### Fiscal Year 2015-2016 Budget Approved

At a Special Town Meeting on May 28th Chester residents voted to approve the fiscal year 2015-2016 \$12,907,355 budget proposed by the Board of Finance. This budget covers all general government operations, capital expenditures, Chester Elementary School and the Town share of Region 4 District's budget which was approved at referendum on May 5th.

The new budget is an increase of \$299,619, 2.4% higher than the current 2014-2015 adjusted budget. The major budget expenditures are for education 67%; general government operations 30%; and capital expenditures at 3%. Both Chester Elementary School's and Region 4's budget increases will be less than 2% reflecting Chester's declining student enrollment across all twelve grades. The general government budget expenditures are for boards and commissions, Town Hall operations, public works, public safety, health services, employee benefits and debt payment. These costs will increase by \$180,275, about 5% above fiscal year 2014-2015 operation costs. The increase is attributed to payroll cost up 2.75% plus additional staff hours for library, sanitarian, treasurer and public work seasonal crew. The Town will pay more for our Resident State Trooper, reserve more for winter maintenance costs based on past five year average, and

contribute more for medical and pension fund payments. The 3% capital budget expenditure funds \$419,000 over the next five years spreading the cost of major projects and equipment purchases such as road construction, Main Street improvements, technology hardware, fire and police equipment and vehicles.





Based on expected revenues and operating expenditures the Board of Finance set the 2015-2016 mil rate at \$25.32 per \$1,000 of assessed property value; this is 50¢ more than the current rate of \$24.82 per \$1,000 of assessed property value. A higher mil rate increase was modified by using \$200,000 from the Town's healthy fund balance added to the revenue budget. The June 30, 2016 fund balance is projected to grow to \$1,699,000, approximately 13% of the adopted 2015-2016 expenditures budget and slightly higher that the Board of Finance's guideline of 8% to 12% for fund balance reserves.

### **Main Street East Reconstruction Begins**

On May 20th the Town signed a contract with Quality Associates, Continued on page 2

Inc. of East Haven authorizing them to proceed with Phase I of the Main Street East project. Quality Associates was one of ten companies who submitted bids for this work. The project's contract price is \$857,622.

A pre-construction meeting was held May 27th to walk Main Street and Laurel Hill Cemetery with the contractor to identify specific areas of concern. Also at this meeting were representatives of the Connecticut Water Company who discussed their schedule for completion of the new water main that will be coordinated with replacement of the brook culvert adjacent to the post office. The culvert crossing is the critical part of the improvement project because all storm water between School Lane and the post office flows downhill into the new culvert.

The utility mark outs and construction surveying are in place and Quality Associates began the culvert replacement mid-June. This work is expected to take three weeks to complete. During this construction it will be necessary to temporarily close access to the work zone except for abutting property owners. Access and on-street parking will be reopened at night and on weekends. Throughout most of this construction period single lane traffic will be permitted.

The contractor has been directed to limit disruption and provide advance notice when closures and detours are necessary. The pavement section between School Lane and Middlesex Avenue



will also be replaced and minor drainage repairs installed. In this section no new or replacement sidewalk work or wall restoration will be done. This 830 foot section of Main Street will be improved using only Town capital road funds.

Every effort will be made to limit inconvenience to abutting property owners and businesses located within the project area. This construction will finally complete the past two sewer and recent new water main projects resulting in an improved Main Street with new drainage, sidewalks, curbing and pavement.

# Chester Library Building Project – North Quarter Park

On April 10th the Board of Selectmen authorized contracting with LLB Architects to begin the preparation of Schematic Design options for a new library at North Quarter Park (NQP). The first step in this process was verification of soil testing to determine the presence of potential contaminants that could require remediation.


On April 29th Environmental Compliance Services (ECS) supervised the digging of six test holes along the south side of the park. These holes were located to avoid the 19 test pits dug in 2001 when the park was being considered for a new Town Hall site. The recent test holes revealed the same artificial fill materials as previously observed, such as road sweepings, leaves and tree debris, some bituminous pieces, concrete and broken brick. However, with ECS presence soil samples were properly collected and sent for laboratory analyses.

The soil assessments confirmed the fill material has relatively low concentration of petroleum hydrocarbons and traces of metals expected from road sweeping and perhaps catch basin sediments. The report concluded that: "while there are no specific regulations stating that you must remediate these subsurface materials, if the materials were excavated as part of the building foundation or site work and cannot not be re-used on the site (under the building or parking lot and above the groundwater table) and had to leave the site, they should be disposed of at a facility approved to take such material." (Quote from "Limited Subsurface Investigation North Quarter Part Environmental Compliance Services" May 26, 2015, page 3 of 3.)

If the site is slated for development, ECS highly recommends that an environmental soils management plan be developed to ensure that these soils are handled and managed appropriately and either used on site, if possible, in a manner that is protective to human health and the environment or transported to an approved facility for recycling.

Library Building Committee met on June 2nd to discuss this favorable but cautionary report and agreed to direct LLB Architects to move forward with the schematic site and floor design options as well as preliminary project cost estimates for evaluation and public review.

# Attention Chester Residents:

### Deep River's Recycling – Bulky Waste Transfer Station

Chester residents are permitted to use the Deep River Transfer Station on Route 80 CONTINGENT UPON the display of a "Chester Access to Public Services" permit on the passenger side windshield of their vehicle. These permits may be obtained at the Chester Town Clerk's office. Permits will not be issued to individuals doing work for a homeowner or to any business. Chester residents have convenient access for disposal of bulky waste items such as furniture and lumber, electronics, refrigerators/air conditioners, scrap metal and tires.

No Chester household waste disposal is permitted at the Deep River transfer station. Chester residents should arrange for curb side weekly pick up from a licensed hauler. This shared municipal service is beneficial to both Towns. Deep River operates a well-organized facility compliant with the State's environmental standards.

Chester residents are requested to abide by our shared services agreement with Deep River and cooperate with the attendant when using the transfer station.

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## **Visiting Nurses of the Lower Valley**

Summer is well underway. The sea, the sun, and the sand are calling us to spend time outdoors. Fun with family and friends, picnics, hikes, and lazy days at the beach renew and revitalize the spirit. Summer also brings high temperatures, sunburns, insects, and hurricane season. Are you prepared? It's time to make sure you are ready to stay safe and healthy.

Make sure everyone drinks plenty of water as the temperatures rise to prevent heat stroke. Remember the inside of the car can reach 140-190 degrees within half an hour on a hot sunny day. Never leave children or pets unattended in a closed vehicle.

Stock up on sunblock with a UVA/UVB rating of 30 or higher to protect yourself from those harmful ultraviolet rays. A teaspoon of sunblock is recommended for each arm or leg. Remember to apply sunblock to your ears and the tops of the feet, these areas are often forgotten. Hiking, picnicking and outdoor activities in brushy or wooded areas increases the risk of Lyme disease transmitted by ticks. To prevent tick bites, wear light colored clothing on your legs so you can spot any ticks quickly. Use insect repellent containing at least 20% DEET, or wear permethrin-treated clothing. Check your body daily for ticks. Remove ticks with tweezers grasping close to the skin surface and pull up with steady, even pressure. Clean the area with rubbing alcohol, or soap and water. See your doctor if you develop a red ringed rash, fever, chills or flu like symptoms.

Now is the time to check your emergency kits so you will be ready to evacuate should a hurricane hit. Make sure to have plenty of water, nonperishable food, medications and first aid supplies. Keep a battery powered radio, flashlight and extra batteries on hand. Know the evacuation route and make a plan to follow so all family members will know what to do. Above all enjoy the summer, and be safe!

# Things You Should Know When Reporting and/or Responding to an Accident on the River

### **Chester Office of Emergency Management and Harbor Management Commission**

Roles and responsibilities under Maritime Law, Connecticut State Statutes, Case Law, Good Samaritan Law and common sense:

#### **Maritime Law**

"The Master of a vessel has supreme authority dating back to the early days of navigation. It was included into the US Constitution in Article III section 2 when it mentions "to all cases of admiralty and maritime jurisdiction".

Under Maritime Law; You must stop to render assistance if you observe a vessel and or its crew in distress. See Good Samaritan Law.

### **State Statutes**

- Who is in charge: CHAPTER 104 MUNICIPAL POLICE AND FIRE PROTECTION, Sec. 7-313e. Authority of fire officer during an emergency "The fire chief of the local municipality, or any member serving in the capacity of fire officer-in-charge, shall, upon arrival assume command and control of the incident." If responding to assist: YOU MUST request permission from the River Command.
- Under State law, reportable accidents are considered to be for

damage of \$500 or more to a vessel, an injury, person overboard or fatality. These Incidents must be reported to the DEEP, Boating Division, 860-424-3000.

### **Good Samaritan Law:**

- Good Samaritan laws offer legal protection to people "who give reasonable assistance to those who are injured, ill, in peril, or otherwise incapacitated."
- Ana
- You do not act beyond your level of training, experience or as conditions dictate.

### **BUI Suspects:**

Unless you are a POST Certified law enforcement officer, you cannot detain a vessel. Even harbormasters, with lights and siren, cannot stop a vessel if the operator is suspected to be under the influence. Call for a law enforcement officer's assistance.

• Case Law: All parties to an incident are looked at for liability exposure. Lawyers in doing their due diligence, will look throughout the land of law for similar incident judifications (or the one that fits their case) to go after any/everyone. Follow the rules of engagement.

### **Reporting an Emergency Incident:**

When reporting an accident or someone in trouble on the River; call out a May Day, May Day, May Day over Channel 16. Utilization of VHF Channel 16 shall be your first mode of communication: that way other vessels in the area can assist. Then call 911 on your cell. The 911 call is a fast-track call to the local 911 Call Center who in turn will alert local responders.

### Note about Towing, to TOW or not to TOW

- You only take another vessel under tow in a situation where you can prevent further damage to the vessel or injury to its crew.
- DO NOT utilize your tow line. Use theirs. The minute you attached your line to the other vessel the liabilities switch to you.
- You are only obligated to tow the vessel to a safe haven. For a longer tow, Call (if the owner does not have a Tow contract) the Coast Guard and they will make the call, for the owner.

### Note from writer about night operations:

Under COLREGS and Inland Rules "it is illegal for any light to create glare that affects the safe operation of a boat". Boaters should be aware of where search lights point. It will take twenty plus minutes for a person's night vision to return.

Cedar Lake 2015 Summer Season: The Town Beaches on Cedar Lake are open through August 20 with scheduled hours from 10:30am until 6:00pm. Hours may vary according to staff availability, training, weather, or special programs. It is the policy of the Chester Park and Recreation Commission that access to the Town parks, including the beaches on Cedar Lake, is by permit only. Vehicles of residents parked at unstaffed parks must display a public access sticker, which is available at the Town Clerk's Office. Non-residents must display a park pass on their vehicles at unstaffed parks and show their pass and identification when entering a staffed facility. Non-resident passes are currently \$65 and valid through June 19 of 2016. They are available at Pelletier Park during operating hours and at the Parks and Recreation Office during the off-season. Chester residents may enter staffed facilities by showing a driver's license, or other proof of residency or taxpayer status with identification. Residents and pass holders may bring up to six people, but must accompany them. All other guests are \$3 each. Groups of 10 or more must make reservations in advance by submitting a completed group use application, a certificate of insurance to the Town, and pay a group fee.

• Waterfront Safety Note: The Park and Recreation Commission reminds parents that they are responsible for their children while visiting Pelletier Park. Please watch your children while they are in the water and do not drop them off or leave them unattended at the facility. Drowning is the second leading cause of trauma deaths for ages 1-19 years old and the third leading cause of ALL deaths for children 0-4 years of age. We would like all patrons to realize that no one is permitted in the water if they are under the influence of drugs or alcohol, or while they are chewing gum or eating. Please remember that head first entries are not permitted. This includes throwing children into the water as they may turn to a head-first position.

Head-First Entries Into The Water Are The Leading Cause Of Sports Related Spinal Injuries.

- Canine Good Citizen Prep Course & Testing. Successful completion of the CGC test can be used to verify your dog's eligibility to conduct pet therapy; for renters insurance or for the personal satisfaction of knowing that your dog is considered safe and polite in public. The course focuses on practicing and perfecting the 10 behaviors required to pass the AKC Canine Good Citizen test. Any dog 6 months of age or older is eligible to participate. Location: North Quarter Park, Chester Dates: 5:30pm August 6,13,20,27, (Rain date September 3) Cost: \$115.00 +tax. Test Information: it is not mandatory to take the course to test. \$15+tax, Sunday Sept 13 at the Chester Pet Awareness Day being held at the Chester Meeting House. ### **Important News From The Tax Office**

### **Regarding Tax Information**

Here it is late at night or really early in the morning and you are wondering what your taxes are but you can't find your tax bill, so the first thing you think of doing is calling the tax office for the info directly. However, this year, you have another option: You can now go online to www.chesterct.org and find Tax Collector information and you should be able to find a link to online information. This new option has been provided this year because we had so many requests for this type service. Since this is a small town with part time hours in the Tax Office, this helpful link will come in handy for lawyers, accountants and title searchers who do so much research prior to a parcel being sold or a refinance plan taking place, but it will be especially helpful for the taxpayers themselves. Many towns have done this previously and it has made research much more efficient for everyone. Just type in the last name and at least the correct initial of the home owner, and you should be able to find the information you want. Info can be found by the street address also. I am told this will be "live" information, so amounts should be updated each night, providing a current view of the details. This "lookup" will provide the total due for anyone who did not pay their bill on time since it will

contain tax along with the interest for that month. Payments should be more accurate with this online ability, since you can see the amount yourself and not try to hear the amount over a phone. Since DMV is trying to go "live" with their registrations and also licenses, we will be providing both real estate and also MV information on line to help with DMV issues. You will have the correct amount due which needs to be paid in cash to receive a "live" clearance for DMV. This cash requirement is only if you are paying late! Since ability to research on your own time is new to Chester, we hope it is extremely helpful to all our taxpayers! But do remember, if you need a clearance for DMV, it must still be with cash or a bank check or a postal money order, when your bill is being paid late! Good luck to all and enjoy this new process. Also, remember: we will continue to try to help anyone who calls or comes in for information! Take care and enjoy the summer months, and enjoy your new ability to do the research yourself for tax information! It will help you a bit at "tax time" too for the federal income tax process! Take care!

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# Everybody wants a lush green lawn—but at what cost?

Many people don't realize that lawns maintained with synthetic fertilizers and pesticides pose a serious health threat to people, pets and the environment. Lawns also decrease natural habitat vital to wildlife. Reducing the use of lawn care chemicals to foster healthier communities can be done individually, in our yards; in our parks, playing fields and other public places; and in our schools, where use of lawn care chemicals is currently banned by state law at day care centers and grades K-8.

### Why Chem-Free?

Lawn care chemicals—applied by homeowners or lawn care companies—contain potent toxins that kill organisms considered pests, such as dandelions and grubs. Scientific evidence shows that these chemicals also affect people, especially children, and pets. Exposure to certain lawn care pesticides has been associated with increased risks of a variety of health problems, including asthma, several types of child and adult cancers, and cancers in dogs.

The effects of harmful lawn care chemicals reach far beyond your family and yard. These chemicals can make their way into the environment through rain runoff, polluting streams and groundwater, and move through the food chain, becoming more concentrated. Using herbicides and pesticides to tackle weeds and insects can actually be counter-productive to your lawn's health. These poisons also kill good organisms in the soil that help produce nutrients plants need to grow. This weakens the grass, fosters thatch and encourages disease.

### How to Have a Healthy Lawn and Yard

Fortunately, you can have an attractive and healthy lawn without using harmful synthetic chemicals. You can make simple changes, like mowing higher (3"), leaving your grass clippings on the lawn, using organic fertilizers, aerating to reduce soil compaction, and de-thatching, to make your lawn healthier and more vigorous naturally. You can also reduce the size of your lawn by growing a variety of other plants to promote a healthy, diverse ecosystem in your yard. Grass, which requires lots of sun, water and good soil, is one of the highest maintenance plants we can grow. Instead, plant groupings of trees, shrubs, grasses and flowers that are compatible with existing environmental conditions; use ground covers that require less maintenance than grass; and, choose native plants adapted to our climate and conditions. Finally, use safe alternatives to get rid of common pests. You can pull out dandelions at their weakest—when blooming; eliminate crabgrass by mowing high and using organic fertilizers; treat weeds in driveway or sidewalk cracks with white vinegar; and control grubs with alternatives like beneficial nematodes, Neem or GrubGONE.

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### **Tick Borne Illnesses In Connecticut**

Summer is the time for picnics, hiking, outdoor concerts, and just relaxing in your back yard. It is also the time for ticks to come out and feed. In Connecticut there are several illnesses caused by a tick bite. The common deer tick, Ixodes scapularis, can transmit Lyme disease, Human Granulocytic Anaplasmosis (Ehrlichiosis), and Babesiosis. Symptoms of these illnesses include fever, body aches, headaches, and in the case of Lyme disease an expanding red rash. Symptoms may begin from 3-30 days after the bite.

The American dog tick, Dermacentor variabilis, can transmit another illness

Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever. Symptoms include the sudden onset of fever, headache and muscle pains followed by a rash. These symptoms may appear 3-14 days after the tick bite.

All of these infections can be treated with antibiotics, but without prompt treatment they can cause serious or even fatal illness.

After spending time outside it is important to do thorough skin survey to find any ticks. The longer a tick remains attached the more likely it could transmit an illness. An infected deer tick can transmit one or even more illnesses at the same bite. The

Connecticut Agricultural Station estimates that about 25-30% of deer ticks are infected with Lyme disease. But not every tick bite will transmit the illness.

If you find a tick it is important to remove it promptly. Use tweezers and grasp the tick's mouthparts as close to the skin as possible. Using steady pressure, pull the tick upward. After removal wash the area with soap and water and apply an antiseptic. Write down the date it was removed and the body part. If you develop a rash at the bite site and/or symptoms of a flu like illness contact your physician immediately.

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
# **Roto Frank Raises Funds & Food for Shoreline Soup Kitchens**

No matter how many times you've "been through the Mill," there's always something new to see at Chester's museum. This summer, we're exhibiting old Chester "pastimes" (such as Peg Lieberman's Flexible Flyer and Diane Lindsay's croquet photo) and sharing stories on our SoundSticks like Peter Zanardi's humorous account of local baseball player Paul Hopkins. We also now display the piece of 1913 trolley rail unearthed from our Main Street last winter, and every month we have a new display of our latest Archive acquisitions.

Outside, the front of the museum has recently been landscaped with native plantings. The two historic millstones from Chester's first gristmill, probably 275 years old, flank the front door. These enhancements were made possible through a grant from the Community Fund of Middlesex County and the contributions of Landscape Specialties.

With our free admission, it's easy to drop by and stay as long as you wish with family, friends, or visitors. You can even while away an afternoon in air-conditioned comfort playing our array of old-time board games.



### Four Collomore Concerts at Meeting House this Fall

For its 42nd season, the Robbie Collomore Music Series will offer all four of its concerts in the fall, between Sept. 27 and Nov. 29. As always, the Collomore Committee, chaired by Martin Nadel, has chosen a mix of music genres for the season. All four concerts will be on Sundays at 5 p.m. in the Chester Meeting House.

Beginning the season, on Sept. 27, is the Barbara and Edmund Delaney Young Artists Concert. Cellist Julia Bruskin debuted with the Boston Symphony at age 17 and now performs as a member of the Metropolitan Opera Orchestra and internationally as a soloist. She will perform in Chester with her husband, Aaron Wunsch, an internationally known pianist and a member of the Juilliard piano faculty.

Jerron "Blind Boy" Paxton takes center stage on Oct. 18. According to the Wall Street Journal, Paxton, age 26, is "virtually the only music-maker of his generation—playing guitar, banjo, piano and violin, among other implements—to fully assimilate the blues idiom of the 1920s and '30s."

The Hot Club of Detroit, a jazz ensemble specializing in the Gypsy jazz sound made famous by guitarist Django Reinhardt, performs on Nov. 8, followed on Nov. 29 by classical guitarist Jorge Caballero. He is the youngest musician and the only guitarist to win the Naumburg International Competition, one of the

most prestigious and coveted awards given to performers of any instrument.

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
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## **Chester Fife & Drum Corps.**

Welcome to the summer of 2015. We, the members of the Chester Fife and Drum Corps, look forward to the parade and muster season. As you may know by now, Chester Drum Corps was established in 1867 and went "on the road" in 1868. This Corps has been playing our music continuously since the beginning with no time taken off for any reason (good, bad or otherwise!). We have performed in many different uniforms, and are now planning our fourth (or fifth) uniform in 147 years. We now sport a colonial white shirt, colonial vest and Tricorn with medallion on it. Our new look will be more colonial. We hope to be newly outfitted by the end of summer.

We play on wooden colonial drums and 6-hole fife in the key of B flat. A little background on fifes and drums: A fifer and a drummer were officially and necessarily attached to each company in both European and American military forces in colonial times. While in camp, they sounded all the duty calls, such as dinner time, reveille and taps. In the field, on maneuvers or in battle, they signaled movements and actions ordered by the officers, such as forward, retreat and fire.

The earliest American reference to the massing of fifers and drummers under the leadership of a fife major or drum major occurs in George Washington's general orders for August 23, 1777, wherein he not only orders the massing, but specifies how they will look or act. So much for ANCIENT history, now back to the future.

Our drum line is well staffed; however our fife line needs more players. If you are interested in joining us, but do not wish to play an instrument, we also need members for the Color Guard to march at the front of our Corps and carry our Colors. We provide drum and fife lessons free of charge and also teach our members the ins and outs of marching in unison. We practice at North Quarter Park and Cedar Lake. So please come and see what we are about, do and play. Our tentative summer schedule is noted below.
