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

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



(current member of the Sanitary Waste Commission and the Water Pollution Control Authority) and Kelly Sterner, Finance Director. A presentation of the Committee's recommendation to the Town is expected to occur in the Spring, 2014. The exact dates will be communicated when decided.

I am excited to tell you that the Town saw tremendous achievement on its Essex Civic Campus Enhancement this year. Come by and see the renovated parking lot, handicapped parking, sidewalks, cross walks, and park playscape. The Town is on schedule to complete the remaining work by Spring, 2014: reinstalling tennis courts, project lighting, and landscaping.

The Town was awarded a grant by the State of Connecticut in September to enhance Ivoryton Village's Main Street: the Main Street Investment Fund (MSIF) grant. MSIF will fund work to enhance a shared "Village Center" around Main, Ivory and Summit Streets. MSIF will focus primarily on funding infrastructure work such as: intersection improvements (Summit Street and Main Street) and the installation and renovation of cross walks. The Town will continue to assess other improvements that may be identified to help in the continued renewal of Ivoryton as a robust economic center.

The annual work of preparing the Town's 2014/2015 budget has already begun. The Town's goal is to continue to meet the needs and expectations of our residents while seeing as little increase in spending as possible. Town schools, boards, commissions, and departments will soon begin compiling and submitting their requests. The schedule of budget meetings has been posted on the Town website. The budget meetings are public meetings and as members of the Town you are encouraged to attend. The Board of Finance has overall responsibility for the budget process and will submit a final budget to a Town meeting, currently scheduled for May 12, 2014, for the approval of Town residents.

On behalf of all of us here working to serve you at the Town Hall, our sincere wishes that the New Year brings you much health and happiness.

### Assessor's Office

As you may be aware, the town of Essex is completing its statutorily required revaluation for 2013. The last one was completed for 2008. For 2013, we were able to do physical interior reviews of about 50% of properties.

The purpose of a revaluation is not only to set property values but to recognize that values of different types of properties or different neighborhoods within towns fluctuate differently and at different rates. A primary function of the Assessor is to establish a reasonable market value for the properties within our jurisdiction. Unfortunately, the financial status of individual owners cannot be taken into consideration when establishing market values. Also, the Assessor's Office does not set the amount of taxes that an individual will pay.

In this recovering real estate market some neighborhoods within the town saw their values increase or remain the same, however, overall the town will see a decrease in the total Grand List for 2013. The decrease to the total real estate grand list was not unexpected considering the status of the general real estate market in Connecticut. Since the informal hearing process is not yet complete, we do not have a firm percentage of decrease to report.

Typically declining values result in a lower grand list and a higher mill rate to offset that decline. Therefore, if your assessment is lower it does not mean that your property taxes will decrease or remain the same. Property owners should **not** take their new assessments and apply the current mill rate to figure

out their new taxes because that calculation would produce an incorrect amount. The town will need to increase the mill rate in order to raise the needed revenue to fund the budget. The town budget will be released and voted on sometime in May, 2014, and the Board of Finance will then set the mill rate.

Taxes equal the assessment times the mill rate. As an example, if an assessment was \$100,000 and the mill rate 50, the tax amount would be the same as an assessment of \$1,000,000 and a mill rate of 5.

The majority of revenue Connecticut towns receive comes from the real estate grand list. This usually makes up somewhere between 75% and 90% of the total Grand List.

It is very important that each homeowner review the data for their particular property, checking for accuracy of information, i.e. room count, number of baths, all finished living area is accounted for, etc. The information is available for review at gis.vgsi.com/EssexCT.

If you would like to appeal your new assessment, please file an application for a hearing with the Board of Assessment Appeals prior to February 20, 2014. Forms are available on the Board of Assessment Appeals web page www.essexct.gov/board-of-assessment-appeals. This will be the last opportunity to appeal before the tax bills get mailed in July, 2014.

We greatly appreciate the continued cooperation of the citizens of Essex during this process.





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### Essex Tree Committee

The Essex Tree Committee reported at the end of 2013 that it had planted 15 new trees in Essex making a total of 243 trees planted since 1994. Two of these trees planted on Arbor Day include a White Oak on Teal Lane sponsored by the Rotary Club and a Valley Forge Elm on Main Street sponsored by the Essex Garden Club. Other trees planted this fall were 3 Red Sunset Maple – one planted on the corner of Kings Lane and Maple Ave and two at the entrance of Clark Pond in Ivoryton. Two Eastern Red Bud trees were planted on Mack Lane extension. Two English Oak and three Liquid Amber were planted in front of the Piano Factory in Ivoryton. Two English Oak were planted on Dennison Road, at #7 and #46. Another English Oak was planted at the corner of Melody and Walnut in Ivoryton.

These plantings could not have been done without the help of Ken Bombaci who assisted in the purchase of the trees from Northeast Nurseries in Cutchogue, NY and Fred Weber & Associates.

The Essex Tree Committee was established in 1990 to inventory, preserve and replace our priceless resource of street trees. Funding for the plantings comes from the town, grants (such as the America the Beautiful or ATB) and private donations. For example, in the case of those trees planted this fall, the English Oak at #7 Dennison was sponsored by the Essex Community Fund and the two Red Sunset Maple at the entrance to Clark Pond were sponsored by the Essex Garden Club.

The Essex Tree Ordinance which governs the tree warden and his committee, promotes and protects the public health, safety and welfare by providing regulations for planting, maintenance and removal of trees and shrubs within the town of Essex. It applies to all trees and shrubs planted on public areas and to all trees on private areas which may endanger the life, safety or health of persons or property.

It should be noted that the ordinance includes protective orders against damaging trees and shrubs in public areas (including cutting limbs) without authorization and against fastening materials such as signs, advertisements etc. to trees, shrubs or poles. Violations carry fines up to \$250. Any individual or corporation wishing to cut or remove a tree or shrub in part or completely may apply in writing to the tree warden.

The warden, therefore, is responsible for the care and control of all trees and shrubs in whole or in part (including limbs and roots) within the limits of any public road or grounds of the town of Essex except those along State highways. Public parks or grounds which are under the jurisdiction of the park commissioner are not included.

To accomplish the task of maintaining Essex's healthy trees, Augie Pampel and his committee survey areas which need attention and develop annual plans for planting. These plans are coordinated with the Planning and Zoning Commissions as well as other interested boards, such as the Essex Land Trust, the Rotary Club, the Essex Garden Club and others. Individuals can and have approached the Tree Committee with ideas for tree planting and can actively participate in the planting of trees.

Trees have also been planted as memorials or simply as donations to the town. Those who give a tree to the town of Essex are recognized on the Tree Committee's list of donors posted in the Town Hall: "Trees Given to the Town of Essex".

The success of the Tree Committee in maintaining the beauty of our streets and public areas continues to depend on the support and interest of the Essex community, its organizations and individual residents. Additionally, the expertise of our local arborists is essential to the committee's work. Given this ongoing community collaboration, we can look forward in 2014 to new trees being planted to further enhance the lush green beauty of our streets.

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### Saving the Preserve – What it all means

Just off Ingham Hill Road in Essex lies a hidden gem known as The Preserve. This 1,000 acre coastal forest is located mostly in Old Saybrook, but 70 acres of this unique forest are part of the town of Essex. Forested properties of this size are rare in coastal Connecticut and present an opportunity for developers and conservationists alike. For many years the property was the subject of development applications and lawsuits over its potential future as a housing development with 221 homes and an 18-hole golf course. More recent proposals involved carving the land into development "pods" around the perimeter of the property. All proposals to develop the land would have a significant impact on the towns in which the land is located.

The downturn in the real estate market presented an opportunity for conservationists to protect the property forever. In June of 2013, The Trust for Public Land reached an agreement with River Sound Development, LLC, to purchase the property. In order to complete the purchase, the Trust and its partners need to raise \$10 – 12 million by June 2014.

If the fundraising campaign is successful the land will be permanently protected from future development and open to the public to enjoy for passive recreational activities such as hiking and wildlife viewing. The Essex Land Trust will likely own the 70 acres in Essex, while the Town of Old Saybrook will most likely own the 930 acres in Old Saybrook and Westbrook.

The forest includes 38 vernal pools, 114 acres of wetlands and more than 3,100 linear feet of watercourses. The land contains the headwaters of three watersheds and protects public and private drinking water supplies. Migratory birds use the area as a stop-over, and the forest's many vernal pools support amphibian species such as the northern dusky salamander, spotted turtles, and box turtles. Bobcats and fisher cats have also been spotted on the property, along with rare plant species such as the eastern prickly pear.

A broad coalition has formed to take on the huge task of raising funds to acquire The Preserve. The Essex Land Trust has joined The Trust for Public Land, The Old Saybrook Land Trust, The Town of Old Saybrook, the Town of Essex, the CT Department of Energy and Environmental Protection, the

Connecticut Fund for the Environment / Save the Sound, the Nature Conservancy, Connecticut Audubon, and many others, to raise both public and private funds for the purchase.

The Essex Land Trust will be involved in providing information to the public and will assist in collecting private donations to achieve permanent preservation and stewardship of the land. Efforts will also include tours of the property for interested parties, potential donors and residents who will be voting on funding referenda. One such public walk in November brought out 200 people interested in seeing the property.

State Representative from the 36th District, Phil Miller, who also served as Essex First Selectman, continues his opposition to the development of the Preserve, and often refers to the land as a "wet rocky sponge," which helps to drain surface waters on the property to important watersheds: the Oyster River, Mud River and Trout Brook and then on to Long Island Sound.

The area's unique geology also serves to absorb and release more slowly large excess water from storms such as Super Storm Sandy, preventing flooding in lower-lying areas.

The Preserve borders 500 acres of permanently protected land including Great Cedars East and West and Clark Community Park.

The months ahead are critical to the future of land protection in Essex. An active and engaged community will help to make the permanent preservation and stewardship of this important property a reality. 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### A Brief History of Nott Island

It may not look like much today, but Nott Island, across from Essex harbor, was a long-time hub of local economic activity that made a good living for the families that owned it over the years. It also served as a place for recreation and spiritual renewal and the reminiscences of those who lived or played there are full of descriptions of nature's beauty. There were sandy beaches for swimming, abundant bird life from ducks and rail to songbirds and migrating species, and one could fish off the shore or catch "crabs by the bushel."

The island apparently got its name in the late 19th century when a Mr. Nott, a well-known farmer who lived on the Westbrook Road, owned it. (Note that it has also been referred to as Nott's, Knott and Knott's Island over the years.) Nott appears to be the first to fully develop the island as a moneymaking proposition. Fishing piers were built and he rented out the rights for as much as \$20,000 – a sign of how lucrative the fishing industry could be on the lower Connecticut River in the late 1800s.

He also used the island as a base for growing and harvesting hay. The conditions were already close to ideal, but Nott designed and built a series of ditches and dikes that controlled the river's tidal flow, irrigating extensive hay fields. The moist soil was ideal and haying became a staple of island industry. Nott built what was touted as "the largest barn in the valley" to store the hay and added a cement dock on the island's north end for shipping it to the mainland by barge.

Around the turn of the 20th century, a family from Chester, the Harwoods, bought the island and raised prized Devon cattle there for a brief number of years. By 1910, the island had passed into the hands of the Comstock family of Essex, who built on Nott's successes. The Comstocks not only pastured sheep on the island but also developed the haying even more. A short rail line was built from the barn to the pier for easier handling. There, the hay was loaded onto a barge in warm weather months or skidded across the frozen river in winter. The primary customer for Comstock's hay? The Ringling Brothers Barnum & Bailey Circus!

Floods were a constant problem and one in 1936 did considerable damage to the island and its buildings. In the 1940s, the MacWhinney family acquired the island, and it saw its last "golden age" of habitation and productivity. MacWhinney had a "mainland" farm on Stone Pit Hill (today's Grandview Terrace neighborhood in Essex) and pastured his 20 head of cattle on the island in the summer, bringing them over by barge. Family members often stayed on the island in the spring and summer, living in a comfortable 10-room house. They grew corn, tomatoes, squash and melons. They roamed the island, went swimming and fishing, built bonfires in the evenings and watched the sunsets. It was "an idyllic life" and family members left in the fall only reluctantly.

The MacWhinneys sold out in the late 1950s and the island fell into disrepair. The house burned down after the MacWhinneys sold it in the 1950s and by the late 1960s, Nott Island became a Wildlife Area owned by the State of Connecticut. It is part of the Town of Lyme.

### Gruyere, A Versatile Cheese!

Gruyere is one of my favorite cheeses and it ranks on my top 10 list. The reason is simple: few cheeses come close to the versatility of Gruyere. It gives fondue its body, onion soup its elegance, and Quiche Lorraine its flavor. In fact it can handle any task when it comes to cooking. It has great melting capabilities, it doesn't get stringy, nor does it solidify. Heat enhances its flavor and its keeping quality is longer than most other cheeses.

Gruyere dates back to the twelfth century and is named after the town of Gruyere, Switzerland that boasts a valley and castle of the same name. The cheese is manufactured with the finest raw milk from cows that graze only on fresh, lush, green pasturage. Milk from silage fed cows will never make its way into Gruyere production.

Gruyere is a natural cheese produced in 60-80 pound wheels. It has almost no eye formation (holes) and, most often, 'blind' (no holes) forms are the rule. The cheese is approximately thirty inches in diameter. Gruyere is more aromatic than Emmenthaler and usually sharper. This is due to a longer aging period and its size being less than half the weight of an Emmenthaler. All cheeses ripen from the outside in so a smaller cheese will ripen faster than a larger cheese. You can buy Gruyere at many different stages along the way. I prefer a longer cave aged cheese with much greater flavor. As a side note, Gruyere is occasionally confused by some as

a processed cheese found in little cubes or wedges. Though some of the lesser quality natural Gruyere cheeses make their way into processed cheese it should not be confused with the natural greatness of true Swiss Gruyere.

Gruyere has a wide range of culinary uses. You can make a great meal by just slicing Gruyere on dark bread with a little raw onion, mustard, and smoked sausage. Add a crisp white wine such as Chenin Blanc, Riesling, or Chardonnay, and a fresh salad and a simple, appetizing meal awaits you. Pan-frying this cheese dusted with a little flour is a great snack as well.

I mentioned earlier that Gruyere has a great keeping quality. The cheese can keep for weeks if not months. Should the cheese show any surface mold just scrape or cut it off. If the cheese is covered in cling film for a prolonged period of time you might develop what I call a plastic taste similar to cheeses often found pre-cut and cryovac packaged. Although this packing technique helps for mass marketing shelf life it does little to protect the integrity of the cheese. Just remove the surface layer with a cheese slicer to regain the fresh taste. As always, its best to buy smaller amounts more often and, of course, freshly cut.

### Essex Health Department

JANUARY IS NATIONAL RADON ACTION MONTH. Radon is an odorless, colorless gas which is the result of the breakdown of uranium in soil, rocks, and water. Radon is the leading cause of lung cancer in nonsmokers. High indoor radon concentrations occur sporadically in all parts of Connecticut and so two homes right next to each other can have different indoor radon levels.

Radon is emitted from the ground and enters your home through cracks in walls, basement floors, foundations and other openings. It can also enter your private well water supply and can be emitted into the air in your home by bathroom showers and sprays. When radon gas gets trapped indoors, it can build up to dangerous concentrations. Inhaling concentrated radon in indoor air over a prolonged period damages lung tissue and increases your risk of developing lung cancer. People who smoke have an even greater risk.


THE ONLY WAY TO FIND OUT IF YOUR HOME HAS RADON IS TO TEST FOR IT. The Essex Health Department promotes radon testing during Radon Action Month and has a limited number of passive, short term test kits available for Essex residents for FREE. These test kits measure radon in air. For measuring radon in water, contact a certified water testing laboratory.

The heating season is the best time to test for radon because your home is closed up, and radon levels tend to build up indoors. Testing is inexpensive, easy and only takes a few minutes of your time. The EPA recommends radon mitigation in homes having an air radon level 4 pCi/L or higher and the CT Dept of Public Health (DPH) recommends radon mitigation in homes having a water radon level 5000 pCi/L or higher.

It is Connecticut's free information and referral service. By dialing 2-1-1, a toll-free number throughout CT, callers can reach knowledgeable, multilingual staff and get information, referrals or seek help in a crisis. 2-1-1 operates 24 hours a day, every day of the year. TDD access is available.


Deschapelles Library Update: The walls are going up and soon we will be ready to put on the roof of the Deschapelles Library and the outbuilding where the guardhouse and pump house for the well will be located. The well is pumping water and the water is being used for construction. We have received the first installment of a \$37,000 from a grant from the Digicel Foundation (Digicel is the largest cell phone provider in Haiti) as well as funds for installing the well. We are in the process of applying for additional grants and are thankful for the generous support not only of our extended community but for the \$10,000 grant for books from the International Tri-Town Rotary as well as on-going fundraisers from the Valley Regional Schools, Essex Meadows and others. We still need to raise at least an additional \$50,000 and welcome your support.




