You kids fell asleep on the way home," Mom said. "You looked fresh and tan." She woke us at Rocky Hill's Fountain where we had ice cream cones.

From there the trip home took 30 more minutes. At the front door we said tired good-byes to Grandma. We hoped for a sunny Sunday next week.



As it happened, he and his family were preparing to go to a July Fourth Party. He was so excited that the bike was complete and let me know that he was about to see the dad who was to receive the bike at the party! 

## **Age-Related Macular** Degeneration

Age-Related Macular Degeneration (AMD) is the leading cause of severe vision loss in adults over the age of 50. This eye disease occurs when there are changes to the macula, a small portion of the retina that's located on the inside back layer of the eye. Commonly, older people develop macular degeneration as a natural part of the aging process. AMD causes loss of central vision and it can occur in two forms: wet and dry.

With macular degeneration, you may experience symptoms such as blurriness, dark areas or distortion of your central vision, or permanent loss of your central vision. It usually does not affect your peripheral vision. For example, with advanced macular degeneration you could be able to see the outline of a clock, yet you may not be able to see the hands of the clock to tell what time it is. The majority of people with macular degeneration experience the dry form, which does not have a known treatment, but many people benefit from a vitamin regimen. Unfortunately, vision loss cannot be reversed. The less common wet form may respond to lasers and medical injections if caught and treated early. Smoking and high blood pressure are often associated with the wet form of macular degeneration. If you have been diagnosed with dry macular degeneration, you should use a chart called an Amsler grid every day to monitor your vision. Dry macular degeneration can quickly change into the more damaging wet form. If you notice any change of vision, you should contact your ophthalmologist immediately.

## Bike and Pedestrian Path Endorsed by Board of Selectmen

On May 2nd the Board of Selectmen in Clinton gave its endorsement for a three mile bike and pedestrian path through parts of historic Clinton, the harbor, behind Town Hall to the Elliot Land Trust, and then on to the Clinton Beach. This is a town trail, which means the current infrastructure will be used rather than a "trail" being built. Along the path there will be five points at which the trail meets our rivers and beaches, and where boats and paddleboards can be accessed to a Clinton "blueway." This is the only green/blueway we know of in Connecticut.

The Bicycle and Pedestrian Alliance of Clinton (BPAC) determined the route, gained the committee and board permissions, and collected the money for Phase One. When both phases are complete, the Clinton Greenway/Blueway will connect to both Madison and Westbrook where plans are in the works to join our bike and pedestrian path to theirs.

## Joey Logano – Inspiring others to do for others

Professional NASCAR driver Joey Logano started his racing career right here in Connecticut racing quarter midget cars and quickly made a name for himself. Starting at the age of six, the Middletown, CT native started winning championship after championship – to the point that, by the time he was 15, he was already on the radar with NASCAR racing legends. Now, he's always to be reckoned with on the NASCAR racing scene, competing fulltime in the Monster Energy NASCAR series and part-time in the NASCAR Xfinity series.

#### THE STATS ARE IMPRESSIVE.

- Youngest driver to win a NASCAR Xfinity Series race - winning at Kentucky Speedway in 2008 when he was just 18 years, 21 days old and in only his third Xfinity Series start.
- 2009 Monster Energy NASCAR Cup Series Rookie of the Year
- Won the Daytona 500 in 2015 Second youngest driver to win this race.
- 49 combined wins in NASCAR's top-three series

There is, of course, the glitz and the glamor that pervades NASCAR as a whole. And there's the occasional race-action controversy. And there are the ups and downs. After early successes (leading to the nickname, "Sliced Bread") and nearly winning a championship in 2016, Joey failed to make the playoffs in 2017. This year could mark a turnaround. Joey notched a win at Talladega Superspeedway in April, which ended a nearly year-long winless streak and, as of press time, he is fourth in the NASCAR Championship Point Standings.

But there's more to the 28-year-old than that. Joey and his wife Brittany, whom he married in 2014, welcomed their first child into the world this past January. Joey and Brittany have also been very committed to giving back. In a previous conversation, Joey mentioned, "If we can touch a few people's lives and help them become contributing members of our community and the world, it's really going to make a difference and it starts one person at a time." That's the crux of the Joey Logano Foundation that invests in organizations offering second chances to children and young adults during times of crisis and works to inspire others to live a life of generosity.

#### WHY SECOND CHANCES?

First, there was a life-changing visit to Joplin, Missouri in 2011 where Joey helped to rebuild a home for a local family following the tornado that devastated the area. That family needed a second chance. Little did Joey know that he would soon need his own second chance. He had been driving the No. 20 Toyota Camry for Joe Gibbs Racing since the 2009 season, but that ended in 2012. He received his second chance when he was picked up by Penske Racing in 2012. The following year, the Joey Logano Foundation was established.

Since 2013, the foundation has invested almost \$2.7 million in various organizations across the country. Programs include inviting children who are facing tough situations (whether physically and/or emotionally) annually to a NASCAR race to be part of the crew for the day, supporting non-profit organizations during the 10-week NASCAR playoffs in each playoff race market, assembling and donating comfort care backpacks to foster and/or terminally ill children, and an annual fundraiser in Connecticut, called Driving Hope Home. A portion of the Driving Hope Home proceeds are donated to The Ronald McDonald House of Connecticut with the remaining proceeds donated to reputable charities the foundation supports to offer children in need a first or second chance. "It's our responsibility. You have to do it. If we we're not going to do it, who else is going to be an advocate for these kids," says Brittany, who notes that first chances are important too. "They need a first opportunity in life. If we can shed light to this and inspire others to do the same, we can have a bigger impact than the two of us. That's our goal."

There is no doubt that Joey is a fierce competitor and a pure NASCAR racing talent. But don't overlook the other side. "When you are able to make a difference like that, you can see it in that person's face, how much it affects their lives - there's no better feeling than that," he observes. "I can talk about race wins as much as I want and how great that is but there's nothing better than that win - when you're are able to affect something. That's a bigger win than any racetrack can get you."

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


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
