Branford Economic Development Commission

At its April meeting the Branford Economic Development Commission presented **Pat Munger Construction, Co.** with its "Business Recognition Award". The EDC periodically



presents the award to a Branford business that is a leader in its field and that contributes to making Branford a better place to live and work.

Founded in 1968, **Munger Construction** is a leader in commercial construction along the shoreline. In 1992

Other development projects underway include the expansion of Stony Creek Brewery's production capacity, American Polyfilm, Inc.'s new state-of-the-art advanced manufacturing facility on Route 1, and medical device manufacturer **DefibTech** move into town.

We are also looking forward to marketing and business consultants Acara Partners arriving at its new town center location at the corner of Main Street and Harrison Streets, as well as to Polished Boutique's expansion into the former Merle Norman Cosmetics space next to Home Restaurant. And on the heels of the success of the 4th annual Branford Restaurant Week, Café Fiore has joined Branford's stellar array of restaurants at its new location on East Main Street. Brian's Hope – Stopping the Progression of ALD

Newborn Screening for Adrenoleukodystrophy is Saving Lives in Connecticut

All babies born in CT hospitals are screened for 52 selected genetic and metabolic disorders, usually within the first 48 hours of life. Now ALD is included in that list. The CT Department of Health implemented newborn screening for ALD in October 2015. In January, our first CT baby with ALD was identified. Because ALD is genetic and passed to boys from their mothers, this infant's 2-year-old brother was tested a few weeks later. He too tested positive for ALD. There is a silver lining here. With early detection, treatment can be promptly initiated to prevent complications and irreversible problems. The children will be monitored and cared for according to an established protocol. These words are from parents Autumn and Sam Ford, "It's news we didn't want to hear. A reality we didn't want...but since it is our reality, we are thankful we got the news. Our boys have ALD. This is our life now. And we have a fighting chance because of the screening. We are blessed it was added to the newborn screening." It was bittersweet to have the diagnoses, but at the same time very rewarding to know the system is working and lives will be saved.

Brian's Hope has been working towards this for several years. New York and Connecticut are the only states currently testing for ALD. New York has identified over 40 infants since January 2014, which does not include other family members who might be affected. California will begin screening in June. However, this is not good enough. All US babies should be tested.

In an effort to realize that goal, there is currently a federal bill proposed in DC. New York Senator Schumer introduced the bill in March:

Senate bill S.2641 and House of Representatives bill H.R.4692. We encourage all of our supporters to reach out to CT Senators Blumenthal and Murphy, as well as your local representatives, to ask them to sign on and co-sponsor this bill. Please tell them that there is a reliable screening process, and with early detection we can treat ALD. Time is of the essence; we need to pass this bill out of the Health Committees to keep the process moving. Sending

Assessor's Office

This is a gentle reminder that the Town of Branford is currently in the process of doing building permit inspections for the **Grand List of October 1st, 2016.** In order to complete this process we are doing a great deal of field work and inspections.

You most likely will see individuals in the field working on different phases of inspections. They will be reviewing properties that have been sold, inspecting building permits, taking photos of parcels to update field cards and reviewing building permit work or doing requests for inspections.

All individuals will have a letter from the Assessor's Office, a photo identification badge and the vehicles used are Town of Branford vehicles. Individuals in the field are staff members from the Assessor's Office.

If you have recently taken out any building permits and/or have received an inspection letter from the Assessor's Office to schedule an appointment please anticipate an inspection from the Assessor's Office.

Inspections are done to update your property record card with the most recent data based on building permit work, sales verification data, photographs and requested inspections.

Please telephone the Assessor's Office if you have any questions or are requesting an appointment between 8:30 am and 4:30 pm Monday through Friday at (203) 488-2039.



If you are a part-time/seasonal resident, in addition to your license and registration, please also bring a utility bill (cable, electric, gas) showing service in your name at your Branford address. 

Branford Parks And Recreation Summer Happenings

In continuing to support its philosophy of "Recreation....Where the benefits are endless", the Branford Parks and Recreation Department dedicates itself to running programs, both active and passive, to promote a positive and healthy lifestyle for all.

Two major summer events that will take place are the "Summer Camp Playground Program" for Branford boys and girls ages 6 thru 12, or have completed Kindergarten and "Teen Travel" for those that are in grades 7 and up as of September of 2016. The Summer Camp Playground program runs from July 5 to August 12 from 9:00 am to 3:00 pm. The cost for this camp is \$400 for six weeks. There is a before care that starts at 7:45 am until 9:00 am for an additional \$125 and an extended care from 3:00 pm to 5:00 pm for \$175.Camp Locations can be found at Hammer Field, Veteran's Park, Stony Creek and Foote Park. Teen Travel starts on July 5 and runs until August 4th on Tuesdays and Thursdays only. This program is designed for teens to fill their summer with excitement, exceptional trips and spending time with their friends. Teens are supervised by an experienced staff and trips include Brownstone Discovery Park, Six Flags, Lake Compounce, Sheer Madness in Boston, and much more. Cost for this program is \$500. The Counselor In Training Program (CIT) for ages 14 and 15, will help strengthen the individual in a variety of areas, leadership, social skills, being a good role model and more as part of the Branford Recreation Department Summer Camp Playground Program. The goal is to have the CIT one day become an effective counselor. Each applicant must submit a paragraph on "Why you would like to be a C.I.T. for the Branford Recreation Summer Camp?" The Junior Counselor In Training Program is for those children age 13 by July 1, 2016 to be part of the camp experience in a capacity which bridges the gap between a camper and becoming a Counselor In Training.

Adults can also enjoy the Branford Recreation Experience by signing up for one of the many offered programs including: Adult Tennis Lessons (Beginner and CAPP and Adult Cardio Tennis), Tae Kwon Do, Adult Swim Lessons (Beginner/Advanced Beginner and Advanced), Yoga for Every-BODY and Aqua Aerobics to name a few.



Branford Taxes Due July 1st

All Branford residents and businesses are reminded that motor vehicle taxes as well as the first installment of real estate and personal property taxes for the 2015 grand list year will be mailed in June and are due July 1 and payable by August 1 without penalty. Payments made after August 1st will accrue interest of $1\frac{1}{2}$ % each month dating back to the original due date. If you do not receive a bill, please call us as failure to receive a bill does not preclude your liability for the tax and any interest incurred. If you escrow your real estate taxes, your lender will receive your real estate bill instead of you.

Payments may be made:

- On line at www.branford-ct.gov. Click on "View and Pay Taxes," put your last name, a space, and first initial (no punctuation), click "Search" and your bills will come up. You can pay your taxes by clicking on the green shopping cart. Convenience fees are 2.95% for payments made with a credit card, or \$.95 cents for those made with a check (ACH).
- At the Tax Collector's office at Town Hall 8:30 am to 4:30 pm. We do not accept credit cards in the office, but payments can be made by check, cash, or money order.
- By mail. Checks should be payable to "Tax Collector Branford" and mailed to Tax Collector, PO Box 136, Branford, CT 06405.

Questions concerning your tax bill should be directed to the tax collector's office at 203-315-0672; questions concerning your assessment should be directed to the assessor's office at 203-488-2039.

Veteran Additional Exemption Program Income Based

This is a reminder for Veterans to apply for an Additional Veteran Exemption based on Income. The exemption is based upon certain income levels and marital status. There are two programs available to veterans. One is a State Program §12-811 and reference in subsection b under §170aa and the other is a Local Option Veteran Program §12-81f.

Application for the state additional exemption and the local option additional exemption are filed with the Assessor's Office in the Town of which the veteran resides. The filing period is from **February 1st through October 1st of 2016.** Once a veteran is approved for the additional exemption he/she must submit an application on a biennial basis. Income received by both a husband and his wife is considered in determining the eligibility of married persons for the exemption. If a person

is legally separated pursuant to CGS §46b-40, as of the December 31st, 2015, he or she is treated as single for purposes of this program.

Under these additional exemption programs provided by subsection b under \$12-170aa, \$12-81l and \$12-81f, a veteran must meet several requirements to qualify for these additional exemptions. The Veteran must have filed a DD214 or other proof of eligibility on the Land records by September 30th, 2016 as stated in \$12-93 and meet the requirements under \$12-81 subsection 19, 20, 21, 22, 23 and 24. All income received in the calendar year of 2015 must be filed in the proper manner with the Assessor at application time. The Veteran and/or spouse's domicile, must be where they reside and located in the Town of Branford for the exemption to be applied. If the Veteran does not own real estate in the Town of Branford, the veterans domicile must be in the Town of Branford and have their Motor Vehicles registered in the Town of Branford.

Community Forest Commission

The mission of the CFC is to protect and increase the number of native trees in Branford via education and a tree planting program. The Department of Public Works (DPW) plants trees every year and there is a commemorative tree program whereby one can pay for a native tree that DPW will plant on Town property. Native trees support our insects, birds and mammals whereas non-native plants may not support any wildlife. For example, a native oak supports over 500 species whereas the Bradford pear (native to China and Vietnam) supports essentially zero. Per Dr. Douglas Tallamy: "Foreign plants dominate our landscape: over 3400 species of non native plants are out-competing native plants in every ecosystem in North America." Our birds have little to eat since 90% of their diet are native insects which are not adapted to foreign plants.

The presence of trees improves human health and trees help clean our streams and rivers, prevent soil erosion, conserve energy in the winter, cool buildings, sidewalks, etc. in the summer, combat global warming, decrease noise pollution, increase property value and have many other benefits.

A mature tree usually has a significant monetary value. Proper care includes regularly watering a newly planted tree deeply to keep the soil moist (for several years) and mulching correctly: a ring several feet from the tree with NO mulch next to the tree trunk, otherwise the bark can become diseased.

East Shore District Health Department Working To Make Branford Waters Cleaner

Long Island Sound: we boat in it, we swim in it, we fish in it, and it is a major source of commercial shell fishing in Connecticut. The East Shore District Health Department (ESDHD), along with the Bureau of Aquaculture and its partner shoreline health departments, test waters of the beaches during the summer months and year-round test the waters of the shellfish beds for contaminant bacteria levels.

The waters of the Sound come from streams and rivers mixing with the waters from the Atlantic Ocean. The major source of pollution is from these streams and rivers and what the health department calls non-point source pollution, or run-off. This non-point source pollution can have high bacteria levels as rain or snowmelt carry vehicle pollutants (oil, grease), pesticides, litter, and fecal matter from various animals from roads,

rooftops, parking lots, construction sites, lawns, and other surfaces.

This summer the State and Local Health Departments will test the waters of the streams and rivers in an attempt to determine what the source of the pollution is and whether we can reduce or eliminate it. ESDHD will be collecting samples and have them tested not only to find out what bacteria lie within the waters, but also the source of the bacteria. By testing the DNA of the bacterial contamination, we will be able to tell whether the pollution is from humans, animals, or water fowl. Once the source of the pollution contamination is determined, a plan of action can be implemented.

The monitoring of the beach waters can save us from swimming related illnesses. Although unpleasant, swimming related illnesses are usually not very serious -



they require little or no treatment and improve quickly if treatment is needed, and no long-term health effects. The most common illness associated with swimming in water polluted by sewage is gastroenteritis. It occurs in a variety of forms that can have one or more of the following symptoms: nausea, vomiting, stomachache, diarrhea, headache or fever. Other minor illnesses associated with swimming include swimmers itch, ear, eye, and nose and throat infections.

ESDHD urges our residents to observe any beach closure, advisory, or safety hazards signs. Have a happy and healthy summer.


