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
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Cover Story

Recently the Town of Vernon purchased the property known as 135 Bolton Road, (formerly Wolff-Zackin) to house our much need NEW Senior Center. Mayor Champagne and members of the Senior Center Advisory Committee worked to find the perfect location that would accommodate the many senior citizens who call Vernon home. Earlier this year the purchase was made and the plans to renovate the property into the NEW Senior Center began.

The Advisory and Design Committee worked to visit area senior centers and discuss with their directors space needs issues and

programming presently provided by their existing centers. The Committee continued their research by speaking to stakeholders and distributing surveys for individuals to contribute to the discussion. In the end, a design was drawn up to include multiple, multi-purpose rooms for activities and programs, a library and quiet space for reading and visiting, administrative offices, a full service kitchen (to house a snack bar, and to be used as a catering facility), and a room for members to play pool. The goal is to have the design accommodate the needs of all our seniors now and into the future.

Work has begun inside and outside the facility and the hope is that the Town will open its NEW Senior Center sometime in late fall. We'll keep you posted!

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From the Town Clerk - History of the Vernon/Rockville Post Offices

The post office at Vernon was established as Vernon Depot on July 29, 1853. Its name was changed to Vernon on September 28, 1885. The post office at Vernon Center was established about March 24, 1812. The first post office building was erected on the site of the old County Home. This post office was discontinued on March 15, 1910. There was not a post office in Rockville until 1842.

Mail service was meager for a number of years, one mail only coming to Rockville

and one going out each day. It was carried to Vernon Depot on the 9:30 am stage coach and brought to Rockville on the 3:30 pm stage. All the Rockville, Vernon Center, Tolland and Ellington mail did not even fill a mail bag. The stage driver waited while the mail was sorted. The beginnings of the Rockville Post office were in various stores or businesses on, or near, Park Place. A local newspaper dated May 17, 1872 indicated that there were 712 delivery boxes in Rockville, letters received were about 750 and letters sent about 725. A new Rockville post office was opened on May 31, 1918. It was located at the corner of Park

and School Streets and was constructed of Indiana limestone and tapestry brick with granite steps and limestone posts. That building was in used until a newer building was built at 141 Union Street around 1975. That building is still in use today.

For a time, there were two small branch post offices; one located on Hartford Turnpike and one located in Talcottville at 54 Hartford Turnpike. Currently, only the Talcottville branch services the Town of Vernon along with the main office in Rockville.

Board of Assessment Appeal hearings for Motor Vehicles are on Tuesday September 5th, Wednesday 6th & Thursday September 7th & Wednesday from 4:00 -7:00 pm, for the sole purpose of hearing appeals related to the assessments of motor vehicles on

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the Grand List of October 1, 2016. Anyone wishing to appeal their motor vehicle assessment may make application in the assessor's office. Blank applications are also located on the Vernon Town Website under the Assessor's Department. Hearings are on a First come, first served basis. (State Statute #12-110)

Town Hall Annex Building @ 8 Park Place, Vernon, Connecticut (Next to Town Hall). Anyone who appeals the assessment based on condition or high mileage must bring their vehicle to the hearing for an inspection. All documents considered. (860) 870-3625.

SOLAR ENERGY EXEMPTION

Applications for solar energy exemptions are available in the assessor's office. The value ADDED by the installation of passive or active solar systems will be the amount of the assessment exemption.

VETERANS

Any new veterans moving into Vernon need to have their discharge on file with the Town Clerk. The original form DD214 has to be filed with the Town Clerk before October 1, 2017 in order to receive benefits. If a veteran had lived in Vernon and moved away, and has now returned, they need to notify the Assessor's Office in order to activate their veteran exemption. Any claimant, still serving and unable to appear in person may forward to the Assessor annually a written statement, signed by the commanding officer of their unit or by the presentation of a notarized statement of a parent, guardian, spouse or legal representative of the claimant. The time served has to have been during wartime. Any veteran who is income limited that has not reapplied since last year should also contact the Assessor's Office. Forms can be obtained at the

Assessor's Office. If there are any questions please call the Assessor's Office. (860-870-3625)

Disabled Veterans: If you have a:

10-25% Disability Rating, your assessment exemption is 3,000 26-50% Disability Rating, your assessment exemption is 4,000 51-76% Disability Rating, your assessment exemption is 5,000 76-100% Disability rating, your assessment exemption is 6,000 (age 65 and older)

NEW: Members of the National Guard who performed homeland security duties under Title 32 for 90 days or more on or after August 2, 1990 may be entitled to an exemption. The exemption is for 10/1/2008 going forward. Also, any National Guard member performing homeland security duty on October 1, 2008 or subsequent assessment date should call our office immediately. Please call for details.

Personal Property Declarations must be filled out, according to law, between October 1st and November 1, 2017. Those engaged in any type of business in the Town of Vernon failing to submit their declaration will receive a 25% penalty of the total assessment due and payable in July 2018. You can access our link below and file your Personal Property Declaration electronically. You do not have to submit a hard copy of the signature page to the Assessor when filing electronically; however, the deadline remains no later than November 1, 2017.

Electronic signatures are now acceptable. This should save the tax-payer or their agent time and means you can save your information electronically for future reference. We will be mailing out the hardcopy declaration along with your unique password to access our web-file. There will be instructions attached. http://www.vernon-ct.gov/departments.

Personal Property consists of: <u>unregistered</u> motor vehicles, campers, trailers, truck campers: snowmobiles, all terrain

vehicles, junk autos, farm equipment, horses, commercial furniture, fixtures and equipment, farming and mechanic tools, cables, conduits, gas pipes, electric and water companies.

Personal Property forms are mailed out to all those persons who declared personal property last year. **All new businesses** should appear before the Assessor the first time they declare such property to avoid any misunderstandings going forward. That is the opportunity to ask questions what should be declared and how to file the declaration. If personal property has been disposed of during the assessment year, please return the form stating the disposition of same.

All real property and registered motor vehicles are declared by the Assessor.

The blind should furnish proof of their disability and must file such proof with the Assessor by October 1, 2017.

All persons filing for land reductions under PA-490 Farm, Forest and Open Space for the first time, must submit an application to the Assessor between September 1st and November 1, 2017. (Revaluation Year) Recent changes in the law regarding New Forestland. Applications require the applicant to contact the Assessor. Open Space Applications must be approved by the Planning and Zoning Commission prior to filing with the Assessor.

New Change in the Law regarding disabled persons: You only have to file your Disability Rating with the assessor once unless the percentage changes. Totally disabled persons who are receiving permanent total disability under the Social Security program are entitled to an exemption of \$1,000 from their property assessment they own. You must submit an affidavit from Social Security to be eligible. The filing deadline for new applicants is October 1, 2017.

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Disaster Preparedness Planning for Your Pets

Who can forget the 2011 Halloween Noreaster grabbing us all completely by surprise? Widespread power outages and property damage caused many communities to remain without electricity for nearly two weeks, forcing residents - and their pets—to seek out public shelters. Many people were not prepared. Here is how to plan for emergencies in advance to ensure your pets' safety in any situation.

Animal Evacuation Supply Kit

In the event of an evacuation, always bring your pets with you - never leave them alone inside the home or tethered outdoors. If conditions are hazardous for people, then likewise it is not safe for animals. During an emergency there may not be sufficient time to assemble everything your pet needs, so plan ahead by purchasing a sturdy closed-top plastic tote and store the following provisions to take with you:

- Food (at least a 3-day supply) packed in waterproof containers
- Manual can opener for moist food
- Bottled water (at least a 3-day supply)
- Lightweight portable food and water bowls
- Prescribed daily medications, vitamins, nutritional supplements, flea and tick preventatives
- Medical records and vaccine certificates make copies to keep in a plastic ziplock type bag
- Print out and laminate recent photos of you and your pet together to establish identity and ownership should you become separated from each other
- Contact information list of animal control agencies, veterinary hospitals, boarding facilities, and pet-friendly lodging in surrounding areas where you live or frequently travel with your pet. Also include this number for the National Animal Poison Control Center: 888-426-4435
- Extra collar or harness with identification tags, leash (non-retractable)
- Microchip identification tag check online database for accuracy of contact information
- Favorite toys and treats to help reduce stress
- Sanitation supplies disinfectant wipes, paper towels, wash cloths, pet waste disposal bags, absorbent puppy pads, cat litter/scoop/litter box, trash bags
- Towels and blankets for portable bedding
- Crate/pet carriers—sturdy plastic or metal only (cardboard carriers fall apart when wet). Carriers should be large enough for your pet to stand, turn and lie down comfortably.
- Label carriers with your name, phone number, and your pet's

Animal First Aid Kit

While not a substitute for professional veterinary care, a basic first aid kit for animals is essential. Sign up for a first aid

course, or read and learn first aid procedures in advance so you can help save the life of your own pet, or someone else's, during an emergency. Keep one kit at home and pack another in your car while traveling. Some items a basic first aid kit should contain:

- Nonstick gauze pads in several sizes do not use human adhesive "band-aids" on pets
- Rolled gauze in several sizes
- White bandage tape 1" wide
- Flexible pet bandage wrap 3" wide
- Bandage scissors
- Wound cleansing solution
- · Alcohol pads
- Cotton-tipped applicators
- Latex-free gloves
- · Liquid dish detergent, towel and washcloth
- Sterile saline solution bottle
- Hydrogen peroxide new unopened bottle (only administer to pet by veterinary consult)
- Karo® syrup new unopened bottle (use for diabetic pets and only by veterinary consult)
- Nail clippers and styptic powder
- Foil blanket
- Instant warm/cold compress cover with fleece or cloth to prevent burns or skin irritation
- · Digital rectal thermometer and lubricant

- Contact information list (same as in evacuation kit)
- First-aid guidebook

Animal Rescue Kit

Be ready for the unexpected when away from home. Prepare two animal rescue kits, one for home in case a neighbor needs to rescue your pet if you are not able to return home yourself, and keep another travel rescue kit in your car. Rescue kits should contain the following:

- Pillowcases for quick capture and/or temporary transport device
- Towels and blankets can be used for covering animals to calm or distract them, or for wrapping an injured or scared animal
- Leash and/or loop rope to act as a lasso for quick capture
- Heavy leather work gloves for hand protection, and a muzzle for your pet to prevent biting. When stressed or panicked, animals may even bite people they know and trust otherwise
- Portable transport carriers
- Special treats to coax animals into carrier or vehicle
- Contact information list (same as in evacuation kit)

Being prepared provides your pet the best chance of staying safe. Keep in mind your pet may require unexpected assistance even during everyday situations.

The Many Faces Of Talcott Ravine

The Northern Connecticut Land Trust (NCLT) owns and maintains seven Vernon properties totaling 100 acres.

Perhaps the most interesting is the 20-acre Talcott Ravine at the western end of the Tankerhoosen River donated in 2010 by John Talcott Jr. Here nature, history and recreation meet - a place to remember Vernon's industrial past while the river and pines help you unwind.

The river enters the preserve over the Dobsonville Pond dam, then cuts through the ravine it carved out eons ago, before taking a leisurely journey through tall pines on its way to join the Hockanum River. Far above the river on the south bank is the Hop River Rail-Trail.

The peaceful aura of the ravine today is a far cry from what you would have found 100 to 150 years ago when Peter Dobson's two cotton mills competed with Rockville as the industrial center of Vernon. Remnants of both factories remain showing the location of water wheels, turbines, factory walls and canals. With imagination you might picture

the busy and noisy life of the time as you walk through today's quiet pines on the path once traveled by wagon and horse connecting the Dobson and Talcottville mills.

Today the river is a favorite of fishermen. At the Talcottville end of the preserve is Talcottville Pond, the only one of the three lower lakes with no cottages or buildings. Here wildlife flourishes throughout the year. You might find geese, ducks, turtles, blue heron, song birds and even an occasional beaver. Perhaps those sitting quietly with pole in hand are here more for the tranquility than the fish.

Talcott Ravine is open to the public with access from both ends. On Saturday, October 14 at 1 pm NCLT will lead its annual history-geology-nature hike from Talcottville through the Talcott Ravine and returning on the Rail-Trail. 



Leaf Collection Information

When will the leaf bins open?

Leaf bins will open mid-October for the convenience of residents. Contamination caused by disposal of brush, bags, grass clippings or any other debris will result in these leaf bins being shut down.

- Nye Street At the firehouse off West Street. Bin will be marked.
- Church Street In the bike trail parking area. Bin will be marked.
- Legion Field Off Regan Road at rear of parking lot. Bin will be marked.

When will collection begin?

The Town of Vernon leaf program will begin Monday, November 6, 2017. Leaves should be raked to the curb by this date to ensure collection. Do not be alarmed if you see DPW crews out the week before this date. They are testing the vacuum equipment and training our temporary leaf laborers.

When will my street's leaves be collected?

All streets in the Town of Vernon have been divided into 3 groups. Group A Streets will be collected first and completed before leaf crews move on to Group B Streets and so on. This program is dependent on weather. Under good conditions, we expect to complete a group of streets in 1-2 weeks. Rain, snow or freezing temperatures will delay the program.

Do not rake leaves into the street or onto the sidewalk. This is a safety and flooding hazard as well as a violation of Ordinance No. 235, Sec. 7-20 and is punishable by a fine of \$100.

How many passes will there be this year?

All streets are guaranteed at least one pass. If time permits, there will be a second pass. Residents are at their own risk whether to wait for a second pass or to bag their leaves for pickup on either of the first two Fridays in December.

Other options?

Residents may either transport their leaves to a designated leaf bin or bag them for pickup by DPW crews. Leaves may be bagged using either the biodegradable paper bags OR plastic lawn & leaf bags.

When will bagged leaves be collected?

Bagged leaves will be collected the first two Fridays in December. Bag pickup is not automatic - please call the Public Works Office at 860-870-3500 to schedule. Leaves cannot be put out for collection with regular trash.

Please be aware of some delays that are beyond our control - leaf fall timeframe, weather conditions, holidays. "Mother Nature" plays a big role in our leaf program!

Update on the Road Bond

The Department of Public Works has once again been busy performing pavement maintenance on our Town roads. Funded through the 2014 Road Bond Project, our activities seek to renew roads that have exceeded their useful life and preserve satisfactory roads to extend their serviceable life. The techniques used this year have included full depth reclamation and surface milling/paving.

In all, over thirteen (13) miles of town roads were completed this year bringing our total since the start of the program to over sixty five (65) miles reconstructed or resurfaced. This represents almost sixty percent of all Town owned roads. This winter, DPW staff will review the two years of work remaining. They will work with our utility companies to accommodate upgrades to service and develop next year's work list. They will also assess streets that are not listed on the bond and may seek to add them to the program if conditions warrant their inclusion.

The program has consistently achieved savings which has allowed the Town Council to add roads on a yearly basis which had not originally been included in the program but have been identified as needing repairs.

RECYCLING TIP CARDBOARD

Over 85% of all products that are sold in the United States | are packed in cardboard. That's a LOT of cardboard!

The Vernon Public Works Department requests that any cardboard which is thicker in nature be first flattened out and unfolded before placing in the recycling cart. If possible, cardboard may be cut into smaller pieces as well to avoid smaller recyclables being jammed in the bottom of the cart. Flattened cardboard will take up less space leaving more room for other recyclables.

Water Pollution Control Authority



In any given day ~3 million gallons of sewage flows to the Town of Vernon Water Pollution Control Facility (WPCF) for treatment. Evolving from its historical roots in the era of mills and sand tricking beds of the 1800s, sewage treatment has become more complex, sophisticated, and regulated. Vernon's treatment facility is old. While the expected life span for a modern treatment plant is twenty years, Vernon's plant is a mix of components

ranging from 25-40 years old. Age isn't the only story. The State of Connecticut mandated the Vernon plant meet new environmental standards by 2021 - including 94% reductions in phosphorus and 54% reductions in nitrogen discharges. What does this mean? It's time for an upgrade.

The upgrade process isn't without challenges, costs, and opportunities. Meeting some of the most stringent standards statewide is only part of the story. Town compliance with a statutory July 2019 deadline for beginning construction secures eligibility for 50% and 30% relative grants for phosphorous and nitrogen improvements, and an estimated overall project reimbursement of 28%. As a regional facility, other contributing towns will fund nearly 30% of remaining costs. Failure to complete improvements by 2021

will result in significant, daily fines. Upgrades also provide immediate operational and budgetary improvements; improving the environment and extending the life of the plant for at least twenty years. Immediately there will be energy and operational savings, as well as ~\$110,000 annual savings associated with present nitrogen fees - fees projected to escalate and cost Vernon more than \$5 million dollars by 2040. To date, Vernon has completed the facility plan study of the WPCF (funded by a State 55% grant, and contributing Towns), and recently began the 18 month engineering process to meet the rapidly approaching 2019 deadlines. So the next time you go, know we have your flow.



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Town of Vernon Fire Department

Part 3 of a 3 Part Series on the history of the Town of Vernon Fire Department.

Two Fire Departments in Vernon? (Excerpts from an original article written by Richard Bowman)Prior to 1979 Vernon



had two fire departments: The Vernon Fire District and The Rockville Fire Department. The Vernon Fire District was formed in the 1940s to meet the needs of rural Vernon. The Rockville Fire Department was formed in the 1800s to meet the needs of the more industrialized Rockville section of Vernon. Each department had its

own Chief, Officers, geographical boundaries, and methods of operation.

Even though the general government (Town Council, Board of Education, Police Department, Public Works, etc.) was consolidated in 1964 the fire departments were not. In the early 1970s firefighters, government leaders, and the community began to talk about the need for one fire department. One person said at the time "That's like asking the Red Sox and the Yankees to form one team! You'll never do that."

A by-laws committee was formed consisting of firefighters from both departments. It was clear that in order to serve the needs of the town a pooling of resources, and the volunteers, needed to happen. Long hours of difficult negotiations took place. Years of tradition had to be respected. The name of the new department had to show no favoritism toward either department. After many months of meetings and soul searching a new fire department was born! The Town of Vernon Fire Department became

a reality. Out of the two old departments came one Fire Chief, a fire marshal and a single department made up of all volunteers.

In the 38 years since 1979 the needs of Vernon have changed and the new department has grown with it. It is an excellent and modern emergency service. But the one thing that has not changed since 1855 is the dedication and commitment of the volunteers. The memory of one town with two fire departments is now just a fond memory.

Water Pollution Control

Two Rockville High School students, Trevor Jones and Adam Fraiko, recently donated a steel American flag they constructed for a school project to the Vernon Police Department.

Trevor and Adam, both students from Caitlin Hoffman's sophomore English class at the time, were assigned to create something for an organization to show their appreciation. Trevor and Alex chose to create an American flag for the Vernon Police Department in recognition for "all the work they do to keep us safe in this town."

Trevor and Adam obtained flat steel scrap metal from John's Scrap Metal in Columbia. Using an angle grinder and mig welder, they built a frame for the flag. They proceeded to use a plasma cutter to cut out 13 individual strips and custom bent each one to create the illusion of the flag blowing in the wind.

After welding the strips to the frame and smoothing it out with a grinder, Trevor and Alex sawed off the brass ends of 50 empty shotgun shell casings and glued them to the square portion of the flag to represent the stars. After 20 hours of construction and multiple layers of paint, the students' final project weighed over 30 pounds.

On July 5th, in the presence of nearly every officer, Jones and his parents presented their flag to the Vernon Police Department.



Their accomplishment was well received, and the officers were impressed with the detail, effort, and consideration the students put into their project.

The flag will be displayed in the lobby of the Vernon Police Department and accompanied by a plaque with the students' names. Hoffman stated they received an A for their project.

The Vernon Cemetery Commission will conduct the ceremony this year at Lugg Field, the Veterans Section at Grove Hill Cemetery on Saturday December 16th starting at 12:00 noon. Seven ceremonial wreaths will be placed to remember all soldiers, sailors, airmen, and marines who served, honor their sacrifices, and teach our younger generations about the high cost of our freedoms.

Specially designated wreaths for the Army, Marines, Navy, Air Force, Coast Guard, Merchant Marine, and POW/MIA will be placed during the ceremony that will be coordinated simultaneously at over 1,000 participating locations all across the Country.

Sponsorship of individual wreaths is not accepted at this site. The cemetery is located off of Grove Street in the Rockville section of town.

It is projected that around a million wreaths will be placed nationwide, by over 600,000 volunteers as part of the Wreaths Across America mission to Remember, Honor, and Teach.

Wreaths across America TM is a national nonprofit organization founded in 2007 to continue and expand the annual wreath-laying ceremony at Arlington National Cemetery begun by Maine businessman, Morrill Worcester, in 1992. One interesting fact is that Mr. Worcester attended Rockville High School for a brief period in his youth.

The end of each school year is a very busy time for the Vernon Education Foundation (VEF). 




