

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

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First Selectman's Corner

As I complete my third term in office I reflect back and I am extremely proud of the great employees of the town as well as the volunteers who serve on all the boards and commissions who have come together as one to improve this great town!

Through one of the most difficult economic environments in US history,

they came together to basically keep spending flat while simultaneously improving service to the town, expanding open space and improving the quality of life for each of us.

Sure we often disagreed, but this led to healthy non-partisan debate. The result is that through our excellent financial management a fantastic foundation was pored for us to move forward in a bold way to improve the infrastructure of our town and the quality of the education our children receive.

You see in 2010, I recommended and the Board of Selectmen formed the Financial Needs Roundtable Committee to build a strong vision as well as review our capital requirements out ten years. The Committee completed its work in 2012. The following major projects were identified and recently presented:

- consolidating municipal offices with handicap access
- public safety issues including additional space for Emergency Services and repairs to the Moodus Firehouse
- Elementary School code upgrades/renovations

East Haddam contracted with O&G Industries to act as the program manager with the responsibility of analyzing the projects and to advise the town on the most cost efficient and cost effective options to address these needs.

The Board of Selectmen (BOS) has recently appointed two building advisory groups.

- The Municipal Facilities Building Advisory Group has been charged with reviewing the work previously done by the Middle School Conversion Committee, continuing to look at converting the old Middle School into consolidated municipal offices in a significantly more financially responsible way and reviewing the condition and space requirements of two firehouses.
- The Elementary School Advisory Group has been charged with reviewing the 2012 Elementary School architectural study completed by Kaestle Boos Associates. This study documents several building code updates and renovations that are required at the Elementary School and will greatly enhance the learning experience of our youngest students.

The goal for both of these advisory groups is to formulate specific and informed recommendations for the Boards of Finance, Education and Selectmen so the projects can be brought to and thoroughly explained to the residents of East Haddam. We will hold public information sessions so that citizens will be able to become informed on the projects. Our ultimate goal is that the projects will be voted on at referendum.

In this edition of Events Magazine there is information from each Advisory Group discussing their respective work to date and an outline of the overall scope of their projects as well as the benefits to the town.

These town and education improvements are extremely important and require a significant investment by the town. The total estimated cost to complete these projects is approximately \$40.3 million. The good news is that at this time we estimate state school construction grants, other potential grants, and income from the sale of the town office site and Moodus Firehouse properties to be approximately \$10 Million.

My vision is to continue to significantly improve the towns Emergency Management, the quality of our children's education and the overall experience of living in this town. The vision is bold and while requiring a significant investment, will position the town's services to our residents for decades to come.

You see, the Town has outgrown many of the existing facilities (i.e. Town offices, Police, Fire, Ambulance and Emergency Management) and there are maintenance and handicap access (ADA) issues to be addressed. These large repairs and upgrades were put on hold anticipating that the option to move to the old Middle School would address the majority of the issues. The Board of Selectmen, the Board of Finance, and I rejected the original plans to convert the Old Middle School because the costs were exorbitant for

the original scope of that project. We are now much more comfortable as these investments cover a significantly broader scope of services than the original plans.

Listed on the next page are the identified projects and the estimated costs for full renovation and the costs for required code work and repairs should the citizens not support full renovations at referendum:

Furthermore, we have an amazing opportunity for our town. Our town offices sit on one of the most beautiful and valuable pieces of real estate along the Connecticut River. Relocating the town offices would enable us to sell that property and expand the economic base in both the East Haddam and Moodus villages.

In summary, we have an incredible opportunity to move boldly forward and improve the town's infrastructure that will have a meaningful impact on the quality of life for each resident for decades to come with these projects. We are also going to be faced with these important decisions over the next several months. I would ask that you take the time to stay informed by attending the advisory group's meetings, attending the public hearings and town meetings, and most importantly take the time to vote at the referendum. 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
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East Haddam Library System

A Note From the Assessor

All persons having taxable personal property to declare such as: unregistered motor vehicles, horses and ponies, farm equipment, or any furniture, fixtures, and equipment used in the operation of a business, must do so by November 1, 2013. Declaration forms are available at the Assessor's Office; however, they will also be mailed to all businesses and residents who have declared property in the past. Please be aware if you have taxable personal property, and do not declare it, state statutes allow the assessor to add it at an estimated amount, plus a 25% penalty.

Applications for Farm, Forest and Open Space will be

accepted from September 1 until October 31, 2013. Forms are available at the Assessor's Office, or online at the town website.

Any persons who acquired a new motor vehicle after October 1, 2012 will receive a supplemental motor vehicle bill for their new vehicle by January 2014. These bills will be prorated, based on the date of registration, for the 12-month period starting October 2012 and ending September 2013. Vehicles acquired in August or September do not receive supplemental tax bills.



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Costly Repairs Imminent for the East Haddam Elementary School

The East Haddam Elementary School located on Joe Williams Road is the lone elementary school in town serving 332 students from kindergarten through third grade. The school consists of three sections built in 1962, 1964 and 1985, respectively. No sections of the school have ever been renovated. Significant investment is needed to renovate the structure due to wear and tear over the school's 51 years, as well as a need to comply with current building and life safety codes.

A school condition study, commissioned by the Board of Education and completed by Kaestle Boos Associates in 2012, made it clear that the school is in need of major, costly repairs to make the school more serviceable and code compliant. In order to provide local government transparency and solicit community involvement in decision making, the Board of Selectmen established a 7 member East Haddam School Building Advisory Group (Advisory Group) in August of 2013. The Advisory Group began meeting in late August joined by the First Selectman, Directors of Finance and Facilities, Land Use Administrator, and a Board of Education representative (of which are non-voting advisory group members.)


The Advisory Group has been charged with reviewing the various options and costs to repair the school, weigh the pros and cons of each option, and make a recommendation to town officials. Clearly, the town has no choice but to

complete urgent major repairs, bring the school in to code compliance and provide our children with a facility that offers a safe environment conducive to learning. Our group also must closely examine which option achieves the best long range goals for the town while maximizing State of Connecticut reimbursement. The Advisory Group is sensitive to the financial impact to taxpayers and is exploring all repair options and reimbursement scenarios.

The Advisory Group is under very tight timelines to conduct its work. Over the next two months the Advisory Group will: examine and understand all of the repair options and estimated costs; meet with town boards, commissions, and community stakeholders to solicit input; hold public meetings to review the Group's recommendation; and recommend to the Selectmen they move the final adopted recommendation to town referendum.

The Advisory Group urges public involvement at our meetings. Generally, meetings are held on the second and fourth Wednesday of the month at the Grange Hall, but you should check the Town Website for each meeting location. The Advisory Group's meeting dates and locations, agendas, and minutes are all published on the Town of East Haddam website at: http://www.easthaddam.org/. Please become involved in this very important issue facing our town.

Land Trust

Land Trust Preserves 45 Acres Along Moodus River

East Haddam Land Trust (EHLT) recently added approximately 45 acres along the Moodus River to its list of Preserves. The outright purchase of property on Grist Mill Road combined with a protective easement of acreage from Gary and Donna Bogan insures that 4,200 feet of land bordering the Moodus River will remain woodlands, wetlands, and meadow.

Preserving the Moodus Riverfront and creating a linear trail along the river has been a goal of the Land Trust for more than 30 years, notes EHLT president Rob Smith. We appreciate Gary and Donna Bogan's willingness to work with EHLT to take another large step toward this goal, Smith adds.

The creation of hiking trails through the property and along the Moodus River for fishing access will begin on October 19 from 9 a.m. to noon, during EHLT's monthly Stewardship activity. It's Back! (Snow, That Is)

We hear frequent complaints about the dangerous road conditions that result when people push driveway snow out into our public roads. We actually have an ordinance prohibiting this practice, which states, "No person shall plow, throw, put or cause to be thrown or put any snow or ice from any private property or from any area in the rear of said private property or in area between a private dwelling house or structure and the legally laid out sidewalk into any public highway in the town of East Haddam."

As a reminder to residents the town also has an ordinance regarding the clearing of sidewalks adjoining or fronting a resident or business property. The ordinance states,

"Whenever the sidewalk, or any part thereof, adjoining or fronting any building lot of land or any street, square or public place in the Town of East Haddam, shall have upon it an accumulation of snow, sleet or ice, it shall be the duty of the owner, occupant or any person having the case of such building or lot, to cause such sidewalks to be made safe and convenient by removing the snow, sleet or ice therefrom, or by covering the same with sand or some other suitable substance, and in case such owner, occupant or other person having the care of such building or lot shall neglect to do so for the space of eight (8) hours during the daytime, the person whose legal duty it shall be to clear the sidewalk, and so neglecting, shall be fined not more than twenty five (\$25.00) dollars for each occurrence, and every hour of neglect to make the sidewalks safe in accordance with the provisions of this section, after notice from the First Selectman or his designee, shall constitute a separate offense."

Please keep this in mind this winter. Your neighbors will appreciate it.

Bringing Back the Harris Farm

It was a sleepy day in mid-August at the town-owned Harris property on Mr. Parnassus Road but nature's industry was at work. Legions of dragonflies perched on the tall green grasses and circled like bombardiers hunting for mosquitoes. Honeybees and bumblebees industriously gathered pollen and nectar from the buckwheat flowers, polygonum and other wild flowers that filled the meadow.

Buckwheat had been planted as a cover crop in the spring of 2013, following the winter cover crop of rye. Cover crops hold precious top soil and accumulate nutrients and introduce important biology to encourage higher productivity and stability to agricultural sites.

Flashback to two years ago, these front acres were covered with brush, briers and barberry mixed with tangles of bittersweet, poison ivy and other creepers and invasive plants. These vines and invasive plants covered tree stumps left behind by human hands and huge boulders left behind by the last glaciers.

Pathways were cleared by volunteers, but it soon became evident that some mechanized help would be needed to bring the field back to agriculture and recreation parkland. The town came to the rescue with heavy brush clearing equipment. Other heavy equipment was brought in to remove stumps and debris, remove the decrepit barn and move the huge boulders to the periphery of the field. Old-time farmers would have been impressed at how quickly this clearing could be accomplished.

Soon state funded deer fencing (a necessity in modern farming) will be installed and community gardens and small farm plots will be planted in the spring. Hiking, horseback riding and birding will be a natural recreation in the adjacent pathways and surrounding woods, making the Harris Property a true community asset.

Master Gardener's Corner

This year I completed a course called Coastal Certificate - Sound Gardening: Sustainable Landscaping for Clean Waters. The course was comprehensive and addressed native plant habitats that attract birds and pollinating insects along with designing for sustainability using native coastal plants. It offered solid landscaping practices for Connecticut coastal and watershed residents. Many East Haddam residents have wetlands on their property so the great landscaping and design ideas fit nicely into many property environments.

One very doable idea is to build a Rain Garden. Rain Gardens aren't only useful; they are attractive and enhance the beauty of your yard and neighborhood. They benefit our environment by reducing the amount of pollutants that wash into lakes, streams, ponds and wetlands. They help protect communities from flooding and drainage problems and help reduce the need for costly municipal storm water treatment structures. As the saying goes, "on the ground into the sound", usually by way of our important wetlands. Rain Gardens act as filters and the benefits are far-reaching.

Rain Gardens are landscaped depressions about 6 inches deep that collect runoff from a roof, driveway or yard and allow it to infiltrate into the ground. They are typically planted with shrubs or perennials. Rain Gardens are not difficult or expensive to install and do not take machinery to get the job done. It's another family project that all can enjoy. Maintenance is as easy as maintaining a small flower garden.

Sand for Winter Ice

Residents of East Haddam are reminded that they may take only a small amount of sand from one of the municipal sand piles for their personal use in sanding steps, walkways, or ice patches in driveways. Piles are located at the corner of Haywardville and Early Roads, and at the Town Garage, off Mt. Parnassus Road near Shagbark. For safety reasons, residents should not obtain sand during storm conditions

when operators are loading trucks and entering and leaving the site.

It is understood that sand is provided for private, personal use and is not to be used commercially or for profit, or for any application other than as a safety precaution. Residents needing more than a few buckets of sand per winter should purchase their own supply.

Please remember, due on January 1, 2014, is the second installment of Real Estate and Personal Property tax bills that were mailed out in July 2013. A second bill will not be sent on these accounts. If you are a new owner of real estate property and need a copy of your tax bill, please contact the tax office immediately. Motor Vehicle Supplemental bills are also due January 1, 2014. Supplemental bills will be mailed the end of December 2013. The last day to pay these bills will be February 3, 2014. Additionally, we have selected October 27 for a Sunrise State Park community clean-up day. More details will be coming via my e-newsletter, which you can sign up for at www. repziobron.com"

Rep. Ziobron had pushed for a plan for Sunrise State Park since taking office in January because of concern that the property has evolved into an abandoned collection of rundown buildings that presents a significant safety hazard to the public and welcomes illicit behavior such as drug use, vandals and arson. The property, once a recreational destination for vacationers, was purchased by the state in 2008.

The East Haddam Police/Resident Troopers Office would like to inform East Haddam residents about the number of complaints received by our office daily, about speed throughout town. Officers constantly monitor different areas in town to address these speeding complaints and look for other motor vehicle violations. Although speeding complaints are received from all areas of town, our office has been experiencing a high volume of speeding complaints on Routes 82 and 149 in the East Haddam Village, Boardman Road, North Moodus Road, Falls Bashan and on the East Haddam Colchester Turnpike.

It is not uncommon for officers responding to complaints of speeding and other motor vehicle violations to find several of the violators to be those that live on that street or within the general vicinity. As you travel our roads throughout town, please take a minute to notice the posted speed limit and stop signs and ensure you obey these signs.

As summer has come to an end, all schools are now back in session. Your local and State Police will ensure that our children are as safe as possible while traveling our roads to and from School. Please do your part by being alert, avoid driving distracted and be aware of the posted school bus stop signs, speed limits signs and buses stopped with flashing red lights picking up or dropping off kids. Strict enforcement action will be conducted around any violation involving kids or a school bus.

Raw Milk vs. Pasteurized Milk in Cheese

Customers often come in to our shop, having just returned from a trip to Europe, looking for that great cheese they had enjoyed in their travels. My usual reply is, "That's made from raw milk and it is not allowed in this country." The disappointment is obvious as they sadly accept the best possible alternative I can find.

Raw milk cheese has been blamed for many illnesses, hence the ruling against it here in the States. According to the CDC (Center for Disease Control), between the years 1993 to 2006 over 121 outbreaks occurred, causing over 1,500 illnesses and two deaths. Older people, pregnant women, children and those with weak immune systems are the most vulnerable.

First, we need to understand the difference. Raw milk is milk straight from the animal with no processing done to it. Pasteurized milk is raw milk that has been heated to a high enough temperature to kill most of the harmful bacteria present. You might be aware of the 60-day rule, which simply states that no cheese under 60 days old is allowed to be imported. The reason is that young raw milk cheeses are associated with salmonella, E.coli, and listeria, just to name a few. So why the 60-day rule? The reason is that any harmful bacteria present in the milk or cheese does not survive past this time period. So, if a cheese is over 60 days old, it is considered safe for consumption.

As a general rule, cheeses made from raw milk taste better that those made from pasteurized milk. The issue then becomes the taste quality of raw milk cheese vs. the safety of pasteurized milk cheese. I agree that raw milk cheese has more depth in flavor, more complex aromas, and a better finish than pasteurized cheese.

Europe takes a different viewpoint on raw milk cheese. Some countries allow distribution of raw milk cheese, while others do not. Scotland bands them, while England, Wales and Northern Ireland allow them. France is the biggest proponent of raw milk cheese, considering it a sacrilege to use pasteurized milk in cheese production. There does not seem to be any issue for France when it comes to eating raw milk cheese. The thought is that they have built up immunity to the raw milk bacteria and, as a result, they don't get sick from them.

In any case, you will not find raw milk cheeses such as Brie or Camembert in the United States anytime soon. The older cheeses, beyond 60 days old, are available and considered safe. The decision is yours. I enjoy them, but as stated earlier, pregnant women, children, the elderly and those with weak immune systems might want to proceed with caution.

Registrars of Voters

November 5, 2013 is the date for our municipal election. It will be held at the Nathan Hale-Ray High School, on School Drive, off of Route 151 in Moodus. Voting hours will be from 6:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. If you are not already registered to vote, you may do so by stopping into the Registrars' office, in the River House, across the street from the Gelston House, and next door to the Town Office Building. Registrars are there every Tuesday, from 11:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. You may also register in the Town Clerk's office, Monday, Wednesday, Thursday, from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.; Tuesday, 9:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. and Friday 9:00 a.m. to 12 noon. You may download applications from the East Haddam Town website www.easthaddam.org; or the Connecticut Secretary of State's website www.sots.ct.gov; and mail them to "Registrar of Voters, River House, P.O. Box K, East Haddam, CT 06423. Mail in voter applications must be received by the registrars on or before October 28, 2013, to be valid for the November election. Otherwise registration must be in person.

There is a special registration day, Saturday, October 19, from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m., set aside per direction of the Secretary of State's office for citizens to register to vote.

Registrars will also be in their office on Tuesday, October 29, from 9:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m., and November 4 from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

This year citizens, who were not able to register prior to the Election date, may register on Election Day! Registration on Election Day, will take place at the Registrars' office, during election hours. Citizens registering must bring both identification and proof of residency. This may include a driver's license, (which, if it has a local East Haddam address may also be used as proof of residency), or any other preprinted form of ID which shows your name and address, or name and signature, or name and photograph. Proof of residency may include utility bill or paycheck with your name and address which is no more than 30 days old.

Check with the Town Clerk for absentee ballot requirements. Absentee ballots will be available from the Town Clerk beginning October 7.

Thus, it is our hope that all citizens will make the effort to register, if they are not currently registered; and that those who are registered, will come out to vote or obtain an absentee ballot.

Voting is a precious right! We like to see Democracy in action!

Absentee Ballots - For Municipal

An elector may vote by absentee ballot due to:

- 1. the elector's absence from their town for all of the hours of voting;
- 2. illness or physical disability;
- 3. active service in the US armed forces;
- 4. religious tenets forbid secular activity on Election Day; or
- 5. service as a polling place official in a town other than their own.

Beginning October 7th absentee ballots are available from the Office of the Town Clerk for the November 5th Municipal Election. Absentee balloting is a two step process. The ballot may not be issued until an application for the ballot has been received. Applications may be filed in advance of the ballot becoming available.

To obtain the application for an absentee ballot, call 860-873-5027 or come into the Town Clerk's Office. Forms may also be downloaded from the town's website www.easthaddam.org (elections under Town Clerk) or www.sots.ct.gov (elections & voting, voter resources, absentee ballot and procedures, application for ballot). The absentee ballot application with an original signature must be on file in order for a ballot to be counted.

Permanently Disabled Absentee Ballot Status

Public Act 12-57, "An Act Concerning Permanent Absentee Ballot Status for the Permanently Disabled" created permanent absentee balloting status for certain individuals and is now in effect.

In General: To be eligible for permanent absentee ballot status, an elector must file with the Town Clerk an absentee ballot application together with a doctor's certificate stating that they have a permanent disability and are unable to appear in person at their polling place. The doctor's note should be on letterhead. There is no prescribed form - the doctor's note and the absentee ballot application would satisfy the requirement of the law.

Permanent absentee ballot status enables the elector to receive an absentee ballot for each election, and primary, in the municipality in which they are eligible to vote. Absentee ballots are available 21 days before a Primary and 31 days before an Election.

Eligibility: In January of each year the Registrars of Voters will send written notice to each elector with permanent absentee ballot status to determine if the elector continues to reside at the address on the permanent absentee ballot application. If the elector fails to respond to the notice, the permanent absentee ballot status will be removed.

The Largest Organ in Our Body

Do you know what the largest organ in the body is? It's the skin. It protects you from illnesses and infection, helps control your body's temperature and dehydration, protects and helps you feel everything from a hot kettle to a soft breeze.

For your skin's health, it is essential to eat organically grown fruits and vegetables rich in antioxidants such as vitamin C (bell pepper, parsley, broccoli, strawberries, cauliflower, papaya, kiwifruit, lemon), vitamin E (sunflower seeds, swiss chard, almonds, spinach, olives), carotenoids (sweet potatoes, spinach, kale, carrots, roman lettuce, cantaloupe, bell pepper) and flavonoids (blueberries, raspberries, strawberries, plums, raisins, cranberries, celery, apples, lemon), as well as foods rich in omega 3-fatty acids including fish such as salmon, tuna, sardines and cod, in addition to flaxseeds and walnuts. Omega 3 inhibits the production of inflammatory compounds involved in the progression of skin conditions. Good hydration with high quality water is necessary for skin health.

To have beautiful, wrinkle free skin on your face avoid sugar and alcohol. Alcohol will lead your body to dehydration and dryness of your skin, eating too much sugar will lead to wrinkles and sagging. Too much sugar in your bloodstream will start to attack your skin. All that sugar attaches to protein molecules, collagen and elastin, and it turns those beautiful supple skin cells into rigid things causing sagging and wrinkling, everything we don't want on our face.

Regular exercises and massage sessions will help with appropriate blood circulation.

The skin needs protection from continued exposure to sunlight to prevent premature aging and cancerous changes. If you can, do your outdoor activities before 10 am or after 2 pm, when the ultraviolet rays are less intense. In case of sunburn, use natural remedies to help the healing process of the skin. The fat content of milk is soothing, so milk makes a great compress for sunburn pain. To speed the process of healing, eat more foods rich in vitamin C. Keep an aloe vera plant in your house, when you get sunburn, break and open a leaf then apply the clear gel inside directly to your tender skin. Apply as often as needed for relief. Also a baking soda bath is great for soothing sunburn. Appropriate applications of sunscreen before and during time spent in the sun, especially after swimming, can prevent skin damage.

Youth & Family Services

In 2011, Connecticut decriminalized the possession of small amounts of marijuana which means that penalties for the possession of ½ ounce of marijuana or less have changed from jail to fines.

In 2012, Connecticut passed a law that legalizes the medical use of marijuana for certain conditions. Neither of these actions gives "blanket approval" for the use of this drug and both include guidelines that are intended to limit the potential for abuse or misuse. However, the fact is that decriminalizing and/or legalizing marijuana normalizes it and reduces the perception of risk or harm associated with using it.

There are many studies on the adolescent use of marijuana from reputable medical and mental health organizations. They identify the harmful effects of marijuana on the teenage brain and the impact of regular use on academic performance. They raise concerns about the danger of drugged driving and the

higher addictive qualities of marijuana today as compared to forty years ago. And they point to a dependence on the drug that is more likely to occur the earlier use begins.

There is a "culture of use" that goes along with adolescent drug use. When kids begin using marijuana, they socialize with others who are also using it. The more involved they become, the more likely it is that they will come in contact with kids using other drugs. It isn't hard to understand how it becomes increasingly more acceptable for them to do the same.

There are conflicting arguments on both sides of the question: "Harmful/Not Harmful", "Addictive/Not Addictive", "Gateway drug or not". Whether, as adults, we choose to believe one side of the argument or the other is a matter of choice. But, as parents and caretakers of our children, it is incumbent upon each of us to be well informed and educated about the issues related to this drug and acutely aware of the messages our kids are getting.

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Emergency Management

The East Haddam Emergency Management Group knows the importance of being prepared for all types of emergencies. Preparing the Town is in many ways like you preparing your family for different emergency situations, just on a much larger scale. For our group, we need to be concerned with all of our residents, the different needs that people throughout town may have and what assistance they may need during an emergency.

One of the areas our group is diligently working on is the ability to assist our residents with functional needs during emer-

gency events. Functional needs include: power requirements, transportation/mobility issues, oxygen dependence, etc. Over forty Emergency Management Volunteers attended a functional needs training class earlier this year. The training was taught by a dedicated group with different disabilities from the Capital Regional Planning group. The class was extremely informative and provided volunteers with a much better understanding of how we can assist our residents based on their potential needs during an emergency.

Have you heard this before? "Well I drank when I was in high school and I am fine so my kid can do the same". In my younger days having a few beers or the occasional Boones Farm while parents were away was the norm but is this the same kind of underage drinking that goes on today?

Kids today have access to money, transportation, social media and more alcohol options than ever before. The spirits industry has brought in millions of dollars marketing towards youth and statistics show their efforts have paid off. Kids start drinking alcohol at age 12 nationally and in CT even younger. Would you drink these flavors: cotton candy, cookie dough, cake, gummy? These fruity alcohol flavors are specifically marketed toward youth. Can you imagine Bill Cosby as the

spokesperson for Alcoholic Jello shots? Want some alcohol infused whipped cream on your dessert?

If youth are exposed in middle school to these products, do you wonder what happens when they reach high school? If they build a tolerance to alcohol at age 14, do they then go looking for other substances to give them a higher high? East Haddam survey results show an increase in substance use from 7th to the 12th grade both in levels and kinds of substances. The next time you enter a local retailer take a look as if you are 12, notice bright colors, sweet youthful flavors and cartoonish labels. Is this really the same kind of underage drinking that you grew up with?

Middlesex United Way Announces \$840,000 in Funding
