HOMEOWNER'S TAX RELIEF PROGRAM

The Homeowner's Tax Relief Program allows

a tax credit for qualifying individuals. To qualify, the homeowner (or spouse, if domiciled together) must have been 65 years of age by the end of 2017 and must reside at the property. 2017 income cutoff is \$43,000 if married, and \$35,300 if not married; this is defined as adjusted gross

income and tax-exempt interest, plus any other income not included in the adjusted gross income. Totally disabled persons, regardless of age, are eligible provided they have a Social Security Award Letter or SSA-1099 with Medicare premiums. The filing period for this tax relief program is February 1 through May 15, 2018.

ADDITIONAL VETERAN'S EXEMPTIONS

An additional exemption may be available for those veterans who meet the income requirements noted above. Applications for this program must be filed between February 1 and October 1, 2018.

APPLICATIONS

Both of these programs require applications to be filed every two years. If you are currently on one or both of these programs and it is your year to refile, applications will be mailed to you February 1. Forms are available in the Assessor's Office.

Spotlight on the Tax and Revenue Collector's Office

MEET THE MEMBERS OF YOUR TAX AND REVENUE COLLECTOR'S OFFICE.

The Town's Tax and Revenue Collector, Ann Marie Conti, is responsible for the collection of taxes on real estate, personal property, and motor vehicles. Other collection functions include sewer assessments and sewer use fees, as well as trash collection

fees. Also serving the Town in the Tax and Revenue Collector's Office are Heidi Tucker, Deputy Tax and Revenue Collector and Jackie Wagner, CCMC, Tax Clerk.

Tax rates are determined by the Board of Finance through the municipal budget process, with the annual tax rate (mill rate)



depending on how much money is needed to fund the municipal budget and how much property is available to be taxed (grand list) as of the assessment date (grand list date) of October 1. Like all Connecticut towns, Ellington operates on a fiscal year, beginning July 1 and ending the following June 30. Tax bills are issued July 1 each year and payments are due semiannually in July (first installment) and the following January (second installment). Motor Vehicle bills are due in one installment. The current mill rate is 31.7.

State statutes dictate the procedures to be followed for the billing and collection of taxes and the record-keeping involved and also govern when and how bills are sent; what notice is to be given or published concerning taxes; the rate and applicability of interest; how liens are applied; and what means of delinquent collections are permitted. Your tax dollars are essential to the successful maintenance and growth of this great Town. Tax revenue supports the Hall Memorial Library, the Ellington Senior Center, Ellington Public Schools, Town building and road maintenance, parks and recreation programs and police protection to name just a few of the vital services provided. Our Tax and Revenue Department boasts a high tax collection rate and much of that is due to the Ellington residents who diligently pay their taxes in full and on time. The Tax and Revenue Department staff members are always available to assist taxpayers who have questions.



The 2018-2019 Budget Process is Underway!

BOARD OF SELECTMEN AND BOARD OF FINANCE MEET FOR FISCAL YEAR 2018-2019 BUDGET

In early January, the Board of Selectmen and the Board of Finance members joined to begin the months-long budget process. In Ellington, the method used to determine the budget is an open process. Every citizen who is registered to vote (property owners and those who rent) is welcome to participate. Your involvement is very important. Please take the time to become familiar with Ellington's proposed budget once it becomes available. All of the meetings held in this process are open to the public. Town departments, commissions and agencies will review programs and services in order to determine how much it will cost to operate the Town for the next fiscal year. This includes the Board of Education, which will estimate how much it will cost to operate the schools and school-related services.

In accordance with the Town Charter Section 1003, Nicholas J. DiCorleto, Jr., Finance Officer/Treasurer, compiles the Budget Book for the Board of Finance on or before March 15. The

compilation of the Budget Book includes the submitted budgets from the Board of Selectmen on General Government, Board of Education, and Capital Improvements. It also includes the estimated projection of revenues for the current fiscal year and the following fiscal year. All budget documents are posted on the Finance page of the Town website so that the citizens of Ellington have complete information at their disposal to increase their knowledge and to assist them in participating in the budget process.

Ellington Emergency Response Team Uses Technology as Force Multiplier



Ellington is one of many Connecticut towns and cities that have formally organized a team of residents to assist the community when emergencies arise. Ellington's Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) was established in 2008 and presently includes approximately thirty members. Ellington CERT is recognized as one of the "civil preparedness forces" created by state law, and is nationally registered with the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). CERT programs around the country serve in a support role to police, fire and ambulance professionals. In addition, CERT Teams provide shelters for displaced persons during emergency events, assist with search and rescue operations, traffic control services and other support functions.

CERT members volunteer their time to continually train to assist in a variety of disaster preparedness, response and recovery efforts. In Ellington, CERT members have pre-positioned resources to provide temporary shelter and food service to Townspeople at the Ellington High School, Middle School and Crystal Lake School facilities. As

required by law, these "people" shelters are also equipped, and CERT members trained, to provide shelter for the domestic pets of those staying at the shelter. In 2011, the Ellington CERT operated the shelter at the high school.

Approximately half of the Ellington CERT members are amateur radio operators (Hams) licensed by the Federal Communications Commission. The key characteristic of Ham radio is that it functions when cell phone, land phone lines and the internet are not operating due to weather or other issues.

In Ellington, CERT Ham Operators use amateur radio for communications between

the school shelters and the Town Emergency Operations Center (EOC). CERT members rely on Ham radio communications when they are operating at field locations in various areas in Town.

Ellington CERT received permission from the Enfield CERT leadership to use the Enfield team's radio "repeater" system. Ellington CERT Hams practice radio operations on a regular basis to confirm their equipment capabilities and keep their skills sharp.

A Ham radio repeater receives signals from low power handheld Ham radios, then rebroadcasts it at higher power. We would like to say thank you to the Enfield CERT for allowing Ellington CERT to operate on their repeater system. The Enfield Repeater allows Ellington CERT members to communicate with each other throughout Town.

Ellington CERT Hams conduct weekly call-ins on non-repeater frequencies as part of the Amateur Radio Emergency Service (ARES) system. The ARES group is the field arm of the American Radio Relay

League that recruits and trains operators to provide emergency communications. The state's emergency response framework and municipal model operations plans call for ARES to partner with municipalities when requested to provide communications support functions needed during emergencies or the immediate aftermath during recovery operations.

Ellington CERT welcomes all those interested in joining the CERT program and helping our community. CERT meetings are held on the third Thursday of the month at the Ellington Volunteer Ambulance building next to Ellington High School. Ellington CERT leadership is provided by Joseph Palombizio as the Ellington Emergency Management Director and John Streiber as the Deputy Emergency Management Director. DOES YOUR HOME NEED REPAIR?

If you own and live in a single or multi-family residential property in Ellington that is occupied by low- or moderate-income households, you

may be eligible for financial assistance to make repairs to your property.

The Town manages the Ellington Regional Housing Rehabilitation Program, which offers financial and technical assistance to property owners in Ellington, Somers, Suffield, and Windsor Locks. The Program's purposes are to correct building code deficiencies, improve energy efficiency and improve housing conditions.

The program currently has no waiting list for Ellington residents. The types of work that the Program assists with include upgrades to electrical, plumbing, heating systems and insulation, energy conservation improvements, roofing and window replacement, septic system repair, asbestos and lead-paint abatement, and accessibility modifications.

Funding assistance is provided in the form of a 0% interest "deferred payment loan" (DPL). The DPL is only repaid when the property is sold. If the property is transferred to an heir, the loan does not need to be repaid but it remains in effect until a sale at a future date. Financial assistance is limited to \$30,000 per housing unit.

Low income property owners may qualify for 100% of the cost of repairs. Moderate income property owners may qualify for 75% of the cost of repairs.

VOLUNTEER INCOME TAX ASSISTANCE

Did your household earn less than \$54,000 in 2017? Would you like FREE assistance with filing your taxes? If so, and when you have all your tax documents, please call us to schedule a VITA (Volunteer Income Tax Assistance) appointment. You must provide the following information (if applicable) for all persons on return: valid photo ID, Social Security cards,

birth dates, income and wage information (1099, W2's, etc), Form 1095-A (ACA), 2016 tax return, Form 1098 (mortgage interest, property taxes), Form 1098-T or 1098-E, child or dependent care expenses including the name, address and tax ID # (or SS or ITIN) of provider, bank routing and account number for direct deposit, any other pertinent documents or papers. Married couples must both be present to sign return. All VITA tax preparers are trained and certified in tax law by the IRS.

SECURE YOUR MAILBOX - Residents are asked to make sure their mailboxes are secured and sturdy before the winter snow begins. Mailboxes damaged by snow load will not be repaired by the Town.

RECYCLE SHED AND HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS

WASTE - Currently the MIDNEROC collection center in Willington is closed for the winter; it is scheduled to open again on April 21, 2018. The Town's recycling shed at 21 Main Street continues to be open during working hours: Monday-Friday

7:00 am - 3:30 pm. The following items are accepted at the Public Works shed: batteries, waste oil, antifreeze, motor oil, oil filters, propane tanks, fluorescent light bulbs, computer components, and electronics. Paint is NOT accepted at this location.

TEXTILE RECYCLING - The Town has a box for textile recycling located at the Town Garage. Usable as well as non-usable clothing items are accepted. Also accepted are shoes, belts, handbags, stuffed animals; all must be bagged and put into the container.

SNOW REMOVAL FROM FIRE HYDRANTS AND

SIDEWALKS - If you have a fire hydrant or sidewalk in front of your home, it is your responsibility to clear it. Sidewalks are required to be cleared within 24 hours of a storm's end.

REMINDERS

- It is illegal to discharge sump pumps into the sanitary sewer; they must be discharged to the exterior.
- Please do not dispose of items into our storm drains. They run directly into our lakes and streams.

Starting in November 2016, all honorably discharged veterans of every era became eligible to get a photo identification card from the Department of Veterans Affairs (DVA) due to a law passed in 2015. The law, Veterans Identification Card Act 2015, orders the DVA to issue a hard-copy photo I.D. to any honorably discharged veteran who applies. The law states that the card must contain the veteran's name, photo and a non-Social Security identification number. Veterans may apply for the card online at www.vets.gov/#. At the bottom of the page click on "Apply for Printed Veteran I.D. Card". Congress passed the I.D. law as a way to help veterans prove their service without showing a copy of their DD-214 discharge papers. This allows Veterans to receive the benefits and discounts they deserve. The I.D. law coincides with military exchange stores opening online shopping to all honorably discharged veterans which began in November 2017. Veterans who opt to utilize the military exchange store online shopping benefit must be verified through VetVerify.org.

RECENTLY PASSED STATE LEGISLATION - AFFECTING VETERANS AND THE MILITARY

PA17-83 s3: Burial in the State Veterans' Cemeteries: National Guard and reservists who do not have active duty service beyond training may now be buried in a state veterans' cemetery.

PA17-79 s23: Handicap Placards for Veterans with PTSD: Veterans with PTSD have an option to receive a windshield handicap placard. The new law allows an applicant to get the placard by providing certification from a U.S. DVA psychiatrist that (1) he or she is a veteran who has service-connected PTSD and (2) meets the federal definition of a person with a disability that limits or impairs the ability to walk.

PA17-127 s127. Medicaid Programs for Certain Family Members:

The legislature passed a law that allows an armed forces member on active duty to apply on behalf of his or her spouse or child for any Medicaid home or community-based program in Connecticut for which the spouse or child is eligible.

PA17-127 s1-13 Prohibition of Discriminatory Practices on the Basis of Veteran Status: A new law prohibits discrimination on the basis of a veteran's status in employment, public accommodations, the sale or rental of housing, the granting of credit and other laws over which the Commission on Human rights and Opportunities (CHRO) has jurisdiction. The law authorizes any veteran aggrieved by an alleged discriminatory practice to file a discrimination complaint with CHRO. PA17-83 s2. Veteran Status on Driver's Licenses / I.D. Cards: Former service members entitled to military retirement pay under federal law, regardless of age, may request to have their veteran status listed on their driver's license or identity card.



A NOTE FROM THE RECREATION DIRECTOR, BOB TEDFORD

December and January have been historic from the standpoint of inclement weather, so let's hope that February and March are less intrusive!

Here are just a few reminders on winter access and postponement guidelines. Please be extra careful accessing sidewalks and parking lots, as sand/salt and snow/ice can be prominent. In case of inclement weather, and if the public schools are closed or released early, ALL day or evening recreation programs are automatically postponed for that day. Weekend programming is, historically, decided upon by 6:30 am that day. All postponements are placed on the Parks & Recreation website and Facebook, as well as the following media outlets: WFSB 3 - WTNH 8 - WVIT NBC 30; cancellations will be listed under "Ellington Recreation Department."

Some highlights and upcoming events deserve a special note:

- On Saturday, March 24, the 2018 Ice Breaker plunge will take place at Crystal Lake; this event will support our veterans.
- The 2017 Hunter K. Giroux Holiday Youth Basketball Tournament was very successful, with four teams taking part in the 8th grade boys' event. This event is named after the late Hunter K. PROGRAM REGISTRATION PROCESS

The Ellington Parks and Recreation Department has a registration process for all recreational programs/camps through our Active-Net Online Program. The process for online registration is easy and convenient for all. The process involves following these simple steps:

Note: there is a convenience fee applied to your credit card when registering at home. We reserve the right to limit class size and to cancel classes that do not meet minimum requirements. 

Registration forms received after that date will be placed in the "as available" file until final registrations/two evaluations have been completed. It is important to note that the spring 2018 season could bring about new age groups and/or placements based on 'actual enrollment' as of April 10, 2018. Since spring soccer is considered an off-season sport, roster size and team alignment may be adjusted in order to provide a roster placement for all registrants. EPS' Student Enrollment Prompts New Policy



At the September 27, 2017 Ellington Board of Education meeting, the Board unanimously approved Policy 5117 School Enrollment Zones. The policy was publically discussed at four meetings including three full Board of Education meetings July through September 2017. The policy

went into effect on January 1, 2018. The new policy does not impact students enrolled in the Ellington Schools prior to January 1, 2018.

WHY A NEW ENROLLMENT ZONES POLICY?

The Town of Ellington is growing. In August 2017, the Connecticut State Data Center reports that Ellington's popula-

tion is projected to increase from approximately 16,000 residents in 2017 to 22,000 residents in 2040. From 2007-2017, the Ellington Public Schools has had its student population increase approximately 4.5% whereas surrounding area school systems have witnessed a decline - approximately -17% in South Windsor and Somers, and -20% in Tolland. Since 1999, the Ellington Schools have seen student enrollment increase approximately 24%.

The Ellington Schools requested its annual school enrollment projection report from the New England School Development Council (NESDEC). The report projects a rise from the current (as of January 2018) student enrollment of approximately 2,700 to 2,900 in 2027.

Should the Ellington Schools' student enrollment continue to grow, it will be increasingly difficult to balance our class sizes and provide equitable learning opportunities for students at Windermere, Center, and Crystal Lake Elementary Schools.

WHAT IS POLICY 5117 SCHOOL ENROLLMENT ZONES?

The policy allows the school administration to determine the best school placement for new students at one of Ellington's three elementary schools regardless of which enrollment zone the student's primary residence is located.

WHAT IS AN ENROLLMENT ZONE?

Ellington Schools' enrollment zones have been in place for over twenty years. The policy doesn't change the established enrollment zones. Each Ellington residence falls within one of the three enrollment zones attributed to our three elementary schools.

WHICH FAMILIES WILL BE AFFECTED BY THE POLICY?

The policy will primarily impact a small number of students entering kindergarten or newly enrolled in the district.

IF MY FAMILY ALREADY HAS A CHILD ENROLLED IN AN ELEMENTARY SCHOOL, COULD THE SIBLING BE ASSIGNED TO A DIFFERENT ELEMENTARY SCHOOL?

No, students with a sibling enrolled in an elementary school will be assigned to the same school as their sibling.

LOCAL PRIVATE SCHOOLS

In the era before the public school system, local private schools were prominent in Ellington. Mr. John Hall opened a school in 1829 for the education of his own children and eventually included children from outside his family. Located on Frog

Ellington Historical Society

Hollow Road, the Ellington School was initially for boys only and the students came from the surrounding states as well as the West Indies and Brazil. When Hall's health failed, the school became more of a village academy and admitted girls. The school closed in 1870 and burned down in 1875.

John Hall's oldest son Edward founded Edward Hall's Family School for Boys in 1844. This school was located on Main Street and offered living in a family setting while attending school. Classes were comprised of about 12 students who stayed from three to five years. The classics, including Latin, were emphasized, and students enjoyed life in the rural community with activities such as sledding and skating in the winter. The school closed in 1875 due to Edward Hall's failing health and eventual death.

Yanosuke Iwasaki of Japan was a student at Edward Hall's Family School for Boys in the early 1870s. The family-like setting was an opportunity for him to learn English and socialize with American boys. Yanosuke returned to Japan and became the second president of the Mitsubishi Corporation in 1885. The corporation was originally a shipping company but modernized and diversified under Yanosuke's leadership to become the company we know today.



Everyone is always looking for ways to save money and get a deal. Your library is the best deal in Town! Check out what it has for you.

- Read for Free: Yes, we have lots of books, of all kinds, new ones and old favorites, for all ages, along with audiobooks and ebooks. If we don't have the one you want, just ask! But did you know how much you are saving by checking out James Patterson's latest from the library? The cost of an average adult hardcover book is \$29.00, an average children's hardcover book is \$18.00, and an average adult fiction paperback book is \$16.00.
- Magazines and Newspapers for Free: Magazine titles from Time Magazine to People to Mother Earth News, including a year of back issues, are available for loan; you can also use our download service, Zinio, to read on your device. Local newspapers as well as the Wall Street Journal, New York Times and others are available for reading in the library. The average cost of a magazine is \$5.60 per issue and the average cost of a digital-only newspaper subscription is \$15.11 per month.
- Movies and Music for Free: New DVDs are available a few
 days after release, and there is something for everyone in our
 large collection. There are CDs, too, for all ages. You can also
 stream movies, TV shows and music with HOOPLA. A new
 DVD is \$21.95, and streaming services have monthly charges.
- Free Programs for Adults and Teens: Where else can you see new release-on-DVD movies (with hot popcorn!), attend historical programs and hands-on craft programs, participate in book groups or a knitting group, and check out e a great Friday night music performance all for free? Movie: \$5.00 Tuesday nights, Educational program at local college: \$10.00. Making new friends: priceless!
- Internet, Wi-Fi and Access to Computers, Printers, Fax and Scanner: You can have free internet access and Wi-Fi, on your

device or ours. The average cost of internet service is \$45/month for the slowest service, and we all know about the cost of printer ink. Prints and photocopies are just \$.10 for B&W and \$.25 for color at the library. We have fax service and a scanner too!

- **Job Preparation:** JobNow is a very powerful service that provides you with practical tools to help you get a job, as well as a learning library with live skills-building lessons, videos, practice tests for college entrance, college placement, grad school and an ESL center. Test prep course elsewhere can cost up to \$1,000.
- Find Your Family History: For family genealogists, we offer free access to the search programs Ancestry.com, Heritage Quest.com, AmericanAncestors.org and Fold3.com. Ancestry, Fold3 and AmericanAncestors require you to search in the library, but HeritageQuest will allow you to search from home after logging in with your library card number. The cost of an online genealogy membership is at least \$19.99 per month.
- Great Services for Parents and Kids: We are a significant resource to parents. Where else could your children find a free summer program that encourages reading, allows them to take home armloads of books for free and have a blast all summer long? Throughout our summer programs, authors, wildlife experts and a myriad of others drop by bringing their special knowledge to share. We have a collection of parenting books, thousands of DVDs for the kids (and adults, too!), and a staff that can help you or your child find the exact right title.

The Bottom Line...Hopefully, you already have a library card, but if not, stop in soon to get one. Obtaining a library card is free and simple: visit the library, fill out an application, present ID and proof of residency and you have instant, free access to a world of entertainment and information! Such a deal!

HAPPY 250TH ANNIVERSARY TO EAST WINDSOR!

In 1633, settlers laid claim to the vast area of land on both sides of the Connecticut River, now known as Windsor, East Windsor, South Windsor and Ellington. The first English settler in what is known today as East Windsor was William Pynchon, the founder of Springfield, Massachusetts. In 1636, he erected a warehouse for his settlement's transshipment of goods at what is now known as "Warehouse Point". Warehouse Point served as the southern border of Springfield, Massachusetts for 132 years - until 1768 - when Warehouse Point was annexed by the Connecticut Colony. Pynchon selected the site of Warehouse Point because of its location near the Enfield Falls - the first major falls in the Connecticut River, where all seagoing vessels were forced to

terminate their voyages and transfer goods to smaller vessels. By constructing a warehouse at this location, Pynchon essentially forced all northern Connecticut River business to run through him and his settlement at Springfield.

Initially, settlers avoided the East Side of the river due to the Podunk Indian tribe that inhabited the area, particularly following King Philip's War in 1675. But the lure of the fertile land won out, and settlers began to traverse the river to farm and eventually establish homesteads. In 1733, when Reverend John McKinstry became the minister of the first Congregational Church in Ellington, only 11 families lived in this "Great Marsh" area. Eventually in 1768, East Windsor parish was partitioned from Windsor. The center of town was in what is now East Windsor Hill in today's South Windsor. Ellington parish separated from East Windsor in 1786.

To celebrate our shared history, the five libraries in the original "East Side" have joined together and created a fun scavenger hunt for you and your family to enjoy during the month of February. To play, visit the Hall Memorial Library to pick up your booklet, and look for the five items here. Then visit the other libraries—South Windsor Public Library and Wood Memorial Library in South Windsor, and Broad Brook Library and Warehouse Point Library in East Windsor; find the five items in each of those libraries. Once you have found all the items and all have been verified, you will be entered into a drawing to win a gift certificate to The Book Club Book Store in South Windsor.


