



First Selectman's Corner

For the last six years I have focused on professionalizing our town services and sharing costs with neighboring towns and local departments. We have been very successful and I am proud of the innovative ideas that our employees, boards and unions have come up with to share costs and employee responsibilities. To date we share an Assessor with Chester, a Zoning Enforcement Officer with Haddam, and we did not replace our retired Assistant Tax Collector. Our clerical employees cover for each other by cross training in their departments. Our Finance Director is combined with the Board of Education to share the costs of running our business offices. Finally, we created a regional Animal Control Department that has three more towns interested in joining.

This push to share and reduce costs has been driven by an economy that is short on revenue. Without these innovative ideas the only solution would have been large tax increases. To further develop our regional team work we just created a Council of Governments of the 17 towns from Old Saybrook to Middletown that all share the same focus of protecting our Lower River Valley. We will work as a team to protect this incredible resource, while at the same time promote and develop a tourism identity that will help drive future revenues to our towns.

Within the next couple months I will be holding a public hearing to layout our plans and options of how we can

capitalize on our East Haddam Village and options for improving town agencies and departments, highlighted by how our old middle school fits into our long range goals. Watch our website for notification!


men and women who have given their lives. We will never forget the sacrifices made for our freedoms. Our town has the best Memorial Day celebration. East Haddam always comes together on this


special day of reconciliation.

Every year town and school officials welcome the arrival of members of our sixth grade class for Government Day. The program was held on May 2nd.

Students are selected for their positions on the basis of a letter they prepare explaining which position they would like to hold for the day and their reasons for that choice.

The program encourages student participation in the daily workings of municipal government and education with a first-hand experience of what is expected. The students are exposed to a variety of opportunities to learn

about road projects, building, sanitation and fire codes, law enforcement, land use regulations and vernal pools, government finance, tax collection, records maintenance, voter requirements, property values, economic development, animal care and enforcement, senior services, youth and family services, probate court, parks and recreation, library services, and educational administration.

Students and staff both enjoy the experience. The day concludes with lunch for all participants at the middle school.

The First 1,000 Days

The first 1,000 days of a child's life - 9 months of pregnancy until age 2 - are vital to his/her future health. Current research shows that there is a connection between nutrition and the pregnancy environment to later health in ways that are direct and breathtaking. The first 1,000 days contain a series of critical periods that require certain conditions for optimal development. If these are not met, a stage is set that may not be revealed for years to come. Research by David Parker shows that problems such as heart disease, diabetes, and weight issues can be tied back to those first 1,000 days. Additionally, according to a new study by the Davis MIND Institute, a mother's obesity can increase the likelihood that her child will have autism or other developmental delays. What to do? Good nutrition for the mother throughout her life as well as avoiding smoking, stress, drugs and alcohol are key to providing a healthy environment in utero. Healthy eating for the child during the first two years is also important. 

Tax Collector's Office

After the budget passed at referendum on May 22, the Mill Rate for the 2011 Grand List was set at 21.52 (an increase of .42). Tax bills for the 2011 Grand List were mailed on June 30, 2012. Payment is due on July 1, 2012 and must be paid on or before August 1, 2012 to avoid interest. If you recently purchased property and did not receive a tax bill, please contact the Tax Office immediately.

Tax payments may be made in person, by mail or on-line. There is a secure lock box in the front alcove, which is available 24 hours. Payments may be dropped there after hours. If you choose to pay your taxes on-line, you may do so by going to easthaddam.org and clicking the "PAY TAXES" button. This will bring you to Point & Pay, a firm that enables East Haddam to accept electronic payments at no cost to the town. There is a transaction fee of 2.95% on all credit/debit payments and a \$2.95 flat fee for e-checks.

This office is for the collection of taxes only. Any adjustments to your bill must be made by the Assessor (860-873-5026). The Tax Office can be reached at 860-873-5033 or by e-mail: tax-collector@easthaddam.org.

Attention to Those Who Have Gone to Hale-Ray

I have been very concerned about the future of the murals in the hallway of the old Nathan Hale-Ray building. Recently Mark Walter, Brian Perry, Chris Saltus, Paul Varkla, Irv Chmura, Charlie Farrow and I inspected the Langdon Kihn "Nathan Hale" murals in the library. They depict major events in Nathan Hale's life and are oil on canvas, affixed directly to the plaster and lathe walls. They appear to be in good condition at this time.

The group's present plan is first to continue to monitor the murals. Second, using Brian Perry's contacts, solicit bids from professional photographers to have the murals preserved digitally.

If we can secure the funding, we will print a full-size copy of the murals on canvas to be installed at the East Haddam Historical Society. After that we will attempt to have the originals removed and taken to the EHHS.

The entire cost is projected to be about \$10,000. A fund is being set up for this purpose. Of the 69 children screened earlier this year, 5 were referred to ophthalmologists for further diagnosis/treatment. We participate in project Safe Halloween and this year planted trees on public land as part of the international President's Tree planting campaign (Lions planted more than 9.7 million trees

around the world this year). We provided Easter baskets through the Food Bank to over 75 East Haddam residents. The International Peace Poster contest for children around the world this year had 78 participants from the middle school. Bethany Powell was our winning entry and our District winner; she and her family were honored at the Lions Multiple District Conference luncheon where she gained second place. The (non-Lion) Humanitarian of the Year banquet is a District event honoring non Lion Humanitarians from all towns in Eastern Connecticut. This year, EHCL unanimously recognized Craig Mansfield for his services to the Town during "Irene" and beyond. We were pleased to award two \$1500. scholarships to graduating seniors at Hale-Ray High School; Nichole Govert and Hannah Palmer. We wish them continued success in their future endeavors.

This program, thanks to a grant from Lions Clubs International Foundation and support of lens manufacturers, allows the athletes to go through an 8 stage eye screening, and if prescribed, leave at the end of the day with a new pair of eye glasses at no cost: an extremely rewarding and heartwarming event to help out with.




Anita Sherman Memorial Display

English Kaolin (clay) pipes found at General Joseph Spencer homestead



Medical Emergencies in the Wilderness

Six EMTs from the East Haddam Ambulance Association recently received wilderness emergency medical training. Kevin Cavallo reported the experience to be extremely interesting for everyone. It included eight hours of training for three weeks plus one and one-half days in the field. They learned how to make use of the environment to survive and provide medical assistance without access to supplies or civilization. Other participants included Dean Anderson, Rachel Denny, Ken and Tracy Purdue, and Paul Michael Ross.

Some unexpected practice took place two weeks after the training was completed. While mountain biking in Cockaponsett state forest with a companion, far from ambulance-accessible roads, one of the participants suffered a broken leg. Knowledgeable rescuers splinted the leg with a sturdy branch, and the injured cyclist was safely and properly extricated.

The East Haddam community should feel well-protected knowing that our EMTs are now able to provide medical help - whether it be an injury, heat exhaustion, poisoning, animal bite, or any other kind of health emergency - no matter where you may be in our town. But, there is a lesson here too: never travel into the wilderness without a companion or a cell phone.

News from the Assessor's Office

Our October 1, 2012 revaluation is well underway. Data verification forms were sent out in April for homeowners to return to the Assessor's office with any changes. Representatives of Vision Government Solutions have been visiting properties of recent sales and building or remodeling activity. They are also updating photos for the property record cards. Assessment notices will be mailed in November, 2012 and informal hearings with representatives from the revaluation company will follow in December.

The Assessor's office began accepting applications for the Elderly and Totally Disabled Renters Rebate Program on May 15, 2012. Applicant's total income must not exceed \$32,300 for a single person, \$39,500 for a couple (joint income), including Social Security and Medicare. Applicants must be 65 or older or totally disabled and bring all income, rent, and utility information from 2011. The deadline for filing is September 14, 2012.

Residents whose motor vehicles have been sold, stolen, totaled, or who have moved out-of-state may be eligible for a pro-ration of their car taxes.

Two forms of proof are necessary to pro-rate or remove a vehicle from the grand list. Residents must bring a copy of the plate receipt issued by the Department of Motor Vehicles at the time of cancellation of registration, and a copy of one of


the following; bill of sale, transfer of title, receipt from junkyard, notification of total loss, trade-in papers, or some other document showing the date on which the vehicle was disposed.

The Assessor's office has its own web page on the town website. Included is information on real estate, personal property, and motor vehicle assessments; property tax relief for seniors, veterans, and the disabled; renters' rebate; information on revaluation; access to applications and forms pertaining to the Assessor's office.

were due June 8th. We appreciate all those citizens who promptly returned their canvass letters. To date, the total number of registered voters in East Haddam is 5,783. This includes 1804 Democrats, 1245 Republicans, 2671 Unaffiliated, and 63 voters in other parties. This is a total decrease in registered voters from last year of 124 voters; 62 fewer Democrats, 19 fewer Republicans, and 43 fewer Unaffiliated.

In our most recent budget referendum, on May 22, 340 voters cast ballots. This equals a voter turnout rate of little less than 6%. We are hoping that the small turnout indicated general approval of the Board of Finance's efforts, rather than voter apathy.

Please don't forget to vote in the Democrat and Republican primaries on August 14, at the Nathan Hale-Ray High School. The polls will be open from 6 a.m. to 8 p.m. If you have been a registered Republican or Democrat for at least 3 months prior to the primary (May 14, 2012) then you are eligible to vote. If you have been listed as an unaffiliated voter, at least three months prior to the primary, you may switch to a party affiliation by mail up to August 9, and in person up to noon on August 13. New voter registrations are also accepted, in person, up to noon on August 13.

East Haddam Green Committee

CT Recycles Day is November 15, and in anticipation, the Green Committee is evaluating the amount of recycling in East Haddam.

According to the Public Works Department, East Haddam recycled about 26% of its general waste in 2011. This figure compares single stream recycling and scrap metal amount against solid waste, bulky waste, and construction debris. It does not include tires, batteries, leaves, waste oil, or electronics. Although these items are recycled, they are not weighed, so exact information on the amount is difficult to determine. We are very interested in how our schools handle recycling. The Art of Hands-On Skills

The profession of massage therapy has grown tremendously in recent years as the value of therapeutic

touch has become increasingly recognized. Therapeutic touch can bring general emotional, psychological and physical relaxation to clients, as well as improve local fluid circulation. In this regard, massage is always clinical in nature. However, the term "clinical massage" is often applied only when massage is done with intent toward healing a specific condition. Clinical massage can generally be divided into medical massage-primarily geared toward treating visceral/metabolic problems in hospital settings-and orthopedic massage, primarily oriented toward the treatment of musculoskeletal condition.

When working clinically, the massage therapist requires a greater "set of tools" than when working with the general application of touch. Certainly, knowledge of anatomy, physiology, kinesiology and pathology is always appropriate and helpful for all massage therapy. However, with clinical orthopedic massage, it's essential to accurately assess and treat a client who presents with a specific musculoskeletal condition. Of all assessment tools available to the massage therapist, palpation of the musculature is the most important. Muscle palpation is so integral to the field of massage therapy that it's likely that the massage therapy profession leads all other health fields in muscle palpation skills. Muscular palpation has two major objectives. The first is to locate the target muscle that is being palpated. The second objective is to assess its health by feeling for its tone and texture: trigger points, inflammation, fascial adhesion.

Assessing the health of the muscle is the most important aspect of palpation because the integrity of the tissues is what informs our decisions regarding treatment.

The Middlesex Hospital Total Lung Care Center

Complete, Local, Convenient Care - According to the national Centers for Disease Control (CDC), more than 350,000 people alive today in the United States have been diagnosed with lung cancer at some point. Although lung cancer is a very serious type of cancer, if it is detected in its earliest stages and appropriate and coordinated treatment is provided, a cure is possible.

If you ask Gean Brown why this is the case, she will probably say it's because of improved screening, increased surveillance and follow-through treatment for lung cancer patients. Brown is the Lung Nurse Navigator at the Middlesex Hospital Cancer Center and was instrumental in developing the Total Lung Care Center at Middlesex Hospital, a "virtual" center that provides everything a lung cancer patient needs.

When Gean first arrived at the Cancer Center in 2009, she realized that, although Middlesex Hospital had all the elements for comprehensive treatment of lung cancer in place, there wasn't a coordinated system to help patients "navigate" the steps from diagnosis, through treatment and on to potential recovery. Since that time, Gean and a number of physicians in various Hospital departments have worked hard to change that.

The first step in developing the Center, according to Brown, was to begin a quality assurance (QA) program to ensure that any abnormal lung testing done through the Radiology Department would automatically be sent to her. From there, Brown takes the results and makes sure to always inform the patient's primary care physician if the finding looks serious and then recommends a consultation with a pulmonary physician or thoracic surgeon to review the findings further. The clinicians then refer to what is called the "Fleishner Society" guidelines to assess the lung nodules. The Fleishner Society comprises a group of thoracic surgeons who developed standard guidelines to follow for appropriate actions to take based on the differences in lung tumors, i.e., size, whether or not the person is a smoker, has a history of lung disease, etc.

A total of 500 patients came through that initial QA program, which made it clear that the Hospital needed to enhance its array of services and treatments for patients with abnormal lung findings. As a result, the Hospital recruited two thoracic surgeons, John Federico, M.D. and Mario Katigbak, M.D. who now work in concert with other Middlesex Hospital surgeons to treat lung abnormalities. In addition, a special "endobronchial ultrasound" (EBUS) system will soon be in use. Pulmonologists utilize the EBUS system to perform a procedure that uses sound waves to detect cancerous tumors in the lungs. Last, but not least, the Hospital's new da Vinci® Si robot provides an additional high-tech tool for specific types of lung surgeries as well.

Most recently, Middlesex Hospital has begun to offer CT screenings for lung cancer. Studies have shown that these low-dose CT scans have the potential to catch lung cancer in its early stages, which means that it is more likely to be cured.



Low-dose CT scans can detect lung cancer in its early stages (Stage 1 or 2). They are recommended for people at high risk for lung cancer (those who have smoked at least one pack a day for 20 years or more AND have a history of lung cancer or are between the ages of 50 and 74 years old). The test takes only ten minutes and there is no preparation needed beforehand. The cost is \$250 and is not covered by insurance. A physician order is required for the scan. If you do not have a physician, Brown can assist you in getting a referral. She can be reached at (860) 358-2066.

As mentioned before, the Total Lung Care Center is a virtual one, but one that is very comprehensive. It includes radiologists, oncologists, pulmonologists, surgeons, radiation oncologists and Brown, the Lung Nurse Navigator. She explains that although "not all the doctors are involved at every stage, everyone is at the ready to do their part. In fact, different doctors may consult on a patient, but the patient may never see them. But even if the patient does not see every member of the team, he or she can feel confident that the entire team is working for their benefit at all times."

Patients who do not currently have a physician can call 1-855-MHDOCS1 (1-855-643-6271) and one can be recommended. Middlesex Hospital also offers a smoking cessation program that provides information and counseling to motivate smokers to quit tobacco use. Call (860) 358-3003 for more information.

Department of Public Health

With nice weather upon us, the Department of Public Health (DPH) is asking the public to keep safety in mind.

"The spring and summer in Connecticut bring longer sunny days, warm weather and opportunities for outdoor fun and exercise," stated DPH Commissioner Dr. Jewel Mullen. "Unfortunately, outdoor activities can also increase the risk of injury, so it is important to take some simple steps to stay safe and make this great time of year enjoyable for everyone."

DPH recommends the following safety tips:

Safety in and around water - An adult should always supervise children in or near water. Drowning can occur in minutes and in just a few inches of water. Whenever an infant or toddler is in or near water an adult should always be within an arm's length providing "touch" supervision.

When boating, everyone should wear US Coast Guard approved life jackets. Consider taking a boating safety course, and remember, just as with drinking and driving, alcohol and swimming or boating don't mix.

Be ready for emergencies by learning CPR and first aid and keep a phone with you.

Bike Safety

Wear a bicycle helmet every time you get on a bike. Helmets can reduce your risk of head injury by up to 85% in a bicycle crash.



Wear appropriate multi-sport helmets and safety gear to prevent injuries while skate boarding, inline skating or riding a scooter.

Supervise younger children and assure that they ride with supervision in safe areas away from traffic.

Safe Walking

Teach your children to look left, right and left again when crossing the street.

Walk on sidewalks whenever possible, and cross safely using traffic signals and crosswalks. If there are no sidewalks, always walk facing traffic as far to the left as possible.

Watch for cars that are turning or are backing up, especially in driveways and parking lots.

Wear clothing with reflective materials and carry a turned on flashlight at dusk and dark.

Safe at Play

Check playground equipment, whether it's in the backyard or at the park, to make sure it is in good repair.

Playgrounds should have protective surfacing under and around the equipment to protect against falls. This can include sand, mulch, wood chips, shredded tires, or rubber mats.

If you or your family plays team sports, be sure to use all the appropriate safety gear. Learn to recognize the signs of a concussion and seek medical treatment immediately.

Safety around the Home

Falls from windows increase during the summer months and screens will not protect children from falling out.

Safeguard children by installing window guards or stops, opening windows from the top whenever possible and moving furniture away from windows to discourage climbing.

Safety on the Road

Buckle up on every trip in the car, even if it's just a short ride around town.

Younger children should ride in size and age-appropriate car safety seats.

Do not leave children or pets in a parked car - interior temperatures can reach deadly levels in minutes even during moderate temperatures.

Protect Your Skin from the Sun

In summer, the risk for ultraviolet (UV) damage of the skin increases. While outside enjoying the nice weather, it is important to take simple steps like putting on sunscreen and wearing protective clothing to protect your skin from the sun's harmful rays. Protecting your skin not only helps prevent skin damage, it also helps prevent skin cancer."
