The Madison Art Society announces the Town Hall artists for July and August are Madison residents John Copelin and Muci Clemens. Their work will be on display in the main hallway of the Madison Town Hall, 8 Campus Drive, Madison, CT.

John K. Copelin

John graduated from Yale College, and Yale Architecture School, and worked as a self-employed architect for 40 years. He started watercolor painting upon retiring from architecture in 2001, and studied for a number of years with Lou Bonamarte.

He now paints with a group of watercolor artists every Wednesday, headed by Joan McPherson. John is a proud member of the Madison Art Society, the Clinton Art Society and the Guilford Art League, where he has successfully shown his work.

His collages are actually two watercolor paintings, one of which is sliced into strips of varying sizes and carefully

fixed on top of a base painting. The attempt is to prevent one painting from

dominating the other. Hopefully, this process develops a dialog between the resulting stripes. The results should not be readily apparent, and the hope is to further engage the viewer in the artwork.

Sometimes the collage is composed of two completely independent paintings and some are two paintings of the same object done in complimentary colors. Occasionally the subjects of the work are only remotely selected but the values and colors are compatible. His work demands your attention as it is uniquely beautiful in its handling of watercolor art.

Muci Clemens

From still life to landscapes and portraits, Muci Clemens paints in a representational, impressionistic style with either oil or pastel. The rebirth of nature and its dependable cycle of life, peaceful and pensive, filled with light, influences her colorful palette.



White Peonies with Lilacs,16"x 20", oil by Muci Clemens


She continues to collaborate in workshops with Doug Dawson, Daniel Greene and Clayton Beck.

Protecting Against Garden and Yard Critters

Spring rains brought relief to the drought and finally the gypsy caterpillars subsided thanks to the rain that brought on a fungus killing them. But gardeners face other challenges this summer. The past two warm winters have produced a boom in the tick and critter population. Gardeners are determined though, never giving up. We know that since we cannot control the weather we must make the best of what Mother Nature presents. Focus on the positive like the magnificent blooms that the rain resulted from the generous rainfall. Nevertheless, the toll the critters take on us and our gardens can bediscouraging to say the least.

So what are we to do?

Take measures to protect against ticks. Use sprays, cover up and most importantly check yourself for ticks after exposure. For someone like myself that means showering and checking every single day after work! There are some excellent organic yard sprays for ticks. You can find these at Madison Earth Care.

The critters, especially the rabbits, are out of control! I have never seen so many rabbits before. And they are eating

everything, even the plants they are not supposed to like. Repellants are helpful but not fool proof. I find the best repellant for rabbits to be Liquid Fence. Though, I must warn you... it smells awful! I have resorted to installing rabbit fencing in some of my flower gardens. Deerbusters has a good rabbit fence kit. Voles and chipmunks are just as much a menace. A product I recommend is Repels All.

Another helpful thing to do is rotate repellents. I find rotating Liquid Fence and Repels All to be a good combination. And of course there is the notion of planting critter resistant plants. Although as I mentioned this is not always full proof either, it does help.

Keep up the good fight against the critters but most important remember to enjoy the summer!



Five Sunscreen Myths Debunked

My moisturizer has an SPF of 15 so I don't need a separate sunscreen.

Most moisturizers contain ingredients that protect against UVB but not against UVA. It is the UVA rays that are most responsible for wrinkles. Many of us now wear mineral makeup and rely on this for total protection. Unfortunately, the SPF in these make-ups is usually between 5 and 15, which is not high enough.

I get a base tan to protect my skin before I go on vacation.

There is no such thing as a base tan for protection. Your skin changes color to protect itself from damage so you are damaging your skin to prevent further damage. Today's tan is tomorrow's wrinkle.

SPF 80 gives more protection than SPF 30.

The choice of sunscreens can be overwhelming and it is now possible to find SPF numbers into the triple digits. SPF 15 blocks 93% of UVB and SPF 30 blocks 97%. Nothing blocks 100%. Your coverage is negligible above SPF 30.

I have dark skin so I'm not at a risk to get skin cancer. Everyone can get skin cancer. People of color are less



susceptible due to the excess amount of melanin produced, but they are not immune.

I don't use sunscreen because I need the Vitamin D.

It only takes ten minutes of sun exposure to produce enough Vitamin D for the day. If you are Vitamin D deficient, you should get your vitamin from food and supplements. There is no need to expose your face to the damaging effects of the sun for Vitamin D.

Unusual Whites for the Summer

There are so many different grapes grown in the world making for a vast amount of interesting wines. Every once in a while we should explore some of these unusual wines. Here are just a few wines that are slowly growing in popularity.

The first wine we will discuss comes mostly from the country of Austria. The grape is called Grűner Veltiner, this being the most widely grown grape in that country. The wine is late harvested but it does develop into a slightly peppery, full bodied, but dry crisp finish. The wine can also age well to become a richer and more complex wine.

The next wine which has become a very popular as a just sitting around sipping wine. It is from Portugal, called Vinho Verde, which means "Green Wine." The wine is light in color and also light in body. The wine has good acidity and a little spritz to it. The region it is grown in is controlled by law not to produce a wine to exceed 11.5% alcohol content. Due to this, the wine should be drunk young, as it will be most refreshing at this point.

Muscadet is a wine produced in France at the beginning of the Loir valley. The muscadet area only grows one grape, Melon de Bourgogne, which has been around since the 17th century. The most predominate growing region for this wine is Muscadet-Sērvre et Maine where as much as 75% of this wine is produced. The wine produce a slight minerally and limestone flavor, which is a great wine to pair with shellfish and other seafood dishes. Also some of these wine areas are labeled Sur Lie under the name of Muscadet. This means the wine "rests on the lees" (which is the dead yeast, left over seeds and pulp from the grapes produced during the wine process, right after fermentation). This gives the wine slightly more body. Enjoy these light refreshing wines for the summer, pairing them with light dishes or just drinking them on their own.



A "Friend-Ship" and an "Owl" are two logo designs used since some Madison citizens formed the Scranton Library Friends. This year, we have a new logo to identify our group and its work, to "Support Our Library." The logo was designed by a Board member and chosen by a Board vote from nine options.

In 1971, the Friends began helping the Scranton Memorial Library. We have made many things happen - the Parade of Pooches, Galleries in Motion, One Book - One Town, many children's activities, a very popular Antique Appraisal event, Pop-Up book sales, and principally, the Annual Book Sale. 

The last word...

Joey Logano - Inspiring others to do for others

Professional NASCAR driver Joey Logano started his racing career right here in Connecticut racing quarter midget cars and quickly made a name for himself. Starting at the age of six, the Middletown, CT native started winning championship after championship – to the point that, by the time he was 15, he was already on the radar with NASCAR racing legends. Now, he's always to be reckoned with on the NASCAR racing scene, competing full-time in the Monster Energy NASCAR series and part-time in the NASCAR Xfinity series.

- 49 combined wins in NASCAR's top-three series

There is, of course, the glitz and the glamor that pervades NASCAR as a whole. And there's the occasional race-action controversy. And there are the ups and downs. After early successes (leading to the nickname, "Sliced Bread") and nearly winning a championship in 2016, Joey failed to make the playoffs in 2017. This year could mark a turnaround. Joey notched a win at Talladega Superspeedway in April, which ended a nearly year-long winless streak and, as of press time, he is fifth in the NASCAR Championship Point Standings.

But there's more to the 28-year-old than that. Joey and his wife Brittany, whom he married in 2014, welcomed their first child into the world this past January. Joey and Brittany have also been very committed to giving back. In a previous conversation, Joey mentioned, "If we can touch a few people's lives and help them become contributing members of our community and the world, it's really going to make a difference and it starts one person at a time." That's the crux of the Joey Logano Foundation that invests in organizations offering second chances to children and young adults during times of crisis and works to inspire others to live a life of generosity.

WHY SECOND CHANCES?

First, there was a life-changing visit to Joplin, Missouri in 2011 where Joey helped to rebuild a home for a local family following the tornado that devastated the area. That family needed a second chance. Little did Joey know that he would soon need his own second chance. He had been driving the No. 20 Toyota Camry for Joe Gibbs Racing since the 2009 season, but that ended in 2012. He received his second chance when he was picked up by Penske Racing in 2012. The following year, the Joey Logano Foundation was established.

Since 2013, the foundation has invested almost \$2.7 million in various organizations across the country. Programs include inviting children who are facing tough situations (whether physically and/or emotionally) annually to a NASCAR race to be part of the crew for the day, supporting non-profit organizations during the 10-week NASCAR playoffs in each playoff race market, assembling and donating comfort care backpacks to foster and/or terminally ill children, and an annual fundraiser in Connecticut, called Driving Hope Home. A portion of the Driving Hope Home proceeds are donated to The Ronald McDonald House of Connecticut with the remaining proceeds donated to reputable charities the foundation supports to offer children in need a first or second chance. "It's our responsibility. You have to do it. If we we're not going to do it, who else is going to be an advocate for these kids," says Brittany, who notes that first chances are important too. "They need a first opportunity in life. If we can shed light to this and inspire others to do the same, we can have a bigger impact than the two of us. That's our goal."

There is no doubt that Joey is a fierce competitor and a pure NASCAR racing talent. But don't overlook the other side. "When you are able to make a difference like that, you can see it in that person's face, how much it affects their lives - there's no better feeling than that," he observes. "I can talk about race wins as much as I want and how great that is but there's nothing better than that win - when you're are able to affect something. That's a bigger win than any racetrack can get you."
