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First Selectwoman's Corner

With the holidays and winter upon us, the weather continues to get colder outside, the heavy jackets and accessories have come out of storage, and of course, the decorations are on display, reminding us that the holidays are right around the corner! While we are all busy preparing for our celebrations, there is still a lot going on in town!

Election Day was November 6, 2018 at the Cross Lane Fire House, and it was one of our busiest on record. Over 72% of registered voters in Old Lyme cast their vote in this election, which is impressive for a non-Presidential election! The poll workers reported that they were continuously busy, and voters were graciously patient, despite the wait in line even in the rain! We are proud that our voters realized the importance of this election and that they took the time to cast their vote. Special thanks to the poll workers who begin around 5:00 am and don't finish until after 9:00 pm - a very long day!

I am pleased to report that the Town of Old Lyme has been notified of several grants, which will be a great help in assuring that our infrastructure needs are addressed. In August, we were informed that we have been awarded a Community Connectivity Grant for \$400,000 to complete the sidewalks on Hartford Avenue, connecting the south end of Hartford Ave. to Route 156. This grant pays for all construction of the project, and we are

currently in the process of forming a committee to work out the details. The sidewalk is planned for the west side of Hartford Avenue, from Bocce Lane to Route 156. Plans will be shared with residents as we move forward in developing them, but this is a great opportunity to improve safety in a busy pedestrian area. In addition, we were notified that our application for funding of construction on two local bridges was also

approved. We have been awarded a Local Bridge Funding grant of \$427,400 for the replacement of the Mile Creek Road bridge over the Black Hall River, as well as \$345,838 for repairs to the Grassy Hill Road Bridge, near the intersection of Route 1. The Mile Creek Road Bridge will be replaced in the summer of 2019, which will mean that Mile Creek Road will be closed for a period of time. Of course, advance notification will be posted on our website, with detours well marked. In August, the Public Works Dept. discovered some serious washout under the Grassy Hill Road Bridge, requiring immediate emergency repairs, which were completed within 5 days of discovery. This prompted an application for additional funding for this bridge, as it is a narrow bridge continued on page 3

with unreinforced parapets (side rails). A timeline for these repairs has not yet been established, but more information will follow as we work with engineers to plan to address these repairs. In total, these grants pay for 50% of the repairs of both bridges. We are delighted to be able to keep the cost down for our tax-payers as we address our infrastructure needs in Old Lyme.

The Police Services Options Committee continues to meet and discuss the pros and cons to working together with another community on police services for Old Lyme. While a decision has not been made, this committee has had the opportunity to have meaningful conversations with our local police union representatives, the CT State Police and the CT Police Chiefs Association. In addition, residents have had the opportunity to express their opinions about this and other ideas, as well as air their concerns about police services in our community. It has been a fruitful effort, and whether or not the Town of Old Lyme works with another community to meet our needs, it is worth considering a continuation of this committee to provide a forum to assure that our policing needs are understood and considered as we move forward.

The Halls Road Improvements Committee continues to work with Yale Urban Design Workshop on draft plans for improvements to Halls Road in an effort to make it more walkable, supportive of businesses, and connected to our Lyme Street and Arts areas. The Committee worked together with volunteers from Essex Savings Bank, Point One Architects, Coldwell Banker and the Open Space Commission to clear brush from the area north of Halls Road between the Lieutenant River and the Old Lyme Shopping Center. If you have driven on Halls Road recently, you have likely noticed how the view has improved due to the clearing of the area. After our cleanup day, Public Works cleared the brush and completed the task, improving the area for all. On December 6th, the Yale Urban Design Workshop will host a public meeting at the Lyme Old Lyme Middle School Cafeteria to review the options they have developed for the improvements to Halls Road, in an effort to get input from the community. It will be in the cafeteria so that participants can work together to provide valuable feedback to YUDW on their efforts. It should be an interesting and exciting presentation.

In July of 2019, our contract with Old Lyme Sanitation, the provider of our Solid Waste and Recycling Collection Services for over 30 years, will expire, and Gary Yuknat has notified the Town that he will not bid on a renewal of the contract. For that reason, a committee was formed to develop a Request for Proposals (RFPP) for collection services. Anticipating this change, the committee agreed it was the perfect time to incorporate continued on page 4

weekly collection of all solid waste and recycling throughout town. The RFP was advertised in August with a due date in October, at which time we received four bids. After reviewing all the bids, the committee has begun negotiations with the low bidder and looks forward to announcing a new contract by the beginning of 2019. Provided we are successful in awarding a contract, the vendor will have plenty of time to make preparations for collections beginning on July 1st. At that time, weekly garbage collection, as well as weekly recycling collection, will begin for all residents. This has been the number one request for years! No more remembering which week recycling is done, or checking calendars to determine if recycling needs to go out. Stay tuned for a January announcement.

Heritage Consultants of Newington, CT are currently performing the Historic Resource Inventory Survey, which is being funded by a grant from the State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO). The committee expects to get together with the consultants to review their draft report some time in December, and make suggestions for edits and possibly add some properties. The survey should be completed by the end of January, 2019. Once the final report is submitted, it will be made available to all residents.

While Hurricane Season is behind us, the winter can bring some nasty storms, so be sure to stay prepared - keep several days'


worth of supplies on hand should the electricity go out, and if you use a portable generator - never run it inside, or even in the garage. By all means, if you don't yet have a carbon monoxide detector, get one today. Simple safety precautions can save lives. During a storm, please check on your neighbors, especially those who are elderly or infirmed. And don't forget to make sure you, and your neighbors, are listed on our Old Lyme Alerts - you can go to the town's web page and click on the red banner at the top to register, or pick up a green card from Town Hall. It is quick and easy and assures that you will be notified during an emergency.

Still important to remember: The Town of Old Lyme continues to reach out to all residents to improve efforts on recycling. All of us have an obligation to recycle ONLY acceptable materials, and then, only if they are clean. When we intermingle materials that are not acceptable, we pay additional fees and fines to our haulers. Please help us to improve our recycling efforts - acceptable, clean recyclables only! And remember that the blue bin for garbage is ONLY garbage - no grass clippings, branches, building materials, etc. Thank you for your diligence.

If you feel you may meet the requirements please contact our office for further information.

Trash and Recycling

Curbside trash removal is performed by Old Lyme Sanitation 860-434-3800. There is no trash pick-up on the following Holidays: Christmas (Dec. 25), New Year's (Jan. 1), Memorial Day (last Monday in May), July 4th, Labor Day (first Monday in Sept.), and Thanksgiving Day (fourth Thursday in Nov.). Trash normally collected on Thanksgiving will be picked up the next day, along with the regular Friday pickup. For Christmas and New Year's (Monday holiday), trash pickup moves to the following day, until Thursday and Friday, which remain on schedule. If the Monday holiday falls on your recycling day, Monday will be picked up on Tuesday, along with Tuesday's regularly scheduled pick up, and the rest of the week will remain on schedule. Old Lyme Sanitation DOES NOT observe the same holidays as the Town.

Please have trash container out at curbside by 6:00 am on your assigned day. Containers should be three feet away from any other objects, such as mailboxes, cars, other containers, planters, etc. DO NOT block breakdown/emergency lanes. Phone Michele Hayes 860-434-1605, ext. 212 with additional trash removal questions.

Single stream curbside recycling pick-up is provided for clean bottles, cans, #1 - 7 plastics and paper products co-mingled in the green recycling carts every other week. Corrugated cardboard boxes need to be flattened for recycling. A complete list of

acceptable single stream recyclables is available on the Town's website: www.oldlyme-ct.gov - click the trash and recycling link on the Selectman's or Public Works pages or at www.shoreline sanitation.com. Information is also available in the Selectman's Office at the Memorial Town Hall, 52 Lyme Street, and at the Landfill/Transfer Station on Four Mile River Road. Please phone Michele Hayes 860-434-1605, ext. 212 with any additional questions.

Curbside recycling is performed every other week by Old Lyme Sanitation 860-434-3800. There is no recycling pick-up on the following Holidays: Christmas Day (Dec. 25), New Year's (Jan. 01), Memorial Day (last Monday in May), July 4th, Labor Day (first Monday in Sept.), and Thanksgiving Day (fourth Thursday in Nov.). Recycling normally collected on Thanksgiving is picked up the next day, along with the regular Friday pickup. For other holidays, recycling pickup moves to the following day, until Friday, which remains on schedule. Recycling information is available on the Town's website www.oldlyme-ct.gov, as well as in the Selectman's Office at the Memorial Town Hall, 52 Lyme Street, or at the Landfill/Transfer Station on Four Mile River Road. ordered through Michele Hayes 860-434-1605, ext. 212 in the Selectman's Office at the Memorial Town Hall, 52 Lyme Street. Containers cost \$80.

Please mark clearly your address on recycling and trash receptacles to avoid mix up, removal or displacement of cans. Homeowners are responsible to replace lost, stolen or broken cans at their expense.

Transfer Station Information

TRANSFER STATION/LANDFILL HOURS.

The Transfer Station is located on Four Mile River Road and is open Tuesday-Friday, 7:30 am - 3:45 pm, Saturday, 8:30 am - 4:00 pm. Closed Sunday and Monday. Taxpayers' vehicles should have a Transfer Station sticker affixed to the right-hand side of windshield. Vehicles without a sticker should bring proof of property address (i.e., tax bill, mortgage statement or closing papers), along with a driver's license and registration.

Bulky Waste and Demolition: Vehicles will be charged by weight at \$110/ton. Recyclables should not be mixed in the same load with Bulky Waste or Demolition Debris. Loads less than 100 lbs. are charged a minimum fee of \$5.

Brush is charged on a per load basis. No wood or limbs thicker than four inches are accepted.

Grass clippings are not allowed at the Transfer Station because of chemical con tamination from pesticides and fertilizers and cannot be deposited in your trash can. Please compost on your property.

Electronics are now accepted at the Transfer Station. Residents can bring the following items to the Transfer Station on Four Mile River Road: computers (personal computers, mainframes, med-range computers, laptops); networking equipment (hubs, switches, control cards, etc.); computer monitors, televisions, printers, keyboards, mice, adaptors, stereos, speakers, VCR's, scanners, fax machines, copiers telephones and telephone systems, computer wire and cable; computer drives and storage devices (floppy drives, CD ROMs, hard drives), power supplies, circuit boards, microwaves, scrap copper (cable, pipe, etc.), scrap aluminum (machine and machine parts, cable extrusions, etc.), fluorescent light bulbs, UPA (uninterrupted power supply) batteries, and related computer and electronic equipment.

PROPER RECYCLING IS GOOD! - BOTH FOR THE ENVIRONMENT AND FOR OLD LYME'S BUDGET



Recycling means business! ...for the environment and for Old Lyme!

OL residences and business have two bins. BLUE is for TRASH, and GREEN is for RECYCLABLES. Old Lyme pays for each ton of trash removed by our contractor, and often "trash" contains much that could and should be recycled. OL could be earning bigger rebates for recycling... IF WE do our jobs.

First - know the definition of "Recycling" - as Old Lyme

defines it. "Recycling" includes clean paper, glass and cans: newspaper, plastic butter tubs, plastic cups, foil containers and cardboard. It does NOT include gift wrap, gift bags, ice cream containers, paper cups, ceramic plates, mugs or drinking glasses, pots, pans, scrap metal, building materials or loose bottles caps.

Second - Package your recycling properly. Simply place bottles, etc into the green bin, NOT in plastic bags, or gift bags.

Third - know the difference between other discards: **These are TRASH, not Recycling:**

Garbage
Shredded paper
Bottle caps
Aluminum foil
Plastic plates, bowls and utensils
Prescription bottles
Gift wrap and gift bags
Foil tops from yogurt containers

This is COMPOSTING Not TRASH and Not Recycling: (More later)

Yard debris, clippings Holiday plants in pots

This is Reprocessing:

Clothing, sweaters, towels, fabric. Can be made into rags or reprocessed into fabrics. Drop into a bin labeled "Clothing."

This is ELECTRONICS RECYCLING:

(*Deliver to Old Lyme Transfer Station, Four Mile River Road*) -Computers and laptops, printers, fax machines, monitors, TVs, cell phones, tablets, video games, VCR/DVD machines, remotes, keyboards, computer mice.

SUCCESSFUL MENTORING PROGRAM AT LYME-OLD LYME SCHOOLS SEEKS ADDITIONAL COMMUNITY VOLUNTEERS

The Lyme-Old Lyme Mentoring Program is built on the premise that every child deserves caring adults in their life. Established in 2014, the Lyme-Old Lyme Mentoring Program is run in collaboration with Lymes' Youth Services Bureau, and this program strives to match students with trusted, caring high school and adult mentors.

The Mentoring Program is a school-based program in which mentors meet with mentees for approximately one hour per week. All of the meetings are held on school grounds and take place during or at the end of the school day. Mentors provide a positive social connection for their mentee. To develop caring and supportive relationships, mentors play board games, do crafts, play basketball, go for walks, and participate in a variety of shared experiences with their mentees. It is expected that these matches will last for several years.

The Mentoring Program recruits both high school and adult community members to serve as mentors. Mentor candidates undergo a thorough application process. Candidates first submit a formal application and are interviewed by a panel of individuals associated with the Mentoring Program. Once the screening process is complete, the Mentoring Program provides a training session for new mentors. The training provides information about the roles and responsibilities of mentors and mentees, gives an overview of their responsibility as mandated reporters, and the training session provides tips to new mentors to help ensure a positive start to the relationship. To provide follow-up support to mentors throughout the year, the Mentor Program hosts two supportive roundtable discussions.

After the training session, mentors and mentees are matched. Mentees may be new students to the district, some may be having trouble navigating the tricky social dynamics of late child-hood/early adolescence, while others may just need a friendly,

caring person in their lives. Participation in the program is voluntary.

While the Mentoring Program started as a middle school initiative, it has recently been expanded to include students in grades 3, 4, and 5 at Lyme Consolidated and Mile Creek schools. Plans to expand the program up to Lyme-Old Lyme High School are being developed.

The Woman's Exchange of Old Lyme

Women Helping Women could possibly be considered the mission of the Woman's Exchange of Old Lyme but the Woman's Exchange is so much more!

Our non-profit organization is staffed by dedicated volunteers who have only one goal. Our goal encompasses all aspects of helping others in our community through the sale of unique items offered by talented artisans.

The significant history of the Federation of Woman's Exchanges started in Philadelphia way back in 1832, as the Philadelphia Ladies Depository. The Woman's Exchange movement is one of the oldest continuously operational charitable movements in the United States. What began quietly, expanded quickly after the Civil War, and by the late nineteenth century, there were nearly one hundred Exchanges in operation across the country from New York to San Francisco.

Exchanges were fashionable shops where women who had fallen on hard times could sell their home-produced merchandise on consignment. They combined



elements of charity, cooperation, and retailing, and served their communities in a variety of ways.

At first, the Exchanges simply provided a venue for hand crafters to sell their goods, but gradually their mission expanded to meet women's changing needs. Some Exchanges provided fabric and instruction in the art of fine sewing: some purchased buildings where, in addition to their gift shops, they opened tea rooms and offered women employment there. Some made available workrooms and apartments for ladies to rent.

Today's hand crafters can earn money by marketing their goods in a shop rather than relying on intermittent craft shows for sales. Also, the townspeople where the remaining Exchanges are located benefit from having places to purchase unique handmade items, shops whose profits are given back to the communities they serve.

Here at the Woman's Exchange of Old Lyme, most items are provided by consignors who receive a percentage of the sale price. We are privileged to feature their beautiful and unique items in our shop.

Funds collected beyond the operating costs are given back to the community in the form of donations to programs such as The Thames River Family program for women and children as well as various food banks and The New London Homeless Shelter.

The Woman's Exchange of Old Lyme is located at 86 Halls Rd in the Old Lyme Marketplace. Our hours have now changed to: Monday through Saturday from 10:00 am until 5:00 pm!





TIRED OF BEING HARASSED BY FRAUDSTERS?

For elderly friends and family members it's more than annoying - it can be overwhelming, frightening and downright dangerous. Scammers come across as eerily believable and create a sense of urgency that can be difficult to challenge. Telling callers or visitors they must speak with a family member who is not available can stave off many, but what's really needed is a strong, comprehensive defense.

THE FIRST STEP IS AWARENESS

Understanding how scams work can help folks avoid being conned. A good resource is AARP's "Con Artist's Playbook." Unfortunately, as cognition declines, folks are less able to think logically when confronted by scammers, so more action may be needed.

- **Get Caller ID** and perhaps a system that integrates with the television. Don't answer unless you recognize the name if it's important they will leave a message.
- **Get on the do not call list** scammers won't care but it will cut down on the number of unwanted calls (Donotcall.gov or 888-392-1222.)
- **Verify legitimacy of charities** charitywatch.org; charity navigator.org.

- Opt out of prescreened credit offers optoutpre screen.com or call: 888-5-opt-out (888-567-8688.)
- Put on credit freezes at all three major credit bureaus (Transunion.com/credit-freeze; Equifax.com/personal/credit-report-services/ Experian.com/freeze.)
- **Install a camera** folks can see who is at their door in advance and decide whether or not to answer.

If more oversight seems desirable or necessary, consider additional steps like having duplicate statements for bank and investment accounts sent to a trusted friend or family member who could also review mail (see www.informed delivery.usps.com), and if needed, monitor or pay bills. If friends and family are not readily available consider hiring a trusted local assistant for these tasks.

The assault on the most vulnerable among us is deeply troubling, but we can all be part of the solution.

WPCA Coastal Wastewater Management Plan Update

WPCA Chairman Prendergast and other town representatives hosted a public meeting in the Old Lyme Town Hall to inform our community of the work the WPCA has been doing on the Coastal Waste Water Management Plan. There were at least 120 individuals in attendance. We will use a larger venue for the next meeting.

The Environmental impact Evaluation (EIE) summary document that describes the potential impacts of sewers on the Sound View area was approved on June 5, 2018 by CT DEEP and it was published to the CT DEEP Monitor website. The EIE was posted for a period of 45 days so that members of the public could make comments about the wastewater management plan. A draft of The Record of Decision is currently circulating at CT DEEP. This document addresses questions posed during the EIE public comment period and will indicate what the next steps are for the wastewater management plan moving forward. The WPCA expects to receive The Record of Decision soon.

The intermunicipal waste transfer agreement (IMA), a necessary component of the Coastal Wastewater Management Plan is moving forward. Representatives from Old Colony Beach Club Association (OCBCA), Miami Beach Association (MBA), and Old Lyme Shores Beach Association (OLSBA) referred to as the "Private Beach Associations," in consultation with Selectwoman Reemsnyder and WPCA Chairman Prendergast have been negotiating agreements with representatives of East Lyme and New London for conveyance of wastewater to the New London

treatment facility. The New London IMA with the Private Beach Assocations is being reviewed by a representative of the WPCA.

In June a meeting was held to clarify details of the pump house land lease agreement. Selectwoman Reemsnyder, WPCA Chairman Prendergast and individuals representing the Private Beach Associations were able to develop an illustrated exhibit with references and update the land lease agreement. The pump house land lease was approved by the community at a Town Meeting andto the Board of Selectman will sign the agreement.

A ground water quality testing plan has been approved by CT DEEP for the area known as Hawk's Nest Beach (HNB). Additional test wells stipulated by CT DEEP were installed and flushed in the spring of 2018. The updated map added 6 new wells to the existing 5 wells for a total of 11 testing sites. All the wells were flushed and the first samples were obtained and tested in July. At that time the WPCA decided to flush the new wells again before the next round of testing in September. All ground water testing results will be posted on the town website. There will be a total of 16 well samplings over a 2 year period. CT DEEP will interpret all testing data at the end of the 2 years and issue final conclusions on the quality of ground water in the HNB area. The new test result information will supplement existing ground water quality data and become part of CT DEEPs evaluation of this area for future wastewater treatment needs.

Connecticut State law 12-155 prohibits the use of a fertilizer containing phosphorous less than 20 feet from any body of water. A \$500 fine is imposed on violators. If you have questions on the phosphorus legislation or soil testing, call the UConn Home & Garden Education Center at: 877-486-6271.

Open Space

While foliage is fast fading, Old Lyme's open space is still full of life. Squirrels are scurrying collecting nuts, wild turkeys are oblivious to holiday meals, and plants like winterberry holly put on a color show. With the leaf canopy gone, forest and pastoral vistas are open, allowing better views of cliffs and wetlands.

The Open Space Commission encourages you to visit our 600 acres of preserves during this special time of year. Here are suggestions:

CHAMPLAIN FARM SOUTH

Along these trails, see the skeletons of long-dead juniper trees

from old sheep pastures. Stone walls that held livestock and marked boundaries meander alongside. Can you spot the old roadway traveling along the ridge from the end of Meeting House Hill north toward I-95? Look for the tracks of old iron-wheeled carts that traversed pioneer farms.

CHAMPLAIN FARM NORTH

If you think our winters are cold, consider that a mile of ice once covered this land. The moving ice of the last (Wisconsin) glaciation transported millions of tons of rock, sand, silt and clay across this land, sculpting the landscape.

Lahav's work centers on oversized images of famous figures, each layered with references to history, lore, and imagery that have shaped our understanding of that person. Through his cheeky, psychologically complex treatment of iconic figures, Lahav explores the multifaceted nature of cultural identity, calling into question the very notion of "greatness" among American historical figures and exploring the concept of fame itself.

In keeping with the Museum's efforts to reflect a distinctly Connecticut point of view in our exhibitions, Lahav will curate a selection of Lyme Art Colony works and objects from FGM's collection to appear in conjunction with The Great Americans. The artist will create several new Connecticut-related works for his

series, including portraits of Florence Griswold and Lyme Art Colony visitor Woodrow Wilson. The exhibition will look first at the cultural big picture of our national heroes, then draw the visitor's eye to see CT-specific resonances-all through Lahav's uniquely 21st century lens.

Shopping can be fun, especially if you are in the market for a festive Champagne or Sparkling Wine. There are some important things to know when looking for a 'bubbly' so that you can best decide which to purchase.

Champagne is a region in France, and only wines from this region can be called 'Champagne', all others are considered

to be sparkling wine. Champagne is considered in many eyes to be the premier sparkling wine. There are large Champagne houses such as Taittinger, Veuve Clicquot, Perrier Jouet and Moet & Chandon which are very popular and sell extremely well. Smaller, less well known houses that have the grapes grown and produced on the property are called 'Growers Champagnes.' These champagnes are becoming very popular since there is such time and care put into the winemaking continued on page 38

process. These Growers Champagnes are of superb quality and are usually a very good value. Many other areas in France produce less expensive sparkling wines including the towns surrounding Champagne, Alsace and the small town of Limoux.

There are many different styles of Champagne and sparkling wine. The most traditional is a blend of Chardonnay, Pinot Meunier and Pinot Noir. Blanc de Blancs is a sparkling made solely of Chardonnay. Blanc de Noirs is made from Pinot Noir and Pinot Meunier, which has a pinkish hue resembling the color of onion skin due to the grape skins having longer contact with the grapes. Rosé is considered the best wine of the winery and gets its color from still Pinot Noir being added during the winemaking process. Brut is a very dry sparkling wine, drier even than Extra Dry, and a lot less sweet than a Demi-Sec.

Sparkling wines are available from all different parts of the world which can be much less expensive than Champagne. The United States produces a good amount of sparkling wine, most notably in California, but also has a wide selection from Washington and New Mexico. Gruet is

by far the most popular sparkling wine producer grown in New Mexico. Spanish sparkling wine is called Cava, and is traditionally made with Macabeo, Parellada and Xarel-Lo varietals. These wines are extremely approachable and are significantly less money than Champagne. Then there is the very popular Prosecco, a light and pleasing varietal from Italy. Prosecco has grown in popularity over the years, most likely due to its very reasonable pricing and friendly palate. For something a little sweeter Italy also produces fantastic Moscato d'Asti and Spumante sparkling wines.

The Sparkling Rosė compliments any holiday meal it is typically dry and quite refreshing. There are many that are inexpensive ones throughout the world. So you won't be force to buy the very expensive ones from Champange.

With all this info you should have no problem picking out a perfect sparkling wine for the holidays. So raise your glass, and toast to the holidays with friends and family. Cheers!

Connecticut Cancer Foundation - John & Jane Ellis by Sigrid Kun

An enduring promise to help Connecticut cancer patients and their families.

The story of John and Jane Ellis is one of love, inspiration and dedication. She says he had the vision. He says she's the angel who does everything. Together, they are strong individuals who never wavered since John made a most solemn promise.

Born in New London, John was a high school standout in football and baseball. He went on to a 13-year major league baseball career. The catcher debuted in 1969 with the New York Yankees (1969-1972), hitting a home run in his first at bat. He also played for the Cleveland Indians (1973-1975) and Texas Rangers (1976-1981).

A routine life insurance examination revealed a spot. He had been a picture of health - jogging 10 miles a day. At age 38, the 1971 Topps All-Star Rookie had Hodgkin's lymphoma. He had already lost a brother, sister and sister-in-law, each to cancer. "Sitting there in the hole, getting your juice, and breaking it down. I made a deal," explains John. "If you let me live, I'm going to do this. I said I'd dedicate my whole life to the needs of the needy."

That was 1987. Together, the couple started a foundation whose mission has remained steadfast - to provide financial assistance to Connecticut cancer patients and their families and to fund cancer research. He is the Chairman/Founder. She is the President and Executive Director. The formula is simple. Many individuals affected by cancer struggle with basic living necessities. The foundation is there to help.

Oncology social workers in Connecticut provide referrals to the foundation. Applications are reviewed each Monday, with grants made within a week - an unheard of turnaround. If there is an emergency, they will do what they can right away. "It's all local. "You know where the money is going and that makes us unique," notes Jane. To date, the foundation has provided almost \$6 million in financial assistance to CT families and over \$2 million to lymphoma research. A \$7 million endowment ensures its future.

Their signature fundraiser is an annual celebrity dinner first held in 1988 at the Groton Motor Inn. Mickey Mantle, Whitey Ford and Billy Martin were there. "It was like a group of friends, getting together and telling stories," relates Jane. "It was special." The event raised \$100,000. At the end of the evening, Mickey observed "I hope this foundation goes on forever."

The event has grown markedly and is now hosted by a key corporate partner, Mohegan Sun. The next celebrity dinner will be held on February 8, 2019. The list of attendees are a testament to the relationships/ trust that the couple forged over the years: Don Zimmer (who once released John), Yogi Berra, Derek Jeter, David Oritz, Hank Aaron, Carl Yastrzemski, Joe Torre, Reggie Jackson, Mariano Rivero, and Roger Clemens. There are new fundraising initiatives: Cycle Against Cancer,

the Fishing Against Cancer tournament, and a Speakers Program. And there is assistance for ILROG - the International Lymphoma Radiation Oncology Group. "We're global in nature but local in giving," observes John.

The foundation recently (July 2017) opened its new location at 15 North Main Street in Old Saybrook. Every aspect of the new facility focuses on the foundation's mission. There is a Hall of Fame. "It's a museum piece," says John. "A tribute to some of the wonderful baseball players who helped literally to build the foundation." There is an art gallery to hold exhibits benefitting the foundation. "It's the infrastructure for the next 30 years," says Jane.

John and Jane have assembled plenty of stories. John laughs over that second celebrity dinner when Joe DiMaggio wouldn't sign memorabilia Whitey Ford brought along for him to sign. Yogi Berra successfully intervened. And then there was a single mother whose child was suffering from a rare cancer. "I'll never forget that for the rest of my life," recounts Jane. "They were homeless. She didn't know how to feed her children that evening. We gave her \$2,000. That gave her hope. We continued to help her. We got furniture... I had John schlep it all in his truck."

Thirty years ago, the couple wondered if they'd still be needed. Surely, cancer would be beaten already. "Our mission is more relevant today than 30 years ago," explains Jane. "Everyday expenses...it's so much more expensive to live. Our help is needed more than ever." "There's plenty of work here," adds John. "We look forward to making sure the foundation goes on and on."

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
