Infrastructure projects across town continue to move forward. The train station's "kiss & ride" platform on Kirkham Street is taking shape; the intersection of North Branford Road [Rte. 139] at Valley and School Ground Roads is nearing its completion with a new turn lane to better accommodate traffic and allow for safer vehicle movements, and the design work for the School Ground Road's new bridge is just about finished, allowing that project to begin soon. Once that bridge is in, the state bridge on Rte. 139 between Commercial Street and Thompson Road will be replaced. Collectively, all of these projects will result in much improved and safer traffic in the east end of town for residents and businesses alike.

As you know, decisions for a new public work facility and resident, recently came on board as the town's new Public senior center must remain for the next administration. It's unfortunate that distractions by a small group of naysayers were used to prevent these two projects from moving forward. I regret those missed opportunities, but am hopeful that the welcoming and wishing them the best of luck in their work. Branford Economic Development Commission

Branford is now home to Durata Therapeutics, a new biotech company developing treatments for infectious diseases. With its headquarters in Chicago, the new company has located its technical operations at 322 East Main St., on Rte. 1 near Exit 55.

A recent visit by Governor Malloy included a tour of the facility and a discussion with company executives about their work and growth plans. The state provided funding, requested by Representative Lonnie Reed with assistance from Representative Pat Widlitz, to help enable the company to open in Branford. The funding program, through the state's Department of Economic and Community Development, supports R&D companies to start up and expand in Connecticut. In addition to the state's support, Durata was attracted to the Branford site because of the town's available workforce, infrastructure, municipal services, and low taxes. 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
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


Since 2008, the Branford Police Department adopted new strategies in policing, changing our agency's mission and implemented CompStat. CompStat is a "strategic control system" designed for the collection and feedback of information on crime and related quality of life issues.

The CompStat process can be summarized in one simple statement: "Collect, analyze, and map crime data and other essential police performance measures on a regular basis, and hold police managers accountable for their performance as measured by this data."

Our department's mission was also changed and one of the elements of the new mission is to "reduce traffic crashes". Utilizing CompStat we have been able to predict when and where crashes are most likely to occur, with about 66% accuracy, and direct our officers to enforce aggressive driving and distracted driving violations to change the behaviors of the driving community.

Our enforcement efforts have proven to be effective and have resulted in a decline of traffic crashes. We have successfully reduced traffic crashes town wide by 20% and by greater percentages in isolated hot spot areas since the inception of



the management change, therefore reducing the probability of being involved in a traffic crash.

Nationally, police have been scrutinized for their conduct during motor vehicle stops. In Connecticut, effective October 1, 2013, laws have been passed to prevent police officers from stopping motorists based on race, ethnicity/ancestry, age, gender, sexual orientation, religion or in a protected class. Officers are now required to provide instructions to motorists they stop on how to file complaints against officers who they believe stopped them for the above reasons. We also encourage citizens to compliment officers when they think they did a good job.

Our officers are proud to showcase their work and maintain transparency with the community. Our officers are either

equipped with body worn video cameras or a video camera mounted in the patrol vehicle and record interactions with the community during motor vehicle stops.



Holiday Wrapping Paper Program

The Solid Waste and Recycling Department is excited to inform you that we are introducing a Holiday Wrapping Paper Recycling Program for the upcoming holiday season. This Program is not only new to the Town of Branford, but is the first of its kind in the State! Many thanks are due to Etta Hanlon, a Branford High School student, who brought the concept to my attention.

In the coming months, please be on the lookout for special collection bags which will be available at various locations throughout town for collecting your recyclable holiday paper. Please see below for a list of acceptable wrapping materials. Simply place your filled bag(s) out with your normal recyclables for collection, or bring them directly to the Transfer Station. If you do not have one of the specially marked bags, your holiday paper can still be recycled by placing it in the same bag/ bundle as your newspapers and magazines.

We must stress that only paper products can be placed in these bags. Wrapping paper made of foil or plastic (Mylar) are not acceptable. Neither are ribbons or bows that are not made of paper. A good rule of thumb is, "If it rips, it fits."

Acceptable Materials:

PAPER wrapping paper Paperboard/ gift boxes Tissue paper Holiday cards and envelopes

Unacceptable Materials:

Any non-paper products Plastic, foil or Mylar wrapping paper Bows or ribbons Styrofoam

Remember that recycling not only saves our environment, but our tax dollars too! For every ton of trash that is recycled, the Town saves over \$100. Please recycle.

Be prepared for the season

With the change of season fast approaching, we should all take the time to make sure we are ready, part of this process relies on you.

With our heating equipment starting up for the first time of the season, take the time to examine the condition of your equipment. Start your equipment and make sure it is in proper working order for supplying either heat or hot water. Take the time to examine the condition of your equipment including the venting of your equipment. Make sure all connections look secure and free of rot or corrosion, listen to the sound of your equipment running and stopping. Any unusual sounds, noises or if something just does not look right to you should be further investigated by a licensed technician. Make sure all direct vent equipment intake and exhausts are free and clear at the termination points on your exterior.

Now is the time to also make sure your Smoke detectors and Carbon Monoxide detectors are in proper working order within your home. Change out any detectors that are ten years of age or older and replace the batteries in all detectors throughout your home. Make sure each level of your home has at least one Smoke detector. All sleeping rooms should have a proper working Smoke detector and install a Carbon Monoxide detector outside each sleeping area in the immediate vicinity of the bedroom.



NATURE EXPLORER PROGRAM



In 2009, the Branford Land Trust started the Nature Explorer Program to help Branford residents, both adults and children, learn more about the natural environment of our hometown. All together, there have been around eight programs scheduled each year. And, each event is FREE and open to the public!

This program was inspired by the terrific response of Branfordites to activities at the BLT 40th Anniversary picnic held in 2008, where there was a scavenger hunt, live animals, a display from the Peabody Museum of natural artifacts, and a walk around Young's Pond.

Most Nature Explorer programs take place out-of-doors to familiarize people with some of the trails maintained by the

Land Trust and the Town of Branford, and to learn about various aspects of nature found there, such as birds, trees, wild flowers, or how to identify animal tracks.

We have also had several shows with live animals: one with birds of prey and another with reptiles and amphibians, and we hope to have another event with live animals again this year, since it is so exciting to see live animals that live right here in Connecticut!

Included in the Nature Explorer Program are also some of the Land Trust's traditional annual events, such as the Branford River Parade, where non-motorized boats go down the Branford River from the high school to Branford Point, the pre-Thanksgiving walk on the Van Wie property, which is the Land Trust's largest holding, and the New Year's Day walk.

fuller-bodied red and white wines. Two great varietals that are definitely worth trying for a fuller, spicier mouth-feel. come to mind are Malbec and Torrontes, which are both mostly produced in Argentina.

The red varietal, Malbec, originated in France, and is used for blending in small amounts in Bordeaux, and in larger quantities in Languedoc. In France, Malbec tends to be drier than in Argentina due to the soil and the climate. The long warm season in Argentina allows for Malbec to become full and juicy, which enables it to stand on its own as a varietal in the wine-making process. The flavors are rich with dark fruit such as black cherry, cassis and blackberry. Malbec does maintain its dry finish and also can acquire a slight spicy component. Malbec is also blended with Cabernet Sauvignon, Bonnarda, and Syrah in Argentina to create huge red blends that knock your socks off. These blends can be over-looked due to the huge

Fall is here and the cooler temperatures call for some popularity of red blends in California right now, but they

Torrontes is a white varietal widely grown in Argentina. It is a unique and unusual varietal showing a floral nose with complex fruit flavors of apricot, and citrus fruits with a medium dry finish. Torrontes has a heavier mouth-feel, like that of a Chardonnay, but with a lighter finish. This varietal is a great pairing for lemon chicken or heavier seafood dishes.

Although the lazy days of summer have dwindled away, the beautiful New England fall weather calls for more barbecues and gatherings. Being extremely versatile, both Malbec and Torrontes pair with almost any fare you choose to serve up. So take a step away from your every-day go-to wines and serve up some South American treats!

If a Holiday is on a Monday, ALL COLLECTIONS ARE DELAYED ONE DAY

Beginning on November 4th and continuing thru December 20th, except for Thanksgiving week, the town will be collecting leaves curbside. For the leaves to be collected, they must be in a brown paper leaf bag, or loose in a garbage can.

Do not use plastic bags; the town will not pick up leaves in plastic bags. Leaves should not be raked into the streets, piled at the curb, placed in wetlands, streams, storm drains, or on Branford Land Trust Property.

Your leaves will be picked up on the same day as your regular recycling collection, though by a separate truck. Resi-dents are reminded not to include branches and also

to keep the leaves free of litter and other materials which will not decompose. These materials contaminate the compost which your leaves are turned into at the Transfer Station and which is available to Branford residents for free.

Brown paper leaf bags can usually be found at the following Branford stores: Big Y, Branford Building Supplies, Caron's Corner, Richlin's, Stop & Shop, Walgreen's and Wal-Mart.

Branford WPCA



The Town of Branford has established a Sewer Commission designated as the Water Pollution Control Authority (WPCA) to exercise all powers and authority over the Town of Branford Water Pollution Control Facility (WPCF) as set forth in municipal statutes.

Goal

Our wastewater facility (and collection system) is a publicly owned treatment works dedicated to providing the efficient transportation and treatment of wastewater from the town of Branford. Wastewater personnel will place their highest priority on courteously serving the public and protecting human health and the environment.

Function

The primary function of the WPCF is the efficient operation and maintenance of the Town of Branford wastewater facility and collection system. The Superintendent is charged with directing efforts of the WPCF towards the utility's mission (in a cost-effective manner).


The Town of Branford operates and maintains an expansive sewer system with over 100 miles of underground sewer pipe, 50 sewage pumping stations, and a wastewater treatment plant located at 75 Block Island Road. The sewers and pumping stations collect an average 4 million gallons per day (MGD) of wastewater and then direct it toward the centralized facility for treatment and eventual discharge from a subaqueous outfall located within Branford Harbor. During the past year, the plant treated over one billion gallons of wastewater.

The 2013-2014 Town's fiscal budget dictates the wastewater plant day-to-day operations are covered by a \$3.4 million Enterprise Fund-Operating Budget which is funded through 1) a Sewer Utility Fund, 2) the fees collected from the sewer utility bills charged to residents, 3) septage receiving fees from the various haulers, and 4) nutrient removal credits (monies).
