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Wreaths Across America at Grove Hill Cemetery on December 12

The Vernon Cemetery Commission will again participate in the Wreaths Across America ceremony on Saturday, December 12 at 12:00 noon at Lugg Veterans Field in Grove Hill Cemetery. Ceremonial wreaths representing all the branches of service and the Prisoner of War will be placed at the field. Service flags will accompany each wreath as they are placed.

The tradition of laying wreaths to honor our veterans during the holiday season began in 1992 when Morrill Worcester of the Worcester Wreath Company of Harrington, Maine was stuck with a number of extra wreaths at the close of the holiday season. Remembering a boyhood trip to the Nation's Capital and the sacred grounds of Arlington National Cemetery, he donated 5,000 wreaths to be placed at the headstones of an older section of the cemetery.

What began as one man's gesture has now grown into a national movement when in 2006 Wreaths Across America was formed as a non-profit. As part of the annual ceremonies, wreath-laying events at over 500 participating locations are held across the country and the world to show our gratitude and appreciation during the holiday season. 




Vernon's Community Emergency Response Team (C.E.R.T.)

residents about disaster preparedness for hazards that may impact our area and trains residents in basic disaster response skills, such as fire safety, light search and rescue, team organization, and disaster medical operations.

Twenty hours of formal C.E.R.T. training is available for free to residents who are interested in joining the Vernon team. Residents who have gone through the C.E.R.T. training have a better understanding of the potential threats to our community and have taken the right steps to lessen the effects of these hazards on themselves, their homes, and their workplaces.



In times of disaster, when our local response capabilities have become overwhelmed, C.E.R.T. members have stepped-up to play an integral role in supporting our emergency

operations. By effectively applying their training and by executing their plans they have proven to be an invaluable resource to our community. Equally as important, our C.E.R.T. members are busy participating in non-emergency projects and events that have improved the overall safety of our community.

Some Winter Tips

- Put good snow tires on your car and keep a shovel in your trunk.
- Drive courteously according to road conditions and watch out for the safety of pedestrians.
- Pay close attention to weather forecasts.
- Keep refuse and recycling carts out of harm's way. Storm conditions can sometimes bring high winds that can toss cans into the road.
- Keep hands out of snow blowers.
- Deposit snow to the right side of the driveway (facing the road) to prevent it from being pushed back into the driveway.
- Clean walks after the final pass of the plows.

HELP US HELP YOU

- Please do not leave your vehicle on the street during snow or ice storms.
- Please limit travel to trips that are absolutely necessary.
- Please do not place snow into streets. Remember, you are responsible for your contractor's actions.
- Please keep a safe, minimum distance of 50 feet back from snow control vehicles.
- Please keep your mailbox 42" above the curb and slightly back from the edge of pavement and keep the post and hardware in good repair.
- Please remove all basketball hoops for the winter months to prevent damage to equipment and reduce liability.
- Keep refuse and recycling carts at the edge of the driveway, NOT in the roadway.

Adam Libros Town of Vernon **Fire Marshal**

On May 7, 2015 the latest CT Fire Prevention Code (CFPC) was adopted. There is a new section within the CFPC that regulates cooking equipment as follows:

Sec. 10.11.6.1: For other than one- and two-family dwellings, no hibachi, grill, or other similar devices used for cooking, heating, or any other purpose shall be used or kindled on any balcony, under any overhanging portion, or within 10 feet of any structure.

Sec. 10.11.6.2: For other than one-and two-family dwellings, no hibachi, grill, or other similar devices used for cooking shall be stored on a balcony.

Sec. 10.11.6.3: Listed equipment permanently installed in accordance with its listing, applicable codes, and manufacturer's instructions shall be permitted.

If you are unsure if your building shall comply with this new requirement, please contact the Office of the Fire Marshal at 860-870-3652 for assistance.

Youth Services office at Rockville High School



Anyone who passes by Room 235 at Rockville High School is sure to see a revolving door of students coming in and out as they grab some M&M's, play with one of the many fidget toys or let Mrs. McTighe know how they're doing. Many students stop into the office in between classes to say hello and often end up talking about a school or personal issue which needs to be addressed. They might not know the room number, but students often refer to it as "that really colorful room" or "the room where you can get snacks and talk."

This room is also known as the satellite office of the Vernon Youth Services Bureau and is an addition to the support services offered at Rockville High School. Kim McTighe works for Vernon Youth Services and has staffed that office since August, 1995. She also grew up in Vernon and attended Rockville High School.

This partnership between the school and Youth Services Bureau (YSB) is unique to Youth Service Bureaus. Having an office in the school allows Kim to be on the front lines and work closely with the school support staff, school resource officer and administration to help assess students' needs. She provides counseling and case management services to students who are struggling with issues at school and at home. It also allows her to interact and build relationships with the high school population in order to connect the students and their families to school and community resources.

The school office allows her to have direct access to students in order to co-facilitate intervention groups, run prevention programs, coordinate employment learning programs and community based prevention initiatives and she also helps to coordinate after school Zumba, Yoga and basketball programs in which 30% of the high school students participated last year.

Kim is also the advisor for the Peer Advocate and SSNAP (Students Seeking New Achievements Positively) programs where she works with students to educate the school about issues such as the dangers of 3D driving: Drinking, Drugged and Distracted driving. The groups participate in community service projects, mentor at the elementary schools and work with peers who might be struggling. They also coordinate school activities such as the mock car crash and an overnight Volleyball lock in which is the most anticipated event at RHS. Over 250 students participate each year and take part in a double elimination volleyball tournament as well as Zumba and karaoke.

Kim also takes part in a number of school and community groups such as the Juvenile Review Board, Vernon Drug and Alcohol Prevention Council, Tolland County Multi-disciplinary team, Attendance Intervention Group, Student Attendance Review Board and the RHS Crisis Team.

Overnight Parking

Fall has arrived, the leaves are falling and temperatures are dropping. These are harbingers of things to come. Winter is around the corner and so is the annual overnight parking enforcement campaign by the Vernon Police Department.

On an annual basis, the Vernon Police Department begins the winter season with the enforcement of Town Ordinance 13-38, which prohibits the overnight parking of vehicles on the public streets. Any vehicle found parked on the street between the hours of 3:30 am and 5:00 am is subject to a \$15.00 fine for each violation.

In order to gain compliance with the ordinance the Police Department will shortly begin to place warning notices on vehicles found in violation with enforcement to begin in earnest by December.

The ordinance is in place to assist Public Works with the timely clearing and treatment of snow covered streets.

Although the ordinance prohibits overnight parking on an annual basis, the ordinance is not enforced during non-winter months due to the lack of parking areas in sections of the community.

The Police Department also reminds vehicle owners that during snow events parking bans will be put in place to facilitate snow removal. Any vehicle found on the town streets during a parking ban, which impedes snow removal operations, can and will be towed at the owner's expense.

With a little cooperation the community and the Police Department can provide safe passage on our streets during the upcoming winter season.





Snow & Ice Removal Guide

The primary responsibility for keeping Vernon streets open and the transportation network alive during winter storms rests with the Public Works Department.

When winter precipitation starts, the Public Works dispatches trucks throughout the town to treat the roads and plow over 26 separate plow routes. Within each plow route, certain streets are designated as primary streets to be "opened up" first so that all areas of the Town can be reached by snow removal crews and emergency vehicles. Secondary streets are then opened. This means that one or two passes will be made so that the road is open for traffic. Residents can help by parking vehicles off the street at all times during the winter months.

After all streets are opened, the drivers will begin to "widen out" so that the maximum width of the traveled way will be usable. Widening out may require four or more additional passes to move the accumulated snow to the gutter line. Cul-de-sac residents are encouraged to be patient with the removal of snow from these areas as large snow removal equipment cannot appropriately clear the entire area and alternate equipment may then be applied when the storm subsides. The plow operator has little choice as to where the snow will be deposited; many times the snow will be deposited into driveway openings.

It is suggested that when clearing your driveway you shovel the snow to the right when facing the street, this way what you have shoveled will not be deposited in your driveway by the plow. The parking ban may be enforced by the Chief of Police if the storm warrants it.

Sidewalks

Sidewalks must be cleared of all ice and snow within eight hours of the end of the storm, or eight hours after sunrise if the storm ended during the night. When plowing or clearing driveways and sidewalks, snow may not be deposited onto the roadways. Plowing contractors and homeowners should take notice that violators may be subject to a fine for this. Our department has free sand available for your sidewalks; call our office at 860-870-3500 for the locations.

Mailboxes

While plow truck drivers make every effort to avoid mailboxes, they do, on occasion, hit or knock one over. Operators must report these incidents to their supervisor. It is also possible that mailboxes can be knocked over by heavy snow without the operator's knowledge.

It is the Town's policy to replace a mailbox struck by a Town vehicle if the mailbox was mounted on a sturdy post and located according to U.S. Postal Service standards. Once it has been determined that the Town is at fault, the mailbox will be replaced with either a plain white or black regulation mailbox and a pressure-treated post (if applicable). The post office will not

deliver mail until the mailbox is replaced. These standards are summarized as follows:

- The box should be $3\frac{1}{2}$ 4 feet from ground level to the bottom of the box.
- The face of the box should be flush with the back of the curb or set back 6 - 12 inches from the edge of the road.
- All mailboxes should have a handle, a flag, and the house number on the righthand side as you face it from the street.
- Residents must keep the approach to their mailbox clear of obstructions to allow safe access for delivery. If USPS employees are impeded in reaching a mail receptacle, the Postmaster may withdraw delivery service.
- Curbside mailboxes must be placed to allow safe and convenient delivery by carriers without leaving their vehicles.

Fire Hydrants

Owners of property and occupants of buildings that have a fire hydrant are required by Town Ordinance to clear a 4-foot area in all directions around the hydrant and a 3-foot wide path from the street to the fire hydrant. Failure to comply with this ordinance

may result in a fine. The Fire Department counts on hydrants being cleared of snow to help protect your safety.

Catch Basins

Help minimize street flooding by shoveling snow and ice from in front of the catch basin nearest your house. This includes keeping catch basin grates free of leaves and other debris all year long!

Basketball Hoops & Poles

The Town will not be responsible for basketball hoops and poles placed on town property, either at the edge of the road or on a cul-de-sac. Basketball hoops or poles damaged by town vehicles, especially during removal of refuse, recycling, snow, slush, etc. will not be repaired or replaced. These items should be placed on private property.

Refuse & Recycling Collection

During winter months, please keep cart(s) clear of snow, snow banks, parked cars, and other obstructions. Place refuse and recycling carts at the edge of the driveway, NOT in the roadway.

Two Fire Departments in Vernon?



Yes? Prior to 1979 Vernon had two fire departments: The Vernon Fire District and The Rockville Fire Department. The Fire District consisted of three companies formed in the 1940's to meet the needs

of rural Vernon. The Rockville Fire Department consisted of six companies formed in the 1800's to meet the needs of the more industrialized Rockville section of Vernon. Ambulance services were provided by the volunteers out of each department in their coverage areas. Each department had its own Chief, Officers, geographical boundaries and methods of organization.



Even though the general government (Town Council, Board of Education, Police Department, Public Works, Parks and Recreation, etc.) was consolidated in 1964, the fire departments were not. In the early 1970's firefighters,

government leaders, and the community began to talk about the need for one fire department. One person said at the time "That's like asking the Red Sox and Yankees to form one team! You'll never do that."



A by-laws committee was formed consisting of firefighters from both departments. It was clear that in order to serve the needs of the town a pooling of resources and volunteers needed to

happen. Long hours of difficult and detailed negotiations took place. Many years of tradition and feelings had to be respected. The name of the new department had to show no favoritism to one department or the other. After many months of meetings and soul searching, a new fire department was born! The Town of Vernon Fire Department became a reality. Out of the two old departments came one fire chief, a fire marshal, a single department made up of all volunteers and an ambulance service.

In 36 years since 1979 the needs of Vernon have changed and the new department has grown with it. It is an excellent and modern emergency service. The limited monies allocated for fire protection is able to be spent on the best equipment and training without the high cost of salaries and benefits. The one thing that has not changed since 1855 is the dedication and commitment of the volunteers. The memory of one town with two fire departments is now just a fond memory.

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








Rockville's Charles Ethan Porter

"African-American Master of Still Life"



Born in Hartford in 1847 or 1849, Charles Porter's family moved back to Rockville during his youth.

Porter's artistic gifts were evident before he graduated from high school in1865. Porter left Rockville to further his education, studying at the National Academy of Design in New York City from 1869 through 1873. He supported his education by giving art lessons. To help him pay for an additional

year of school, Rockville citizens held a musical benefit for him at a local church in 1877. Porter left New York City in 1878 and moved to Hartford where he lived until 1881.

Charles Porter specialized in still life paintings of fruits, insects, butterflies, and flowers in a mixture of indoor and outdoor settings. His work was known for realistic details and precise brushstrokes. While in Hartford, Porter became acquainted with people in the local art and literary communities including Samuel Clemens, also known as writer Mark Twain. As an African American, Porter endeavored to prove that he had the talent and ambition to succeed as an artist.

In 1881, Porter decided to study in France to learn about the new movement in art that would ultimately be labeled "Impressionism." Arriving in France, Porter carried a letter of introduction from Samuel Clemens and other notable citizens from Hartford. He spent two years abroad and took courses at an art school in Paris. Before having to return to the United States due to a shortage of funds, Porter spent time in the French countryside which inspired him to paint landscapes.

Porter returned to Hartford in 1884. His later work revealed the influences of his time overseas. His still life paintings display looser brushwork and he used color and light in a more Impressionistic style.



Between 1884 and 1897, he divided his time between Hartford and New York as he worked on making a name for himself. These years were his most productive period. He sold a number of paintings but not enough to completely support himself as an artist. Throughout his career, incidents occurred which made him conscious of the barriers that society imposed on his race. After 1897, he settled permanently in Rockville. He

occasionally exhibited his work. His income came from giving lessons to area artists and selling still life paintings and depictions of local scenes. Porter died in 1923. In his last years, he faced declining health and the loss of close relatives. Sometimes to get by, he would trade paintings in place of money to settle his bills.

Known only to people in Rockville at the time of his death, Porter and his work were rediscovered in the late 20th century. In one of his letters, Porter wrote that he felt that his struggle to become accepted as an artist and as an African American would pave the way for others of his race to achieve success in the arts. Porter's art is appreciated by many museum visitors and art collectors. The story of the artist adds a greater richness to his body of work.

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
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The Vernon Chorale **Celebrates 35 Years!**
