MHS 100th Anniversary Celebration Continues
Since the Madison Historical Society was founded in 1917, its mission has been to collect, preserve, and interpret artifacts and information that illustrate Madison's rich cultural history. The Madison Historical Society continues its Centennial Year celebration with its annual Antiques Show on the Madison Green on Saturday, August 26, 9-4. Known far and wide as the most sophisticated Antiques Show around, over 1,000 people are likely to attend. The award-winning exhibit, "Over Here, Over There: Madison in WWI" is a collaborative exhibition of the Madison Historical Society and the Charlotte L. Evarts Memorial Archives, and tells the story of Madison and its people during the Great War and features uniforms, memorabilia and letters of those who served. It will run through November. The MHS will feature vintage images of the town in storefronts along the Post Road and Wall Street. The celebration continues with "An Evening in White" fundraiser at a secret location in the late summer. The festivities will culminate on October 19 with a gala at the Madison Beach Hotel.

## Town of Madison Rolls Out Pilot Program for Summer Hours Schedule

Madison First Selectman Thomas J. Banisch announced today that the Board of Selectmen voted unanimously at its April 24, 2017 meeting to approve a Pilot Program for a Summer Hours Schedule affecting Town Campus Offices, Madison Youth \& Family and the Senior Center.

The intent of this action is to provide service to the public beyond the traditional work day hours by staying open late on Thursdays. The Town Buildings will be open to the public from 8:30 am - 4:00 pm on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday; from 8:30 am - 6:00 pm on Thursday, and from 8:30 am - 2:00 pm on Friday. The Pilot Program began on June 1st and will end on September 4, 2017.

First Selectman Banisch stated that this Pilot Program was as a result of a comprehensive review of policies and procedures which he commenced upon his taking office last year. "I am hopeful that the extended hours on Thursday will benefit the public as they will be able to conduct Town business outside of their normal working hours, eliminating the need to take time away from their careers in order to pay taxes, apply for beach passes, etc.," the First Selectman added.

The schedule will be evaluated after September to determine whether the hour changes assisted the public in a positive manner.

## Protecting Against Garden and Yard Critters

Spring rains brought relief to the drought and finally the Gypsy caterpillars subsided thanks to the rain that brought on a fungus killing them. But gardeners face other challenges this summer. The past two warm winters have produced a boom in the tick and critter population. Gardeners are determined though, never giving up. We know that since we cannot control the weather we must make the best of what Mother Nature presents. Focus on the positive like the magnificent blooms that the rain resulted from the generous rainfall. Nevertheless, the toll the critters take on us and our gardens can be discouraging to say the least.

## So what are we to do?

Take measures to protect against ticks. Use sprays, cover up and most importantly check yourself for ticks after exposure. For someone like myself that means showering and checking every single day after work! There are some excellent organic yard sprays for ticks. You can find this at Madison Earth Care.

The critters, especially the rabbits, are out of control! I have never seen so many rabbits before. And they are eating everything, even the plants they are not supposed to like.

Repellants are helpful but not fool proof. I find the best repellant for rabbits to be Liquid Fence. Though, I must warn you... it smells awful! I have resorted to installing rabbit fencing in some of my flower gardens. Deerbusters has a good rabbit fence kit. Voles and chipmunks are just as much a menace. A product I recommend is Repels All. Another helpful thing to do is rotate repellents. I find rotating Liquid Fence and Repels All to be a good combination. These products are also available at Madison Earth Care.

And of course there is the notion of planting critter resistant plants. Although as I mentioned this is not always fool proof either it does help. Keep up the good fight against the critters but most important remember to enjoy the summer!

## White Wines - Steel vs. Oak

Steel vs. Oak is a choice made by the winemaker. During the wine making process, white wines are fermented in steel tanks, French oak or American oak barrels and, although not as common, in cement vats. By the mere selection of what type of barrel or tank is used, the winemaker can impart a particular flavor from that source into the wine. If you are a person who enjoys Pinot Grigios or Sauvignon Blanc, it is the crispness that excites your palette. This also includes citrus and tropical fruit ending with a clean sometimes tart finish. The brightness of these wines are due mostly to the stainless steel tanks. That's not to say that these and other similar wines are never put in oak. They may rest in oak for a few months or small percentages of the wine.

Chardonnays are fermented in stainless steel or oak barrels and then might be aged for 6 months up to a couple of years. This additional aging enhances the flavor of the wine with a rich, woody taste. It may impart flavors of vanilla and sometimes smoky and spicy. This leaves the wine with a full and rich finish. It is well known in the industry that the use of new oak barrels gives a fuller taste than older or used barrels. Also smaller casks produce more of that oak flavor than larger ones. All of these choices give the winemaker freedom to develop their own unique structure and taste of a particular wine.

Looking for a crisp dry Chardonnay? Try a French Chablis. The wine has a mineral and limestone finish, great with seafood. Sauvignon Blanc and Pinot Grigio are an excellent choice if you are having a light dish. Something heavier such as creamy chicken warrants a rich oaky chardonnay.

I hope this has given you a better insight towards white wines and their particular fermentation process. Enjoy your choices, of which there are many.

## RESIDENTS WITH PRIVATE WELLS

Most wells in Madison are drilled wells; i.e., holes bored into the underlying bedrock. Generally, these wells produce water of very good quality. The presence of bacteria is rare in such wells and is a potential cause for concern. Other chemical constituents are found at various concentrations, reflecting background ground-water quality.

Iron and manganese are very often found in ground water in Madison at concentrations that are aesthetically objectionable. There are treatment systems that can correct most water-quality problems found in local ground water. In no case should the backwash from any such treatment system discharge to the septic system, because this can add unnecessary amounts of water to the system.

It is important to remember that any well water analysis represents the quality of the well water only at the time the sample was collected. Periodic tests of well water quality are not required by the Health Department once a Certificate of Occupancy is issued for the home, and responsibility for the well is then entirely in the hands of the homeowner. Factors affecting the quality of the ground water in an area can change, and therefore, the potential for changes in the ground water quality also exists. For these reasons, the Madison Health Department suggests retesting the well water every few years.

There are numerous chemical compounds that can be found in well water, such as heavy metals, fuel components, industrial solvents, pesticides, radon, etc. With the exception of lead and radon, there are more exotic compounds that can be found in wells in Madison. Homeowners must be very careful in their use and disposal of chemicals and products that contain toxics. Remember that what you dispose of into your septic system or spray on your lawn ultimately reaches the ground water, which feeds your well and nearby streams or other water bodies. Lead can be leached from interior plumbing, particularly if the well water is acidic, although modern plumbing solder is lead-free.

## LYME DISEASE \& TICK-BORNE DISEASES

## What you should know - What you should do

Prevention of Lyme disease and other tick-borne diseases starts with reducing your exposure to tick bites. Tick-borne diseases generally occur during the summer months when ticks are most active. There are no vaccines available for Anaplasmosis, Lyme disease, or Rocky Mountain spotted fever. To prevent these illnesses you must prevent tick bites. Use the following personal protection measures:

- Avoid tall grass and over-grown areas.
- When hiking stay in the middle of trails
- Consider using tick repellent
- Tuck pant leg into socks
-Wear long-sleeved shirts and closed shoes
- Wear light-colored clothing to see the ticks easier for removal.
- Examine yourself, your children, and pets for ticks when returning indoors.
- When returning home after an outing, shower using a washcloth or puff to remove unattached ticks.
- Talk to your veterinarian to find out how to protect your pets from tick bites, and the roll of vaccine for dogs.


## Tick Removal

To remove a tick: use tweezers and grasp the tick's mouthparts as close to the skin as possible. Pull the tick with steady pressure in an upward motion. Don't "yank" the tick out of your skin. Don't use petroleum jelly, hot matches, nail polish remover, or any other substance to remove a tick. Don't crush the tick's body because it may contain infectious fluids. When the tick has been removed, wash the area of the bite with soap and water, and then apply an antiseptic. Write on the calendar the date

you removed the tick and the part of the body from which it was removed. Should you experience any symptoms of any diseases mentioned within the timeframe indicated, contact your physician to be evaluated. Preventing tick bites is the key to preventing Lyme disease, Anaplasmosis, Babesiosis, and Rocky Mountain spotted fever.

## PLAY IT SAFE IN THE SUN

With the start of summer, the Madison Health Department reminds residents to protect their skin from the sun's ultraviolet (UV) rays and use sunscreen correctly.


According to federal health officials, skin cancer is the most common form of cancer in the United States and the most common cancer among 20 to 30 year-olds. It's estimated that one American dies every hour from melanoma, the deadliest form of skin cancer. In Connecticut, there were 930 cases of malignant melanoma diagnosed in 2009, and 100 deaths from the disease. Melanoma rates continue to rise, especially among adolescent girls.

Connecticut residents and visitors should protect their skin to help reduce rates of skin cancer from overexposure to the sun's UV rays. Sunscreen can offer some protection. However, products with a high (over 50) SPF (sun protection factor) rating offer an insignificant amount of added protection. Sunscreens with SPF ratings over 50 may mislead people to believe they are more protected than they actually are, causing them to stay in the sun too long or not reapply sunscreen as often as recommended.

## HOW TO PLAY IT SAFE?

Avoid Too Much Sun: Wear protective clothing (shirt, hat, pants, and sunglasses) when in the sun; seek shade as much as possible; avoid mid-day sun.

## Apply Sunscreen to Exposed Skin

Apply 15 minutes before sun exposure; apply a generous coat and reapply every 2 hours or more often if getting wet or sweating heavily.

Choose Sunscreen Wisely...
Look at the label - Choose a sunscreen that:

- Offers broad spectrum (UV-A \& UV-B) protection.

Is rated as SPF 15 or higher?
Products with SPF ratings over 50 do not provide significantly more protection. SPF numbers only indicate protection against UV-B radiation.

- Contains zinc oxide as the active ingredient or as a blend with titanium dioxide. These mineral blockers are preferable to chemical absorbers. Avoid products with oxybenzone which has endocrine-disrupting activity.
- Is it water resistant?

## Four Sunscreen Mistakes

By now you are aware the sun is not your friend and you need to protect yourself against its harmful rays. Unfortunately many women rely on SPF numbers alone and think that they are totally protected. In spite of the push to wear sunscreen, many women are still making some mistakes when it comes to choosing and applying sunscreen.

## RELYING ON SPF IN MOISTURIZER

Many of us think we are protected because our moisturizer has an SPF. We seek out and sometimes pay extra money for these products. Most moisturizers contain ingredients that protect against UVB but not against UVA. It is the UVA rays that are most responsible for wrinkles.

## NOT REAPPLYING

Sunscreen wears off. This is especially important to remember if you are outdoors for a good part of the day. In order to get maximum benefit, you need to re-apply every two hours.

## LAYERING SPF'S

Many women think we are totally protected because our moisturizer and make-up both contain sunscreen. Unfortunately, if you are wearing a moisturizer and make-up that both contain SPF 15 , this does not equal SPF 30. You are still wearing an SPF 15, which is not enough coverage to protect your face.

## RELYING ON SPF IN MAKE-UP

Many of us now wear mineral make-up and rely on this for total protection. Unfortunately, the SPF in these make-ups is usually between 5 and 15, which is not high enough. My favorite ingredients for the best protection are minerals - either zinc or titanium dioxide. So don't get fooled - protect your face!

## Summer Eye Health

Summer brings numerous eye problems such as burnt corneas, chemicals in eyes, and many more. Wear eye protection doing home projects: It is important to remember to shield your eyes even during simple home improvement and maintenance, like mowing your lawn. Rocks and other debris commonly fly up and into your eyes.

Use eye drops: To soothe dry and tired eyes during the summer, it is best to use artificial tears. Despite best attempts sometimes your eyes are irritated or in discomfort.

Give your eyes a rest. If you spend a lot of time at the computer or focusing on any one thing, you sometimes forget to blink and your eyes can get fatigued. Try the 20-20-20 rule: Every 20 minutes, look away about 20 feet in front of you for 20 seconds. This can help reduce eyestrain.
