

MOTOR VEHICLES

"What do I do if my vehicle was…" is the most frequently asked question in any Assessor's Office. Since tax bills are due in July, we are answering this question and providing all possible situations if you no longer have a vehicle in your possession. Your tax bill is based on ownership as of the October 1, 2016 grand list date, and any proration of the bill is based on the month, not day, of disposition.

Please note that a Plate Return Receipt from the CT DMV alone does not prove disposition of a vehicle. Below is a listing of the acceptable types of proof required, in addition to a copy of your plate return receipt.

Sold, Traded-In or Donated

- 1. A copy of the bill of sale with year, make, model, VIN number, and buyer's information including signatures of both seller and buyer.
- 2. A copy of the new owner's registration or title.
- 3. A copy of your title showing transfer of vehicle.
- 4. A copy of the dealer's bill of sale showing trade-in and new plates issued. (See Transfer of Plates on page 6).

- 5. A letter from your insurance agent/company including date of cancellation, the vehicle information, and the reason for cancellation.
- 6. A letter from the charitable organization on their letterhead, stating the vehicle information and date of donation.

Totaled or Junked

- 1. A letter from your insurance agent/company stating that the vehicle was totaled, the date of the accident, and the vehicle information.
- 2. Dated receipt from junkyard dealer where vehicle was disposed, including the vehicle information.

Stolen

A letter from the insurance company stating the vehicle was stolen and not recovered, including date of theft and vehicle information.

Repossession

- 1. A letter from the finance company stating the vehicle was taken and not redeemed by you, or
- 2. A copy of the bill of sale or auction papers that state the date of sale and vehicle information.

Events Presents ~ Skip's Wastewater Services



In March of 1958, Peter Skipper purchased a small septic business from Sherwood Downes of Ellington, CT which consisted of a 1941 Ford Tank Truck and a handful of customers. The new business was called Skips Septic. By 2010, the company had grown to fifteen full time employees, five pump trucks and close to twenty thousand customers. Skips Septic serviced mainly areas in Tolland County and focused on pumping septic tanks and doing a small amount of septic repairs and installations.

Andrew Coleman, grandson of Peter Skipper, became very interested and familiar with the septic business while working for Skips all throughout high school. In 2005, Andrew started his own business; Wastewater Services, Inc. and focused primarily on the installation and repairs of septic systems. By 2012, Wastewater Services had nearly four thousand customers and was installing over one hundred septic systems per year.

In April of 2014, Andrew Coleman and Wastewater Services purchased Skips Septic. The two companies became Skips Wastewater Services. Today, Skips Wastewater Services specializes in septic pumping, inspections, repairs and installations. The company has grown to thirty employees and close to twenty five thousand customers. The company's fleet has expanded to nine pump trucks, eleven service vehicles, five dump trucks, and over a dozen pieces of excavating equipment.

With three-full time septic inspectors on staff, Skips Wastewater Services is able to perform over 1600 septic inspections per year. Each septic inspection is a visual inspection and utilizes the use of a fiber-optic camera to visually view the condition of subsurface components. This visual inspection is accompanied by a typed septic report emailed to the customer the next business day.

A failing septic system can be a home owner's worst nightmare. With over 130 septic installs per year, Skips Wastewater Services has the experience and expertise on staff to complete the job on time and correctly. During the installation process, Skips Wastewater Services makes it a priority to have an on-going conversation with the home owner; explaining what will happen each step of the installation.

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

Registered Out Of State

A copy of the out of state registration or title showing issue date and vehicle information.

Taxed in Wrong Town

If you lived in a different Connecticut town on October 1, 2016, provide proof of residency, such as the property record card for your home, or lease for rental property. You will also need to correct your address and tax town with the DMV; forms are available in our office or at www.ct/dmv.

Tax bills are not prorated between towns. For example, if you were in Ellington on October 1, but moved on November 1 to another town, you will still pay taxes to Ellington in July.

Transfer of Plates to New Vehicle

If you transferred your plates to a new vehicle, you are not entitled to an adjustment at this time. The adjustment follows the plate, and you will receive the credit towards your new vehicle on the supplemental grand list due in January 2018. It is not required to provide proof of the sale or trade-in of the vehicle; the DMV notifies us of the plate transfer to a different vehicle via a supplemental bill credit. The original bill you receive in July for the old car should be paid in full.

Vehicles Registered After October 1, 2016

A vehicle registered after October 1 will be on the supplemental motor vehicle list. Motor vehicle taxes are prorated according to the month registered through September 2017. Bills are due and payable in January 2018.

Unregistered Motor Vehicles

A vehicle that is no longer registered with the CT DMV is still considered taxable personal property. Motor vehicle tax in Connecticut is based on ownership, not registration or road use. You will receive a Personal Property declaration to report your unregistered vehicles in September 2017.

Meet the members of your Town Clerk's Office. They are available to assist you with dog and sport licenses, marriage licenses, vital statistics, voter registration and so much more.

The duties and responsibilities of the Town Clerk's Office are numerous and varied, most of which are governed by State Statute, Town Charter, and the Board of Selectmen. The State Statutes govern the duties and responsibilities of the Office of Vital Statistics.

Responsibilities and duties of the Town Clerk's office include, but are not limited to, the following:

- Recording documents related to real estate
- Collecting conveyance taxes
- Filing and maintaining maps, trade names, liquor permits, military discharges, and Notary Public Certificates
- Posting notices of meetings and filing minutes and notices received from various Boards and Commissions, as required by the Freedom of Information Laws
- Preparing all election material including absentee ballots for elections, primaries, referenda and the issuing of all absentee ballots
- Accepting applications for new voters and those wishing to change their party affiliation (Learn more on the Secretary of State's Office website at ct.gov/sots)
- Coordinating with the Registrars of Voters to report election, primary and referenda results
- Issuing marriage licenses, burial, cremation and transit permits and certified copies of birth, death and marriage licenses
- Processing sports and dog licenses
- Serving as Aircraft Registration Official
- Recording and preparing Town Meeting Minutes All Town meeting minutes are on file in the Town Clerk's Office
- Managing land records including processing, maintaining and preserving records and maps affecting the title to land located within the Town.

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

CRUMBLING FOUNDATIONS

The Building Department staff has been receiving calls from Ellington citizens regarding crumbling foundations. Unfortunately, the Town does not keep records of concrete foundation suppliers. We

recommend contacting the State of Connecticut, Department of Consumer Protection as they provide an extensive list of resources on their website about this topic. The site provides information that can help determine if a concrete foundation is failing, as well as information on hiring a contractor, what to do if you are selling your home, and much more. Go to the Department of Consumer Protection's webpage at http://www. ct.gov/dcp. Under the listing "What's New," click on Concrete Foundations for the latest information and resources.

SWIMMING POOLS

Now that we are having some warmer weather, many people will be thinking about opening their pools. Prior to using your pool, we recommend having it serviced by a licensed pool contractor to ensure the safety of all equipment. It's always a good idea to review pool safety. There are many preventative measures a homeowner can take to keep family and friends safe, which include:



- Provide fencing that is climb-resistant and at least 4' high. The fencing and gates should be well maintained with a self-closing latch located at least 54" from the bottom of the gate.
- Install and maintain pool alarms.
- Install and maintain door alarms.
- Never leave a child unattended.
- Actively watch children; it is easy to get distracted by our electronic devices.
- Remove toys near the pool when not in use.
- Keep electrical appliances away from the pool.

pools that are sold at big box stores. These pools can hold more than 24" of water, so therefore require Building and Zoning permits prior to installation. Barrier

fencing, self-closing gates and certain electrical items are required for these pools to ensure public safety.

OPEN BUILDING PERMITS

Do you have any open building permits? An open permit is a permit that was applied for and approved, but the work never received a final inspection and approval from our Building Official. Homeowners often assume the contractor takes care of all inspections. Sometimes this is true; many times, however, the contractor doesn't call for the final inspection. Ultimately the responsibility falls to the homeowner to confirm all building permits are "closed out," meaning the final inspection has been



The Building Official checks all work to be sure it meets the minimum building code and ensures the work is done safely and correctly. This will come into play when someone is selling or purchasing a home. A prospective home buyer likes to be assured that the home they are buying is up to code and safe. Often times, closings get delayed because the seller has permits that have not been closed out. This can be avoided by making sure you have a certificate from the Building Official before you make that final payment to your contractor.

Temporary Signs: With springtime upon us, please remember that signs cannot be located along the edge of a street or at a roadway intersection. Permitted temporary signs should be set back onto the property to which it pertains in order to allow for safe sightlines for people traveling as pedestrians, bicyclists or motorists.



Backyard Poultry: Are you aware that the Ellington Zoning Regulations were amended last year to allow 'backyard' hens and poultry? If you have land that is 20,000 square feet or more, you potentially may keep up

to 8 poultry. Please note that roosters are only allowed on farms. The Planning Department requires the submittal of a form at no charge to make sure requirements are met regarding location of structures and enclosures, site suitability, waste management, etc. Use the following link to access the Backyard Poultry Compliance Form http://www.ellington-ct.gov/DocumentCenter/View/1161

Additionally, the Town will receive a free 5 kW solar installation to put on a school or town building for every 12 homeowners who go solar through Solarize Ellington.

"Solarize Ellington is a program that the Town is eager to promote to its residents. The benefits of renewable solar energy are vast, and utilizing it is an economical and practical way to meet household energy needs while reducing environmental pollutants," said Ellington's First Selectman Lori Spielman. "This program offers the potential for immediate savings and will allow residents to take control of their available energy resources. I feel that this program is a huge asset to the community, and I recommend that Ellington residents take advantage of the no-charge evaluation to see if their homes can go solar." Solarize Ellington also offers residents access to financing options that make going solar affordable with no upfront costs. Homeowners who want to find out if their home is good for solar can go directly to SolarizeCT. com/Ellington.



Conservation Commission: Clean Energy Communities Initiative - Home Energy Solutions

During the latter six months of 2016, Ellington partnered with Eversource, Aiello Home Services, Energy Efficiencies Solutions, and Fox Heating to bring you Home Energy SolutionsSM - an Energize ConnecticutSM initiative designed to save residents money and reduce energy needs. As part of the 2016 campaign, partnering contractors donated \$25 to the Ellington Fuel Bank for each in-home energy service. The program resulted in over 40 homes participating in Home Energy Solutions and a donation of \$1,075 to the Ellington Fuel Bank. To commemorate the achievement of the 2016 program, a donation ceremony was held on Monday, March 13, 2017, during a Board of Selectmen meeting. (See Photo). The Ellington Fuel Bank assists low income Ellington residents who are facing a utility shut off or are in need of an emergency delivery of heating fuel. Residents can call Ellington Human Services to be screened for eligibility 860-870-3128.

Since the 2016 campaign was such a success, it has been extended through December 31, 2017. When you participate in Home Energy Solutions, a utility-approved and insured contractor visits your home to evaluate energy use and make on-the-spot improvements that can lower energy bills. During

the visit, the average household receives about \$1,000 worth of products and services for just \$124, and, thereafter, most customers save about \$200 every year by reducing energy consumption.

OPEN BURNING

We are well into the spring season and with that comes traditional spring clean-up. As property owners approach this

clean-up, it is important to remember that open burning is heavily regulated within our state. The Connecticut Department of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP) promulgates state-wide regulations governing open burning and it is not unusual for many towns in Connecticut to augment those regulations with the adoption of local ordinances. The focus of DEEP's regulations is not on fire safety but air quality management, with the goal being the reduction or prevention of fugitive particulate matter in the atmosphere. The ordinances serve to fine-tune the state regulations to fit more closely the character of each town. Ellington adopted an ordinance in 2001 which should help residents

understand the open burning regulations. This ordinance can be found on the town website www.ellington-ct.gov/362/towncode Chapter 74, Article II. Since adoption of that ordinance, DEEP has made significant adjustments to its regulations.

Application for an open burning permit, accompanied by a filing fee of \$15, may be made to the Fire Marshal in the Town Hall Annex at 57 Main Street. Open burning can be conducted only on residential property upon which the applicant resides. The DEEP program generally allows the burning of only light brush. It does not allow the burning of any kind of treated wood (any wood having been submitted to any process, including construction lumber and demolition material), leaves, or branches larger than 3 inches in diameter. There are some exceptions for agricultural burning by farmers, but lot clearing is not allowed. The primary benefit to requiring a permit for open burning is not a matter of revenue generation but rather of public safety. Requiring the permit fosters and supports the safe environment.

The application for the permit is the key element of the process, for during that transfer of information, the scope of the project becomes clear and illuminates those facets that must be further explored. Once the scope is clarified, the fire marshal applies statutes, regulations and ordinances along with standardized safe practices to the specific project, including a site inspection. The permit process acts as a system of checks and balances resulting in a lawful and safe project. The net result is that the Town, in its authorizing of a controlled fire, has performed its due diligence, has reduced its legal liability to an acceptable level, and the public is presented with a safe and compliant venue.

Regulations governing open burning are among the many statutes, codes, regulations and ordinances enforced by this department. Penalties for violations of the open burning regulations can be severe, with the most recent case totaling \$34,000 in fines.

Ellington Volunteer Fire Department Cadet Firefighter Program

The Cadet Program is open to youths between the ages of fourteen and nineteen. Cadets have the opportunity to participate in the same programs and training as the regular membership in addition to their own dedicated training and activities. Their participation at emergency incidents is restricted to assure they are not exposed to hazardous activities. The insights and support they bring to the fire department represents a valuable part of our organization. As they grow in experience and age they are brought into the organization where there training continues.

There's No Crying in Baseball

"It's supposed to be hard. If it wasn't hard, everyone would do it. The hard is what makes it great." This quote, delivered by Tom Hanks in the 1992 dramedy *A League* A Langhorne, PA native, Smith got her foot in the door at the *Bucks County Courier*, a small publication with a sports editor who believed that women plus sports wouldn't equal success. She then took a position with the *Philadelphia*



of Their Own, was intended as a reminder that nothing worth having comes easily, a lesson that Ellington resident Claire Smith has learned time and again during her illustrious 35-year career as a baseball writer. Her extraordinary journey, embarked upon in 1981, will lead her to Cooperstown this July as the first woman ever presented with the J.G. Taylor Spink Award, set aside "for meritorious contributions to baseball writing." th the *Philadelphia Bulletin*, where she landed a front-page byline with her first baseball story, a fan-reaction piece on Pete Rose breaking the National League hit record, previously held by Stan Musial, in 1981. She went on to hold groundbreaking positions on the staff of the *Hartford*

Courant, the *New York Times*, and the *Philadelphia Inquirer*; in 2007, she joined ESPN's team, where she currently serves as news editor of remote publications, in charge of the integration of news and analysis in live game broadcasts, as well as the Baseball Tonight and SportsCenter studio programs.

Claire credits most of her love of baseball to her mother, an avid Dodgers fan who

introduced her to "a sport where you write about the people who happened to play, as opposed to writing about point spreads...a sport [driven by] the storytelling." In 1984, during her second career postseason, she was literally pushed away from a story taking place in the San Diego Padres' clubhouse, simply because she was a woman. "My father...said I would always be required to prove what I wasn't before I could prove what I was." When asked for her recommendations to anyone working their way through conflict, Smith had the following advice: "Shatter stereotypes with your knowledge. It's called bringing your 'A' game. No one has invented a way to better that, yet!"

She recognizes the likes of Jane Gross, Lisa Olson and Lisa Nehus Saxon as pioneers who taught her about strength and fortitude as she joined them in the fight for equal access in the wide world of sports. While this fight has and will continue to open doors for likeminded women in the industry, Smith still preaches patience. "Someone will ask you one day how you got there, and if you're an overnight success, you have to just smile. You don't have a story."








Map Created by the Ellington Planning Department











The Renaissance of The 2700

The Ellington Public Schools enrolls approximately 2700 students. The 2700 are a diverse group who are undergoing a Renaissance, a reawakening. They are artists, athletes, scientists, inventors, debaters and so much more. They are whoever they want to be, and this is how it should be.

The 2700 are on a 13 year Ellington Public School journey from kindergarten to graduation. Their journey will witness each of The 2700 accessing varied opportunities to remember who they truly are, to reawaken their talents and passions, and to co-create with others.

The 2700 are constantly evolving, making errors in judgement, and failing often, yet making progress that they themselves might not recognize. The paths chosen are often arduous and winding, leaving those who guide and love The 2700 unsure how long they will remain asleep. However, it is not if they will awaken but when. And when they choose to closely examine their Ellington Public School journey, successes will abound, life lessons will be learned, and a Renaissance into adulthood will have been realized.

The Ellington Board of Education recently adopted the 2017-2018 budget to support The Renaissance of The 2700. With 2016-2017 resources directed at full day kindergarten, next school year's budget theme will focus on the enhancement of the arts and academics at Ellington High School (EHS). The Board proposes to add two key positions at Ellington High School:

Theater Teacher: A full time theater position will ensure students are able to strengthen their skills in three primary areas of theater production:

- Technical (scenery, lighting, properties, costuming, and sound)
- Business (finances, publicity, and staffing)
- Performance (playwriting, singing, dancing, and acting)

Currently, EHS offers the extra-curricular after-school club, Opening Knights Players (OKP). OKP puts on five to six performances per school year. These performances range from full length and short plays to musicals. This year on May 12, 13, and 14, OKP will perform a full scale production of The Sound of Music. It is anticipated that approximately 15% of Ellington High School students will take advantage of already developed theater courses when staffing is available to run them. Theater courses will enhance the arts like never before at EHS.

Math Instructional Specialist: A full-time math instructional specialist will enhance the mathematic achievement of ALL students in the following manner:

- Enhanced Innovative Instructional Practices
- Increased Opportunities for Talent Enrichment
- Vertical, Flexible Support Grades 9 12

This teacher, along with the entire EHS Math Department, will ensure students from all instructional levels (Advanced

Placement, Honors, and College Prep.) receive support in four fundamental Mathematic areas:

- Calculus
 Geometry
- Statistics Algebra

In addition, the Ellington Board of Education has proposed a budget that continues to fund many other opportunities at Ellington High School. Students at EHS have access to over 25 extracurricular clubs and 44 athletic teams. The list of courses is comprehensive and includes Robotics, Forensics, Earth & Space Science, and Environmental Science.

Some of the newly approved courses to be highlighted for the 2017-2018 school year are as follows:

• Exploring Our World through Personalized Inquiry and

Research: The course will focus on students developing compelling and researchable questions, applying disciplinary tools and concepts, and corroborating and evaluating sources in order to develop greater insight into their topic.

• Advanced Placement (AP) Capstone Program: This

two-course sequence is designed to equip students with the independent research, collaboration and communication skills that are increasingly valued by colleges. AP Seminar will be offered in grades 10-12 and AP Research in grades 11-12. EHS is one of a handful of high schools in the state that have been chosen by College Board to run the AP Capstone program.

• UCONN Early College Experience (ECE) - Medical

Terminology and EMT Training: This course will be offered as a combination of school day instruction at EHS and evening classes and participation in clinical/ride along experiences. Students who successfully complete this course sequence will earn five (5) UCONN credits in addition to two high school credits. Ellington

• **Mural Painting:** Students will learn about the history of mural painting and the artistic process from conception of ideas to the finished product, a school mural. Creativity, playfulness and the artistic process are emphasized.

Ellington High School has also been named to the Advanced Placement (AP) District Honor Roll for the past three out of six years. The annual AP District Honor Roll recognizes districts for increasing access to Advanced Placement course work while maintaining or increasing the percentage of students earning scores of 3 or higher on AP Exams. Reaching these goals indicates that Ellington High School is successfully identifying motivated, academically prepared students who are likely to benefit from rigorous AP course work.

The Renaissance of The 2700 culminates at Ellington High School. For that reason, the Ellington Board of Education's 2017-2018 proposed budget is one of many major steps designed to ensure the continuous enhancement of the arts and academics at EHS. The Board encourages all citizens to actively participate in the Town of Ellington's budget process.

The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) has published regulations to establish presumptions for the service connection of eight diseases associated with exposure to contaminants in the water supply at Camp Lejeune, NC. The presumption of service connection applies to active duty, reserve and National Guard members who served at Camp Lejeune for a minimum of 30 days (cumulative) between August 1, 1953 and December 31, 1987, and have been diagnosed with any of the following conditions:

- Adult leukemia
- Aplastic anemia and other myelodysplastic syndromes
- Bladder cancer
- Kidney cancer

The spring season is upon us and the activity at the Nellie McKnight Museum is picking up. This year we are celebrating the 50th anniversary of the Ellington Historical Society. An exhibit of our past events and history will be on display at the Nellie McKnight Museum at 70 Main Street.

"We have a responsibility to take care of those who have served our Nation and have been exposed to harm as a result of that service," said Secretary of Veterans Affairs Robert A. McDonald. "Establishing a presumption for service at Camp Lejeune will make it easier for those veterans to receive the care and benefits they earned."

Environmental health experts in VA's Technical Workgroup conducted comprehensive reviews of scientific evidence, which included analysis and research done by the Department of Health and Human Service's Agency for Toxic Substances and Disease Registry (ATSDR), the Environmental Protection Agency, the International Agency for Research on Cancer, the National Toxicology Program, and the National Academies of Science.

Veterans with 30 or more cumulative days of active duty service at Camp Lejeune during the contamination period are already eligible for certain medical benefits, following passage of the Honoring America's Veterans and Caring for Camp Lejeune Families Act of 2012.

In the early 1980s, volatile organic compounds, trichloroethylene (TCE), a metal degreaser, and perchloroethylene (PCE), a dry cleaning agent, as well as benzene and vinyl chloride, were discovered in two on-base water supply systems at Camp Lejeune. The contaminated wells supplying the water systems were shut down in February 1985.

Emergency Management: Prepare for Hurricane & Thunderstorm Season

PREPARE FOR HURRICANE AND THUNDERSTORM SEASON

It comes each year at about this time. We start asking ourselves the following questions.

- Which is more serious: a hurricane watch or a hurricane warning?
- Which is more serious: a Category 1 hurricane or a Category 5 hurricane?

The following article will help you understand hurricane and weather facts. A hurricane is a low pressure system that generally forms in the tropics. It is a type of tropical cyclone. It is accompanied by thunderstorms and counterclockwise circulation of winds. All coastal areas on the Atlantic Ocean and Gulf of Mexico are subject to hurricanes or tropical storms. The Atlantic hurricane season starts in June and ends in November. Peak season is mid-August to late October. Hurricanes can cause catastrophic damage to coastlines and several hundred miles inland. Winds can exceed 155 miles per hour. Hurricanes can spawn tornadoes, microbursts, storm surges and heavy rainfall.

HURRICANES ARE RATED BY THE SAFFIR-SIMPSON HURRICANE SCALE:

Category 1:	Winds 74-95 mph, usually causing minimum
	damage
Category 2:	Winds 96-110 mph, usually causing moderate
	damage
Category 3:	Winds 111-130 mph, usually causing extensive
	damage
Category 4	Winds 131-155 mph, usually causing extreme
	damage
Category 5:	Winds greater than 155 mph, causing
	catastrophic damage

HURRICANE WATCH VS. HURRICANE WARNING

The National Weather Service issues a hurricane watch when there is a strong likelihood the hurricane will be in the area within 48 hours. All preparations for the hurricane should be conducted during this phase, such as putting together an emergency kit, securing food, medications, and water supplies, securing windows and doors, purchasing gasoline/propane for generators and vehicles, securing all outdoor equipment and material such as gas grilles, umbrellas, and lawn furniture, and making preparations for your pets, as well as having a radio with batteries ready.

YOUR IMPORTANT DECISION

During the watch phase, you must make an important decision. Are you going to stay in the strike area and face the hurricane or other weather incident, or are you going to evacuate or leave your home and move to a safer area? Factors to consider in your decision include the health of family members, mobility of family members, special medical needs, age of family members living in your household, etc. If you decide to leave the area, notify friends and family members that you are leaving the area. Advise them where you are going.

The National Weather Service issues a hurricane warning when the hurricane will strike the named areas within the next 24 hours. All preparations, and your decision to stay or evacuate, should have been made prior to the warning period. If you decided to stay, find a place inside your home on a lower floor that is away from windows and doors. Basements or interior bathrooms are fairly secure rooms. Be prepared to evacuate, if your home is severely damaged during the weather incident.

LIGHTNING

Lightning occurs with all thunderstorms. In the United States, lightning causes, on average, 93 deaths and 300 injuries per year. Annually, lightning causes several hundred million dollars in damage to property and forests. What is lightning? Lightning occurs when the action of rising and descending air within a thunderstorm separates positive and negative charges. Lightning results from the buildup and discharge of electrical energy between positive and negatively charged areas. The rapid heating and cooling of air near the lightning channel causes a shock wave that results in thunder.

Your chances of being struck by lightning are one in 600,000. The air near a lightning strike is heated to thousands of degrees. Recent statistics showed people killed by lightning were boating, swimming, golfing, riding a lawnmower, talking on a cell phone while outside, playing outside sports, loading a truck, mountain climbing and fishing. The common denominator? All deaths occurred while the individuals were outside. To protect you and your family from lightning injuries: if you hear thunder or see lightning, seek shelter at the nearest indoor facility.

Answers:

1. **False** - Lightning often strikes outside the area of heavy rain storm. Lightning may occur as far as 10 miles away from the center of a rain storm.

- 2. False Lightning victims carry no electrical change and should be attended to immediately.
- 3. False Heat lightning is actually lightning from a thunderstorm too far away for thunder to be heard. The storm could be moving in your direction and put you at risk.
- 4. False Rubber-soled shoes and rubber tires provide no protection from lightning. The steel frame of a hard-topped vehicle provides increased protection if you are not touching the metal. Although you may be injured if lightning strikes your car, you are safer inside a vehicle than outside.

Disaster Preparedness Planning for Your Pets

Who can forget the 2011 Halloween Noreaster grabbing us all completely by surprise? Widespread power outages and property damage caused many communities to remain without electricity for nearly two weeks, forcing residents - and their pets — to seek out public shelters. Many people were not prepared. Here is how to plan for emergencies in advance to ensure your pets' safety in any situation.

ANIMAL EVACUATION SUPPLY KIT In the event of an evacuation, always bring your pets with you-never leave them alone inside the home or tethered outdoors. If conditions are hazardous for

people, then likewise it is not safe for animals. During an emergency there may not be sufficient time to assemble everything your pet needs, so plan ahead by purchasing a sturdy closed-top plastic tote and store the following provisions to take with you:

- Food (at least a 3-day supply) packed in waterproof containers
- Manual can opener for moist food
- Bottled water (at least a 3-day supply)
- · Lightweight portable food and water bowls
- Prescribed daily medications, vitamins, nutritional supplements, flea and tick preventatives
- Medical records and vaccine continued on page 46

certificates— make copies to keep in a plastic Ziploc type bag

- Print out and laminate recent photos of you and your pet together to establish identity and ownership should you become separated from each other
- Contact information list of animal control agencies, veterinary hospitals, boarding facilities, and pet-friendly lodging in surrounding areas where you live or frequently travel with your pet. Also include this number for the National Animal Poison Control Center: 888-426-4435
- Extra collar or harness with identification tags, leash (non-retractable)
- Microchip identification tag— check online database for accuracy of contact information
- Favorite toys and treats to help reduce stress
- Sanitation supplies—disinfectant wipes, paper towels, wash cloths, pet waste disposal bags, absorbent puppy pads, cat litter/scoop/litter box, trash bags
- Towels and blankets for portable bedding
- Crate/pet carriers—sturdy plastic or metal only (cardboard carriers fall apart when wet). Carriers should be large enough for your pet to stand, turn and lie down comfortably. Label carriers with your name, phone number, and your pet's name.

ANIMAL FIRST AID KIT

While not a substitute for professional veterinary care, a basic first aid kit for animals is essential. Sign up for a first aid course, or read and learn first aid procedures in advance so you can help save the life of your own pet, or someone else's, during an emergency. Keep one kit at home and pack another in your car while traveling. Some items a basic first aid kit should contain:

- Nonstick gauze pads in several sizes— do not use human adhesive "Band-Aids" on pets
- Rolled gauze in several sizes
- White bandage tape 1" wide
- Flexible pet bandage wrap 3" wide
- Bandage scissors
- Wound cleansing solution
- Alcohol pads
- Cotton-tipped applicators
- Latex-free gloves
- Liquid dish detergent, towel and washcloth
- Tweezers
- Sterile saline solution bottle
- Hydrogen peroxide—new unopened bottle (only administer to pet by veterinary consult)
- Karo[®] syrup—new unopened bottle (use for diabetic pets and only by veterinary consult)
- Nail clippers and styptic powder
- Foil blanket
- Instant warm/cold compress— cover with fleece or cloth to prevent burns or skin irritation

- Digital rectal thermometer and lubricant
- Contact information list (same as in evacuation kit)
- First-aid guidebook

ANIMAL RESCUE KIT

Be ready for the unexpected when away from home. Prepare two animal rescue kits, one for home in case a neighbor needs to rescue your pet if you are not able to return home yourself, and keep another travel rescue kit in your car. Rescue kits should contain the following:

- Pillowcases for quick capture and/or temporary transport device
- Towels and blankets can be used for covering animals to calm or distract them, or for wrapping an injured or scared animal
- Leash and/or loop rope to act as a lasso for quick capture
- Heavy leather work gloves for hand protection, and a muzzle for your pet to prevent biting. When stressed or panicked, animals may even bite people they know and trust otherwise

- Portable transport carriers
- Special treats to coax animals into carrier or vehicle
- Contact information list (same as in evacuation kit)

Being prepared provides your pet the best chance of staying safe. Keep in mind your pet may require unexpected assistance even during everyday situations. Pets depend on you— always be ready to help.

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Ellington Farmers' Market Opens 2017 Season



The inaugural event of the 2017 Ellington Farmers' Market season took place on May 6th at Arbor Park on Main Street from 9:00 am-12:00 pm and featured this spring's

newest Barnyard Babies, where kids of all ages could enjoy local farms' newest spring additions. In an effort to make healthy, locally grown foods available to the low-income population, the market has recently acquired a 501c3 non-profit status and hopes to increase funding to their matching SNAP (formally called food stamps) program through tax deductible donations. Last year, the market matched over \$2,000 in SNAP benefits and aspires to increase that amount in 2017. Over 500 individuals and families receive SNAP benefits in Ellington alone. When including the five towns that border Ellington, that number increases to over 3,200! SNAP transactions can be made at the central market booth with the big green banner.

The market also sponsors a Power of Produce Club for kids 5-12 which will run June 17th through September 2nd. The club empowers kids to make healthy food choices through educational activities, samples of produce and the distribution of \$2 tokens for children to purchase fresh produce at the market. Over \$1,200 dollars in tokens where distributed last year.

The market features forty vendors bringing a wide variety of locally grown and produced food items. A host of guest vendors will add a wide variety to the weekly offerings of local produce, plants and flowers, dairy, beef, pork, lamb, seafood, poultry, cheese, honey, baked goods, specialty foods, alpaca products, handmade soaps, natural body and cleaning products, artisan wares and more.

Each Saturday, guest vendors and special events will focus on a particular theme for that day, such as "Happiness is a Warm Puppy" with a Rabies and Microchip Clinic, The Zucchini 500 Drag Race and "Youth Market Day" when local youngsters under 18 can sell their home-grown produce. Every market Saturday promises to be a lively community event providing education, entertainment and the celebration of Ellington's rich agricultural heritage, while promoting and supporting local farmers and entrepreneurs.


