Hello Chester!

Happy Fall of 2018! On the plus side, the kids are back to school, the apples are ripe, football is back at Valley Regional and there is literally a fun local event every weekend to keep us having fun! On the other hand, I am probably not the only one sad to see it getting dark earlier every day... thank you again for being such a great community and letting me work every day on your behalf. We have a lot going on and are always looking to serve you better. Here are some important things to note:

STRATEGIC PLANNING

We are about to enter the final phase of our update of the Plan of Conservation and Development (POCD). A second survey is in process and I expect that a draft of the updated plan will be presented to the Planning and Zoning Commission by the end of October. They will then work to edit the document so that it reflects the wishes of you, the residents, and to make sure that it is in compliance with the State of Connecticut Plan.

Several special meetings of the Commission will be held to work through these pages, followed by a public hearing in February for final comments and corrections. The final revised document is due by mid-March, in keeping with the 10 year deadline. The end result will be an updated and restructured POCD, our statutorily

required guidance document for future planning. In the meantime, the Board of Selectmen, Board of Finance and other volunteers will be working to fashion a comprehensive Town Plan with criteria to link the goals of the POCD with the financial planning elements necessary to prioritize projects and bring them to frui-

tion. These are YOUR documents – all meetings are public. Please watch the Townwide email, the town website (www.chesterct.org), and the POCD planning website (www.weknowwhereitis.com) for relevant dates and times.

Please participate - we need everyone's input!

HOW DO YOU GET INVOLVED?

We are currently discussing ideas for enabling and encouraging more people to participate in the business of our town. The Board of Selectmen are looking at the current methods for elections and appointments to Boards and Commissions specifically. Current procedures are focused on the two party system, with Town Committees referring candidates to the municipal ballot and to the Board of Selectmen for appointment.

Part of our discussion is focused on the reasons residents do not get involved. These reasons may vary widely – is it because from the time of many meetings conflicts with dinner and small children's bedtimes? That residents are just too busy with the regular working lives? The necessity to "run" for office on the municipal ballot? Confusion about how to start? We would really like to hear from you as part of our investigation. Please email or call my office if you have opinions and/or suggestions. We are hoping to be able to make some positive improvements in this arena soon.

EMERGENCY COMMUNICATIONS

Hurricanes. Tornados. Snowstorms. Our sympathy and best wishes go to those in the Carolinas dealing with the aftermath of Hurricane Florence. Last March we had our own experience with extended power outages and impassable roads on a thankfully less deadly level. As we discover again every year, communication during emergency weather events is difficult. My office has worked with the police, Chester Hose Company and our Emergency Management Director to institute plans and procedures for communicating with Chester residents during these events. Last year alone we changed our Townwide email platform so that we could

send communications from any computer with internet access, upgraded our ability to have wireless communication during power outages, and updated our ability to send emergency health and safety messages through Everbridge to individual cell phones and email addresses. We also post emergency messages and instructions on television and radio news stations, our town website and Facebook page. None of these communication methods will work,

however, without you. Please help our Townwide communications get to you by doing the following:

Call or email Jenny at the Selectman's office and ask to be put on the Townwide email list and get instructions to go online and sign up for Everbridge alerts. If you are not comfortable with the internet, but have a phone that you would like to enter for emergency communica-

tions, we will help you to get entered into the Everbridge system for emergency calls.

Our goal is to keep our residents informed and safe during times of emergency. Thanks for your attention to this in advance of any emergency.

Have a wonderful fall – I hope to see everyone at one of our fun local fall events!

Middlesex Hospital: Detecting and Treating Breast Cancer

Middlesex Hospital is using new technology and techniques to help Connecticut women.

Early detection is very important when it comes to breast cancer, the most common cancer in women in the United States, and Middlesex has invested in technology that allows for more complete imaging.

Traditionally, women have received 2D mammograms, but it can be difficult to detect potential cancers while they're still small and most treatable using these 2D images. That's why Middlesex Hospital uses 3D mammograms. These 3D images enable Middlesex radiologists to examine each layer of tissue more closely and from angles previously unavailable, resulting in a 40 percent increase in invasive breast cancer detection.

In addition, Middlesex is the only hospital in New England to offer dual-headed molecular breast imaging, which uses a radio-active tracer to better detect breast cancer cells. Molecular breast imaging is often used in conjunction with mammograms to give patients the best possible chance at early detection.

We hope you will find it to be a useful tool to find updated information and explore our wonderful community. While early detection is certainly key, how breast cancer is treated is also important, and Middlesex is always looking to improve outcomes for its patients. To that end, Middlesex recently began using the Deep Inspiration Breath-Hold Technique, which helps to keep radiation away from the heart for women receiving treatment for cancer in their left breast.

Election - November 6th

The next election will be November 6, 2018. The polls will be open from 6 am – 8 pm on the 2nd floor of Town Hall. This is an election for Governor and Lieutenant Governor, Representative in Congress, State Senator, State Representative, Secretary of the State, Treasurer, Comptroller, Attorney General, Judge of Probate and Registrar of Voters.

The last day to register to vote in this election is Tuesday, October 30, 2018. Election Day Registration will be available on November 6 in the registrars' office for residents who did not register by October 30. Residents will be required to provide a form of identification and proof of residential address. Registration can be done in person at Town Hall during regular hours, by mail, or online with the Secretary of the State's website https://voterregistration.ct.gov/OLVR/welcome.do.

You can check your registration online at https://portaldir.ct.gov/sots/LookUp.aspx or by calling our office at 860 526 0013 ext 211. If you wish to vote by Absentee Ballot, applications can be picked up in the Town Clerk's office. Or obtained online at https://portal.ct.gov/-/media/sots/ElectionServices/ ElectForms/electforms/aabengpdf.pdf?la=en.



Observations of a Tax Collector

It amazes me each August that so many people forget to pay their JULY taxes. This August, we had to mail out 79 delinquent Real Estate (RE) bills & 545 delinquent Motor Vehicle (MV) bills & luckily only 59 delinquent Personal Property (PP) bills. That is approximately 15% of the PP & just a bit lower for the MV ones at 13% & much less for the RE bills at 4%. Of the 79 RE, 26 are people working on their older bills first, so technically, 53 forgot to pay their RE bills or couldn't for one reason or the other. I wish I could figure out a way to be sure no one forgets again. I guess after 15 years of being the Assistant in Deep River, and now over 9 years being the Tax Collector in Chester, if I haven't been able to figure it out yet, I probably never will.

But to help you not miss paying in January, when it is much easier to forget because there is no bill at that time, & we are all busy with the different holidays, try to fill out this reminder sheet & send it by mail or email. Then, we will try to personally remind you about the January installment. We can't do it in July since we are much busier in that first collection time frame. If you have already sent an email address for us to contact you, then just drop us an email to verify that we have it. Or, fill out the form again, to guarantee we have it, & we will start

to remind anyone on our REMINDER list by email on or near the 15th of January if the real estate bill is not paid by then. Or, we will start calling if we just have your phone number near the 22nd of January, so maybe we can help more people avoid the 3% interest (since it is by state statute 1% from due date which would be January 1st and 1% for February if the postmark is Feb 2nd or later). Here is the form... but a blank paper with the info on it would work also & just send it to Tax Collector PO Box 314 Chester, CT 06412 or email to TaxCollector@chesterct.org Maybe I can observe a much lower number or zero forgetfulness this February!

Collomore Concerts Wraps up 45th Season

Several more concerts remain in the 45th season of the Robbie Collomore Concert Series. They will be on Sundays at 5 pm in our Chester Meeting House.

Jazz vocalist René Marie will sweep you off your feet at her Oct. 14 concert. She has been called "one of the more creative female jazz singers on the scene today" by All About Jazz, and Jazz-Times ranks her "among the most dynamic jazz vocalists."

Young pianist Salome Jordania will perform on Nov. 14. Since she took up piano studies at age seven in her native country, Georgia, she has played recitals throughout Europe and North America, won many competitions and prizes, and is currently in her third year at Juilliard. In Chester, she will play works by Haydn and Chopin and as a special treat the original piano version of Mussorgsky's "Pictures at an Exhibition."

Natives of the Ecuadorian Andes, the four Lopez brothers, Fernando, Luis, Bolivar, and Jorge, form the music group Andes Manta, which will perform in Chester on Nov. 25. Playing more than 35 traditional instruments, Andes Manta creates a vibrant and powerful sound, using such instruments as the quena, or Andean flute, and the six-foot-long pan pipes. The brothers performed at a packed Meeting House in 2004, and

Today is Tomorrow's History - What's New with Chester Historical Society

The Delaney Estate Sale

The Chester Historical Society will present an estate sale from the longtime historic home of Barbara and Edmund Delaney on Saturday, Oct. 13, from 8 am to 1:30 pm at St. Joseph's Parish Center. You will find antiques, furniture, oriental rugs, prints, paintings, bric-a-brac, and more.

It's particularly fitting that this noteworthy event is being held by the Historical Society because the Delaneys were the founders and past presidents of the organization Commemorating WWI Armistice.

In collaboration with the Deep River and Essex Historical Societies, the Chester Historical Society is commemorating the 100th anniversary of the end of World War I on Sunday, Nov. 4 at 3 pm in the Deep River Town Hall auditorium. We'll be hon-




BRAYCE IVORYTON PLAYHOUSE EVENT July 11, 2018

Diabetes and the Eye

Diabetes is a disease that affects your ability to produce or use insulin to effectively control the blood sugar (glucose) levels in your body. Too much glucose in the blood for an extended amount of time can damage many parts of your body, including your eyes.


According to the CDC (Centers for Disease Control and Prevention) about 90% of diabetes related vision loss can be prevented with early detection. Yet a study performed by researchers at Wills Eye Hospital saw that 60% of people with diabetes skip their annual exam needed to preserve their vision. It is imperative that people with diabetes get an annual dilated eye exam because ocular complications due to diabetes may show no signs or symptoms. When blood vessels in the eye's retina swell, leak, or close off, or if abnormal new blood vessels grow, it is called diabetic retinopathy. People who are at a higher risk of developing diabetic retinopathy are those who have diabetes

or poor blood sugar control, women who are pregnant, and people with high blood pressure or high blood lipids. Diabetes can also cause your vision to change even if you do not have retinopathy. If your blood sugar levels change very quickly, it can affect the shape of your eye's lens which causes blurry vision. Your vision usually goes back to normal after your blood sugar stabilizes.

According to the Academy of Ophthalmology, the top 5 steps to help prevent diabetic eye diseases are:

- 1. Get a comprehensive dilated eye exam from your ophthalmologist at least once a year.
- 2. Control your blood sugar.
- 3. Maintain healthy blood pressure and cholesterol levels
- 4. Quit smoking
- 5. Exercise

Welcome to CRAHD


On behalf of the CT River Area Health District (CRAHD) I would like to welcome all Chester residents.

Connecticut Cancer Foundation - John & Jane Ellis by Sigrid Kun

An enduring promise to help Connecticut cancer patients and their families.

The story of John and Jane Ellis is one of love, inspiration and dedication. She says he had the vision. He says she's the angel who does everything. Together, they are strong individuals who never wavered since John made a most solemn promise.

Born in New London, John was a high school standout in football and baseball. He went on to a 13-year major league baseball career. The catcher debuted in 1969 with the New York Yankees (1969-1972), hitting a home run in his first at bat. He also played for the Cleveland Indians (1973-1975) and Texas Rangers (1976-1981).

A routine life insurance examination revealed a spot. He had been a picture of health - jogging 10 miles a day. At age 38, the 1971 Topps All-Star Rookie had Hodgkin's lymphoma. He had already lost a brother, sister and sister-in-law, each to cancer. "Sitting there in the hole, getting your juice, and breaking it down. I made a deal," explains John. "If you let me live, I'm going to do this. I said I'd dedicate my whole life to the needs of the needy."

That was 1987. Together, the couple started a foundation whose mission has remained steadfast - to provide financial assistance to Connecticut cancer patients and their families and to fund cancer research. He is the Chairman/Founder. She is the President and Executive Director. The formula is simple. Many individuals affected by cancer struggle with basic living necessities. The foundation is there to help.

Oncology social workers in Connecticut provide referrals to the foundation. Applications are reviewed each Monday, with grants made within a week - an unheard of turnaround. If there is an emergency, they will do what they can right away. "It's all local. "You know where the money is going and that makes us unique," notes Jane. To date, the foundation has provided almost \$6 million in financial assistance to CT families and over \$2 million to lymphoma research. A \$7 million endowment ensures its future

Their signature fundraiser is an annual celebrity dinner first held in 1988 at the Groton Motor Inn. Mickey Mantle, Whitey Ford and Billy Martin were there. "It was like a group of friends, getting together and telling stories," relates Jane. "It was special." The event raised \$100,000. At the end of the evening, Mickey observed "I hope this foundation goes on forever."

The event has grown markedly and is now hosted by a key corporate partner, Mohegan Sun. The next celebrity dinner will be held on February 8, 2019. The list of attendees are a testament to the relationships/trust that the couple forged over the years: Don Zimmer (who once released John), Yogi Berra, Derek Jeter, David Oritz, Hank Aaron, Carl Yastrzemski, Joe Torre, Reggie Jackson, Mariano Rivero, and Roger



Clemens. There are new fundraising initiatives: Cycle Against Cancer, the Fishing Against Cancer tournament, and a Speakers Program.

The foundation recently (July 2017) opened its new location at 15 North Main Street in Old Saybrook. Every aspect of the new facility focuses on the foundation's mission. There is a Hall of Fame. "It's a museum piece," says John. "A tribute to some of the wonderful baseball players who helped literally to build the foundation." There is an art gallery to hold exhibits benefitting the foundation. In fact, the inaugural art gallery exhibition (Horses: In Harmony) takes place from September 28 to October 26. "It's the infrastructure for the next 30 years," says Jane.

John and Jane have assembled plenty of stories. John laughs over that second celebrity dinner when Joe DiMaggio wouldn't sign memorabilia Whitey Ford brought along for him to sign. Yogi Berra successfully intervened. And then there was a single mother whose child was suffering from a rare cancer. "I'll never forget that for the rest of my life," recounts Jane. "They were homeless. She didn't know how to feed her children that evening. We gave her \$2,000. That gave her hope. We continued to help her. We got furniture... I had John schlep it all in his truck."

Thirty years ago, the couple wondered if they'd still be needed. Surely, cancer would be beaten already. "Our mission is more relevant today than 30 years ago," explains Jane. "Everyday expenses...it's so much more expensive to live. Our help is needed more than ever." "There's plenty of work here," adds John. "We look forward to making sure the foundation goes on and on."

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
