Hello Chester!

It is officially fall in New England - kids are back to school, apple picking, leaf raking, dark at 4:30 pm, municipal elections, Valley football, field hockey, soccer and other sports, Halloween, Veterans Day parades, and many other things to keep us busy. Of course it is 87 degrees as I write this - but by the time you read it the weather will potentially be more seasonal. We have been very busy in town lately and there are many new and exciting things to tell you about. First and foremost, however, I want to thank you, the citizens of Chester, for working with myself and all of the other employees and volunteers, elected or not, in continuing to make and keep Chester such a special community. You make Chester truly a unique and vibrant place, and I am honored to work on your behalf. Here's the latest:

STATE BUDGET AND TAXES

Unfortunately, we still do not have a state budget that will be signed by the Governor. No matter your politics or party, this is a maddening situation for all. Overall, Chester is in good financial shape, thanks to careful budgeting and smart planning from current and past Boards of Selectmen and Finance. We have been conservative in our spending and look for additional revenue sources and savings opportunities at every turn. Regardless of what we do on the local level, however, in the various budget proposals over the past few months Chester stands to lose anywhere from \$0 to \$750,000 in state revenue, not including any contribution for teacher retirements or other local items that may affect our taxes. Needless to say, that is a pretty big span of unknown. We will continue to follow the situation closely and are prepared to deal with whatever the final result of the budget negotiation brings. I will continue to advocate for moderation in any cuts made by the state and will keep you informed as we know more.

STRATEGIC PLANNING

The public participation and visioning portion of the Plan of Conservation and Development (POCD) is about to begin - a little later than we had envisioned, but imminent. There will be pop up events around town, a couple of public workshops, a simple survey, and other creative and fun events to gather public input regarding residents' vision of Chester for the future. We have contracted with Milone & MacBroom, a well-regarded consulting firm with vast experience in community planning, to lead us in this effort. The end result will be an updated and restructured POCD, our statutorily **continued on page 3**

required guidance document for future planning, and a comprehensive Town Plan which links the goals of the POCD with the financial planning elements necessary to prioritize projects and bring them to fruition. Please participate - we need everyone's input!

STREETLIGHT CONVERSION PROJECT

LED Streetlights have been ordered and are on the way! We estimate that the new lights will be installed sometime in October and will provide better quality light, less light pollution, and a more direct lighting which will keep excess light from creeping into our dining rooms and bedrooms from the street. We purposely chose the warmest color and lowest wattage lighting to keep some subtlety and also provide for safety. We expect to see substantial savings on the utility bill, with a smaller amount for the first couple of years growing to more than \$25-30,000 per year by year 4. Thank you to the ETeam for all of your hard work.

MAIN STREET PROJECT

We are still working toward the next phase of the Main Street Project, which will re-do Main Street from the new bridge to the Laurel Hill Cemetery, with a short venture up the beginning of Maple Street past the flag pole. This project will also include coordination with Connecticut Water Company for replacement of a 100 year old water main. As you may be aware, we applied for a substantial transportation grant to accomplish this section, and although recommended for funding by the local Council of Governments, we are still answering questions and discussing the details with CT DOT. There are several other towns in the queue, and even with all approvals in place, we will still be waiting for state bond money. There really is no way to accurately estimate what will happen with the timelines until there is an approved state budget, although I have been advised that these funds should remain available. So we move full speed ahead with design and planning (for which we have already budgeted and allocated funds) in anticipation that the funding will still be available when we need it. We will keep you updated as new information arrives. A bit of good news, however, is that we have arranged to temporarily connect the new decorative lights installed at the bridge to electrical service, which means that we will not be forced to wait for the next phase of Main Street in order to activate those lights.

LIBRARY/NORTH QUARTER PARK

The Board of Selectmen recently forwarded the Library/North Quarter Park project to the Board of Finance for financial analysis and recommendation to referendum. We felt strongly that the project needed official analysis of the finances and that this wonderful but expensive project requires the input of all residents. **continued on page 4**

We are in a very different situation than we expected several years ago, particularly with the fiscal uncertainty coming from the State. By the time you read this, the Board of Finance will have held a special meeting to formally review the cost estimates and evaluate them against our grand list and tax situation. The Chairman of the Library Building Committee and myself recently attended the Annual Meeting of the State Library Board in Hartford, where we requested and were granted a one year extension of the one million dollar library building/reimbursement grant. We are trying to keep all options open while planning for the financial health and well-being of Chester. Stay tuned.

OTHER NEWS

- Check out the new playground equipment in North Quarter Park! This spinner was installed to replace several broken items and has been a hit with the kids. The new equipment is easily movable in the future depending on the future of the North Quarter Park/Library project.
- The Chester Meeting House has had a lot of upgrades and changes recently. Last year we worked on safety issues with electricity and the stage, bought new fire retardant curtains and painted the backstage. Over the summer we installed

insulation for energy savings. Currently, the old furnaces under the floor are being replaced with a new efficient boiler, air handlers, chimney and oil tank, while the old underground oil tank will be officially and safely abandoned next spring. Thanks to the Meeting House Committee and the ETeam!

• We are working on a contract for the installation of 385 new solar panels on the roof of Chester Elementary School, to be installed during summer 2018. This project should provide approximately 42% of the electricity for the elementary school, will have an active educational component for the students and will save Chester taxpayers hundreds of thousands in electricity bills over the next 20 years.

Whew - there really is a lot going on around here. Please be safe, have a great season, and continue to bring new ideas and great camaraderie to our great town. Come to Town Talks, visit me at Town Hall, or email or call with questions or to discuss items of concern. I am here for you.

What Happens in the Chester Tax Office in October, November & December

Believe it or not, we stay busy during what is considered the "slow" months of the year. We first receive the list of aircraft based at Chester Airport, and my Assistant, Kristie, stays very busy with the mailing of approximately 110 letters and applications for the aircraft registrations. After the applications are mailed, then they come back to our office for processing, which is a multi-step process. Each application must have a matching copy of FAA registration, which must match exactly to their CT info that the aircraft owner is providing. A decal is issued after all info matches and fee is paid. The money obviously must then be recorded and deposited. Reminders go out to anyone who did not remember to send in or deliver their CT application. All this info is recorded on a special form to be mailed to the CAA, Connecticut Airport Authority, in the beginning of January each year, with a follow up final form mailed the following October each year. We get to chat with aircraft owners and that is a fun, and informative time and can be with people from all over the country, adding more interest to the whole process.

We are also following up on delinquent statements to those who forgot or could not pay the July taxes at the proper time. Some formal letters are sent, warning tax payers who are delinquent that their property could go up for TAX SALE if payments are not paid in a timely fashion. And in between all of this, we are updating our database for our 80 accounts that might still have Benefit Assessment bills to pay, and/or Usage bills. These special bills are both due during October, but we attempt to mail them in mid-September. We must verify that none of the 80 accounts have changed hands, so that our data base is as up to date as possible, prior to us mailing out those bills. We are able to combine any Benefit Assessment and Usage when the address matches, thus saving on envelopes, and postage. These payments start trickling in shortly after the bills are mailed. Then the payments are posted on the same system as our tax bills, but with a different category for reports. The money for Benefit Assessment goes to the Town of Chester, and the money from the Usage bills goes directly to the WPCA to cover its yearly expenses.

Just about the time the aircraft billing and the Benefit Assessment and Usage bills are paid, we start looking to see what unusual accounts that are still outstanding for a number of years should go on our "suspense" list. This list is prepared in December and given to Finance Department shortly after that for their approval. These accounts then do officially go on the suspense list for that particular year. These bills still may and do in many cases get paid, but we no longer need to actively pursue collecting them. Many of these bills are MV bills that do indeed get paid when the taxpayer needs to register a MV in the State of CT or one of the states that help us collect by not allowing a car to be registered in their state unless our CT taxes are first paid. There are about 15 states that work with CT to help all towns to collect back taxes.

During these same months, we are taking in payments for either early January installments or for some of the taxes that were still delinquent. So, in summary, we are never bored. We work hard to help with questions, and printouts and also with those who are thinking ahead and trying to get their tax information ready for the inevitable federal taxes that come due in a few short months. So, even if we are busy, we try to stay available to help the taxpayers of Chester with whatever question or problem they might have with taxes. Enjoy our fall colors as they come and go and remember that second half taxes are due in January, and we do not mail out new bills for those RE taxes that must be paid. We can email a reminder to whoever asks, so just provide us with your email address and the physical address of the taxes of the property that you are paying and we will email reminders around the 15th of each January. Let's hope it will be a beautiful fall, weather wise and color wise and a gentle winter on all of us New Englanders. Take care!

MORE HOLIDAY SHOPPING IDEAS



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Valley Seniors Teach Robotics to Kids in Haiti

How is it that three local boys come to know that no matter your background or culture, kids everywhere share the same emotions and creative spirit? By venturing to Haiti to teach their passion for robotics to children.

Valley Regional High School Seniors Sam Paulson, Nick (Rocket) Otte, and Patrick Myslik from Chester, traveled to Deschapelles, Haiti this past summer to teach a workshop in robotics to thirty kids, ages 8 to 14.

The one week workshop was held at the new Deschapelles Community Library in cooperation with the Sister Cities Essex Haiti (SCEH) Lego project - one of several ongoing SCEH projects in Deschapelles, Haiti. On the first workshop day, Sam, Rocket and Patrick, with help from an interpreter, demonstrated the components of the robot and the operating software. By week's end, the kids advanced to a fully operating robot with grabber mechanisms, so the robot could pick things up.

"Patrick, Rocket and I all thought it was awesome to share something we are passionate about. We felt immense gratification knowing when we leave, these kids will have skills to further their own robotics abilities and teach themselves," Sam wrote in their blog about their experience, Deschapelles Robotics Initiative - for full account: www.robo deschapelles.com.

Smoking & Eye Disease

Smoking tobacco (cigarettes, cigars, or pipes) can cause lung disease, heart disease, cancer, and many other serious health problems. But did you know that smoking can also harm your eyes?

- Cataracts Smoking increases your risk for getting cataracts. Cataracts is the clouding of your eye's naturally clear lens that causes blurry vision and makes colors look dull, faded, or yellowish. Cataracts are removed in surgery.
- Age-related macular degeneration (AMD) - This disease happens when a part of the retina called the macula is damaged. You lose your central vision and cannot see fine details. Sometimes medicine or surgery can help certain people with AMD from getting worse, but there is no cure. Studies show that smokers and ex-smokers are more

likely to get AMD than people who never smoked.

- Diabetic retinopathy Smokers who also have diabetes risk getting diabetic retinopathy. Diabetic retinopathy is when blood vessels in the eye are damaged causing blurry or distorted vision and possibly blindness. Treatment includes medication or surgery.
- **Optic nerve problems** People who smoke risk having optic nerve problems. The optic nerve connects the eye to the brain. Damage to this nerve can lead to blindness.
- **Dry eye** This is when your eyes don't produce enough tears. Smoking with dry eye will make your eyes more likely to feel scratchy, sting, burn, or be red.

- Uveitis Smoking can lead to a disease that affects part of the eye called the uvea. This is the middle layer of the eye wall. Uveitis is when this layer becomes inflamed (red and swollen). This disease causes a red eye, pain and vision problems.
- Graves' disease This is a disease of the body's thyroid gland. One of the symptoms of Graves' disease is bulging eyes. Smokers who have Graves' disease risk having their eye condition get worse. They can also lose vision.

The good news is that after people quit smoking, their risks for these eye diseases lowers.

Chester Town Trees

As I drive around our little town of Chester I'm always amazed as to how many trees there are in our town right of ways and town properties. They bring such beauty to our town roads and properties all year long from the onset of spring buds, their shade on a hot summer day, the vibrant and vivid colors of their fall leaves, to the bare dark beauty of their skeletal shape on a cold and winter's day as the sun sets in behind them. Not only are they beautiful but they also help with storm water reduction, erosion, and a safe place for wildlife to live.

Over the past few years our trees have been faced with life threatening conditions that have killed many of our town trees or has put them in severe decline. Last year's drought combined with the outbreak of the Gypsy Moth stressed many of our trees to the point that some could not recover. The ones that had recovered from last year's infestation were infested again this year by the Gypsy Moth. Most of these trees may have leafed out again after the infestation, but the stress may be too much for the trees to come back next year. This year the Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) has made it past our town borders and with many of our ash trees already in decline from drought, anthracnose, and ash yellows the (EAB) will find numerous stressed ash trees. which attract the insect to the tree. Climate change has also contributed to the decline of our sugar maples by the

tree not getting a consistent number of days with below freezing temps to keep the tree from coming out of dormancy.

This year the town will be removing 40 to 50 trees from our right of ways and town properties to protect our citizens from falling branches and property damage. We will be doing this in three waves. The first wave of tree removal is already under way and consists of 15 trees. The second wave of tree work will be in November to December and it too will consist of 15 trees. Over the winter the remaining trees will be removed as weather allows. Most of the tree removals will be done by an outside contractor and the remainder will be removed by the Public Works Department. A small red ribbon has been placed on the first round of trees and the next 15 trees will be tagged over the next few weeks. Any trees that do not get removed this year will be placed on a list for July next fiscal year's budget. The order of removal will depend on the current state of the tree and the potential for safety issues involving our residents and visitors.





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


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Chester Fife and Drum Corps



CELEBRATING 150TH ANNIVERSARY

In the words of Kate Silliman from the Chester Scrapbook, I quote "In 1867, the hills and ravines of Chester began to resound to a steady rhythmic roll of drums and shrill fifes as the newly organized Fife and Drum Corps started practicing under the leadership of Daniel Silliman. Twenty-five men of the town enrolled in that forerunner of the present corps, and before long had perfected their drumming."

So, it was 150 years ago that the Chester Fife and Drum Corps began.

As we begin to celebrate our 150th Anniversary and look forward to many, many more years, let's pause to remember all the past members that took up the drum, fife, and Color Guard, and kept this great Corps going. Only a handful of Corps can boast this milestone. Thanks to the Town of Chester and the surrounding communities for helping keep this tradition alive and well.

We will be hosting The Chester Fife and Drum Corps' 150th Celebration in 2018 with a muster, a gathering of over 25 other corps, to help us celebrate. It will be held at the Chester Fairgrounds on September 22, 2018.

Our Corps is still growing. We currently can field 7 snares, 5 basses and 8 fifes, plus full Color Guard. The best part is that we have more new members looking to join to help us celebrate. We are still working on updating our current uniforms and will hopefully have them completed by early next year.


