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Madison Women's Club



Champagne & Sparkling Wine for the Holidays

Tis' the season and holiday shopping is upon us. Shopping can be fun, especially if you are in the market for a festive Champagne or Sparkling Wine. There are some important things to know when looking for a 'bubbly' so that you can best decide which to purchase.

Champagne is a region in France, and only wines from this region can be called 'Champagne', all others are considered to be sparkling wine. Champagne is considered in many eyes to be the premier sparkling wine. There are large Champagne houses such as Taittinger, Veuve Clicquot, Perrier Jouet and Moet & Chandon which are very popular and sell extremely well. Smaller, less well known houses that have the grapes grown and produced on the property are called 'Growers Champagnes.' These champagnes are becoming very popular since there is such time and care put into the winemaking process. These Growers Champagnes are of superb quality and are usually a very good value. Many other areas in France produce less expensive sparkling wines including the towns surrounding Champagne, Alsace and the small town of Limoux.

There are many different styles of Champagne and sparkling wine. The most traditional is a blend of Chardonnay, Pinot Meunier and Pinot Noir. Blanc de Blancs is a sparkling made solely of Chardonnay. Blanc de Noirs is made from Pinot Noir and Pinot Meunier, which has a pinkish hue resembling the color of onion skin due to the grape skins having longer contact with the grapes. Rosé is considered the best wine of the winery and gets its color from still Pinot Noir being added during the winemaking process. Brut is a very dry sparkling wine, drier even than Extra Dry, and a lot less sweet than a Demi-Sec.


Sparkling wines are available from all different parts of the world which can be much less expensive than Champagne. The United States produces a good amount of sparkling wine, most notably in California, but also has a wide selection from Washington and New Mexico. Spanish sparkling wine is called Cava, and is traditionally made with Macabeo, Parellada and Xarel-Lo varietals. These wines are extremely approachable and are significantly less money than Champagne. Then there is the very popular Prosecco, a light and pleasing varietal from Italy. Prosecco has grown in popularity over the years, most likely due to its very reasonable pricing and friendly palate. For something a little sweeter Italy also produces fantastic Moscato d'Asti and Spumante sparkling wines.

With all this info you should have no problem picking out a perfect sparkling wine for the holidays. So raise your glass, and toast to the holidays with friends and family. Cheers!

The Mighty Oak

"The mighty Oak reigns over the land connecting earth and sky. It bears abundant fruit promising everlasting life" – anonymous

I am sure everyone noticed the abundance of acorns produced by the Oak trees this past fall. I have heard all kinds of speculation about the acorn deluge being a sign of a harsh winter ahead. While the bumper crop may coincide with such a winter, there is no scientific evidence to back this theory. What we do know is that the bumper crop is a cyclical process referred to as a Mast year. Other trees also produce Mast years (though not necessarily within the same year as the Oak), such as the Beech. However, the mighty Oak is most noticeable because of the dropping of giant acorns. The famous Chicken Little can attest to that as she ran warning of the falling sky!

The acorn is the seed produced by the Oak tree. It requires a great amount of energy for the tree to produce this seed. In an average year, an Oak conserves energy by producing an average amount of acorns. A Mast year occurs irregularly and unpredictably every few years over a widespread region. The interesting thing is that scientists believe there is some kind of communication going on amongst the trees, signaling the production of a Mast. It is not known how this communication occurs, perhaps through the root systems. Mother Nature works in mysterious ways! The reason for the abundance of acorns during a Mast year is to ensure proliferation of its species. There are so many acorns produced that the wildlife cannot even keep up with the surplus. Many acorns remain on the ground, promising future seedlings.

The Oak tree has something to teach us. I think it is about balance. Don't produce ALL your acorns ALL of the time. Maybe it's better to conserve energy at times so that when something big hits, you have the strength to deal with it. It's important to take care of others, but you have to remember to take care of yourself too. If you don't take care of yourself you will not be able to take care of others with a strong happy heart.

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Advanced Cataract Surgery

Lasers have saved vision in patients with Diabetes, eliminated the need for glasses with LASIK, and now assist in Cataract Surgery. In the past, the surgeons would use blades and eye markers to create openings and guides for lens implantation; new technology shines a digital reflection onto the cornea eliminating the marking on the eye, uses a laser to break up your cataract and create near perfect openings for surgery. With this new technology, the plan starts from your visit in the office. Most patients complain of glare, halo, yellowing of colors, and blurred vision when having cataracts. Typical aging cataracts are seen in patients at approximately 50 years of age. With a dilated exam by your surgeon at Middlesex Eye Physicians, they determine if your cataract is ready for removal.

Small cataracts are left alone until they "grow".

Once diagnosed with a cataract and deemed ready for surgery, our patients are sent to the surgical schedulers. The scheduler will educate the patient and make appropriate appointments. The process begins. Patients will have an ultrasound of their eye with specialized equipment. After this measurement, patients will be placed on a machine that will capture fine details on the eye for surgery such as the eyes external blood vessels and the iris composition (color part of the eye). This precise computer information is transferred to the physician to view and create a plan for cataract surgery. More precise measurements customized to the patient's own eyes means better visual outcomes.



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Madison Land Conservation Trust

The Land Trust will offer its annual Groundhog Hike on Sunday, January 31st at 1:00 pm. Future hike dates, locations and trail maps can be found at www.madisonlandtrust.org.

This year's Groundhog Hike will be on the Indian Rock Shelters trail in North Madison. This trail is named for the shallow caves that may have served as a winter home for members of the Hammonasset tribe. Within the rock ledges that form the western boundary of the trail are several protected spots to find

shelter. It's possible to scramble up to the ledges and climb inside, imagining what it would be like to spend the night. The ledges also offer fantastic views of the surrounding area. The shelters overlook the headwaters of the Neck River, which flows south to Long Island Sound. The land trust owns much of the land bordering the river, allowing hikers to follow its course on other trails in town.

To get to the Indian Rock Shelters trail, take Summer Hill Road, North of Route 80 to the second left, Twilight Drive. Turn left on Lake Drive and park at the cul-de-sac. Hikers should wear sturdy boots or snowshoes and be dressed for the weather. Dogs are welcome but must be on a leash. To see a photo album of the trail, visit www.facebook.com/madisonlandtrust.





Facilities Department

The Facilities Department also keeps itself busy with major facility construction projects. In 2015 the Facilities Department renovated the police dispatch room, replaced the playground at Town Campus, asbestos abatement at Walter C. Polson Middle School kitchen and also replaced the floor; replaced the blacktop at Robert H. Brown School and also refinished the gymnasium floor.

The year 2016 will prove just as busy. The Department is currently planning/designing/researching the replacement of the boilers at J. Milton Jeffrey Elementary School, which consists of researching the best energy savings option; Retrocommissioning of Robert H. Brown Middle School which involves working closely with utility companies for the best possible rebate and best energy savings option; Replace the current Town Campus exterior lighting with LED lights which will not only cut down on maintenance but will significantly cut electrical costs; Replacement of the Walter C. Polson Middle School Roof Phase III. This is the last phase that needs replacement as it was installed in 1988. Phase I occurred in 2004 and Phase II in 2005.
