The fall and winter months promise to be full as well. We have a lot to consider as a community with regard to our town

and educational infrastructure. A few years ago a committee called the "Financial Needs Roundtable Committee" was formed with a charge of a ten-year capital/infrastructure plan for the town.




As many of you are aware, there was a committee formed five years ago to evaluate and put forth a plan to convert the old middle school into a municipal complex. Through the efforts of this committee we learned that the total cost to renovate the entire building was far greater than originally anticipated. In addition, through the evaluation of the Financial Needs Roundtable Committee, many more large capital projects have been identified; to include (but not limited to):

 \cdot The potential for a conversion of the old middle school to a municipal complex in a scaled back design and utilization.


• Upgrade of our three firehouses to address many public safety needs for our firehouse structures, ambulance space needs and an emergency operations center.

• A much needed upgrade to the town-wide emergency radio system that will provide greater communication *Continued on page 3*

A Note from the Assessor

All persons having taxable personal property to declare such as: unregistered motor vehicles, horses and ponies, farm equipment, or any furniture, fixtures, and equipment used in the operation of a business, must do so by November 1, 2012. Declaration forms are available at the Assessor's Office; however, they will also be mailed to all businesses and residents who have declared property in the past. Please be aware if you have taxable personal property, and do not declare it, state statutes allow the assessor to add it at an estimated amount, plus a 25% penalty.

Applications for Farm, Forest and Open Space will be accepted from September 1 until October 31, 2012. Forms are available at the Assessor's Office, or online at the town website.

Any persons who acquired a new motor vehicle after October 1, 2011 will receive a supplemental motor vehicle bill for their new vehicle by January 2013. These bills will be prorated, based on the date of registration, for the 12-month period starting October 2011 and ending September 2012. Vehicles acquired in August or September do not receive supplemental tax bills.

New Veterans seeking exemption must record their honorable discharge papers with the Town Clerk by October 1. Active-duty military who have served 90 days or more may also be eligible for an exemption, and are encouraged to contact the Assessor's Office prior to October 1 for more details.

The Town is currently undergoing a revaluation for the October 1, 2012 grand list. Notices of new assessments will be sent out in mid-November.

Moodus Reservoir Preservation Group

Moodus Reservoir Preservation Group represents the residents of Upper and Lower Moodus Reservoir with goals to preserve and improve the health of the water through public education, monitoring of water quality and raising funds for treatment of invasive species. The group has conducted water monitoring for clarity, participated in the DEEP boater education program at state boat launches and has distributed educational information through newsletters and e-mail bulletins. A survey of invasive plants in the Reservoir by the Connecticut Agricultural Experiment Station will provide an inventory of plants and a plan of treatment. Funds to implement the plan will need to be raised through fund raising events and grants from governmental and private associations.

capabilities in case of a major disaster. We are now in the process of a two-phase analysis of our communications system. The first phase is a review of our current infrastructure and the second phase is the design and cost projections to implement a new system.

A facility evaluation was just completed of the elementary school which identified areas requiring facility upgrades to better support the educational needs.

The Old Town Hall and Grange Hall will be seeing some improvements and renovations that will restore their historic quality. I am pleased to report that most of these renovations will be paid for with a combination of a state grant and a donation from Consumers Union.

The town recently purchased property on Mount Parnassus for both open space and municipal use. We just applied for a \$430,000 state grant that would enable us to build a barn and an education center with a commercial rated kitchen. The grant would provide the ability for residents to lease their own plot of land, to learn organic farming and to learn how to commercially process food.

The town has been awarded a grant for a public dock with a floating ramp way at the end of the Goodspeed parking lot. This public dock will enable boaters to easily visit our village and patronize our businesses.

In addition, we continue to be aggressive with our capital improvement plan for annual road and bridge maintenance, equipment replacement and other planned capital needs.

As you can see from the list above, we have many competing needs that warrant public discussion. In the coming weeks, we will be holding a public hearing to provide our citizens with an overview of all of the identified projects to include potential funding sources for each project. We will be seeking public input as we begin to prioritize how we wish to proceed.

I want to take a moment and thank everyone involved in the Relay for Life this year. We had great chairmanship from the team of Donna Barney and Melissa Michalski. The money raised this year topped \$38,000.

I am so proud and honored to be East Haddam's First Selectman!

Tax Collector's Office

As of July 1, 2012 tax information is now available online at easthaddam.org. Go to Town Departments; Tax Collectors page and click on the link "Online Tax Information". You will be able to check your current amount due and view past payments.

Please remember, due on January 1, 2013, is the second installment of Real Estate and Personal Property tax bills that were mailed out in July 2012. No second bill will be sent on these accounts. If you are a new owner of real estate property and need a copy of your tax bill, please contact the Tax Collector. Payments may be made in person at the Town Office Building, by mail to: Tax Collector, P. O. Box 376, East Haddam, CT 06423-0376 or on-line at easthaddam.org and click on the link "Pay Taxes". There is a fee associated with on-line payments which goes to the processing company, Point & Pay for their service. A secure lockbox is located in the front hallway for payments dropped off after normal business hours. Anyone wishing a receipt must include a stamped, self-addressed envelope with their payment.

This office is for the collection of taxes only. Any adjustments to your bill must be made by the Assessor.


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A message from the Superintendent of Schools



By way of setting a context for the coming year, I would like to share an excerpt from a story told by Reverend Dr. Patrick T. O'Neill.

Among the most accomplished and fabled tribes of Africa, no tribe was considered to have warriors more fearsome or more intelligent than the mighty

Masai. It is perhaps surprising then to learn that the traditional greeting that passed between Masai warriors was "Kasserian ingera," which translated means, "And how are the children?

It is still the traditional greeting among the Masai, acknowledging the high value that the Masai always place on their children's well-being. Even warriors with no children of their own always give the traditional answer, "All the children are well." Meaning, of course, that peace and safety prevail, that the priorities of protecting the young and powerless are in place, that Masai society has not forgotten its reason for being, its proper functions and responsibilities. "All the children are well," means that life is good. It means that the daily struggle for existence, even among a poor people, does not preclude proper caring for its young.

When Reverend O'Neill, told this story, he posed an

interesting question. He asked, how it might affect our consciousness of our own children's' welfare if in our culture we took to greeting each other with this same daily question: "And how are the children?" What would it be like if the President, the Governor, the County Commission, City Council or School Board began every meeting by answering the question "And how are the children?" What would it be like if every adult among us, parent and non-parent alike, felt an equal weight for the daily care and protection of all the children in our community? Would we then be able to say, without any hesitation, "All the children are well"?

As we embark on a new school year, it is with a personal commitment to the children in East Haddam and to our shared responsibility for ensuring that all the children in East Haddam are well: That all children in the East Haddam School District have access to and success with a rigorous, standards-based curriculum; that all children graduate with the skills, knowledge, and habits of mind necessary to be successful in college and in the workplace; that all children are able to fully participate in, and contribute to a democratic society.

I look forward to partnering with the East Haddam Community in this endeavor,



It's Coming Back! (snow, that is)

We hear frequent complaints about the dangerous road conditions that result when people push driveway snow out into our public roads. We actually have an ordinance prohibiting this practice, which states, "No person shall plow, throw, put or cause to be thrown or put any snow or ice from any private property or from any area in the rear of said private property or in area between a private dwelling house or structure and the legally laid out sidewalk into any public highway in the town of East Haddam."

As a reminder to residents, the town also has an ordinance regarding the clearing of sidewalks adjoining or fronting a resident or business property. The ordinance states, "Whenever the sidewalk, or any part thereof, adjoining or fronting any building lot of land or any street, square or public place in the Town of East Haddam, shall have upon it an accumulation of snow, sleet or ice, it shall be the duty of the owner, occupant or any person having the case of such building or lot, to cause such sidewalks to be made safe and convenient by removing the snow, sleet or ice therefrom, or by covering the same with sand or some other suitable substance, and in case such owner, occupant or other person having the care of such building or lot shall neglect to do so for the space of eight (8) hours during the daytime, the person whose legal duty it shall be to clear the sidewalk, and so neglecting, shall be fined not more than twenty five (\$25.00) dollars for each occurrence, and every hour of neglect to make the sidewalks safe in accordance with the provisions of this section, after notice from the First Selectman or his designee, shall constitute a separate offense."

Please keep this in mind this winter. Your neighbors will appreciate it.


Annual Thanksgiving Dinner Drive

East Haddam Community Lions

Our Spring fundraising started off with the 5K & 10.5 Mile Race in April, the annual Tea Party at St. Stephens and a Golf Tournament in May. The Gelston House was the setting for our June Fashion Show and Luncheon where over 100 participants viewed current fashion trends in clothing, shoes and jewelry.

Last year we raised over \$22,000 for the East Haddam Fuel Bank, Food Bank, Youth and Family Services, Project Graduation, our Libraries, Project Safe Halloween, Little League, Soccer League, Senior Center, Music on the River and more. Academic scholarships were awarded to two graduating seniors:Hannah Palmer and Nicole Govert. We also help those in our community who may be facing a hardship and need some assistance to get through a crisis. Several of our members help staff the Food Bank, many have been trained for East Haddam's Emergency Management Team, deliver Meals on Wheels and much more. All funds raised by the East Haddam Community Lions are returned to the community through service projects, through direct donation to community organizations and to foundations supported by Lions International.

Our Eye Fund Drive letter was recently mailed to all residents. Funds raised from this endeavor benefit the Connecticut Lions Eye Research Foundation (CLERF) at Yale. CLERF is dedicated to providing funds for eye research projects. The Community Lions sponsored a PediaVision Eye Screening this past spring with equipment from CLERF. Eight members were trained to do the scans and screened 69 preschool children. Research shows that if many eye abnormalities found in children ages 2 - 5 are treated at that young age, normal or near-normal vision can be restored by age 7. This year, 4 children were found to have abnormalities and were referred to their ophthalmologist for further study. Please send in your contribution and help us continue this vital mission.





For safety reasons, residents should not obtain sand during storm conditions when operators are loading trucks and entering and leaving the site.

It is understood that sand is provided for private, personal use and is not to be used commercially or for profit, or for any application other than as a safety precaution. Residents needing more than a few buckets of sand per winter should purchase their own supply.

Are You Ready for the November 6 Election? This fall, an election for President of the United States, United States Senator, Representative for the 2nd Congressional District, State Senator for the 33rd district, State Representative for the 34th district and Registrar of Voters will be held at the Nathan Hale-Ray High School gymnasium on November 6th, from 6 a.m. to 8 p.m.

Registered? If you are not registered to vote, you may do so by mail or at the Town Clerk's office or Registrar's office, during posted office hours. You may also register at the Department of Motor Vehicles, or download a form from the Town's website, www.easthaddam.org or from the Secretary of State's office web site, www.sots.ct.gov. The Registrars will be in their office, as well as on Saturday, October 20th, from 10 am to 2 pm. The deadline for voter registration by mail is that it must be postmarked by October 23rd. In person voter registration deadline is October 30th. (However, if voting rights are obtained by acquiring age, residency or citizenship after Oct 30th, registration in person will be accepted in the Registrar's office from 9 am to 5 pm, on Monday November 5th)

Absentee Ballots - If you are unable to get to the polls, you may apply for an absentee ballot at the Town Clerk's

office, or call 860 873 5027 and an application can be sent to you. Forms may also be downloaded from the town's website or at the Secretary of States web site.

To vote absentee, one must attest to:

 \cdot the elector's absence from their town for all of the hours of voting; or


- · illness or physical disability; or
- · active service in the US armed forces; or

 religious tenets forbid secular activity on Election Day; or service as a polling place official in a town other than their own.

Absentee ballots become available on October 6 and will be available from the Office of the Town Clerk. Absentee balloting is a two-step process. The ballot may not be issued until an application for the ballot has been received. Applications may be filed in advance of the ballot becoming available.

Curbside voting - Disabled voters who wish to come to the polls, can request curbside voting, in which a ballot will be brought in a folder to the car, by the two election officials. The voter privately marks the ballot, puts it in the folder, and then it is deposited in the ballot tabulator by an election official.

The Hadlyme North School

The Hadlyme North School is nestled in a little valley on Bone Mill Road and Town Road. It was built in 1794 near the church providing for grades 1 - 8. The community was primarily agricultural and as with most construction in those days, it was built by volunteers. One teacher covered all grades and older students assisted those who were younger. As we have all heard, there was much more snow back then and students who lived above the school rode and raced their sleds to school. It is easy to imagine their shrieks and laughter as they arrived at the school deep in snow and later with all the sleds leaning against the building and dark smoke coming from the chimney. No parking lots back then.

In 1930 the school was closed and later in 1967 it was scheduled to be sold, moved away, or destroyed. However, the people of Hadlyme would not let such a treasure go and the Society was formed with the goal of maintaining the school and making it available to the community. As it started, the school continues to be cared for by volunteers and financially supported by individuals in the community. Beside its local quaint charm and history, it is now noted for its gourmet potluck dinners held throughout most of the year.

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
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A New Dimension in MRI Comfort

Even for people who are not claustrophobic, the wide-open MRI provides a much more comfortable space during the exam than in the past.



"Open" vs. "Wide-Open" MRI - Many

people believe that having an "open" MRI can eliminate the claustrophobia they feel when having the same test in a traditional MRI unit. These types of "open" MRI systems are only open on the sides, and the top of the magnet is still very close to the body. In addition, these MRIs are also usually "low-field" MRIs, and although they do give patients more room during the test, they also have a significant drawback - it takes a lot longer to obtain the same image quality as traditional, "high-field" MRI machines. To cut down on exam times, some lower-field MRI systems may not have the same image quality as a state-of-the-art, higher-field system.

Middlesex Hospital only uses high-field MRI machines, since they produce the clearest images - because the higher the field strength, the better the quality of the images produced. However, the opening in these traditional machines is



considered too small by some larger or claustrophobic patients to allow them to be comfortable during the exam.

All that is changing at Middlesex Hospital. As of September, the Hospital now offers a new dimension in patient comfort - in its wide-open bore, high-field MRI that combines a much larger bore (circular opening) size and a much shorter "tunnel" (length). The new MRI looks just like a

CT scanner, only a foot longer. The new wide-open bore design accommodates all sizes (up to a 550-pound patient) eliminating anxiety and claustrophobia. For many exams, both the feet and head remain outside the machine. The newer technology combines an open feel with the ability to capture high-field quality diagnostic images. In addition, the new MRI is quieter and may require less time to capture the necessary images.

Why should patients care about the quality of their MRI images? When your doctor orders an MRI, he or she is looking to get as clear a picture as possible of what is going on in your body. The best way to get a clear picture is to use the type of technology that provides physicians with crisp and clear photos of the anatomy.

"This is great news for patients who may have chosen to receive a low-field, open MRI in the past," said Laurel Patt, Middlesex Hospital Director of Radiology.

"These patients can now feel assured that if they get an MRI here at Middlesex Hospital, they won't have to worry about their size or the fact that they may be claustrophobic. Our new machine offers both patient comfort and convenience, while still giving physicians the best possible image quality."

The new "wide-open" MRI system at the Hospital is currently operational. In addition, the current MRI scanner at the Outpatient Center on Saybrook Road in Middletown will be replaced with a new, "super-high-field strength" MRI. This new MRI has double the field strength and can produce even clearer, more detailed images. It will be operational at the beginning of March 2013. The new Shoreline Medical Center in Westbrook will also have a brand new, stationary MRI system operational when construction of the facility is completed in 2014.

When using the new, wide-open MRI systems at Middlesex Hospital, patients will be comfortable, experience less noise, spend less time in the machine and can still be sure

that their doctors will get the highest quality medical imaging. In other words, patients now have the best of all possible worlds at Middlesex Hospital if they need to have an MRI.





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
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
