# Happy New Year Haddam!

The end of 2016 has been busy and productive. I want to share some of the following developments with you.

#### **Cell Phone Service Tower Updates**

On November 17th at a Town Meeting, two sites located on Haddam municipal property were approved for leasing with Homeland Towers. These sites are 439 Saybrook Road (Volunteer Firehouse) and a vacant lot at the intersection of Jail Hill Road and Quarry Hill Roads. Homeland Towers is working to sign on carrier(s), and initiate an application with the Connecticut Siting Council.

# **Tylerville Water**

We have held numerous meetings with the Department of Energy & Environmental Protection (DEEP), the Department of Public Health (DPH), and Connecticut Water Service, Inc. over the past year. Final testing of the water for the "Alternatives Report" is expected in January by AECOM, a third-party hired by DEEP.

I have concerns about the state of Connecticut's budget and deficit. Most state funding for water projects has been omitted, however, because Haddam is on the Superfund list for Connecticut, funding for our water project is still in place.

Therefore, I am working diligently to get this alternatives report and study completed quickly so that we know what options we have to pursue for Tylerville before we lose our funding.

## **Road Projects**

Road milling and paving was completed on a number of roads and this will continue






in the spring when asphalt is available again. Dish Mill Bridge, Phase 1 of McTigh Road is complete along with the bridge in Higganum Center. The major reconstruction for Bartman, McTigh and Park Roads will be going out to bid in the next few months.

This process uses a mere 5 gallons of propane each month, resulting in a cost of just 30 cents per curing cycle, saving thousands of dollars in monthly expense.

#### **SPORTSMEN**

2017 SPORTS LICENSES are available. Additional information regarding regulations, permits, conservation education/firearms safety courses are available online at http://www.dep.state.ct.us. DEEP reminds anglers age 65 and older that the free resident "lifetime" inland fishing, hunting and trapping licenses for individuals age 65 and older became "annual" licenses effective October 1, 2009. All "age 65 and older" free inland fishing, hunting and trapping licenses obtained since October 1, 2009 must now be renewed annually. Additionally, all "age 65 and older" free marine fishing licenses must be renewed annually. Holders of age 65 and older "lifetime" Connecticut inland fishing licenses obtained prior to October 1, 2009 are not required to reregister for a new license. However, should one lose this "lifetime" license, they will need to obtain a free replacement by accessing the licensing system from their home computer, or by visiting a town hall, DEEP office or other participating vendor. All individuals with "lifetime" hunting or combination hunting & fishing licenses will need to register themselves in the Automated Licensing System to obtain the appropriate permits and tags along with their unique Conservation ID#. In subsequent license years, this Conservation ID# will be re-used and the free hunting license will need to be selected annually prior to obtaining permits and tags. For assistance in renewing these licenses, contact DEEP Licensing and Revenue at (860) 424-3105.

#### TRANSFER STATION

The Transfer Station is located on Route 154, just north of the Haddam Meadows State Park.

If you do not have a private trash collection service, trash and recyclables should be brought separated to the Transfer Station. To assure that only Haddam residents use the Transfer Station, a current Haddam sticker must be displayed in order to use the facility. Stickers are good for the fiscal year (July through June) and may be purchased for a \$50 fee from the Town Clerk at the Town Office building.

The operators of the Transfer Station are licensed by the State and will assist residents to assure compliance with the recycling law.

Hours: Wednesday, 8:00 am - 3:45 pm, Saturday, 8:00 am - 3:45 pm, Sunday, 8:00 am - 11:45 am.

**All Transfer Station permits expire July 1st.** To insure that there is a clear understanding of the rules, please read below:

- 1. Permit must be clearly displayed and adhered to the driver's side window shield.
- 2. Registration must be written on the permit itself.
- 3. Any vehicles without a current permit or without a sticker on vehicle will not be allowed to leave its contents at the Transfer Station
- 4. Loose permit stickers will be required to be applied to the vehicle before dumping or vehicle will be turned away.

**In order to purchase a Transfer Station Permit,** please come to the Town Clerk's Office and have the following available:

- 1. Proof of residency.
- 2. Automobile registration.
- 3. \$50.00 payment. Cash or Check no Credit or Debit Cards

Beginning July 1, a penalty fee will be charged for every month a resident is late in registering a dog. Licenses can be mailed once proof of current rabies vaccination and a spaying/neutered certificate are mailed to the Town Clerk at 30 Field Park Drive, Haddam, CT 06438, along with your fee. If you no longer have your dog, please let us know so that we may update our records. If you have any questions or concerns regarding licensing your dog(s) please call or email our office.


# Greetings from the Tax Office

The January installment for Real Estate, Personal Property and Motor Vehicle Supplemental bills are due by February 1, 2017.

You may have noticed a few changes coming out of the tax office this year. Last July we started to include a return envelope with the bills. This is because we switched to a bank that offers us the option to use a lock box. This will help us process payments faster! The address on the envelope is Hartford; that is only where the PO Box is located. All payments are coming to Haddam. If you don't want to use the envelope, that's not a problem. Payments can still be sent to the Town of Haddam, 30 Field Park Drive, Haddam CT 06438. And as always, if you want to come in and see us, Tracy and I will be taking payments in the office. The lock box will be used from January 1, 2017 to February 5, 2017. After that, the fastest way to get a payment in would be to send it to the Town Office Building or stop in. We will still receive payments from the PO Box, they will just take a few extra days to get back to Haddam.

We now have a credit card machine in the office! Unfortunately at this time there is a service fee of 2.95% for payments made with a credit or debit card.

The fee applies to online and in the office transactions. An electronic funds transfer can be set up online from a checking account for a flat fee of \$1.50.

If you are paying online, you will receive an email confirmation that your payment was made. If you do not receive one, or you're not sure if your payment went through, please give us call before you try again. Online payments have to be manually processed in the office and will not reflect on our website for a few days.

If you need a DMV clearance and you pay online, please give us a call. Because our systems are not integrated, we have to manually do a DMV clearance.

We do not mail out bills for the second installment for Real Estate or Personal Property (business). If you need a copy of your bill go to Haddam.org and search under Pay Taxes Online. You can print a copy of your original bill, pay a bill or see when a payment was made. You can always call, email or stop in for a copy.

Any payments post marked after February 1, 2017 will start to accrue interest at a rate of 1.5% from the original due date of January 1, 2017. To help keep interest down, partial payments can be made at any time.

If you would like to have receipt mailed to you, please include a self-address stamped envelope.

The Tax Collector's office is open: Monday-Wednesday 8:30 am-4:00 pm, Thursday 8:30 am-6:30 pm, and Friday 8:30 am-12:00 pm.

# Happy New Year!

We hope that everyone had an enjoyable holiday season!

In the Assessor's Office, we have been very busy finalizing the 2016 Grand List. As a part of that process, we know that there are sometimes questions that arise. If you ever have any questions, please do not hesitate to call us, or stop by.

A few items we want to highlight in this issue are the Supplemental Motor Vehicle List, Unregistered Motor Vehicles and upcoming application deadlines.

## **Supplemental Motor Vehicle List**

Supplemental motor vehicle assessments are for vehicles that were registered after the October 1, 2015 Grand List date and prior to the following August 1. These motor vehicle assessments are prorated from the month registered through September.

If you purchased a new car during these months and the registration (plate) on your prior vehicle was transferred to the new vehicle, the supplemental bill that you receive will note and apply all credits due between the "old" vehicle and the "new" vehicle.

If you got new plates, the Supplemental Bill will reflect the tax due for that vehicle only.

## **Unregistered Motor Vehicles**

Any person with a registered motor vehicle must notify the DMV within 48 hours of any change of address in accordance with C.G.S. Sec. 14-17a.

Motor vehicles registered out-of-state must be registered within 60 days of residency in the State of Connecticut, according to C.G.S 14-12a.

Residents who fail to register their vehicles are subject to an estimate of tax. If you are a resident of another state, your vehicle should not be garaged in the Town of Haddam with an out of state registration. If we are notified that an unregistered motor vehicle is being housed here in Haddam, the Assessor's Office will attempt to contact you via mail and will add the vehicle to the Grand List. If attempts to contact you in advance of adding the vehicle to the Grand List are unsuccessful, a value will be estimated based on the make and model of the vehicle and added as personal property to the Grand List. Once the vehicle is registered with the DMV, the vehicle will be moved to the motor vehicle

If you have any questions, please contact the Assessor's Office.

## **Motor Vehicle Exemptions**

Property tax exemptions are available to qualified individuals, such as honorably discharged veterans, spouses of deceased honorably discharged veterans, etc. Eligible parties must contact their assessor for applications to complete and file to meet statutory filing deadlines when applying for these benefits.

## **Active Duty Military**

1. Out of state residents stationed in CT on military orders must file a Soldiers' and Sailors' Civil Relief Act form with the Assessor's office to be exempt from paying property taxes.

2. Residents of CT must file an Active Duty form annually with the Assessor's office by December 31 of the year the bill is due. Only one car owned by the service member is eligible for full exemption.

#### **Blind**

CT law provides for a \$3,000 property tax exemption for persons who are legally blind. Proof of blindness by a qualified medical practitioner must be presented to the Assessor.

## **Totally Disabled**

CT law provides for a \$1,000 assessment exemption for persons who are receiving benefits from the Social Security Administration for total and permanent disability.

Totally disabled persons receiving retirement or disability benefits maintaining requirements comparable to those of the Social Security Administration may also be eligible for this exemption. Proof of total disability must be presented to the Assessor. Check with our office for acceptable proof of disability.

# **Retrofitted Motor Vehicle Exemption**

A local-option exemption is available with respect to a motor vehicle that has been modified to accommodate the owner's disability or for the disability of the owner's child.

## **Antique Vehicle**

Vehicles that are 20 years or older that are defined as antique, rare or special interest motor vehicles, in accordance with the provisions of CGS Section 14-1, as amended by Public Act 08-150, Section 1, shall not be assessed more than \$500. An Antique Vehicle Affidavit Form is required to be filed with the Assessor's Office unless the vehicle is already registered with the DMV (Department of Motor Vehicles) as antique (class code 25).

# **Upcoming Application Deadlines**

State of Connecticut Homeowner's (Circuit Breaker) and the Town of Haddam Senior Tax Relief and Deferral Programs The application period for these programs begins February 1, 2017 and ends May 15, 2017.

Persons who file must be 65 years of age or totally disabled. Please call our office and ask for Tammy – she will make an appointment with you to discuss your qualifications.

The following tables show the levels of qualifying income for the Elderly and Totally Disabled Tax Relief Program applications to be filed in the year 2017. These levels are to be used for the 2016 Grand List Homeowner and Renter applications, Additional Veteran's applications and may be used for any local option programs.

# Town of Haddam Senior Tax Relief Program -

Income maximum is \$55,000 and must be a property taxpayer for 15 years. If qualified, a participant will receive \$500 for

single applicants and \$750 for married applicants.

**Additional Veteran's Exemption** – The application period for Additional Veteran's exemptions is February 1, 2017 to October 1, 2017. Please call the Assessor's office at 860-345-8531 to make an appointment or to discuss your qualifications.

The Additional Veterans' exemption for income qualifying applicants for the 2016 Grand List will be based on the following income maximums: the maximum for single applicants will be \$35,200; the maximum for married applicants will be \$42,900.

100% V. A. determined Disabled Veterans will continue to use \$18,000 for single applicants and \$21,000 for married applicants (adjusted gross income only; Social Security Income is not considered).

Exemption forms for the Totally Disabled and for the Blind are available in the Assessor's Office.

Proof of income is required when filing for the above programs. Income includes all taxable and non-taxable income as well as social security income.

MIDDLESEX HOSPITAL BREAST SURGEON PERFORMS NEW TECHNIQUE Reconstruction During Lumpectomy Preserves

**Natural Look of Tissue** 

Patients who undergo breast surgery are naturally concerned about the cosmetic changes that come with it. Leah Bassin, M.D., a breast surgery specialist at the Middlesex Hospital Surgical Alliance, is now helping women who undergo lumpectomies feel more comfortable about it.

"Breast tissue does not grow back," says Dr. Bassin.

"When a tumor is removed during a lumpectomy procedure, it leaves an empty space in the breast, that can change the look of the breast." Oncoplastics essentially involves filling any "gaps" in the breast left by the removal of the tumor by reshaping the surrounding tissue, preserving a natural look.

"With the oncoplastic technique, my goal is to leave the breast looking like it did before surgery," explains Dr. Bassin, "with as small a scar as possible."

Dr. Bassin performs both the lumpectomy and the oncoplasty at the same time, which can also be a big plus for the patient. The entire procedure usually takes only about an hour.



# **Glaucoma National Awareness Month**

January is National Glaucoma Awareness Month. Glaucoma affects 60 million people worldwide and more than 3 million people in the United States.

Glaucoma is often called the "thief of sight" since often there are no symptoms and glaucoma-related vision loss is permanent. As much as 40% of vision can be lost without a person noticing. If not diagnosed and treated, 1 in 10 people go blind from glaucoma.

Glaucoma affects people of all ages, even infants. There are two main types of glaucoma: Primary Open-Angle Glaucoma and Angle-Closure Glaucoma.

Open-angle glaucoma is dangerous because most of the time a person affected will not notice any symptoms until vision is severely damaged. The vision loss isn't noticed because it often starts with your peripheral vision and the brain makes up for what you don't see. The inner eye pressure (IOP- intraocular pressure) rises because the correct amount of fluid can't drain out of the eye, this occurs usually deep into the drainage canals.

Closed-angle glaucoma occurs when the drainage canals get blocked or covered. Angle-closure glaucoma is dangerous because, while there are often symptoms of pain including headaches, nausea, and eye pain they happen rapidly and without warning.

It is very important to get an annual dilated eye exam. As you age or if you have a family history of glaucoma you may have the visual field test performed. This test checks your peripheral vision and the loss of your side vision is one of the first signs of glaucoma. If you are diagnosed with glaucoma there are ways to manage it. In the early stages you might be prescribed eye drops or have laser surgery performed. Other ways to manage glaucoma are done by performing filtering surgery or a drainage implant.
