In 2012, Amerbelle Textile Mill closed operations for good. The Town of Vernon immediately began working with members of the business community, state and federal agencies and the owner to find a reuse for the historic complex. The Town of Vernon continued to seek options for the complex and remedies for the Brownfield issued associated with it. Most recently, the Town of Vernon, DECD and DEEP have created a working group to solve the issues and today the complex has been reduced in density, cleaned up and is ready to be marketed. Take a drive by and see for yourself the massive changes in the area.



Mayor Champagne Receives State Historic Preservation Office's Municipal Leadership Award

On May 18, 2017, Mayor Daniel Champagne was presented the Municipal Leadership Award at the State Historic Preservation Office's (SHPO) annual conference, held at the UCONN Storrs campus. SHPO's Municipal Leadership Award recognizes a municipality for the promotion of local historic preservation during the last year, and is given to honor municipal leaders who support and encourage historic preservation on a regular basis through their actions. It is one of two awards presented annually by SHPO. Mayor Champagne was recognized for his efforts on several historically relevant projects including the former Hockanum Mill (now Kaplan Mill Works), Talcott Brothers Mill, Loom City Lofts, Amerbelle Mill, and Citizen's Block. Mayor Champagne said, "As a lifetime resident of Vernon, it has always been my desire to retain Vernon's rich manufacturing history. For the economic success of any town, it is essential to strike a balance between public and private investment, and historic preservation and emediation. Once achieved, these projects not only

beautify the gateways into our community, but close the financial gap for redevelopment, and return them to productive reuse. The Town of Vernon is grateful for the support and partnership of CT Department of Economic and Community Development and the State Historic Preservation Office in these important projects."

From the Town Clerk ~ Vernon Cemeteries

Vernon has seven cemeteries, five actively in use today and two dormant. Five are town owned and operated. Two are privately owned and operated. The dormant cemeteries are also the oldest with the oldest being Bamforth Road Cemetery, once known as the Vernon Cemetery, the pioneer cemetery located on Bamforth Road with graves dating back to the 1700s.

The other dormant cemetery is Old Dobsonville Cemetery, formerly known as Southwest Cemetery, located in the Dobsonville section of town at the corner of Dobson Road and Talcottville Road. The graves of John Warburton and his wife and daughter can be found here. Grove Hill is the largest cemetery consisting of about 43 acres on the corner of Grove and Hale Streets, and is currently active. It has many monuments and mausoleums built of marble and granite. It also houses the Lucina Memorial Chapel which was the gift of E. Stevens Henry in memory of his daughter, Lucina, in January 1923. Its architectural character is that of rural churches in England. It is said that all the horses in town were required to move

the 46 foot high chapel to its place in the cemetery.

Elmwood Cemetery is active and located in Vernon Center at the corner of Cemetery and Bolton Roads. It is a large triangular terraced plot dotted with numerous trees and known for its large white arch over the road. The monument dedicated to Ebenezer Kellogg, the pastor of Vernon Church for 55 years, can be found here as well as the odd shaped granite obelisk of Lemuel King, of the King Tavern.

The newest cemetery is Valley Falls Cemetery located on scenic Valley Falls Road. It is in a tranquil setting sharing space with abundant wildlife. St. Bernard's Cemetery is operated by St. Bernard's Church and dates back to 1855. It is located at the corner of Tolland and Kingsbury Avenues.

The other private cemetery is Mt. Hope Cemetery located in Talcottville and maintained by the Talcott family. The land was donated by the family and the cemetery was dedicated on the Sabbath of June 30, 1867. The cemetery houses a brown stone shaft memorial to Civil War veterans. The cemetery has the appearance of a park with its irregular terrain and numerous trees.



Friends of Valley Falls ~ Artists' Day at Valley Falls Farm



We like to think of Valley Falls Farm as the most scenic corner in Vernon. The pasture, the red barn, and the iconic stable on the hillside paint a picture unique to our community - and - dare we say, unique in our State.

Thanks to the generosity of our community, we were able to preserve this scenic corner in 2000. Our early years of ownership focused on the repair and restoration of the seven structures on the property. By 2008 we were ready to return the favor to the community, and to invite the public to enjoy the site. The idea of Artists' Day at Valley Falls Farm was born: Vernon's most scenic corner was the perfect place for artists to create, musicians to play and visitors to enjoy a balmy summer afternoon. The first event in 2008 drew over 200 people, and it has become a biannual event since that time.



This year's Artists' Day at Valley Falls Farm will be held on Sunday, August 20. The public is invited to stroll around the fields between 1 and 4 pm, and enjoy the art of the plein air artists painting on the grounds. Other paintings by the artists will be on display in the red barn and will be available for sale. Tours of the historic buildings will be given on the hour, sparked with tales about the intriguing history of the 'gentleman farmers' who once owned Valley Falls Farm. Live musicians will play on the porch of the farmhouse during the afternoon, funded by the Vernon Arts Commission. The herb and flower gardens in the old cold frames, planted and tended by the Vernon Garden Club, add to the experience. Mark your calendar - August 20 - for a quintessential summer afternoon experience at Valley Falls Farm!

Vernon Animal Control

Coyotes now have established territories within the Town of Vernon and across the state. The Town has reports of activity in the Brookview Drive area and Valley Falls Park area. Coyotes in the northeast are much larger than their western cousins. This is due to their mating with wolves on their journey east. Coyote or "coy dogs," can weigh between 30-40 pounds. For those of you who frequent Valley Falls Park, remember that coyotes are territorial and may boldly approach dog walkers, especially in the spring/summer when they're raising their young. Please keep your dogs leashed and under your supervision at all times. Should you be approached by a coyote, do not run, just calmly leave the area. Carry a whistle, air horn, or some other type of noise maker this will frighten the coyotes away. A helpful reference can be found at EasternCoyoteResearch.com. Remember coyotes may exhibit bold behavior around people, however aggressive behavior towards people is very rare. Any coyote sightings or coyotes acting aggressively towards people or supervised pets should be reported to the Vernon Animal Control Department/ Vernon Police Department at 860-872-9126.

Tax Collector

Connecticut towns and cities are required to operate on the Uniform Fiscal Year, commencing July 1 and ending the following June 30. Municipalities collect real estate, personal property, and motor vehicle taxes to fund the fiscal year budget. These taxes become due and payable July 1st. For the Town of Vernon real estate and personal property tax bills over \$100.00 may be paid in two installments; motor vehicle taxes are due in full in July.

State statutes dictate the procedures to be followed for the billing and collection of taxes and the record keeping involved. Statutes are strictly construed, with a town's authority existing only if specifically granted by state statute.

The state statutes provide various means of collection enforcement that may be used by municipal tax collectors for delinquent property tax collections. Past due real estate taxes will be collected through a tax sale to be held this coming August. Motor vehicle, personal property, or business property delinquent collections will be enforced by a state marshal or collection agency. One of the most compelling tools of collection is the statutory interest rate of 18% per year, which is charged on all delinquent taxes. This charge is meant to be a penalty for late payment. Delinquent motor vehicle tax payments requiring a State of Connecticut DMV clearance require payment in cash or money order (do not pay online if you require DMV clearance).

Payments can be made online at www. vernon-ct.gov by visiting the Department of Collector of Revenue, or selecting any "BILL PAY" tab from the home page. Payments can be made in person at 8 Park Place Monday-Wednesday 8:30-4:30, Thursday 8:30-7:00, and Friday 8:30-1:00. Payments may be mailed to PO Box 387 Vernon CT 06066. Receipts will be returned to those who include a selfaddressed stamped envelope.

Vernon Building Department

Do I need a permit for swimming pools?

Summer is upon us once again and swimming accommodations are on the minds of numerous residents within the Town of Vernon. Building, Electrical and Zoning Permits are required for pools with the exception of above ground pools that are less than 24 inches deep and within proper setback from property line. Swimming pools are governed by the Appendix G of the 2012 International Residential Code portion of the 2016 Connecticut State Building Code and the documents and information required are:

Above-ground Installations: Manufacturer's specifications and detailed information regarding construction, installation, piping, equipment, electrical, barrier, gates, raised decks, guards, stairs and suction entrapment protection.

In-ground Installations: Construction plans and details will be required to be prepared by a design professional showing structural design, piping, equipment, electrical, barrier, gates, and suction entrapment protection.

Barriers: There are detailed requirements for barriers to provide protection against potential drowning or injury by restricting access to pool.

Temporary Enclosure: Required for in-ground swimming pools. **Pool Alarm:** Required by State Statutes.

A site plan will be necessary to show the location of the pool, deck and barrier and to be sure the pool is compliant with zoning regulations regarding property line setbacks and allowable lot coverage. An application to the North Central District Health Department will be required if there is a well and/or septic system on the property.

The Building Department (860 870 3633) and Zoning Administration (860 870 3636) are here to answer any questions a resident may have offering the valuable information needed for a smooth pool installation. This department's first concern is life safety, therefore follow State Building Codes for proper installation. I wish the residents of Vernon a safe and enjoyable summer.

Vernon Police News

Vernon Police Receive Donations

On February 28, 2017, members of the Maple Grove Club presented Mayor Champagne and the Vernon Police Department a check for \$875 for the department's K-9 fund. The Maple Grove Club, a German/American Heritage social club participates in the annual Summer Days carnival that is held on the grounds of the old Golf Land facility. The club's share of the proceeds is used to further their philanthropic activities in town. The funds will be used to continue purchasing equipment for the department's two K-9 officers.

On March 31, 2017, Rein's Deli held its grand reopening of its newly remodeled facility in the Shops at 30 on Hartford Turnpike. As part of their celebration the restaurant decided to donate a percentage of sales for the lunch hour to local first responders. The Vernon Police Department was presented with a check for \$500 which will be placed in the department's equipment fund. That fund is used to purchase items which will further the department mission of providing the best service to the community.

These donations are just two of the many donations received by the police department by our local groups, citizens and businesses. The Vernon Police Department is very grateful to the continued support of our public.

Vernon Police Join Ranks Of Agencies With D.R.E. Trained Officers

With the de-criminalization of small amounts of marijuana by the Connecticut State Legislature and the legalization of marijuana in Massachusetts, the Vernon Police Department has seen a dramatic increase in Drugged Driving. Recent media studies put the number of impaired drivers under the influence of drugs on our roads as high as forty seven percent. The police department has responded to several serious motor vehicle accidents where the offending operators have been under the influence of marijuana or opioids. Traditional drunk driving enforcement testing does not address drugged driving. In order to combat this rise in



drugged driving, the Police Department received grant funding to participate in a Connecticut Department of Transportation program to train police officers as Drug Recognition Experts. The Drug Recognition Expert (DRE) program is a formal training program which originated in the late 80s with the Los Angeles Police Department and has expanded across the country. The program is an intense two-part education program which combines eighty hours of classroom study with a certification phase in Arizona.

In the academic phase the candidate must demonstrate proficiency in a two week classroom setting where he/she is taught courses in physiology, vital signs and standardized field testing. The candidate must complete this phase of instruction in order to move on to the certification phase in Arizona. The certification phase is held in a controlled environment where the candidate performs a minimum of twelve field tests of individuals under the influence of three of the seven drug categories they are training to recognize. The results of the field tests are then confirmed by toxicological screening. Candidates must also pass a final exam and obtain the recommendation of two instructors to pass the class and receive the title of Drug Recognition Expert. Currently two Vernon Officers are undergoing training in this program. We hope to be able to put more officers through the program in the future.

The Vernon Police Department remains highly committed to keeping our streets safe for the public by maintaining a rigorous DWI enforcement program.

New England Civil War Museum - The museum will be open Thursdays as well as second and fourth Sundays during July and August. (NewEnglandCivilWarMuseum.com)



REGISTRATION MINIMUM/MAXIMUM

All lessons are group classes with no more than six participants per class. Classes must reach a minimum of four participants to run. 

Rock Wall climb to the top if you can.




New Director of Family, School and Community Partnerships

New Electronic Visitor Management System

The Vernon Public Schools is proud to announce the implementation of a new electronic visitor management system that was implemented in all of our school buildings on Monday, April 3, 2017. This new system upgrade has been acquired to better protect our children by tracking visitors, contractors, and volunteers who come into our schools.

Upon entering our schools, all visitors will be required to report to the school's main office and present a valid, government issued, photo identification which will be scanned into our electronic visitor management system. A current photo of all visitors will be taken, and a temporary visitors badge will be printed. The system has the ability to provide alerts on individuals who may jeopardize the safety our of schools, including checking the national sexual offender registry.

Checking into the visitor system will not be required for anyone dropping off or picking up an item in the main office. However, if you need to sign out your student during the school day, you will need to present your photo identification so school staff may verify your identity. Additional information is available on our website at www.vernonpublicschools.org/visitors. A frequently asked question's guide is listed below to provide you with answers to common questions you may have.

The safety and security of our students and staff is our top priority and we appreciate your cooperation and support in enhancing our school security procedures.

VISITORS FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS Why am I required to make an appointment to visit my child's school 24 hours in advance?

Vernon Board of Education policy requires that appointments during school hours be made in advance by all visitors to minimize disruption of administration, teaching and staff duties. To make an appointment, please contact your school's main office.

Why do you require a valid, government issued photo ID for me to visit my child's school?

The safety and security of our students and staff is of the utmost importance. We require a valid, government issued, photo identification from all visitors so we can positively verify the identity of everyone in our facilities. If you do not have photo identification, you may make an appointment with our Logistics and Safety Supervisor to provide alternative documentation to verify your identity.

Do I need to bring my ID with me every time I visit a school?

Yes, you will need to bring your valid, government issued, photo identification with you anytime you visit our schools, including when picking up your child.

What happens when you scan my government issued photo ID?

By scanning your ID card, the system extracts your name and date of birth and enters it into our visitor management system and compares it to the national sexual offender database. If no matches are found, a visitor badge will be printed and you will be permitted to enter the school.

If a positive match occurs indicating that a visitor is a registered sexual offender, what will happen?

In the event that a sexual offender attempts to enter one of our schools, our office staff will receive a discreet alert and have been trained to handle the situation in a professional and non-confrontational manner. It should be noted that the Vernon Board of Education policy prohibits sexual offenders from being on school property during school hours or any school related function.

I am a parent, but I am a registered sexual offender; can I visit my child's school?

We encourage parents to be part of their child's educational process and have put policies in place to ensure that you are able to attend meetings and events. You are required to meet with the Superintendent in advance of your visit to your child's schools so we may review the policies and procedures with you.

What information is stored by your system?

Your name, date of birth and photo will be stored in our secure, online, visitor management system as well as the date and time of your visit.

Developing District Coherence and Capacity in the Vernon Public Schools - A Message from the Superintendent: A Pathway Forward 2016-2017

The philosophy of the Vernon Public Schools is to drive the district towards educational excellence and the belief that all students can and will learn, by advocating a "whole child" approach to student learning, maximizing student performance and setting high expectations, and integrating family and community with the educational system.

The District Goals are to: build and improve relationships and partnerships with family and community; increase the achievement of every student through a high quality curriculum, instruction and assessment; and promote safe environments that are socially, emotionally, and physically conducive to learning.

For the past year, our district and school improvement agenda focused on a small number of key priorities: 1) ensuring a relevant curriculum aligned to common core standards, 2) providing tiered student interventions for both academics and behaviors and 3) providing students with rigorous academic tasks. In order to create the conditions for schools to maximize student learning - there needs to be effective leadership at all levels of our system.

In an effort to take the district to the next level of educational excellence, our district leadership team of central office administrators and building principals continue to focus on building coherence and capacity throughout the district. Collectively, school and district leaders have identified a set of right and wrong district improvement drivers (Fullan, 2011) current in the Vernon Public School system. The Leadership Team codified these improvement drivers that will improve student achievement in Vernon by transforming the Strategy for Improvement document into a Blueprint for Success. The essence of both documents is grounded around the Instructional Core (Elmore, 2000) with a focus on the Learning Task. The Instructional Core is the relationship between the student and teacher in the presence of content. The Learning Task in each instructional interaction has the potential to cognitively engage students in the educational process and both deepen and broaden student learning.

The Vernon Public Schools Blueprint for Success employs five district and school-level improvement drivers that will enhance and support our work around the Instructional Core.

The five improvement drivers are:

- Rigorous Curriculum
- Talent Management
- Family Engagement
- Professional Learning
- Student Interventions

Each driver is integrated into the instructional core and linked to learning. The vision of the Vernon Public Schools is to maximize student achievement, by setting high expectations for individualized learning and focusing on the Instructional Core. Leadership priorities and continuing support for high quality instruction for every child will be grounded in the Vernon Public Schools Blueprint for Success to take to district to the next level of educational excellence. Together we can accomplish great things for the children and families we serve.

In this issue, I would like to share news about important Prevention Work currently taking place in Vernon and highlight Youth Services Summer programs.

SUBSTANCE ABUSE PREVENTION

This year, the Partnership for Success Grant is providing expanded opportunity for the Vernon Community to collaborate around the planning and implementation of prevention strategies to reduce substance use and abuse among Vernon Youth. This Federal Grant of \$150,000 for five years has been awarded through the Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services to the Village for Families and Children-KIDSAFE. Vernon Youth Services is partnering with the Village for Families and Children-KIDSAFE and key agencies such as Hockanum Valley Community Council, the Vernon Police Department, ERASE, Vernon Public Schools, Vernon Park and Rec. and a number of others. The grant will provide funds as well as technical assistance to strengthen the Vernon Community around prevention efforts in Vernon.

2017 SUMMER PROGRAMS

Summer Youth Employment: the YSB partners with Capital Workforce Partners to offer jobs for income eligible youth. Youth must be 16 years of age and must be enrolled in school up to 12th grade. Youth hired for the summer employment program work for 20 hours/week for six weeks between July and August. For more information, contact Kim McTighe, Prevention Program Specialist at: Kimberly.mctighe@vernonct.org.

The Summer Fun Program offers fun programs for 20 youth in grades 1-5 and runs for six-weeks from July-August. Our focus this summer is nutrition, exercise, reading and plenty of time for play. The YSB provides free lunches to any youth 18 year and younger at three lunch sites. Lunches are served from 11:45 am-12:30 pm. Freebies at the Vernon Transfer Station

Many residents are not aware of the "freebies" offered at the Vernon Transfer Station. The Transfer Station is located on Hockanum Boulevard; normal business hours are Wednesdays and Saturdays 8 am - 4 pm and Sundays noon - 4 pm.

A permit and punchcard are not required for the following:

- 1) Excess refuse and recycling throughout the year
- 2) Metal includes items that are at least 75% metal. Does not include freon units (refrigerators, freezers, dehumidifiers, and air conditioners).
- 3) Electronic Waste includes desktop computers, laptops, key boards, power cords, chargers, mice or similar pointing devices, PDAs, portable digital music players and other personal e-devices, televisions, computer monitors, printers, fax machines, scanners, small electronics including VCRs, DVRs, DVD players, cable receivers, digital converter boxes and game consoles.
- 4) Yard Waste A small amount of brush (equal to what would fit into the trunk of a car) and one trash bag filled with weeds, tree trimmings, pine cones, pine needles, etc. will be accepted.

Large amounts of brush require a permit & punchcard.

- 5) Waste Motor Oil & Antifreeze Put oil and antifreeze into a clean plastic container such as a clean laundry detergent container with a screw-on cap. Label container. Do not mix oil and antifreeze. Leave container at designated area at Transfer Station. (5-gallon max per visit)
- 6) Lead acid batteries
- 7) Mulch (Seasonal) Free to Vernon residents (proof of residency required). Residents are responsible for loading their own mulch.
- 8) Paper (shredded) Place shredded paper in a brown paper grocery bag and staple it closed. Large amounts accepted.
- 9) Books/DVDs/VHS tapes & cassettes A collection container is available at the Transfer Station. Place books in a cardboard box with lid so that boxes may be stacked within the container.
- 10) Fluorescent Lightbulbs tubes and household compact fluorescent lights

Part 2 of a 3 Part Series on the history of the Town of Vernon Fire Department / Early Beginnings - Vernon Fire District *Excerpts from an original article written by Norman R. Strong*

In the early times, it was the responsibility of everyone to be very

vigilant in the use of fire and anything that could cause it to go out of control. If a fire started in a barn or house, one would abandon any effort to extinguish it and direct their attention)Id Vernon school after conversion into a fire station on saving of any



nearby buildings. Neighbors would run to help with ladders and buckets upon seeing a cloud of smoke, as there were very few telephones to use to call for help. Many years later with the onset of WWII, the federal government made available a fire pump, motor, and hose mounted on a two-wheel trailer. Chief William Conrady



of the Rockville Fire Department applied for two of these units. Not having use or a place to store them, he offered them to the rural areas of Vernon if we would organize a fire department and secure a properly heated place to house them in.

On March 23, 1943, a meeting was called for all those interested in forming a fire department, in the basement of the County Home School [Now the site of the Vernon Police Department]. The rural town was divided into three areas with each to have its own district, naming Vernon Center to be Company #1, Dobsonville to be Company #2 and Talcottville to be Company #3. Three commissioners, one from each district, were also elected to have oversight of the whole area, with each district

being responsible for raising its own financial obligation for housing and equipment. Thomas Hefferman was elected first Fire Chief of the three companies



and Howard Huelsman was elected Assistant Chief. The Vernon Fire District was born. Learn more about us and come join our volunteer family. www.vernonfire.com

Be Vigilant in Conducting Daily Tick Checks

Spring is here, and with spring, comes ticks. The North Central District Health Department (NCDHD) encourages parents to be on the alert for ticks – peak season is from April to September. Children are particularly high risk! The incidence of Lyme disease is higher in children under the age of 10 than in any other age group. Most cases of Lyme disease are associated with the nymphal stage of the deer tick. Nymphs are small (about the size of a pinhead), difficult to spot, and are active during the late spring and summer months when you and your family spend more time outdoors. "By using recommended personal protection techniques consistently, you can be assured that you and your children can enjoy the outdoors without fear of Lyme disease or other tick-borne illnesses," said Patrice Sulik, NCDHD Director of Health.

Residents are reminded to protect themselves this tick season by taking simple action steps:

- Know where ticks live and avoid these habitats.
- Conduct daily tick checks on family and pets.
- Remove ticks promptly with tweezers. Do not use rubbing alcohol or soap and water to remove the tick.
- Dress appropriately when entering areas where ticks live.
- Wear long pants, light in color, tucked into your socks; wear long shirt, tucked into pants; cover hair with hat.
- Remove and check clothing for ticks after leaving any suspect tick habitat.

- Use insect (and tick) repellent to further reduce tick exposure.

- There are many varieties including botanical, herbal or natural-based repellents. Choose what is right for you. Use veterinarian recommended control products on pets. Be sure to follow manufacturers' recommendations.

Water Pollution Control

The Town of Vernon Water Pollution Control Facility (WPCF) has received its new discharge permit from the CT Department of Energy and Environmental Protection. This new permit requires the facility to reduce the amount of phosphorous it discharges to the Hockanum River by November 2020. This limit is one of the lowest required by a WPCF in the state. Phosphorous is a nutrient that when left unchecked can promote algae growth in fresh water bodies like the Hockanum River. This excessive nutrient can accelerate and promote algae growth in far greater amounts than it occurs naturally. This abundance of algae can reduce the amount of sunlight that can reach plant and organisms below the surface and when the algae dies will reduce the dissolved oxygen that organisms need to survive. This reduces the water quality and makes for an unsightly and unhealthy environment. Currently, the WPCF is not designed to reduce phosphorous. In addition, the last upgrade to the facility was in the mid-1990s and its mechanical and structural components will need replacement or rehabilitation. The Town has hired an engineering firm, Tighe & Bond to draft a facility plan to determine: what is the

current state of the facility, how it can be improved upon to reduce phosphorous, and what needs to be done to the mechanical/structural components to get the facility through its next 20 year life cycle. This facility plan will be completed in the coming months and the recommendations will be reviewed on how these goals will be achieved.

Although 2020 seems like a long way off, these projects take a considerable amount of time to plan, design and construct. Look for future articles for updates on the progress of this upgrade.

Sergeant Charles Dart Gravestone Restoration



The Sons of Union Veterans are proud to announce a fundraising campaign for restoration of the gravestone of Sergeant Charles Dart. Sergeant Dart was the regimental color bearer of the 14th Connecticut Volunteer Infantry at the Battle of Fredericksburg on December 13th 1862. He was shot twice while carrying the regimental flag, a position he volunteered for, during the Union assault on Mayre's Height. Charles Dart truly gave his "last full

measure" for flag and country at Fredericksburg dying a week later from his wounds. Before he died he said that he would, if possible, volunteer for the same honorable position.

The object of the fundraiser is to restore the original gravestone from the weather damage of the past 154 years and preserve it for future generations. The grave monument is located in The Grove Hill Cemetery in Rockville Connecticut. Our goal for the project is to raise \$3000 to restore and clean the original gravestone. Nelson Architectural Restoration Company of Willington, Connecticut will complete the restoration.

Vernon Greenways Volunteers Assist in 100+ Foot Bridge Build

Beginning on Saturday, July 8 the Vernon Greenways Volunteers will assist in the building of a 100+ foot Suspended Bridge (think Indiana Jones) over the Hockanum River.

This enhancement is near Windsorville Road (Route 74) and across the street from the Sewage Treatment Plant. The bridge will be built on the old trolley line and directly connect the Vernon Hockanum River Trail with its counterpart in Ellington. The current setup sends the hiker down a trash filled and sometimes flooded Route 74 to a left turn on Franklin Avenue and 1/16 mile walk to a wooded entry and doubling back to a separate non-thru trail in Ellington.

The project will be led by Dave Smith, Vernon Town Engineer, who will design, as well as lead the construction. A suspended bridge differs from a suspension bridge in that the walkway is not leveled, but is allowed to retain a natural dip. Suspended bridges have been used for centuries for foot traffic, particularly in mountainous locations throughout the world. The project will take 5 to 6 Saturday commitments by participants.


