First Selectman's Corner

Westbrook, several years ago, received state funding to encourage the development of a plan of action for energy conservation. In our regional monthly First Selectman meetings all of us made personal commitments to support the many benefits that accrue by the fostering of energy initiatives in our respective towns. Accordingly, I direct your attention to the following information that was compiled by Bill Fish a member of Westbrook's Energy Committee.

Westbrook's Energy Committee previously voted to recommend that the Town become a Clean Energy Community and the Board of Selectmen subsequently reviewed the agreement and voted to approve it. As a Clean Energy Community, Westbrook has already taken steps to reduce its energy consumption and meet its pledge. The Town has made great strides in reducing energy consumption and achieving budget savings by installing new boilers or burners to enable the schools to burn natural gas or oil, re-lamping the Town Hall and all three schools, installing new windows at the Riggio building, installing electric and hot water solar panels on the High School and upgrading school parking lot lighting to LEDs.

By becoming a Clean Energy Community, Westbrook also qualifies to receive cash grants and free solar photovoltaic panels from the Energize CT programs that are funded via surcharges on statewide electric and natural gas bills. Cash grants for energy conservation purpose are earned by the Town when enough residents participate in the Home Energy Solutions (HES) program, make their homes more energy efficient or upgrade heating and air conditioning systems. Solar panels are earned by Westbrook when residents purchase half or all of their electricity from renewable sources through the CT Clean Energy Options program or install solar panels to pro-



duce electricity (through the CT Solar Challenge program) or solar hot water. For more details on how you may participate and save money, please see the two articles in this magazine and visit the EnergizeCT.com web site.

From Abolitionists to Ice Cream?



30 Westbrook Place (North Main Street)

Pictured above is one of approximately eight remaining historic properties in Westbrook's town center. While most old homes have an interesting tale to tell, it might be of interest to know that this house was built by a group of abolitionists who separated from their mother church because they felt unable to speak freely against the common use of slaves.

Back in February, 1846, prior to the Civil War, Edward B. Lay, Josiah C. Dibble, Horace Butler, William Dibble, William Wright, Sarah Butler, Louisa Dibble, James A. Chapman and Harriet Chapman petitioned the First Ecclesiastical Society for "dismission" from the church. This small group of people believed that they could not effectively speak of their antislavery beliefs within the context of the church's stance at that time. In June, 1847, the newly-formed Second Ecclesiastical Society purchased this property from Jared A. and Andrew B. Spencer and focused on building a new house of worship which continued for about ten years. By 1856, ten members of the Society were unanimously readmitted into the "Congregational Church."

By 1867, the house's ownership was transferred out of the church's hands to private owners. Over the years, it has been home to some and a business address to others. Its walls have witnessed the highly charged discussion of human dignity to the value of antiques to the pure delights of an American favorite...ICE CREAM!

News from Westbrook Social Services

Renters Rebate Program

The Town of Westbrook is accepting applications for the State of Connecticut's Renter's Tax Relief (Renters' Rebate) Program. The Renters' Rebate Program runs from April 1, 2014 to October 1, 2014. Due to the high volume of applications for this program, residents interested in applying must do so by appointment only. Walk-ins cannot be accommodated.

The state program provides a one-time yearly reimbursement for Connecticut renters based on income, rent and utilities that were paid from the previous year (2013). The program is available to residents age 65 or older as of December 31, 2013, or residents at least age 18 by December 31, 2013 who have been found by a government agency to be permanently and totally disabled. Income must be no more than \$34,101 for single individuals or \$41,600 for married couples.

Persons renting an apartment or room, or living in cooperative housing or a mobile home may be eligible for this program.

CRT Winter Heating Assistance Program

The Connecticut Energy Assistance Program is designed to help offset the winter heating costs of Connecticut's lower income households, specifically those households whose incomes fall at or below the federal poverty guidelines.

On behalf of eligible households, the winter heating assistance pays for such heating sources as oil, natural gas, electricity, propane, kerosene, coal and wood.

Homeowners and renters may apply. Households eligible for the winter heating program may also be eligible to receive weatherization assistance. This can help conserve energy and lower heating bills.

The Connecticut Energy Assistance is administered by the Department of Social Services and coordinated by regional Community Action Agencies, in cooperation with municipal and other non-profit human service agencies.

Applications will be taken by appointment only. Interested Westbrook residents may call Westbrook Social Services at 860-399-3040 (ext.154) for general information.

Appointments will be accepted October 15th, 2014 through March 13th, 2015.

If It Sounds Too Good To Be True, It Probably Is

Telephone and mail offers come from different electric companies and they came often; promising big savings. Many people have decided to make the switch hoping for a good deal.

Deregulation in 2000 opened the door to third party suppliers and there are dozens of electric companies operating in CT. They provide options beyond the default companies already operating in CT - CL&P and United Illuminating. Some of these companies offer green energy options while others promise savings. According to the Public Utilities Regulatory Authority, since deregulation, as of May 2014, 48 percent of customers in the state had switched to a third party supplier. Consumer advocates warn it's a buyer beware marketplace.

Any one company can have several options, and sorting through them can be very confusing. In some cases, a supplier will have a fixed rate that consumers can expect. Others will offer teaser rates that last from one to several months, but then those rates can vary after those initial offers expire. Some companies are completely variable, allowing for the potential for large swings in rates.

Customers may get a short term savings, but if in the long term it takes you a few months to realize your rate has basically doubled, any short term savings you've seen is easily eaten up.

Many consumer inquiries about this situation revolve around a tactic known as bait and switch – lure customers with low teaser rates, only to have those rates spike later.

Lawmakers in CT are considering several new regulations to protect consumers. One would require all electric suppliers to give customers three weeks advance written notice if their electric generation rate is about to go up.

In order to be proactive, should you decide to switch suppliers, be sure to write down the expiration date of the introductory rate and check your monthly bill faithfully.

Drilling Down On Drones

The legislature's Program Review and Investigations Committee (PRI) has voted to study current and potential drone use regulation in Connecticut. Drones – unmanned aircraft, which are also referred to as unmanned aircraft systems (UAS) or unmanned aerial vehicles (UAV) – are an area of emerging use, availability and interest. Drones are operated via remote-control using radio frequencies, but can also be operated semi-autonomously via internal computer.

Up until recently, drones have been most closely associated with military use for com-

bat, surveillance, and reconnaissance. However, potential government, commercial and personal applications are under current consideration. Federal drone regulation is presently administered by the Federal Aviation Authority. The FAA anticipates that by 2030, there will be 30,000 public and private drones flying in U.S. airspace. This anticipated proliferation has raised issues regarding drone



use including privacy concerns (the use of drones for surveillance activities), safety issues (drone interference with manned aircraft), and commercial activity uses.

The Program Review and Investigations Committee's study will analyze the following:

- Examine drone use in commercial, governmental, law enforcement, emergency response, personal and criminal activities
- Identify privacy, safety and security issues and concerns related to drone use
- Describe current federal and state drone use regulations
- Determine if and what drone use regulation could be necessary in Connecticut The PRI study will commence this Fall.

A Note About Signage In Town

between economic and aesthetic values is a challenge.

Please do not assume that a permit issued for one sign means all the other signs are in conformance.

What you need to know before purchasing signs for your business.

DO:

- Get an approved Zoning Permit for your sign through the Town's Zoning Department.
- · Have a sign contractor get a building permit for installation. To determine if a Building Permit is required, contact the Building Department at: 860-399-3047.
- Visit the Town's Website or email, call or visit the Zoning Department with any sign-related questions.

DO NOT:

- Install signs without obtaining a permit.
- Place signs or sandwich boards in the public right-of-way.
- Put up banners, pennants, streamers, or other animated signs.
- Place signs at locations other than the property on which the business is located.

The Sign Regulations can be found in Section 10.20.00 of the Zoning Regulations and are available on the web at: http://west brookct.us/Docs/zoning/Zoning%20regs%2004-19-2013.pdf.

Each Zoning District within the Town of Westbrook has different allowable size and types of signs. To verify zoning

> Signs may not move, blink or draw attention through any form of movement. Internally lit signs are not permitted in any district, except the TIC-65.

> Sandwich board or "A" frame signs require a bi-yearly Portable/Temporary sign permit.

Some signs are not allowed in every Zoning District.

While these services are valued at an average of \$1,000, the cost for the HES service is only \$99 and is free for those who meet income eligibility guidelines. The average home in Connecticut saves \$200 on energy costs each year after completing the HES service. Residents that take advantage of rebates and payment plans for heating and cooling equipment, insulation, ENERGY STAR® appliances, and advanced air sealing can save even more.

Westbrook will earn points for every resident and business that participates in Energize Connecticut programs such as HES or Small Business Energy Advantage. For every 100 points earned, Westbrook will qualify for a \$5,000 cash grant to be used towards an energy saving project at a school or town building.

Tropical Storm – Hurricane Preparedness

The Town of Westbrook and the entire southern New England region encounter the highest probability of a tropical storm or hurricane annually from August 15th through November 1st. We want to ensure you have the resources to be prepared. As noted with the past Tropical Storms (Irene and Sandy), each storm caused damage for many residents and forced wires down resulting in no power for 4-8 days. When electricity is disrupted you will lose TV, telephone and Internet services. With severe damage, cell sites can also experience disruption too. Tropical Storms produce sustained winds of 39-73 mph. Hurricane wind speeds range from 74 to over 155 mph. Both storms will produce heavy, long periods of rain and storm surge damage to the coastline. Preparedness actions, before the storm on your part include:



• Awareness of Westbrook Notifications

Appropriate Disaster Plan/Kit: 5-7 Days. Every household needs to have an appropriate Disaster Plan in place that includes you leaving your residence and temporarily relocating. Storm surge and flooding is common for residents located south of the Boston Post Road, adjacent areas near the Menunketesuck River and Jensens/Green Acres mobile home parks. In other areas of the town, residents need to be aware of falling trees due to the extreme winds. Emergency services (Police-Fire-Ambulance) are suspended when sustained winds are 45 mph or greater.

We recommend you have a plan in place to evacuate prior to the storm's arrival; going to family, friends or consider staying at a local hotel. If you have no other option, Westbrook or other towns will open a pre-storm disaster shelter. After the storm has passed and when it's safe, residents can return to their home. If needed, Westbrook will open a post storm disaster shelter.

Disaster Kits are essential to your survival when there is no power for more than 24 hours. Everyone needs to have an appropriate kit that contains suitable food, water, along with other important items (medication, infant supplies) to last at least 5-7 days. Disaster Kits are not just for weather events throughout the year. They can be used for other disaster events that can affect Westbrook.

Town Notifications. Westbrook Emergency Management works closely with State and Federal agencies, including the National Weather Service when a storm is forecast to impact our

area. We highly recommend you follow our website and social media sites on Facebook and/or Twitter. These sites are uploaded regularly with Westbrook preparedness, warnings and post storm restoration events. In extreme circumstances we can notify you via the CT ALERT System, with brief, concise information.

Where Do I Get More Information? The Westbrook Emergency Management website, www.westbrookem.com will provide you with complete information on disaster preparedness topics. The site also includes topics on disaster shelters, CL&P restoration, food safety, pets, elderly, special needs and more. The website is outfitted with videos and written material for downloading to a printer. Options also include viewing the web site in different languages. If you need access to a computer,

please visit the Westbrook Library at 61 Goodspeed Drive.

We don't have the power to stop a weather related event; however you have resources to become resilient, which will help you and your family. By following our recommendations, you will be prepared for almost any disaster that can affect the Town of Westbrook throughout the year.

Valley Shore YMCA





There's a bit of a growth spurt going on this summer at Valley Shore YMCA, and it's got nothing to do with biceps, quadriceps, or even the teens on our swim team. No, this summer's growth is of the leafy variety; as in summer squash, supersonic tomatoes, kale and green beans.

"When people think of the YMCA, it's all about gym and swim," said Chris Pallatto, YMCA Executive Director, as he stood in front of several freshly planted rows of veggies running alongside the YMCA facility on Spencer Plains Road. "But our mission is deeper than that: we're about making our community healthier, and what better way to do that than by starting a community garden."

Dubbed "Partner To Grow," the idea for a community garden sprouted in 2013 when the YMCA conducted a series of focus groups with its most active members to determine what they felt was the largest community need where the YMCA could play the most impactful role.

"Overwhelmingly, the participants wanted to create a community garden," says Lisa LeMonte, a YMCA Board member. "Feeding those in need was something they felt passionately about. So we decided we'd donate the harvest to the Shoreline Soup Kitchens and Pantries location at St. Mark's Roman Catholic Church."

The idea took hold faster than a patch of wild raspberries. Before long, the rows had been furrowed and local businesses had stepped up to contribute supplies. The Westbrook Foundation dug deep with a grant for irrigation and deer fencing.

"It has been truly inspirational to see how many people are passionate about helping feed those most in need," Pallatto said. "Our first harvesting day in June yielded a plate of jalapenos and some cilantro. Our weekly harvests now are well over 100 pounds and we can't wait to see what next year brings!"

The Committee will also unveil final plans for the next phase of the Town Center Parking Project on the town property at the corner of Route 1 and Westbrook Place.



Registrars of Voters

The State Election will be held on Tuesday, November 4, at the Mulvey Municipal Center, 866 Boston Post Road, Westbrook, CT in the Multi-Purpose room from 6:00 am to 8:00 pm. Assembly District 23 and Assembly District 35 will vote at this location in their separate Voting Districts.

If you are not a registered voter, you may get an application at the Registrar's or Town Clerk's Office. The regularly scheduled Registrar's Office hours are Tuesdays from 11:00 am - 1:00 pm, and Thursdays from 5:00 pm - 7:00 pm. You may also call to make an appointment at 860-399-3042.

A reminder to all registered voters – Please inform the Registrars if you have had any change of name, address, telephone number, or want to change your party affiliation. It is important that we have your most current information for our records so that your right to vote is not compromised.

Any registered voter on the active list, if unable to vote in person, may vote by absentee ballot for one of the following reasons: 1) absence from the town during all hours of voting, 2) illness, 3) physical disability, 4) active service in the U.S. Armed Forces, 5) religious tenets which forbid secular activity on the official's usual place of voting during all hours of voting. Absentee ballots are available only from the Town Clerk beginning on the 31st day before an election and the 21st day before a primary, upon application properly made, either in person or by mail to the Town Clerk.






Area Closed To Protect Nesting Birds

Signs have been posted on Westbrook's Salt Island notifying residents and visitors that an area of the Island is closed to human activity to protect the nests of Common Terns and Oyster Catchers which nested there for the first time in 2013. The **AREA CLOSED TO PROTECT NESTING BIRDS** is a small plateau of grasses, poison ivy and shrubs and the supporting rocky framework immediately around it.

During nesting season, late May through August, the swooping, diving and very vocal Common Terns warn visitors that they have nests on the Island, but do not say where their nests are. The signs do, letting people know where the nests are located and that the area is restricted to protect the nests, eggs and chicks.

Tern nests are difficult to detect; generally a loose assembly of dead vegetation on ground making them difficult to see before stepping on them. The olive to buff eggs, marked with numerous small spots and blotches of dark brown, adds to the nests camouflage. The downy chicks can walk but tend to stay on the loose nest, taking close to 4 weeks to fledge (fly). Chicks would not be likely to avoid a missed placed foot.

Enforcement of the **AREA CLOSED** designation will be relatively passive, at least for this nesting season. Fencing around the small plateau is being planned, and Island Keepers will be periodically on the Island to encourage visitors to help protect nesting shore birds and answer questions about the Island and the bird population.
