### **BUDGET**

On May 25, 2017, at the annual town budget meeting, the residents of Chester approved the fiscal year 2017-2018 budget. On June 7th, the Board of Finance set the new mil rate at 26.36, a .79 increase. Throughout all of this, the revenue projections from the state changed on almost a weekly basis. As of this date, no budget has been passed by the State. The Board of Selectmen and the Board of Finance have worked extremely hard to use all of the information available to make sound fiscal planning decisions for the benefit of Chester and its taxpayers, even without the benefit of solid numbers from Hartford. Thanks to everyone for your hard work.

### LIBRARY UPDATE

Thanks to everyone who attended the two Library Building Committee presentations last month. Thank you to the Library Building Committee for your years of hard work planning and designing the revitalization of North Quarter Park including a new library building, playground, parking lot and fields. The presentations were very informative and many questions were asked by residents. The conversations about the need for a new or



- 1. The LED streetlight conversion is in the reconciliation and preliminary design phase and, by the time you receive this magazine, our new lights may be on order. I expect the installation of the new lights to occur sometime in September if all goes well.
- We are working with Greenskies, LLC to place 385 new solar panels on the roof of the Chester Elementary School during this summer.

These two projects alone will save hundreds of thousands of dollars in the next ten years. I know that saving on energy costs is only one aspect of keeping taxes down, but every little bit helps!

These are just a few of the projects and other exciting happenings in Chester this summer. We also have a Request for Proposals out for the update of the Plan of Conservation and Development, are expecting bids for the replacement of the Prospect Street culvert, working on updates of insulation and the heating system in the Meeting House, energizing the new lights on Main Street, expanding opportunities for new businesses in Chester, planning for the protection of the watershed and cleanup of invasive weeds in Cedar Lake, and many other things. # **Attention All Taxpayers!!!**

This was an unusual year in the sense of first...a warm February...then a wet April, May and the beginning of June. During this time, the State of Connecticut was having a very difficult time with its budget and what they were going to share with the towns as far as money. So it left many towns pondering how they were going to pay their bills. As of right now the State still has not settled on numbers for its upcoming fiscal year 2017-2018.

This has made it extremely difficult for towns to set their own budgets. Many towns foresee having to have a supplemental bill midyear to solve the money issue and allow them to pay their bills.

This acts as a reminder to all taxpayers that they should be looking at their own budgets, and making sure they have enough set aside to pay their taxes - Real Estate, PP and MV. Also, approximately 80 property owners should remember to save for their usage bill and their benefit assessment bill. These come out in October and April, and need to be paid in order to avoid interest and additional liens on their property. We, in Chester, have been lucky to have a great head to the WPCA who has worked hard, to try to keep the usage EDU number down as low as possible over the past 6 continued on page 4

years or so. I want to personally thank Bert Armington for his great job as the head of WPCA and how organized and efficient he has been providing the Tax Office with updated information in a very timely manner. It has been a pleasure to work with Bert, and I will miss his helpfulness and friendliness, since I hear he is not running for office again this coming November. A big thank you to Bert from the Tax Collector and it should be from all the taxpayers in town. Here's wishing Bert the best in his "retirement"

So in summary, please be sure to pay your bills on time during July and then January and for the few on Benefit Assessment and Usage, pay those bills when they are due in October and April. Each time you are late, you add to your bill by having to pay the town 1.5% interest or 18% per year. That would hurt anyone. First half RE, PP or MV bills are due anytime in July, so be sure

to have them in to our office or postmarked on time, so you do not incur that interest. MV bills that are late will prevent you from registering your MVs and then you have to hurry in and pay with cash to get cleared through the DMV computer system... so don't be late! If you have not already, give us your email address or phone number so we can remind you to pay the second half of your bill, since no bills get mailed out for January. Enjoy the summer! But also remember, to pay your bills on time and work on a budget for your own personal financial wellbeing. And lastly, thank Bert Armington, whenever you see him, for a great job well done!

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# **Chester Harbor Management Commission**

We have submitted a grant request, to the Department of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP) for funding to prepare a request for the dredging of the mouth of Chester Creek. This area, from the Overlook to the River channel, silts in over time with material from upstream. We need to dredge every ten to fifteen years.

We collect mooring fees from boat owners that keep their boats on moorings off our shores. Traditionally we use these funds for water quality testing of Chester Creek. We will again be sampling different areas of the Creek this year.

# WE MANAGE THE LOWER CONNECTICUT RIVER PUMPOUT BOAT PROGRAM.

During the boating season, the pumpout boats patrol the river providing holding tank pumpout services, free of charge. The service is for recreational boats for the seven municipalities from the East Haddam Bridge to Long Island Sound (But, not into the Sound). We have three boats; providing 7-day a week service. The boats are kept at Essex Island Marina.



During the 2016 boating season, we removed 110,000 gallons of material from boats in the marinas, yacht clubs and on moorings. This was up 26.6% over the year before. We are helping keep the river, its tributaries and boat basin waters clean.

# 9 Town Transit Partners with Google Maps for Online Trip Planning

Finding Chester local bus route information just got a whole lot easier. In fact, you probably already have it available on your smartphone. Google Maps now includes local bus routes and schedules in its directions feature.

Riders no longer have to read timetables. They simply enter the date and time that they hope to arrive at their destination and the trip planner will provide up to 3 options, showing the amount of time and number of transfers for each option, letting you easily select the most convenient trip. Google Maps can even provide walking directions, so you can find out exactly how to get to the nearest transit stop or station, and how to get to your destination once you leave the train/bus. For extra convenience, Google Maps has most locations already stored, so you only need the location name or just a category, such as fast food.

CT Transit New Haven and Hartford, CT Transit Express, Shoreline East and Metro North are all available in Google Maps, so it is easy to plan your trip from Water Street to Middlesex Community College, from Manhattan to Main Street, or from Castle View to Walmart. Google Maps tells you all transfers required along with the connecting agency name and contact information.

Tri-Town Youth Services has been talking with local residents, school staff, business leaders, clergy and young people, to get a better sense of what families need right now, so

that we may offer the best programs and services to our neighbors. During these conversations, something became clear: we need more mentors! An overwhelming amount of research shows that the key to a young person's success, achievement and resiliency is the presence of at least one caring adult in their lives. More than anything, it is the consistent, positive, supportive adult relationships that help young people overcome life's challenges and thrive.

As a small community - with a large adult and retiree population - we have the capacity to ensure that every child in need of a mentor in the Tri-Town area is paired with one. With support from the CT Mentoring Partnership and Nutmeg Big Brothers Big Sisters, Tri-Town Youth Services is developing a system for recruiting, training and pairing mentors with local kids. Whether you are interested in a short-term project working side-by-side with youth, or a longer-term commitment to support one young person in need of some extra care and attention, we would like to hear from you.

We have new opportunities for teens to become mentors, too. Tri-Town's Reach out! Program pairs Valley girls with elementary school girls. They meet after school weekly for snacks, games, crafts and conversation. The participants, their families and school social workers are thrilled with the program, but there is a need for more! # **Office of Emergency Management**

The Town of Chester continues to take advantage of as many and as much as we can of available grants to improve our capabilities of planning for, responding to and recovering from local emergencies.

This year we have been focusing on many areas of improvement of our existing Local Emergency Operations Plan. Those garnering the most attention are based on workshops attended for Best Practices.

One area of work has been, and is currently being, worked on is improving our capabilities for the notification and providing assistance for those residents requiring help during emergencies where power failures will pose a "problem" for them. Another area of plan improvements is a complete rewrite of our River Response Protocol. Our focus is on managing the complications during a mass casualty incident. We regularly have three Passenger Carrying Vessels passing by our shores, and during the Eagle Watching Season there are five. Key challenges are who is in charge and the command and control of the multiple agencies responding to "help." If a disaster were to strike one of these vessels or an airliner (think Miracle on the Hudson), we would have local, neighbor (mutual aid), regional, State, and Federal agencies responding - each having its own command and control guidelines. Plus, on a vessel the Captain has, under maritime law, the responsibility for his/her vessel and its passengers and crew. The same is true for the First Officer on an aircraft. A Properly Prepared Plan Prevents a Poor Performance. Oh, did I mention, that under State statutes the highest ranking fire officer on scene is "In Charge."

# Week 1: Stand Ready to Respond

- · Learn CPR and first aid

# **Summer Eye Health**

Summer brings numerous eye problems such as burnt corneas, chemicals in eyes, and many more. There are studies that show that long-term exposure to bright sunlight may increase the risk of cataracts and growths on the eye, including cancer. Also, UV rays reflected off sand and water can cause eyes to sunburn, potentially resulting in temporary blindness in just a few hours. Here are a few tips to ensure eye health during the summer months:

- Wear sunglasses with UV protection: Most people already know to use sunscreen during the summer to protect their skin against UV rays but our eyes need the same protection.
  - The best way to protect against harmful AVA and UVB rays is to wear sunglasses with protection from both. It's also important to note that sunglasses need to worn even on cloudy days.
- **Use goggles at pools:** The chlorine that is in most pools is designed to protect you from germs, but has the potential to be harmful for your eyes.
- Wear eye protection doing home projects: It is important to remember to shield your eyes even during simple home improvement and maintenance, like mowing your lawn. Rocks and other debris commonly fly up and into your eyes.
- Use eye drops: To soothe dry and tired eyes during the summer, it is best to use
  artificial tears. Despite best attempts sometimes your eyes are irritated or in
  discomfort
- Give your eyes a rest. If you spend a lot of time at the computer or focusing on any one thing, you sometimes forget to blink and your eyes can get fatigued. Try the 20-20-20 rule: Every 20 minutes, look away about 20 feet in front of you for 20 seconds. This can help reduce eyestrain.

# Poison Ivy and Other Poisonous Plants

First comes the itching, then a red rash, and then blisters. These symptoms of poison ivy, poison oak, and poison sumac can emerge any time from a few hours to several days after exposure to the plant oil found in the sap of these poisonous plants. The culprit: the urushiol oil.

# RECOGNIZING POISON IVY, POISON OAK, AND POISON SUMAC

Poison Ivy:.Can grow as a vine or small shrub trailing along the ground or climbing on low plants, trees and poles. Each leaf has three glossy leaflets, with smooth or toothed edges. May have greenish-white flowers and whitish-yellow berries. Poison Oak: Grows as a low shrub with fuzzy green leaves in clusters of three are lobed or deeply toothed with rounded tips. May have yellow-white berries.

**Poison Sumac:** Grows as a tall shrub in bogs or swamps in the Northeast. Each leaf has clusters of seven to 13 smooth-edged leaflets. May have yellow-greenish flowers and whitish-green fruits hang in loose clusters.

# POISON PLANT RASHES AREN'T CONTAGIOUS

These poison plant rashes occur throughout the year but most often in the summer. The rash can't be spread from person to person. But it is possible to pick up the rash from plant oil that may have stuck to clothing, pets, garden tools, and other items that have come in contact with these plants.

The rash will occur only where the plant oil has touched the skin, so a person with poison ivy can't spread it on the body by scratching. It may seem like the rash is spreading if it appears over time but this is because the plant oil is absorbed at different rates on different parts of the body. Even if blisters break, the fluid in the blisters is not plant oil and cannot further spread the rash.

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
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# Today is Tomorrow's History - What's New with Chester Historical Society

One reviewer wrote, "Their exuberant performance and gutsy repertoire... was the kind of fresh approach that keeps chamber music alive." Their Chester concert will feature sonatas by Bach, Debussy, Britten and Rachmaninoff.

In recent years, Jason Vieaux and Julien Labro have thrilled Collomore Concert audiences separately - Jason playing classical guitar in a solo concert and Julien playing accordion with the Detroit Hot Club. When the Collomore committee heard they had joined forces touring, playing the guitar and bandoneon, they jumped at the opportunity to have them return to Chester on Sunday, Oct. 15. You can expect

something "entertaining, fun, exciting, virtuosic in the unusual pairing of these two instruments. The program contains some modern classical, world music from Brazil and Argentina, and even some pop music."

Latin Jazz comes to Chester on Nov. 5, with the Curtis Brothers Quartet featuring Ray Vega, percussionist. And on Nov. 26, the soulful songs of the Gullah culture will be brought to life by Ranky Tanky, a band of native South Carolinians who mix the low country traditions with large doses of jazz, gospel, funk, and R&B.












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
