Haddam Residents.

Each time I write this quarterly update it amazes me how quickly the seasons come and go. Traditionally, public works is very busy this time of year and this year is no exception. In fact, we have accomplished more this past year than we have in the past 10 years on improving roads and buildings. Despite the late start due to the storms and snow and the rain this season we are scheduled to finish what we expected by the end of the construction season!

### Road Projects/Road Work

I want to make sure that I continue to publicize the road report completed by VHB on all of our town roads. This is available on the town website Haddam.org under public works. This report identifies each road with a rating and the estimated cost and type of repairs needed. We are concentrating on roads with a rating of 55 or less. This will take the next several years to do but we are well on our way. Current work includes, reclamation to McTigh, drainage on Turkey Hill, Pokorny Rd, Cove Rd, Injun Hollow, Old County and Rock Landing in addition to chip sealing and cracking scheduled this fall.

### **Town Buildings**

Signage has been added on a number of town buildings and new siding and painting is now completed on the Veteran's museum and Community Center. Our Senior Center handicap assessible rest room is completed and a new ramp that will allow wheel chair accessibility and parking lot paving are scheduled for October. The Old Town hall has new energy efficient windows and the side entrance to the town hall is no longer falling apart and unsafe.







### Middlesex Hospital: Detecting and Treating Breast Cancer

Middlesex Hospital is using new technology and techniques to help Connecticut women.

Early detection is very important when it comes to breast cancer, the most common cancer in women in the United States, and Middlesex has invested in technology that allows for more complete imaging.

Traditionally, women have received 2D mammograms, but it can be difficult to detect potential cancers while they're still small and most treatable using these 2D images. That's why Middlesex Hospital

uses 3D mammograms. These 3D images enable Middlesex radiologists to examine each layer of tissue more closely and from angles previously unavailable, resulting in a 40 percent increase in invasive breast cancer detection.

In addition, Middlesex is the only hospital in New England to offer dual-headed molecular breast imaging, which uses a radioactive tracer to better detect breast cancer cells. Molecular breast imaging is often used in conjunction with mammograms to give patients the best possible chance at early detection.

While early detection is certainly key, how breast cancer is treated is also important, and Middlesex is always looking to improve outcomes for its patients. To that end, Middlesex recently began using the Deep Inspiration Breath-Hold Technique, which helps to keep radiation away from the heart for women receiving treatment for cancer in their left breast.



### Diabetes and the Eye

Diabetes is a disease that affects your ability to produce or use insulin to effectively control the blood sugar (glucose) levels in your body. Too much glucose in the blood for an extended amount of time can damage many parts of your body, including your eyes. According to the CDC (Centers for Disease Control and Prevention) about 90% of diabetes related vision loss can be prevented with early detection. Yet a study performed by researchers at Wills Eye Hospital saw that 60% of people with diabetes skip their annual exam needed to preserve their vision. It is imperative that people with diabetes get an annual dilated eye exam because ocular complications due to diabetes may show no signs or symptoms.

When blood vessels in the eye's retina swell, leak, or close off, or if abnormal new blood vessels grow, it is called diabetic retinopathy. People who are at a higher risk of developing diabetic retinopathy are those who have diabetes or poor blood sugar control, women who are pregnant, and people with high blood pressure or high blood lipids.

Diabetes can also cause your vision to change even if you do not have retinopathy. If your blood sugar levels change very quickly, it can affect the shape of your eye's lens which causes blurry vision. Your vision usually goes back to normal after your blood sugar stabilizes.

According to the Academy of Ophthalmology, the top 5 steps to help prevent diabetic eye diseases are:

- Get a comprehensive dilated eye exam from your ophthalmologist at least once a year.
- Control your blood sugar.
- Maintain healthy blood pressure and cholesterol levels
- Quit smoking
- Exercise

### **Preparing for a Hurricane**

Hurricane readiness should begin long before the event occurs. You can prepare far in advance for the possible dangers to health and safety resulting from a hurricane by learning about your community's emergency plans, warning signals, evacuation routes, and locations of emergency shelters.

### To Prepare

- Identify potential home hazards that could develop during a hurricane, such as those involving gas, electricity, chemicals, and structural damage.
- Install a smoke detector
- Have a fire extinguisher and make sure

your family knows where to find it and how to use it

- Conduct an evacuation drill for at least two ways out of your home
- Provide escape ladders for multi-story structures.
- Post emergency phone numbers at every phone
- Inform local authorities about any special needs, i.e., elderly or bedridden people, or anyone with a disability
- Fill everal clean containers for water, large enough for a 3-5 day supply of water (about five gallons for each person).
- Have a battery-powered radio, flashlights, extra batteries, candles and matches.

### **During the Storm**

- Monitor the radio or television for weather conditions, if possible
- Stay indoors until the authorities declare the storm is over
- Stay away from all windows and exterior doors, seeking shelter in a bathroom or basement
- Bathtubs can provide some shelter if you cover yourself with plywood or other materials

If you should lose electrical power, eat perishable food first.

This summer was brutal. The promise of a new season always brings about the kindest hopes and dreams, no matter the past. Last year the Haddam Land Trust acquired one of the most spectacular pieces of property in town.



Malinowski who was introduced to all of the artists through her travels to Argentina.


The artists include: Marcela Ganly, a sculptor and alumna of

### Connecticut Cancer Foundation - John & Jane Ellis by Sigrid Kun

An enduring promise to help Connecticut cancer patients and their families.

The story of John and Jane Ellis is one of love, inspiration and dedication. She says he had the vision. He says she's the angel who does everything. Together, they are strong individuals who never wavered since John made a most solemn promise.

Born in New London, John was a high school standout in football and baseball. He went on to a 13-year major league baseball career. The catcher debuted in 1969 with the New York Yankees (1969-1972), hitting a home run in his first at bat. He also played for the Cleveland Indians (1973-1975) and Texas Rangers (1976-1981).

A routine life insurance examination revealed a spot. He had been a picture of health - jogging 10 miles a day. At age 38, the 1971 Topps All-Star Rookie had Hodgkin's lymphoma. He had already lost a brother, sister and sister-in-law, each to cancer. "Sitting there in the hole, getting your juice, and breaking it down. I made a deal," explains John. "If you let me live, I'm going to do this. I said I'd dedicate my whole life to the needs of the needy."

That was 1987. Together, the couple started a foundation whose mission has remained steadfast - to provide financial assistance to Connecticut cancer patients and their families and to fund cancer research. He is the Chairman/Founder. She is the President and Executive Director. The formula is simple. Many individuals affected by cancer struggle with basic living necessities. The foundation is there to help.

Oncology social workers in Connecticut provide referrals to the foundation. Applications are reviewed each Monday, with grants made within a week - an unheard of turnaround. If there is an emergency, they will do what they can right away. "It's all local. "You know where the money is going and that makes us unique," notes Jane. To date, the foundation has provided almost \$6 million in financial assistance to CT families and over \$2 million to lymphoma research. A \$7 million endowment ensures its future.

Their signature fundraiser is an annual celebrity dinner first held in 1988 at the Groton Motor Inn. Mickey Mantle, Whitey Ford and Billy Martin were there. "It was like a group of friends, getting together and telling stories," relates Jane. "It was special." The event raised \$100,000. At the end of the evening, Mickey observed "I hope this foundation goes on forever."

The event has grown markedly and is now hosted by a key corporate partner, Mohegan Sun. The next celebrity dinner will be held on February 8, 2019. The list of attendees are a testament to the relationships/trust that the couple forged over the years: Don Zimmer (who once released John), Yogi Berra, Derek Jeter, David Oritz, Hank Aaron, Carl Yastrzemski, Joe Torre, Reggie Jackson, Mariano Rivero, and Roger



Clemens. There are new fundraising initiatives: Cycle Against Cancer, the Fishing Against Cancer tournament, and a Speakers Program.

The foundation recently (July 2017) opened its new location at 15 North Main Street in Old Saybrook. Every aspect of the new facility focuses on the foundation's mission. There is a Hall of Fame. "It's a museum piece," says John. "A tribute to some of the wonderful baseball players who helped literally to build the foundation." There is an art gallery to hold exhibits benefitting the foundation. In fact, the inaugural art gallery exhibition (Horses: In Harmony) takes place from September 28 to October 26. "It's the infrastructure for the next 30 years," says Jane.

John and Jane have assembled plenty of stories. John laughs over that second celebrity dinner when Joe DiMaggio wouldn't sign memorabilia Whitey Ford brought along for him to sign. Yogi Berra successfully intervened. And then there was a single mother whose child was suffering from a rare cancer. "I'll never forget that for the rest of my life," recounts Jane. "They were homeless. She didn't know how to feed her children that evening. We gave her \$2,000. That gave her hope. We continued to help her. We got furniture... I had John schlep it all in his truck."

Thirty years ago, the couple wondered if they'd still be needed. Surely, cancer would be beaten already. "Our mission is more relevant today than 30 years ago," explains Jane. "Everyday expenses...it's so much more expensive to live. Our help is needed more than ever." "There's plenty of work here," adds John. "We look forward to making sure the foundation goes on and on."
