

First Selectman's Corner

This is the second edition of the Woodbridge Events quarterly magazine. I hope you are enjoying it and finding it informative. As time passes we hope more town organizations will use this format to inform residents of their activities.

2012 was a year of progress in Woodbridge – here are a few highlights.

Country Club of Woodbridge - A three-year agreement was signed with Billy Casper Golf to manage the golf course, tennis courts, and the pool. The new management has worked diligently to improve the course, the tennis courts, and upgraded the services at the pool. The pool saw an overwhelming uptick in use. Residents and organizations took advantage of the new dining tent for many fun-filled events. The Country Club of Woodbridge Commission and Billy Casper Golf expect a banner year. For further information contact the Country Club of Woodbridge at 203-387-2278 or the website countryclubofwoodbridge.com.

Natural Gas Line – The natural gas line was extended from the Jewish Community Center on Amity Road to Amity High School, Town Center Buildings, and Beecher Road School. The Church of Our Lady of Assumption, The First Church of Christ, and Congregation B'nai Jacob have also contracted with the Gas Company. In addition citizens residing along the initial line installation are connecting to bring natural gas into their homes. This installation is part of the Town's commitment to a greener environment in Woodbridge. The Board of Selectmen continue to meet with representatives



of the Southern Connecticut Gas Company to encourage extension of the lines in Woodbridge.

Clean Energy – In conjunction with the installation of the natural gas line, the Town continues to seek avenues to expand the community clean energy program. I signed the Clean Energy Communities Municipal Pledge, one of 31 Connecticut towns, extending the Town's official commitment to improve its energy efficiency and promote the use of renewable energy sources. Under the original Clean Energy program we installed a 5kW solar photovoltaic system at the Massaro Community Farm and worked with the Regional School District to install a 4kW array at the Amity High School.

Public Works Facility – Construction on the new public works facility is expected to begin in the Spring of 2013. The approved design will incorporate many energy savings and use of "green" material – from special low voltage lighting, to energy efficient Lucite walls, to innovative use of space. Facility offices now scattered across the Town campus will consolidate into the new building.

Beecher Road School – The Building Committee formed in 2011 has worked diligently to prepare plans for the phase-in renovations to the energy envelope and HVAC system at Beecher Road School. A presentation of the proposed plan was presented to the Boards of Finance and Selectman on January 23rd. We all look forward to making Beecher Road School energy efficient, greener, and environmentally safe for our children.

Flooding Along West River – The flooding along West River has long been a problem for residents on Litchfield Turnpike. Through the efforts of the West River Restoration and Mitigation Committee, the Department of Environmental Protection, the Connecticut Fund for the Environment and with the help of the Army Corp of Engineers, the Town has been working to alleviate the problem with the removal of the Pond Lily Dam. The Connecticut Fund for the Environment has received a \$60,000 grant for the design of the removal of the Dam and is applying for additional grants to fund the removal. Also, the long-awaited construction of the new Merritt Avenue Bridge is scheduled to begin in 2013.

Route 15 Interchange Entrance/exit 59 – Everyone traveling south along Route 69 and Route 63 during the morning and evening commute has experienced the frustration of the traffic congestion in that area. The Town, Connecticut DOT, and municipal advocacy organizations are working with a professional design and engineering firm to alleviate the problem. The ideas include new/redesigned entrance and exit ramps, widening of portions of route 69, and turning lanes. We will keep you updated on the progress for the solution.

Events – On September 23, 2012 the Town celebrated the 150 anniversary of the Emancipation Proclamation with a commemoration of the Civil War. Several Town groups participated. On November 11, 2012 the Town paid homage to the veterans that have left home to serve in the military for the protection and defense of our Country. On December 23, 2012 we all came together in an interfaith vigil in grief and memory of the children and adults slain in Newtown in a senseless tragedy. My remarks given at each of these events are found elsewhere in this publication.

On behalf of the Board of Selectmen, I wish you and your family a peaceful and happy 2013.

Memorial Service for Dr. Robert Gregg

Memorial Service for Dr. Robert Greeg on December 15, 2012

As we celebrate the life of Dr. Robert Gregg who lived a full and caring life for 94 years, let us pause to remember the 20 students ages 5 to 10 and 6 adults at the Sandy Hook Elementary School in Newtown who lost their lives in the tragic event of yesterday.

Most of my interaction with Dr. Robert (Bob) Gregg was as a member of the Woodbridge Board of Selectmen. Bob was a champion for Woodbridge. As President of the Woodbridge Land Trust, he worked diligently and quietly behind the scenes to preserve tracts of open space not just for current but for future generations. His efforts have helped to make Woodbridge one of the jewels in New Haven County.

Bob was involved in the American Chestnut Foundation and through his efforts a portion of the Fitzgerald Tract has been set aside for the cultivation of chestnut trees.

Bob was an active member of the Woodbridge Recreation Fitness Center. At age 93, Bob met with the Selectmen to stress the importance of the facility to the citizens, the need for increased space, and presented to the Selectmen a design for equipment placement when the Fitness Center will be moved to the renovated old firehouse a move that he supported.

Bob and his wife Jean invited Ellie and me to the celebration of their 50th wedding anniversary in your Parish House. Bob was proud of his Scottish heritage and looked resplendent in his kilt.

Bob continued his interest in Woodbridge to the very end. I last met with Bob at Town Hall just before Election Day. Bob wanted to check on the status of the relocation of the Fitness Center to the old fire house. Bob also supported the Town's purchase of the Woodbridge Country Club. During the fall, he attended several meetings of the Country Club of Woodbridge Commission.

Woodbridge is a wonderful community to live in - a community strengthened by the dedication of its volunteers of which Dr. Robert Gregg was a quiet and important member. He will be missed - but his legacy for open space and the environment will live on for generations of Woodbridge residents.

Woodbridge Recipient of a Small Cities Grant

Woodbridge is recipient of a Small Cities Grant for the third year in a row.

Woodbridge First Selectman, Edward Maum Sheehy is pleased to announce that the Town has received its third Small Cities Residential Rehabilitation Grant of \$300,000. These funds are made available by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) and are administered at the State level by the Department of Economic and Community Development (DECD).

Eligibility for the program is based on annual household income and loan to value ratio for the property to determine the availability of equity which is considered when determining maximum loan amounts. These funds are offered as deferred loans with 0% interest and require no payment until a transfer of title, the Owner's demise, or the subject property is no longer the applicant's principal place of residence.

Some of the work that may be eligible for funding includes the correction of health and safety violations, code compliance, roofing, carpentry, electrical work, painting, plumbing, heating, and other non-luxury work subject to approval of the Town.

Expansion - Natural Gas Lines

Remarks by First Selectman Edward Maum Sheehy Amity Regional High School Expansion of Natural Gas Lines

I welcome Governor Malloy and Commissioner Esty to Woodbridge

I want to publically thank Governor Malloy for the \$500,000 STEAP Grant Woodbridge recently received to renovate our police station and the \$300,000 Small Cities Grant for home rehabilitation.

Today, we focus on natural gas expansion to Woodbridge. This concept began as a suggestion by Dr. Bill Silberberg, a Woodbridge resident, retired pediatrician and former member of the Amity Board of Education to extend the natural gas service from the Jewish Community Center on Amity Road to the Center of Woodbridge to provide the Town with cheaper, cleaner, and more efficient source of energy.

Bill met with me and we then met with Val Ferro of the Southern Connecticut Gas Company and other town representatives and Southern Connecticut Gas agreed to extend the gas line. Construction began in June and was completed in August at no cost to any Town residents or entities. Service/s extended to the meter on the building. All work inside the building is the responsibility of the owner.

As a result, natural gas is now flowing here at Amity High School and will in the next few months be energizing our Town Center, the Town Hall, Library, Police Station, Firehouse, Center Building, Beecher Road School and our new Public Works facility which will begin construction in the spring. As a further result, the Town will realize substantial savings in energy costs.

In addition, 31 resident customers along the gas line have agreed to switch to natural gas. There are 50 others

who are eligible. Also our Lady of Assumption Church (Father Gianelli, Matt Giglietti and Andy Esposito are here) Congregation B'nai Jacob and the Congregational Church will be converting to natural gas.

I would like to thank Joe Hellauer, the Town's Administrative Officer for serving as the project coordinator for this gas line extension.

I would also like to mention to our friends from the Southern Connecticut Gas that I have received numerous requests from Woodbridge residents to further extend the gas line. I would request and encourage Southern Connecticut Gas to extend the gas line and hope that we can discuss this in the near future.

Finally, in response to the increased number of storms and weather events impacting power supply, Commissioner Esty has proposed among other strategies developing micro grids for critical facilities throughout the state. A micro grid is a self-contained underground power grid with an independent power source for a select group of properties.

Woodbridge was selected by UI as one of two towns in the UI coverage area because of its rural setting, compact town center and natural gas service for a possible location for a micro grid. Woodbridge is currently preparing a project feasibility application to the DEEP for a Micro Grid. Funding for the generation portion is yet to be determined.

We welcome Governor Malloy and Commissioner Esty and support their efforts to reduce energy costs and promote clean energy in our state.

Many Jewish residents of Woodbridge have contributed to the quality of life here by taking an active part in Town Government, Nan Birdwhistell and Roger Harrison have served as our First Selectmen and countless others have served on various Town boards and Commissions making Woodbridge a better place for all of us to live.

Tonight, we salute the Jewish Community Center which moved to Woodbridge in 1993 and immediately became an important thread in the fabric of our community opening its doors to all and providing a variety of programs for the entire family to enjoy. The Community Center has been a good neighbor and was quick to step forward to assist the Town and its residents as it did in 2011 when the Community Center opened its doors to provide for personal services during the unprecedented destruction of Hurricane Irene. In this regard, I would like to thank Scott Cohen, the Executive Director for his co-operation and assistance with the town during these recent storms.

Tonight, we congratulate the Jewish Community Center of Greater New Haven, its Board of Directors and Staff on its 100th Birthday. We look forward to another hundred years of service to our community.

The Connecticut General Assembly

In the historic Senate Chamber and Hall of the House on January 9th, members of the Connecticut General Assembly were sworn in for the new two-year term. I was grateful and proud to be among them. The ceremonies signal the start of a new legislative session and renewal of our biennial state budget cycle: to a great extent Opening Day pageantry belies the hard work and difficult choices ahead.

As a state we remain shaken by the horror visited upon Newtown's Sandy Hook Elementary School last month. As we slowly regain our composure we must seize the opportunity to revisit questions and issues prompted by the tragedy. In many ways, the eyes of the nation will be focused upon Hartford for our state's response.

Issues surrounding gun ownership, access, and safety will be paramount, as will a discussion of school security. Each of these alone has the potential for passionate debate: public safety vs. personal freedoms on the one hand - how and whether or not to fortify public schools on the other.

The tragedy also shines a bright light on mental health issues in Connecticut. As this session unfolds we will review and reassess screening and diagnostic procedures, accommodations, treatment, and insurance coverage for those with mental illness. My pledge is to continue working toward parity between mental health and physiological health in all our policies regarding public health.

As mentioned, this session will also yield a new, two-year budget for our state, which may be more challenging than usual as a result of a continuing economic malaise. With job creation and support for Connecticut businesses our priority, and with pressing needs in policy areas across-the-board, there will be tough competition to determine how and where limited funds are appropriated.

A reassuring sense of bipartisanship was pervasive at the Capitol on Opening Day, I think in part because we were united recently in our reaction to unspeakable violence in our state and a realization we share that we cannot allow comparable events to become commonplace. Likewise, we also share a commitment to do all we can - and the best we can - to help Connecticut and its residents realize their full potential.

I have always enjoyed productive working relationships with lawmakers from each chamber and each political party. My hope is that all of us sworn in January 9th remain committed to that ideal going forward.

Interfaith Vigil – December 23, 2012

Just three months ago to the day, we came together as a community in this very place to commemorate the Civil War and the 150th Anniversary of the Emancipation Proclamation and to honor 61 men and boys from Woodbridge who served in the Union Army 12 of whom gave their lives.

Today, we along with many other towns across the state, return to remember the victims of the senseless tragedy - 20 students ages 6 and 7 and 6 women educators who tried to protect them who lost their lives in the tragic events of December 14 at the Sandy Hook Elementary School in Newtown. We also gather in sympathy and support of the families of the victims and in support of the first responders and the entire Newtown community.

Woodbridge is a smaller community - but in spirit - similar to Newtown. We treasure our children, support our educators, and are thankful for the diligence of our first responders.

During this past week, I met with Woodbridge Superintendent of Schools, Dr. Guy Stella and Police Chief Gene Marcucci, to review the security procedures at the Beecher Road School. Woodbridge Police Officer Vincent Lynch who is also the DARE Officer will be assigned to the Beecher Road School for the duration of the school year. Dr. Stella has distributed to the parents of the Beecher Road School children information on school security, how the faculty and staff will address the tragic events at the Sandy Hook Elementary School and how parents can listen and talk to their children, and help them express their feelings during this difficult time.

The thoughts and prayers of all the citizens of Woodbridge go out to the people of Newtown with heartfelt sympathy as we all move through this period of grief into a time of healing.

Ours is a country of hope which has a history of facing tragedy and becoming better for it. As we pray for the victims and their families, let us also pray each in our own way for our elected officials both state and federal and encourage them that they may come together to take action that this tragedy will not happen again.

With us this afternoon are Senior Pastor Miles Ahrens of Trinity Evangelical Free Church; Bishop Adam Brinkerhoff of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints; Rabbi Joel Levenson of Congregation B'nai Jacob; Father Gene Gianelli, Pastor of Our Lady of the Assumption; Tom Kenefick, Selectman and Woodbridge Fire Association Chaplain; and Reverend Sarah E. Penn-Strah of the First Church of Christ Woodbridge. They will lead us in prayer and offer words of spiritual guidance.

Quinnipiack Valley Health District (QVHD)

Many town residents do not know that they have a health department that serves their town. QVHD is the public health department for the town of Woodbridge. Its mission is to protect the residents of Woodbridge from disease, injury and environmental hazards through prevention, education, enforcement and collaboration with other town and state departments. The mission is accomplished through:

- Environmental health services that insure compliance with state and local laws, regulations and ordinances;
- Systematic identification of community health concerns and risks;
- Preventive services for early control and identification of disease;
- Provision of current, credible information to promote healthy behavior choices;
- Local and regional emergency preparedness for response to an unexpected environmental or biological event;
- Collaboration with local and state government leaders in setting health priorities.

Opportunities and Requirements

Free Radon Testing Kits: Woodbridge residents may receive a free radon testing kit by calling or emailing the health district. Note: You will need to pick up at the QVHD office, 1151 Hartford Turnpike, North Haven CT, 06473. The kit can't be mailed. Call or email your request for a kit.

Pertussis Vaccinations Offered: You can protect the infant you care about by protecting yourself against pertussis. QVHD offers the pertussis vaccine (in the form of Tdap-tetanus, diphtheria and pertussis) to parents, grandparents, aunts, uncles, babysitters and other caregivers or contacts of newborns and infants 12 months and younger. If you are over age 18 and have never had a Tdap vaccine, (a combined booster immunization containing tetanus, diphtheria and pertussis protection) you are eligible to receive this vaccine. A \$10.00 administration fee is requested. No one will be turned away for lack of ability to pay this fee. Immunization clinics are held every 4-6 weeks. Call or visit QVHD on line for dates and times. Vaccinations are given at the QVHD office.

Healthy Homes Assessment: Woodbridge residents are eligible to receive a free Healthy Homes assessment. This assessment is an inspection done in your home by a sanitarian. He/she will walk with you through your house to help you identify things that can be made healthier or safer, explain the findings to you and leave you with written information to help you make improvements. Many of these things are low cost, good practices. A 90-day follow up visit by the sanitarian will be planned to see how the improvement process is going and if you have made any of the suggested changes. If the sanitarian finds any violations of the CT Public Health Code or any other CT law during the inspection, the homeowner will receive a Notice of Violation to make the necessary corrections within a reasonable amount of time.

Putting On Airs (POA): If anyone in your household has been diagnosed with asthma, QVHD also participates in a program call "Putting on Airs." For this program, a sanitarian and an asthma educator will assess your home for asthma triggers and provide guidance for improvements. Some protective supplies may also be available. Violations of the CT Public Health Code or any other CT law will be handled as outlined above.

Planning a food event that will serve food to the public? If yes, you need to obtain a temporary food permit. This will help protect your group from the consequences of a foodborne outbreak among attendees. Groups such as community organizations, churches or other groups including schools that plan to hold an event that will sell or serve food to the general public must obtain a TEMPORARY FOOD SERVICE PERMIT from QVHD. Examples include bazaars, community picnics, strawberry festivals, fairs or any fundraising event where food is served to the public. Two weeks time is required to process the permit, so be sure to plan ahead! Such permits are required under the Connecticut Public Health Code for food service to public groups. Failure to obtain a permit may result in the shutting down of your event. Proper food handling, cooking and storage are essential for preventing food- borne illness. For safe food handling information and/or an application for a temporary food service permit, call QVHD, 203-248-4528 or visit our web site, www.gvhd.org

Recipe Corner

From the Tax Office:

CHERRY CREAM PUFF RING 10 – 12 servings

1 cup water

- 1/2 cup butter or margarine
- 1 cup all purpose flour
- 4 eggs

1 cup milk

- 3/4 cup dairy sour cream
- 1 pkg. Vanilla instant pudding & pie filling
- 1 can cherry pie filling

Heat over to 400°F. Heat water and butter to boiling in a 1 qt. saucepan; stir in flour. Stir vigorously until mixture forms a ball, about 1 minute. Remove from heat. Add eggs; beat until smooth. Drop dough by tablespoonfuls

onto greased baking sheet to form an 8" ring. Smooth with spatula. Bake until puffed and golden, 50-60 minutes. Cool ring. Cut off top with sharp knife and pull out any soft dough. Beat milk, sour cream, dry pudding mix and extract in small bowl on low speed until blended, about 1 minute. Fill cream puff ring with pudding mixture and spoon 1 cup of the cherry pie filling onto pudding. Replace top of cream puff ring and spoon remaining cherry filling on top. Refrigerate until serving time. Sprinkle with confectioner's sugar before serving.

NOTE: To form ring, place an 8" round pan on baking sheet and trace around it. Drop dough inside the circle

AARF - Amity Animal Rescue Fund

While volunteering at the municipal animal shelter in 2007 resident Cheryl Lipson noticed there was not a separate room designated for cats that found their way to animal control. They were instead housed in a few cages that were off a busy hallway leading to the dog kennels.

As a caretaker of a number of felines herself, Lipson felt the small space was too stressful for the cats, which would affect their adoption potential.

With the assistance of several building suppliers, an architect and Woodbridge town officials, she managed to create a cat room for the shelter from donations creating the space where unused outdoor storage once stood.

Lipson's next step was to work with the animal control officers to try and help as many animals as possible who came through the door of the shelter.

That was the creation of the Amity Animal Rescue Fund (AARF) in 2008.

Registered as a 501c3 nonprofit organization, the group is compiled of a small dedicated group of volunteers from Bethany, Orange, Prospect and Woodbridge who work with the shelter as well as area residents to provide spay/neuter services, (the very successful 'Spay/Neuter Now' program), at a discounted fee, assist with medical care when possible and work with the shelter in an attempt to find homes for animals.

The group works with other rescue groups to trap, spay/neuter and release feral cats. In addition to being sterilized, these cats receive a rabies inoculation before they are released. AARF has had the help of a local boy scout troop to create 'igloo' type shelters for cat colonies.

AARF has received assistance and support from an area veterinarian practice to sponsor rabies/micro chip clinics annually in the surrounding communities for anyone looking to immunize their companion animal at a reduced rate. (A few goats have even taken advantage of these clinics).

A 'Good Dog Rewards' program is another AARF creation. This service encourages people to adopt shelter dogs. Anyone adopting a canine from a shelter who takes and completes a basic obedience class is eligible to receive \$50 off the cost of the class.

Several area schools have helped AARF with food drives which are then distributed to the shelter and residents in the community needing assistance in caring for their companion animals.

Two major fund raising events have seen local and state dignitaries as well as celebrities attend and praise AARF's efforts within the community. AARF has been recognized by the American Red Cross for its work on behalf of animals. In 2010 AARF was named an American Red Cross Hero of the Year.

AARF received a grant from the Orange Lions Club which was used to promote Humane Education month at the Case Memorial Library.

The volunteers have also sponsored a speaker's series for the community with topics ranging from "Help! There's a Raccoon in my Chimney!"... and Other Unexpected Wildlife Problems to Dog Bites and Basic First Aid for Small Animals.

AARF's mission statement: "To prevent animal cruelty by providing medical care, spay-neuter services, food and placement assistance for stray and abandoned animals in Bethany, Orange, Woodbridge and surrounding communities."

There is much more that needs to be done before there are 'no more homeless pets'. AARF is making small strides in that direction. They are grateful for each life that is saved through their efforts. Report From the Woodbridge Land Trust

Chestnut Orchard on the Fitzgerald Property

The American Chestnut was once the dominate tree in eastern forests. Before succumbing to a devastating blight, the American Chestnut accounted for one quarter of eastern hardwood trees, ranging from Maine to Georgia and into the Ohio Valley.

In cooperation with the American Chestnut Foundation, the Trust is proud to host one of only seven Chestnut research orchards in Connecticut. In 2006, the Trust planted approximately 400 trees with the goal of producing blight resistant trees that would be used to repopulate the species. Six years later, the trees have grown considerably and many show some signs of having been exposed to fungal spores that still remain in the environment from the original blight.

We expect to complete the process within two years. When the surviving trees begin to produce nuts, we hope to distribute them locally, with planting instructions, to reestablish the American Chestnut in Woodbridge. The orchard is located at the Fitzgerald Walking Trails. Please stop by the orchard and see the trees.








