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Registrars of Voters

The Municipal Election will be held on Tuesday, November 5 at the Mulvey Municipal Center, 866 Boston Post Road, Westbrook, CT in the Multi-Purpose Room from 6:00 am to 8:00 pm. If you are not a registered voter, you may get an application at the Registrars' or Town Clerk's Office. The regularly scheduled Registrars' Office hours are each Tuesday from 11:00 am – 1:00 pm, and Thursday from 5:00 pm – 7:00 pm. You may also call to make an appointment at 860-399-3042.

A reminder to all registered voters- Please inform the Registrars if you have had any change of name, address, telephone number, or want to change your party affiliation. It is important that we have your most current information for our records so that your right to vote is not compromised.

Any registered voter on the active list, if unable to vote in person, may vote by absentee ballot for one of the following reasons: 1) absence from the town during all hours of voting, 2) illness, 3) physical disability, 4) active service in the U.S. Armed Forces, 5) religious tenets which forbid secular activity on the day of election, primary, or referendum, 6) service as an election official at a polling place other than the official's usual place of voting during all hours of voting. Absentee ballots are available only from the Town Clerk beginning on the 31st day before an election and the 21st day before a primary, upon application properly made, either in person or by mail to the Town Clerk.

Summer Westbrook Events


Westbrook is the best place to be during the summer months! Our Recreation Department has camps and programs for everyone. Field Hockey, Soccer, Baseball, Basketball, Tennis and Theatre Camps are available to every child. We do programs for children from Westbrook and for nonresidents from all over the shoreline.

It's still not too late to sign-up for "Week at the Beach" or "Hangout Week". Week at the Beach will be August 12th – 16th. Each day, parents will drop off and pick up their children right here at the Westbrook Town Beach. Drop-off will be at the Westbrook Town Hall, if it rains any of these days. Please remember that there are two field trips during this week to add to all the fun.

The week after summer camp is over has always been difficult for finding dependable childcare. Hangout week will be August 19th – 23rd, at the Westbrook Library. This week has no field trip but is a great way for children to start thinking about school. Access to library books and other materials will be available so children can catch up on their summer reading. Hours during this week are limited to 8:00 am – 4:00 pm, due to staff availability.

Fall Programs

Fall is right around the corner and the children will be back in school soon. This September we will start a new year for all



our adult programs. We have Zumba, Yoga, Aerobics, Pilates, Adult Volleyball, Adult Basketball, Belly Dancing and Senior Fitness classes. We're sure to have a fitness class to fit your schedule and desire. Why pay membership fees when you're able to take our classes whenever you wish and only pay for the ones you use?

Our new program for this fall will be our Adult Horseshoe league. Teams of two can be men, women or co-ed. All teams should register now, so we can make our schedules available for September. The league will run on Thursday nights from 5:30 – 7:00 pm. Space will be limited so please register as soon as possible.

All our fall youth sports programs will be starting September 7th. As always, we have our very popular Tot Soccer, Recreational and Travel Soccer programs. For the third year we will have the Challenger Sports staff running our 1st – 5th Grade Recreational Soccer program. Challenger teaches both our April and Summer Soccer Camps and will bring their international skills and knowledge. This program will give your child the solid foundation they will need to play soccer.

This will be the fourth year for Youth Badminton. Has your child enjoyed playing badminton this summer? Now imagine them playing indoors with all their friends. This class is limited due to the small Daisy gym. Sign up as soon as possible! K-4 Karate has been an ongoing favorite with children and parents for many years. Your child will learn to listen, follow directions, learn self-discipline and focus better. We also have our other popular youth programs, Archery and the Red Cross courses such as Babysitting and When I'm In Charge.

This will be our fourth year of doing the Before and After School program at the Westbrook Middle School. Do you need to drop off your children early in the morning? Each session runs for four weeks (Mon.–Fri.) at a very reasonable rate. Children may also sign up for certain days each week, at a higher cost per day.



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

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Connecticut's Mental Health Crisis



A recent assessment from the Fitch Agency revised Connecticut's bond rating outlook downward from "stable" to "negative." This negative outlook is based on delayed repayment of borrowed funds, added to already high state debt, along with unfunded pension obligations creating an unstable, vulnerable financial position for Connecticut. This warning comes on the heels of another that finds our state to be the only state in the nation without economic growth in the last two years. The message is clear - Connecticut must get serious about controlling state spending and reducing state debt.

Connecticut is currently 46th of the 50 states rated for the cost of doing business. Businesses are reluctant to invest and expand in a state where unpredictable tax policies, state mandates and high health care costs are the price of commerce. For example, the corporation tax was scheduled to expire. This is good news for businesses and consumers. However, short on operating revenue, Connecticut's majority voted to extend this tax for another two years. Is it any wonder that Sikorsky, when awarded an \$800M helicopter contract sends \$600M of this work out of state because business costs are lower and more predictable?

For as long as Connecticut delays repayment of deficit borrowing, imposes historic levels of taxation on citizens and businesses, adds to its already high debt, and spends grant money unwisely, Connecticut will remain economically vulnerable and our fiscal recovery will persist as slow and unpredictable.

Energy Committee vets Energy Programs

Over the past year the Town's Energy Committee has reviewed a number of energy programs to help residents, businesses and town facilities reduce energy costs.

Two new programs have been implemented: Connecticut Property Assessed Clean Energy (C-PACE) was approved by a vote at a Town meeting on April 30th. C-PACE is an innovative program that helps commercial, industrial and multi-family property owners access affordable, long-term financing for energy upgrades to their buildings.

C-PACE allows building owners to finance qualifying energy efficiency and clean energy improvements by placing a voluntary assessment on their property tax bill. The Town receives a grant from Connecticut's Clean Energy Finance and Investment Authority (CEFIA) to offset the cost of the program. One multi-family property owner has initiated steps to utilize C-Pace.

The second action was the approval by the Board of Selectman to opt in to the CT Clean Energy Communities program which is offered by CEFIA and the Connecticut Energy Efficiency Fund.

Westbrook has pledged to reduce municipal building energy consumption from base levels by 2018, and has invested in LED parking lot lighting to reduce energy usage to help meet the 2018 goal. The Town also committed to purchase some of our municipal buildings' energy use from renewable sources. By achieving milestones, including participation by residents and businesses, the Town can earn cash grants of \$5,000 to \$15,000 and free solar photovoltaic panels to install on town buildings.

On May 29, 2013, the Nurse's Department co-sponsored with the Senior Center an informative seminar on dementia. The keynote speaker was Dr. Jeffrey Bernstein who is an emergency room physician in the Middlesex Hospital system. Key issues discussed were the types of dementia, the causes of dementia and the prevention/treatment of dementia. A lively and educational Q&A followed. This is the first in a series of luncheon seminars that will be presented in the Westbrook Senior Center throughout the coming year.

The summer months are here and with it long, hot, humid days. It is very important to maintain good hydration during this period by drinking 6-8 cups of fluid each day. This fluid can be water, milk, juice, Gatorade, tea, coffee (in moderation), flavored water. If you experience signs of: thirst, fatigue, headache, dry, sticky mouth and tongue, dark urine, decreased urination, dizziness, confusion, falls, constipation or muscle cramping, you may be dehydrated.


With the flu season just around the corner, make a note on your calendar that we will be holding our flu clinic on November 5, 2013, in the Westbrook Senior Center.

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Westbrook Drum Corps

The Westbrook Drum Corps would like to thank all of the generous people who made their recent "Fifing for Food" drive a success. Their next big event is their 54th Annual Muster to be held in August.

The Westbrook Drum Corps muster is the 2nd oldest and 2nd largest muster of fifers and drummers in the world – yes, the WORLD! The members attempt to limit the size of the muster to about 40 invited corps. Although they may not perform at the muster, other corps come just to march in the parade which can include fifty or more corps. This year, it will truly be an international muster as two corps from Switzerland will attend, the Grainfield Fife and Drum Corps and the Swiss Mariners. Other corps attending will travel from all the New England states, New York and Delaware, and New Jersey.

The muster weekend will open on Friday evening, August 23rd at 7:00 pm with the traditional "Tattoo." Members of visiting corps will place historical flags around the perimeter of the muster field. The Junior Colonials of Westbrook will then play our National Anthem followed by a medley of tunes after which each of the Swiss corps will perform. The parade on Saturday morning, August 24th starts at 11:00, proceeds through the center of town and ends at the ball field behind the fire house. The muster will begin once the parade has concluded.

At the muster, each invited corps will march onto the muster field, perform a medley of tunes and march off. The next corps will then enter the field and do the same until all corps have had the opportunity to perform. Some corps perform in full colonial military splendor and some in the dress of the period, but all remind spectators of our early history with their music.

The Boy Scout Committee will have food and beverages for sale. Vendors will have booths displaying their wares of music related items.

Summer Precautions

The hot weather can bring on a condition called "Clam Digger's/Swimmer's/Bather's Itch." After emerging from salt water, beach bathers may show symptoms of a rash resembling insect bites with a prickly or itchy sensation. The symptoms almost always subside within 12 hours only to reappear within the next 6-12 hours as an extremely itchy rash, which usually subsides by the fifth day. The skin rash is caused by certain parasites of birds, introduced into the water from the stool of infected birds and absorbed by snails. These parasites are then released from the infected snails and migrate through the water. It is during this period that if they encounter a swimming or wading person, they may penetrate human skin. Person-toperson transmission does not occur. A vigorous rubbing with a towel immediately after leaving the water will destroy many of the parasites before they penetrate the skin.

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

Summer is here – and so is the Senior Farmer's Market Nutrition Program! The Connecticut Department of Agriculture provides low income seniors with checks that can be exchanged for eligible foods at farmers' markets.

Eligibility Guidelines: All participants must be 60 years of age or older, or under 60 and permanently disabled living in subsidized senior housing. The 2013 eligibility income guidelines are: Single person=\$21,257.00 or Couple=\$28,694.00. Clients must be participating in another program with proper means verifying their eligibility – renters rebate, food stamps etc.

Eligible Products: You may purchase CT grown fruits, vegetables, fresh cut herbs and honey.

Connecticut Social Services New On Line Access. The Connecticut Department of Social Services has a new and easy web site; clients who receive SNAP (food stamps), HUSKY, Medicaid and other benefits can now set up an online account, where you can see if you are eligible for benefits, apply for benefits and access the required redetermination forms, and get answers as to the status of your applications and more.

Also available is an interactive tool that prescreens for services, known as "Am I Eligible?" The program takes about 15 minutes to complete, asking questions to determine what services you may be eligible for.

One of the new features is being able to report changes through your online account, without having to fill out paperwork and mail it in or having to reach your DSS Social Worker. You can now access the online web site at www.connect.ct.gov/access/.

Social Security New Online Services Available with a My Social Security Account. Step 2 – Disaster Notification. Are you registered with CT ALERT to receive emergency, life safety notifications from

Westbrook Officials on your cell phone, email, Apple or Android device? Registration is free. Our website along with Facebook and Twitter are updated regularly with general, detailed information throughout the year.

If you need to evacuate from your home, have a plan to relocate to a safe location. Everyone must have an alternate location plan to stay with fam-

ily or friends, outside of the imminent danger zone. Pending on the severity of the storm, the Westbrook shelter may not be capable of supporting a public pre-storm disaster shelter. Don't wait for the last minute to evacuate. Leave 12-24 hours prior to storm landfall or as conditions change.

Step 3 – After the Storm. Use caution around your property to determine any hazards and take appropriate safety measures. Stay away from any downed wires. Do not attempt to move them with any object. Follow all safety precautions regarding perishable foods and those with well water systems. Contact your insurance and use only licensed professional contractors for repairs.

Conservation Commission

Westbrook's Student Conservation Crew Who are they and what are they doing?

The Crew: This is Brendan Gooley's 8th working for the Conservation Commission; he has just completed his first year at UConn Law School. Brian Melly joined the crew this summer; he is a junior at UCONN majoring in biology. Marty Marx has a years experience working on town open space trails as a Community Volunteer; he joined the crew this summer; he will be in the Junior class this year at Westbrook High School. The students work part time as employees of the town under the supervision of the Conservation Commission

The Conservation Crew assists the Commission with managing and controlling invasive plants on three of Westbrook's Open Space sites; Salt Island Overlook, Chapman Mill Pond and Horse Hill Woods. Primarily they are pulling and cutting Multiflora Rose, Asiatic Bittersweet and Bush Honeysuckle to prevent crowding out native plants and production of invasive plant seed. It is a constant battle. They are also maintaining trails on those open space sites to ensure they are accessible and safe.

The Crew's most visible work has been weeding and trimming over-grown native shrubs planted 10 years ago on the river bank in back of the Mulvey Community Center. Hemlock mulch has been carefully laid down throughout the disturbed and open areas areas to control the prevalent invasive Japanese knotweed, and prevent other invasive plants from establishing. Visitors now have excellent views of the beautiful Patchoug River estuary and the shore birds that fish there.

The Crew will assist the staff of the Stewart B. McKinney National Wildlife Refuge to manage and protect the nesting sites of shore birds on Westbrook's Barrier Islands; Salt Island owned by the Town of Westbrook, Menunketesuck Island,

owned by the Federal Government, and Duck Island owned by the State of Connecticut. The Islands are being managed jointly by the US Fish and Wildlife Service, CT Department of Energy and Environmental Protection, and the Westbrook Conservation Commission.

Volunteers from the recently established Friends of Westbrook's Barrier Islands will work with these agencies.

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






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
