

Assessor's Maps: Ellington's maps are available online at ellingtonct.mapgeo.io. Owner information is updated frequently on this site. There is also a link to the Vision website for Assessor's field card information.

Homeowner's Tax Relief Program: The Homeowner's Tax Relief Program allows a tax credit for qualifying individuals. To qualify, the homeowner (or spouse, if domiciled together) must have been 65 years of age by the end of 2017 and reside at the property. 2017 income limitations have not been set by the State of CT Office of Policy and Management to date, but is defined as adjusted gross income and tax exempt interest, plus any other income not included in the adjusted gross income. Totally disabled persons, regardless of age, are eligible provided they have a Social Security Award letter or SSA-1099 with Medicare premiums. The filing period for the Homeowner's program is February 1 through May 15, 2018.

Additional Veterans' Exemptions: An additional exemption may be available for those veterans who meet the income requirements. Applications for this program must be filed between February 1 and October 1, 2018. Both of these programs require applications to be filed every two years. If you are currently on one or both of these programs and it is your year to refile, applications will be mailed to you February 1. Forms will be available after February 1 in the Assessor's Office. Connecticut Emergency Preparedness Mobile Application

CT PREPARES

Download it today!

The Connecticut Emergency Preparedness Mobile Application will allow Connecticut residents to access emergency information and alerts on the go in the event of an emergency. Connecticut residents are able to create interactive emergency kits, customize family communication plans, and view preparation guides on what to do in an emergency - all from their mobile device.

The Emergency Preparedness Mobile Application integrates with a phone's text messaging, email, and social networking, allowing residents to inform family members when they are safe. Real-time notifications can be sent directly to the device providing up-to-the-minute information for residents. Links to emergency needs such as shelters, food, and assistance will be at hand.

The application will allow users to:

- · Create interactive checklist
- Prepare a family plan
- · Notify emergency personnel
- View preparation guides for different emergencies
- Sign up for alerts
- · Contact family members
- View emergency news and events
- Locate emergency services
- · View weather

About the Alerts: Get emergency alerts and optional community alerts by signing up for the Town of Ellington's Emergency and Community Alerts program. This provides a means for Town officials to notify you by phone, email, SMS TXT, and/or TTY/TDD, as elected by you. You create and control your enrollment profile, and your information is protected by a username and a password that you create. Using your username and your password, you may change or even delete your profile at any time. Town officials will be able to notify you directly of emergencies, with

requirements or recommendations for residents and property owners; this can be used for Town-wide or localized emergencies. If you so select, this will also provide a way for various Town Department officials to notify you of important new information such as Town program delays or cancellations, unanticipated closures or re-locations, limited opportunities, etc.

Powered by Everbridge, this system broadcasts messages at exceptionally high speed (thousands of calls per minute), going through your contact paths until it gets feedback that someone at your end has acknowledged receipt of the message. Ellington relies on you to supply the necessary information. If you don't enroll, you will not receive the alerts.

How to Sign-Up: Visit the Town Website at Ellington-ct.gov and click on the link "Ellington Emergency Notification (via Everbridge)." Click on "Sign Up" and follow the instructions provided.

Assistance: If you need help to sign-up or to change your information, you can contact Hall Memorial Library at 93 Main Street, or by phone at 860-870-3160 for dates/times of group sessions (up to 10 per session). The Library and the Ellington Senior Center located at 40 Maple Street will also provide one-on-one support, on request. Please call the Senior Center at 860-870-3133. Registration is required for either group or one-on-one sessions. Call or visit to register.

As winter closes in, there are steps that can be taken to assist

emergency services workers to provide efficient service to our residents.

- First and most importantly, make sure your house number is posted in a manner that is clearly visible from the street and properly identifies the residence or access driveway.
- Completely clear all of your driveway and sidewalk areas from snow and ice accumulations and apply sand for traction if

necessary. Keep a small container of sand near the entrance steps in case responders need to provide additional traction for a stretcher or equipment.

- Have your heating sources serviced so they are ready to provide a season of safe and efficient service.
- Make sure your Smoke and Carbon Monoxide Detectors have working batteries and are tested.
- Remove snow and ice from around all neighborhood fire hydrants.

In an emergency, response time is critical! Being able to quickly find a location, having a clear access to the residence and being able to have fire hydrants available for immediate use saves time for the responders. Stay safe all season long!

WINTER REMINDERS!

Secure Your Mailbox - Residents are asked to make sure their mailboxes are secured and sturdy before the winter snow begins. Mailboxes damaged by snow load will not be repaired by the Town.

Winter Sand - Sand will be available to residents throughout the winter months. The pile is located at the Town Garage, 21 Main Street behind the firehouse. This is for residents only; no contractors.

Christmas Tree Pick Up - Christmas trees will be picked up during the first two weeks of January. Please leave them at the curb, butt end out and free of ornamentation and tree stands. If trees are not cleaned, they will not be picked up. If residents prefer, trees may be dropped off at any time by the recycling shed at the Town Garage on 21 Main Street.

Hoffman Road Brush Drop Off -

The brush drop off center will be open Saturdays 9:00 am-4:00 pm and Tuesday and Thursday 1:00 pm-4:00 pm until December 2, 2017. It will be closed Thanksgiving Day and that weekend. Items accepted are leaves, brush, firewood and tree trunks. You may call Harvest New England at 860-871-7442 for items not accepted at this drop off center. Grass clippings are not accepted.

Recycle Shed and Household Hazardous

Waste - Currently the MIDNEROC collection center in Willington is closed for the winter, but will open again in Mid-April 2018. The Town's recycling shed at 21 Main Street continues to be open during working hours Monday-Friday 7:00 am - 3:30 pm. There will be two Saturdays (January 6 and January 13, 2018) that the shed will be open from 9:00 am - 12:00 noon. The following items are accepted at the Public Works shed: batteries, waste oil, antifreeze, motor oil, oil

filters, propane tanks, fluorescent light bulbs, computer components, and electronics. Household Hazardous waste and paint are NOT accepted at this location.

Textile Recycling - The Town has a box for textile recycling located at the Town Garage. Usable as well as non-usable clothing items are accepted. Also accepted are shoes, belts, handbags, stuffed animals; all must be bagged and put into the container.

Snow Removal from Fire Hydrants -

Residents are asked to clear any snow from fire hydrants on your property or nearby. Open a path to the hydrant and clear an area all around the hydrant. All hydrants should have a reflective pole marker. If the hydrant near you does not, please call the Ellington Volunteer Fire Department at 860-870-3190 and leave a message with the specific location of the fire hydrant.

Snow Removal from Sidewalks -

Homeowners are required to remove any snow or ice from sidewalks in front of their property within 24 hours following the cessation of the fall of snow or ice, per Town Ordinance. Failure to do so is subject to a fine.

Parking Ban - Residents are reminded that the Ordinance Concerning Parking on Public Highways within the Town prohibits street parking during and after any period of snowfall or icy condition, while said highways are hazardous to traffic. This will allow the Department of Public Works to be able to safely and efficiently remove the hazards of snow and ice from the roads. Violation of this ordinance will result in the removal of the vehicle at the owner's expense and may result in a fine.

Storm Water Reminder - You may think that it's ok for little things here and there to be put down the storm drain. It's easy to forget that your one little thing and my one little thing eventually add up to create a monster problem. Our storm drains don't filter what we put into them. They run directly into our lakes and streams.



To help keep them clean, properly dispose of your motor oil, pick up after your pet, take your car to a car wash and follow the directions when you spray and fertilize your yard.

WORKING IN THE PUBLIC RIGHT-OF-WAY

Do you know what your responsibilities are when you are working in the Public Right-of-Way, (R.O.W)? Do you know that you are required to have a permit and carry insurance and provide a bond? These are some questions you should have answered prior to doing any work along the roadway.

Permits are required for any excavation, driveway, utility, sewer connection. These also require the contractor to post a bond and carry the proper liability insurance.

Planting trees or any other landscaping within the public R.O.W is not allowed and may cause sight line problems and interfere with snow removal and electrical wires.

The cost of a permit to work in the R.O.W. is \$35.00. The permit is required so that the proposed work can be inspected to insure it has or will not interfere with drainage and public use of the right-of-way. All permits can be obtain in the Ellington Land Use Office located next to the Town Hall and on the Town's website.

Ellington DPW Staff Place in the Annual "Snow Plow Roadeo"



Each year for the past 34 years, the Connecticut Association of Street and Highway Officials, Inc. (CASHO) holds an annual "Snow Plow Roadeo." Many Town and State Highway garages enter to test their safe snow operations. Drivers have the options of the following classifications: pick-up, small dump and large dump trucks. This year Pat Roy and Denis Giroux placed third in the large dump and pickup entities. Dan Whitman also participated in the small dump class. Over 30 towns sent their operators to the "roadeo" to test their skills and overall safety knowledge. Each truck entered is inspected to ensure all trucks are road-worthy along with each operator taking a written test for safe driving and snow operations of the truck. Animal Control's Cold Weather Advice for Dog Owners

Winter is coming and along with it comes the cold, snow and ice. Your dog might like to frolic in the snow but there are risks that the freezing temps can bring. Well before the real winter begins, antifreeze is being used to prepare vehicles for the cold that lays ahead. Antifreeze (ethylene glycol) has a sweet taste and it only takes a small amount to damage the kidneys if your pet licks up a spill. Be extra careful and keep antifreeze out of the reach of pets and children.

Most dogs do love to play in the snow but depending on the breed, age and type of coat your dog has should determine how long the winter romp lasts. Very old dogs, young pups, and dogs with chronic illness do not do well when left outside for too long. Also, dogs with shorthair will be shivering long before their thick coated friends.

Right after a fresh snow is the prime time for dogs to be out playing in the snow but do not allow them to run free as a fresh

layer of snow on the ground can cause a dog to get disoriented if they run too far and they may become lost. Snow accumulations can make it impossible for your dog to know if he is in his front yard or if he is standing in the road. If you don't have a fenced yard keep your dog on a leash when you take him outside. There is an increased risk of dogs being hit by cars following a snowstorm. Dog owners may think it is safe to let their dogs run loose because of less traffic but they don't realize that the stopping time required for drivers has greatly increased and the driver may not

be able to stop in time to miss hitting a dog that is running in the road while the dog owner is busy shoveling snow.

Every year there are tragic stories of dogs falling through ice assumed to be frozen on a lake or pond. Even worse are the cases where a dog owner succumbs while trying to save their beloved pet. Many years ago I was called out by the CT State Police for a dog that had fallen through ice and was struggling to keep his head above the cold water. This was my first attempt to do a water rescue and it may not have gone well without the help of the Crystal Lake Fire Department bringing out a boat and several very helpful young men who got me out to the frozen dog by chopping the ice to get near enough to the dog and then helped me lift his heavy, water soaked body into the boat. This was all before the cell phone era or there would have been many bystander videos of this rescue since a large crowd had gathered around the pond. The rescue went well and the dog's life was saved. This was all because someone heard the dog's cries and alerted the State Police.

The Ethics Commission was established to promote and affirm the ethical behavior of the Town's boards, commissions, employees, and officials, both elected and appointed. The Commission operates under a Code of Ethics that was approved by the Board of Selectmen in January 2014. The Commission is available to receive inquiries and requests for advisory opinions submitted from town officials, employees, consultants or residents regarding possible code violations. The procedure for submitting a complaint is outlined in the Code of Ethics which can be found on the Town website on the Ethics Commission page. The "Ethics Complaint Form" is also available on the website or may be obtained through the Town Clerk's Office. The Commission is also charged with disseminating informational and educational materials to enhance public awareness of the Code of Ethics.

The Commission consists of five members who serve staggered terms of four years. Vacancies are filled by the Board of Selectmen in accordance with the Ellington Town Charter. The Chairman and Vice Chairman are elected annually. Currently the Commission meets quarterly over the course of the year and is served by five residents of the Town.



A NOTE FROM THE RECREATION DIRECTOR, BOB TEDFORD

Please peruse this latest edition of Ellington Events for winter and early spring registration information. There are a variety of programs to select from, ranging from pre-school to adult programs. IMPORTANT! This edition contains early notice for pre-season registration information for: spring baseball, softball, lacrosse and soccer. Registration information will be posted on the respective websites, but the information contained in this magazine edition can easily be placed on the 'front of the refrigerator'!

Batz property - Once again, Boy Scout Troop 96 has collaborated with the Town of Ellington for the recent completion of two projects at the Batz Passive Recreation site located at 97 Shenipsit Street.

Project #1: The Community Garden had no water onsite. The water collection pavilion will provide rainwater for the garden plots and a shady place adjacent to the NEW Youth Garden. Project # 2: The addition of the Youth Garden provides numerous opportunities for youth to be outside exploring nature and learning scientific concepts while planting and tending to the garden.

3 vs. 3 Soccer event - A 3 vs. 3 soccer jamboree-fundraiser was held on October 9. Thirty-six teams participated and there were twenty-six sponsors. All proceeds from the tournament benefitted the Jacob Roger Poulin fund towards a future project, proposed to be located at a Town property on Middle Road. The current layout at the property depicts possibilities for a deck-hockey rink, a special playground, a baseball field and a multi-purpose field.

As the winter months get closer, the program postponement policy is as follows:

- 1. If the public schools are closed, including half-day closures, due to inclement weather, ALL programs, are postponed as well.
- 2. Late day: If inclement weather becomes apparent after 3:00 pm on a weekday, coaches, program supervisors and

participants will be notified via email and/or an announcement on the Town's website and the department's Facebook page.

3. Weekend guidelines: All postponements will be placed on Channels 3, 30 and 8, plus the Town website and department's Facebook page. Historically, weekend (Saturday and Sunday programs) decisions are made by 6:30 am for morning (am) events and no later than 10:00 am for afternoon (pm) events.



Suicide in the Military and with Veterans

Suicide in the military and with the veteran group is a serious problem. The Census Bureau estimates there are 21.5 million veterans in the United States. There are 19.3 million male veterans and 2.2 million female veterans.

President Obama signed the Clay Hunt Suicide Prevention for American Veterans Act, named for a Marine Corps combat veteran who struggled with post-traumatic stress disorder after serving in Iraq and Afghanistan. He later committed suicide at age 28. The bill calls for evaluation and expansion of existing Veterans Affairs mental health and suicide prevention programs.

Doctors and researchers are attempting to identify which group of veterans are most at risk and a potential suicide threat. Once they identify the group, they can begin treatment. Some of the variables they are looking at are; veterans who saw heavy combat action and veterans who left the military after a three- or four-year tour and saw no combat action, veterans who retired after twenty years or more of service, veterans who received military discipline, and veterans who were influenced by outside factors.

WHAT CAN WE DO TO HELP.....?

In Connecticut, if you are a veteran, or a loved one or friend is a veteran, or you know a veteran and they are exhibiting; confusion, withdrawal from friends / social interaction, inability to work, go to school, nervousness, jumpy, self-medicating with alcoholdrugs, abuse of prescription drugs, sleep problems, expressing thoughts about dying or life would be better without them.

The Ellington Youth Services Department, which falls under the Human Services umbrella, provides dynamic programs and community activities that develop and

strengthen the essential life skills needed to face life's many challenges. Among the offerings are in-school, after-school, and evening programs designed as fun interactive learning experiences including playgroups, art programs, parenting, social and emotional learning, summer camps/activities and

leadership programs. In addition, there is a licensed therapist on staff that offers confidential counseling to Ellington youth and families in a trusting environment.

Youth Services oversees the Counsel for Developing Positive Youth Culture (DPYC) and Decide to Be Kind Campaign:

DPYC is an ad-hoc committee whose mission is to create and sustain a positive youth culture through collaboration among the community, schools, and town agencies. Rise Above is a community-based student leadership group offering high school students the opportunity to learn and apply leadership by hosting

New ideas for programs and events come out of staff brainstorming sessions and surveys from the community; the department listens to their feedback on programs. DONATIONS TO THE LIBRARY

Each year the Library receives hundreds of donations of books, DVDs, videos, puzzles and other items. Thank you, thank you, and thank you for all these great items! We add to the library collection that which is appropriate and handle the remainder in a variety of ways. Videocassettes are placed on a cart by the front door for free taking by whoever wants them. Magazines are also free for the taking from the basket nearby. All the rest is given to the Friends of the Library to be offered for sale either in the Book Cellar or at the semi-annual Bag-of-Books sales. This works out great of us all - you declutter your home and donate your items to be reused and recycled, the library benefits from the use of the items, or ultimately from the sale of them, and someone goes home with a new treasure! That being said, please keep in mind that only items with life left to them are useful. Things that are dirty, moldy or smelly should be discarded in your recycle bin at home. Textbooks, except for those only a few years old are sadly also recycle items. Magazines more than 5 years old (unless of a specific subject like woodworking), popular books more than 20 years old and old encyclopedia sets are likely not of interest either. And when you bring your donations, please don't bring them when the Library is closed and please don't leave them outside! If you need help carrying them in, please call ahead or come in and ask. Materials left outside are often damaged by weather and then are only trash to everyone. Thanks again for all your great donations!

VISITORS IN SEARCH OF THEIR PAST

The Library often hosts visitors in search of genealogy information or with a link to Ellington. This past September we were thrilled to have Frances Morgan White and her sons visit us from Georgia. Frances is the 5th-generation granddaughter of Reverend John McKinstry, the first minister of

Ellington Congregational Church. Reverend McKinstry's oldest son John moved to Holyoke, MA and spawned the family line from which Frances descends. The Library is built on land that was originally (starting in the early 1700s) the McKinstry farm and it is their family cemetery that is the lovely view from the library windows.

Flu and You!

Flu season is rapidly descending upon us and we need to spread the word and not the germ.

WHAT IS FLU?

Flu or influenza virus is a viral infection which causes infection of upper respiratory tract causing fever, chills, body aches, sore throat, runny nose, headache, fatigue and cough.

HOW DOES IT SPREAD?

The virus spreads via droplet in the air (coughing, sneezing, etc.), by direct contact (touch) with infected or carrier person and by touching a surface contaminated with the virus (desks, public places, etc.).

WHO IS AT SPECIAL RISK?

The population at special risk of developing a more severe

infection are pregnant women, children under the age of six, people older than 65 years of age, immunocompromised adults, people with history of asthma/bronchitis and people with diabetics.

WHAT CAN WE DO TO PREVENT THE SPREAD?

Proper hand hygiene is the best preventive measure we can take against the spread of this virus. Remember to wash your hand properly anytime you come in contact with a sick person or go out in a public place, cover your face when you sneeze or cough. Avoid contact with people suffering from flu especially if you belong to the group at special risk of the disease. As in all diseases, keep your immunity and hydration up to decrease your chances of getting the disease.

WHAT ARE THE COMPLICATIONS OF FLU?

Complications of flu include dehydration, electrolyte imbalance, secondary bacterial infection (including pneumonia /sinusitis, etc.) and deterioration of underlying chronic conditions, such as asthma /heart failure, etc.

WHAT ARE THE TREATMENT OPTIONS AVAILABLE?

Flu vaccine is highly recommended by the Centers for Disease Control (CDC). The treatment option is basically an antiviral medication and supportive treatment as well as diagnosing and treating the complications occurring from the flu. Antibiotics are not used to treat flu. However a secondary bacterial infection may require antibiotic.

This season commit yourself to proper hand hygiene, flu vaccination, building up immunity and staying well hydrated. Stay healthy and blessed.

A Rare Search

The last time the Ellington Public Schools (EPS) conducted a high school principal search was during the spring of 2005. Neil Rinaldi began his tenure as principal of Ellington High School (EHS) with the 2005-2006 school year. Thirteen years later, Principal Rinaldi has announced the 2017-2018 school year will be his last.

During Principal Rinaldi's tenure, EHS has worked diligently to increase student learning options for all students, adding a total of 67 new courses in the past 10 years. New courses have been added in every high school department, with new offerings including Heroes and Monsters, Robotics, Sculpture and 3D Design, Steel Drum Band, Probability and Statistics, and a new UCONN ECE EMT and Medical Terminology course. There was also a significant expansion of the fine and performing arts programs and extracurricular offerings.

EHS now offers a wide range of courses and activities to allow students to pursue their passions, develop new interests, and develop a plan of study that helps them meet their own academic goals. Further, in order to offer more options that will challenge high achieving students, 15 new Advanced Placement (AP) or UConn Early College Experience courses have been added in the past seven years. In fact, EHS has been recognized three times with placement on the National AP Honor Roll by the College Board for expanding opportunity and improving performance of Advanced Placement (AP) students.

Having begun his career as an elementary music teacher, Mr. Rinaldi now has over 40 years of educational service in Windsor Locks, South Windsor, and Ellington. Ellington High School is a better place because of Neil Rinaldi.

The search for the next Ellington High School principal commenced in September with a projected hire date of December 2017. We anticipate that the next principal would start his/her official duties this coming July 2018.

THERE WILL BE THREE PRIMARY PHASES FOR THE SEARCH PROCESS:

- 1 Input from Stakeholders
- 2 Search Committee Interviews
- 3 Stakeholder Dialogue with Finalist(s)

The process is designed to maximize the interaction between candidates and students, parents, staff, and Board of Education members.

Phase One was completed during September. There were multiple opportunities for stakeholders to interact with the Superintendent, providing input as to the characteristics they desire of the next principal. The following were the results:

- enhance the partnership with Ellington Middle School to ensure a seamless and welcoming transition from grade 8 to 9 and continue a student's personalized and academically rigorous 7 - 12 journey;
- lead instructional initiatives (i.e., Mastery Based Learning) to ensure cohesiveness, ownership, and understanding amongst parents, students, and staff;
- leverage the arts, athletics, STEM, and other student pursuits to ensure a comprehensive learning experience;
- employ strategies such as mindfulness, physical fitness, and healthy food practices to enhance the wellbeing of staff and students;
- model accountability, growth mindset, and commitment to continual improvement for students and staff;
- and, be mission driven to ensure Ellington High School continues to be a high caliber, model learning institution for

all students in our local, regional, and national communities.



THE ELLINGTON VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT MEMBERS WOULD LIKE YOU TO REMEMBER THESE WOODSTOVE & FIREPLACE SAFETY TIPS:

- Have your chimney or wood stove inspected and cleaned annually by a certified chimney specialist.
- Clear the area around the hearth of debris, decorations and flammable materials.
- Always use a metal mesh screen with fireplaces. Leave glass doors open while burning a fire.
- Install stovepipe thermometers to help monitor flue temperatures.
- Keep air inlets on wood stoves open, and never restrict air supply to fireplaces, otherwise you may cause creosote buildup that could lead to a chimney fire.
- Use fire-resistant materials on walls around wood stoves.
 Never use flammable liquids to start a fire.
- Use only seasoned hardwood. Soft, moist wood accelerates creosote buildup.
- Soak hot ashes in water and place them in a metal container outside your home.

Developed and offered in conjunction with the Ellington Volunteer Ambulance Corps, Inc. and Ellington High School, the University of Connecticut (UCONN) awards four (4) college credits to the students that are successful in this, first in our state, Early College Experience program. Collaboration between Mrs. Fran Zampini (Ellington High School), Dr. Erin McGurk (Town of Ellington Board of Education)

and Mr. Bruce Hoffman (Ellington Volunteer Ambulance Corps, Inc.) have made this coursework possible and the past four weeks have been nothing shy of amazing. The students are mature, professional, intelligent, and dedicated to becoming EMTs by August 2018!

These seven young adults are embarking on a rigorous journey to make this happen. In addition to their regular high school academics, the students are also taking a UCONN / college level Medical

Terminology course, the EMT course on Wednesday nights, as well fulfilling several extra-curricular activities, including community service.
