

#### **Clinton Family Film Festival**



The Town of Clinton will continue to host its Family Film Festival so long as attendance at the September movie was sufficient. That being assumed, the last two movies will be screened on October 8th and November 12th at 7:00 pm. Both will be shown on the large, rear projection screen in Clinton's Andrews Memorial Town Hall's auditorium at 54 East Main Street. Admission is FREE and all children under the age

of 14 must be accompanied by a responsible adult. .

On October 8th the movie will be "The Prince and the Pauper," Mark Twain's story about Tom Canty, the son of a poor family living in London, who has been taught to read and write by a local priest. Hanging out one day near the palace gates, he sees the Prince of Wales – Prince Edward VI. Coming too close, Tom is nearly caught and beaten by the Royal Guards. Prince

Edward stops them and invites Tom into the palace. There, the two boys are fascinated by their uncanny resemblance to each other.

For fun, the boys decide to switch clothes. The Prince, forgetting that he is still dressed in Tom's rags, goes outside the palace to chastise the guard who was going to beat Tom. But dressed as he is, he is not recognized by the guards, who drive him from the palace grounds, where now in rags, is found by Tom's father and brought to his home, where he is subjected to brutality. Edward escapes and eventually meets Miles Hendon (Errol Flynn), a soldier and nobleman returning from war. Although Miles does not believe Edward's claim to royalty, he humors him and becomes his protector. Meanwhile, news reaches them that King Henry VIII, Edward's father, has died and that Prince Edward, who is now, in actuality, Tom Canty and still believed to be the prince, is about to be coronated King of England. Will Prince Edward remain a pauper? Or will he eventually assume his rightful place on the throne?

Set in 1547, the book was first published in 1881 in Canada, before its 1882 publication in the United States and was Twain's first attempt at historical fiction. Twain was already living in Hartford, Connecticut at the time of its publication –which

was five years after his novel "The Adventures of Tom Sawyer" and four years before "The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn."

In commemoration of Veteran's Day, the movie to be screened on November 12th is "Empire of the Sun" (1987). Steven Spielberg directed this action packed World War II film about Jamie "Jim" Graham (Christian Bale), a privileged only child of a wealthy, British family in Shanghai, who accidentally becomes separated from his parents during the evacuation of that city during the Japanese invasion – and subsequently become a prisoner of war in

a Japanese internment camp. In order to survive, he must make the transition from Jamie, spoiled rich kid, to scruffy survivor - redubbed Jim by an American mercenary (John Malkovich) he attaches himself to along the way. The movie is based upon J. G. Ballard's semi-autobiographical novel of the same name.

#### **Permanent Absentee Ballots:**

An elector can file an AB application together with a doctor's certificate (presumably on letter head), stating that they have a permanent disability and are unable to appear in person at their polling place. This will allow an elector to be on

our Permanent Absentee ballot list. AB ballots will then be automatically mailed to the elector for the Presidential Election.

Election Day Registration will be available.

Please check-out the online services provided by the Department of Motor Vehicles.

#### **DMV'S ONLINE SERVICES**

Go to the DMV website www.ct.gov/dmv.

Here are just a few of the services as listed on the DMV website:

- Check Driver's License Status
- Sign up for official notifications (such as a registration renewal notice).
   You will need to provide an e-mail address.
- Cancel Registration and License Plates (be sure to print out a receipt)
- Check Property Tax, Insurance, Emissions and Other Compliance Issues
- Lookup Registration Status
- Pay Emissions Test Late Fee
- Renew Registration
- Reprint Registration Certificate
- Lookup Wait Time at a DMV Office
- Print Forms

Please take the time to check your license, vehicle registration(s) and emissions status.

If you owe municipal motor vehicle property taxes you cannot register or re-register a vehicle. You will need to resolve your tax issue(s) before attempting to register or re-register a vehicle.

If you owe taxes to the Town of Clinton, contact the Clinton Tax Office 860-669-9067.

If you receive a tax bill from another city/town that you did not reside in or garage your vehicle in as of October 1, 2015, contact the Assessor of that city/town to request a transfer to the correct city/town of residency as of October 1, 2015.

If you have not received a tax bill from Clinton and your vehicle was registered per the Department of Motor Vehicles on October 1, 2015 to the Town of Clinton, contact the Clinton Assessor's office 860-669-9269.

#### Raising Awareness on Breast Cancer Prevention

### CT RIVER AREA HEALTH DISTRICT: RAISING AWARENESS ON BREAST CANCER PREVENTION

As the month of October approaches, so does National Breast Cancer Awareness. During the month of October, many health professionals, breast cancer patients, survivors, and their families help raise awareness on breast cancer as they work hard to raise money for breast cancer prevention, diagnosis, treatment, and research. According to the National Cancer Institute, breast cancer is a disease in which malignant cancer cells form in the tissues of the breast. Although breast cancer can also be found in men, it is the second leading cause of death among women. In addition, one in eight women in the United States will be diagnosed with breast cancer in her lifetime.

Unfortunately, there is no way to prevent breast cancer, but women can reduce their risk by maintaining a well-balanced nutritious diet, exercising regularly, avoiding alcohol consumption, and getting annual screening tests like mammograms, clinical exams, ultrasounds, and doing breast self-exams monthly. A woman has an increased risk of developing breast cancer, if it runs in her family. In fact, hereditary breast cancer accounts for 5% to 10% of all breast cancer cases. In a situation like this, a doctor may refer the patient to a genetic counselor to further discuss her family health history and to learn more about her options for genetic testing.

Early detection is the best protection because as soon as a woman discovers any lumps or physical changes with her breasts, she is able to seek medical attention immediately. Furthermore, it is essential for women to create and follow an early detection plan that will help them detect breast cancer in the earliest stages. To show your support for breast cancer, wear pink during the month of October!

#### Back to School: A Handy Health & Safety Checklist

It's that time again! Time to switch from swimsuits to school clothes and from beach bags to backpacks. That's the easy part. What about preparing your child to have the healthiest and safest school year possible? Here's a handy checklist to help.

- 1. Schedule medical, eye, and dental checkups. Before school starts, check with the pediatrician to see if your child needs any immunizations. Vision and hearing tests are also a good idea, although schools perform hearing tests during certain grades.1 If your child is playing sports, ask the pediatrician whether a special checkup is needed. With certain sports, concussions can be a serious problem. Talk to the doctor about ways to protect your
- 2. Organize your child's medical history records. Provide copies to your child's school or daycare providers. I can help you pull some of this together, but the list should include your child's:
- Prescription medications
- · Medical problems, such as asthma or allergies
- Previous surgeries
- Emergency contacts
- 3. Communicate about transportation. Some kids get dropped

up and picked up by parents. Others carpool. Still others walk, bike, or take the bus. And, of course, teens may have their own wheels. Regardless, it's important that your kids be—and feel safe getting to and from school.

- If you or another adult picks up your child, agree on a time and place for pickups. Explain what to do if the driver is running late.
- If your child walks or bikes, do a dry run and explain any potential traffic hazards.
- If your child or teen takes the bus, find a safe route and agree on a visible pick-up and drop-off spot. Ideally, this is a place where other kids are around and adults can clearly see them.
- If your teen drives to school, be crystal clear about safe driving—including ditching that teen temptation - texting while driving.

Create an emergency plan in case anything goes awry. In fact, make sure your child knows what to do in an emergency—whether at home or at school or anywhere in between.

• Remember that there's more to school than hitting the books. For example, good nutrition and exercise are essential for brain health. Here are a few other reminders:





- Be consistent about bedtime and wake-up times. Growing kids need at least 8 hours of sleep—and teens need even more.
- Make homework a habit by having clear routines. But don't overlook free time and friend time.
- Explain ways to prevent infection such as by regularly washing hands and by not sharing hats or other clothing. That's one way lice get around!
- Keep lines of communication open. Listen for signs of bullying or other concerns. Many parents find that car rides are a great

time to have nonthreatening conversations with their kids. Contact the school if a problem like bullying does arise.

Now about those school supplies.... Come by the store to stock up. And while you're here, we can talk over your health and safety plans for the school year.




