First Selectman's Corner

Main Street East Reconstruction

The Main Street East contractor, Quality Associates, Inc., began work on June 15th. Good progress was made in June and July with installation of new storm drainage, sediment control basin in Laurel Hill Cemetery parking area, electrical conduit for parking area lighting, replacement of deteriorated brook culvert, and placement of new granite curbing. In August and September the existing pavement was reclaimed for the road's new sub base. This work was done for the entire length of Main Street from Laurel Hill to Middlesex Avenue. The section between School Lane and Middlesex Avenue will only be regarded, catch basin tops replaced and paved with new curbing installed where necessary. Final paving of the 1,800 feet of Main Street East will be done at one time for both cost efficiency and consistency of roadway surface. The majority of the reconstruction improvements will be substantially completed at the end of September, wrap up landscape work and traffic signage will be done in October. The cost of this project's construction, Laurel Hill to Middlesex Avenue is estimated at \$973,000, engineering design, administration and inspection at \$189,300, for a total cost of \$1,162,300. STEAP grant funds will pay \$983,088 and Town Capital funds the balance of \$179,212.

Thank you to the residents and businesses along Main Street East who have endured the disruption of construction over the past hot dusty summer months. Your patience is very much appreciated.





First Selectman Ed Meehan

The Department of Transportation awarded the Main Street bridge replacement project contract to Arborio Corporation of Cromwell. In advance of the January 2016 bridge closing, utility relocation work has been done by the Connecticut Water Company, Chester WPCA, and overhead services changes by Eversource, Fiberoptics and Frontier Communications. This work required the coordination of each overhead utility beginning with the setting of eight new poles and the transfer of all wires out of the crane work zone. In addition to the immediate bridge area new wires were extended to poles on Spring Street and along West Main Street. During October, November and December the contractor will begin getting materials ready for delivery, prepare the area around and under the bridge by installing sedimentation





control, abutment stabilization, new lateral sewer connections to adjacent buildings and set up of Chester Fairgrounds for off-site materials storage. The old water trough/flower planter on the west sidewalk will be relocated to the Chester Historical Society's Museum at the Mill for safe keeping and stone curbing and fencing will be salvage for reuse in the new bridge area.

The First Selectman, Economic Development Commission and Merchants Association are working with the Department of Transportation to install supplemental "Business Open" and public parking signage, as well as web site and print material to promote Chester Town Center during the anticipated five month bridge closure which is scheduled from January 16, 2016 to mid-May 2016, depending on winter weather conditions.

New Welcome to Chester Gateway Signs

New Welcome to Chester signs were installed in mid-September. The gateway signs present a fresh welcome to the 22,000 motorists who use Route 148 and Route 9, Exit 6 ramps each day. The gateway concept is part of the wayfinding hierarchy of signs envisioned in the Chester Village and Center District Master Plan, adopted at a Town Meeting July 23, 2013.

A uniform sign design was recommended in the Master Plan as strategy to guide visitors to the Center's attractions and public parking. This design is the generous work of Cummings & Good, whose creative talents have again produced a special image unique to Chester's character. Mental Health First Aid Training

Tri-Town Youth Services, in collaboration with Rushford Center, will offer the 8-hour training certification course, Mental Health First Aid (MHFA) in two parts from 8:30 am to 12:30 pm at Deep River Public Library, Community Room, on October 20. Teaching a five-step action plan to assess a situation, select and implement interventions and secure appropriate care for the individual, MHFA introduces participants to risk factors and warning signs of mental health problems, builds understanding of their impact, and overviews common treatments. This CPRlike program is effective in improving trainees' knowledge of mental disorders, reducing stigma, and increasing the amount of help provided to individuals who are experiencing a mental health crisis or developing a mental health concern.

Anyone can take the 8-hour Mental Health First Aid course – including first responders, faith community leaders, human resource professionals, teachers, individuals who typically work with the general public, parents, other concerned citizens, etc. – to help them identify, understand and respond to signs of mental illness. A fee of \$10 includes materials and certification. For more information or to register, contact Tri-Town at 860-526-3600.

Babysitter Training

Learn how to become a safe and responsible babysitter. Tri-Town is offering the American Heart Association's Pediatric First Aid and CPR course along with a babysitter training certificate program. A Note from Public Works

Winter may seem a long way off, but the cold weather and snow will be here before we know it. Keep the following tips in mind as winter approaches:

- Salt and sand will be available at the Town Garage at 12 Grote Road. Bring your own pail and it's one pail per household.
- Please remember to move your vehicles off the streets during winter storms for efficient snow plowing.
- Please remove any basketball hoops from the roadside and town right of way – they could potentially be caught and destroyed by the plow going by.

Septic Tank Pump Out

Chester residents are reminded that the Town ordinance requires septic tanks to be pumped out and inspected every five years by a licensed sewage disposal company.

Pumping out and inspection of the septic tank is really preventative maintenance and can save on costly repairs later on. It is much cheaper to pump out the septic tank than to have to replace the septic system later on!



Medicare Savings Programs

If you are covered by Medicare, you may be able to get assistance to pay for your Medicare premiums, deductibles, and co-payments. The programs that would cover these expenses are commonly referred to as the Medicare Savings Programs (MSP). Medicare Part B beneficiaries pay a premium each month. This premium is automatically deducted from your Social Security check. If you are eligible for a Medicare Savings Program, DSS will pay this premium and you will receive more income from Social Security each month. In determining eligibility, DSS examines your income. There is no asset limit for any of these programs and no estate recovery. The Medicare Savings Programs encompasses three separate programs. Each one has different income criteria. The three programs are:

- Qualified Medicare Beneficiary program (QMB) pays not only your Part B premium, but all other Medicare deductibles and co-payments (up to the Medicaid rate for that service) to medical providers that accept both Medicare and Medicaid. For an individual, the gross monthly income cannot exceed \$2069.11 for a single and 2,802.08 for a couple.
- **Specified Low Income Beneficiary program (SLMB)** pays the Part B premium. Gross monthly income for one person cannot exceed \$2266.11 or \$3067.68 for a couple.
- Additional Low Income Beneficiary program (ALMB) pays the Part B premium. Gross income cannot exceed \$2413.26 for an individual or \$3266.88 for a couple. There is no asset limit for this program, but unlike the other two programs, it is not an entitlement so the program is subject to available funding. You are not eligible for this program if you receive Medicaid.
- The Low Income Subsidy (LIS) is an extra benefit from Medicare for someone who has Medicare Part D. If you have Medicare and MSP you are automatically eligible for the LIS. With the LIS you can get help paying you Medicare Part D monthly premium. You can get help with your Medicare Part D yearly deductibles and help paying your Medicare Part D co-insurance and co-pays for drugs on your plan formulary. This does not start until Social Security receives notification that you are on MSP.





Online Tax Information Is A Huge Help

Usage and Benefit Assessment Bills Are Due Now

Our new online tax look up is working out really well. If you have not tried it, try it! You'll like it! It has helped reduce the number of phone calls and emails into the office by more than half and the payments that have come in, have been more accurate, since the person can see the amount for themselves and not have to rely on hearing it.

And it's easy. Just go to www.chesterct.org and look on the bottom of the home page, and the link for tax look up is there under the paragraph "New this year for tax information". Then just click on that link, and in the search area, be sure to type in the full last name and the accurate first initial. If you do not know the name that the tax bill is listed under, you can use the accurate address. Be sure to type in any unique part to the address, like 112-1 or 33A or what-ever is listed in the Chester Assessor's records for that parcel. Once it pulls up the information, then you can look at the information or create a pdf or view all bills under that one person, or that one address, or look at the payment history.

This year, there will NOT be last January's information, since this is a new process and it did not save information that

I do NOT plan on being in the office on that last day, so mail your bills early or have them postmarked no later than November 2nd, or they will be delinquent and will incur 3% interest. Autumn News from the Chester E-Team

Consolidating Chester's position as a CT Clean Energy Community, the E-team continues to work to reduce energy usage throughout town by conducting energy audits of municipal buildings and evaluating all the options relative to changing the streetlights to LED.

Two years ago, the E-team did a streetlight survey in anticipation of reducing the town's energy costs by changing streetlight wattage, reducing lighting times, and even eliminating some lights. We have been soliciting comments from the residents on these options.

In the meantime, surrounding cities and towns have been pursuing the option of purchasing all their streetlights and converting them to significantly lower cost LED. This option offers lower long-term operating costs with no upfront expenses. The E-team with the Selectmen's help have explored outside vendors to provide installation and maintenance services. Just recently, Eversource reversed its policy of not providing LED lighting, so we are now also reviewing this option. There is a consensus that LED street lighting is here and that Chester will participate. It is not often that towns get an opportunity to lower electricity costs, provide better lighting and reduce maintenance costs.

All residents are reminded that the E-team provides energysaving tips through Facebook.com/ChesterCTEnergyTeam and the weekly townwide e-newsletter. The team meets the second Monday of each month at 9 a.m. at town hall; residents are welcome.




Synagogue to Honor Children's Advocate Martha Stone

Celebrating its 100th year, Congregation Beth Shalom Rodfe Zedek, honors its past and its legacy by presenting its first "Pursuers of Justice Award" this fall. The public is invited on the morning of November 6, at 10:30, when the award will be given to Martha Stone, founder and executive director of the Center for Children's Advocacy, a non-profit organization dedicated to the legal rights of poor children.

Candidates for the award were nominated by members of the congregation, and the overwhelming favorite became obvious. Andy Schatz, chair of CBSRZ's social action committee says, "Martha has devoted her professional career to social justice, first as legal director for the Connecticut Civil Liberties Union (now the ACLU of Connecticut) and for the past 20 years as probably the most intense and effective legal representative for children's rights She remains legal counsel to the plaintiffs in

the Sheff v. O'Neill case which she helped initiate while with the CCLU."

She is an adjunct professor and teaches an internship course in Child Advocacy as well as an interdisciplinary course entitled Law and Medicine in Child Protection. She served as Associate Director of Children's Rights, Inc., a national organization engaged in foster care litigation around the country, and for 18 years previous to that, she was Legal Director of the Connecticut Civil Liberties Union. She is responsible for bringing the class action lawsuits resulting in Consent Decrees involving the Department of Children and Families, and the juvenile detention centers. She is the recent recipient of the "Phoebe Bennett" Award from the Connecticut Association of Mental Health Clinics; the "Public Citizen of the Year" Award from the Ct. Chapter of the National Association of Social Workers; and the "Distinguished Service Award" from the Connecticut Association of School Superintendents.

Menunketesuck - Cockaponset Regional Greenway Sign Posted at Cedar Lake

The Chester Conservation Commission, with help from the US Fish and Wildlife Service, the Lower CT River Valley Council of Governments and the CT Dept. of Energy and Environmental Protection has erected a new informational sign about the Menunketesuck – Cockaponset Regional Greenway. The sign is located on the kiosk just as you enter the town beach on the south side of Cedar Lake. Next time you're there, be sure to take a minute and learn about this important greenway that covers a large part of Chester.

Greenways are often thought of as linear open spaces but they can be much more. They can be the links from city to country, from village to village, from state to state. They help connect people to their communities, to rivers, fields, and hillsides, enhancing the sense of place that helps define the quality of life in Connecticut. Greenways connect the places we live with the places we love.

The critical element of all greenways is connectivity. The 18mile long Menunketesuck – Cockaponset Regional Greenway functions as a wildlife and multi-use corridor connecting the Stewart B. McKinney National Wildlife Refuge - Salt Meadow Unit in the Town of Westbrook to Cockaponset State Forest, the Quinimay Trail, surrounding private forest land, and public recreational resources throughout the municipalities of Westbrook, Clinton, Deep River, Killingworth, Chester, and Haddam. The greenway formally was established as a CT State Greenway under the authority of Public Act 95-335.

Keeping the Greenway alive and relevant will need a strong commitment at the local and regional level. You can support these efforts through Chester land trust and land use commissions.

A special thanks is due Margot Burns, Environmental Planner, RiverCOG and Chester Conservation Commission member for all the work she done to help make this greenway a reality. Thanks Margot!

As the weather turns colder, statewide energy assistance programs that help residents with heating bills and conserving energy will begin. Programs are available from September 1 through March 30. Connecticut Energy Assistance Program (CEAP) helps income eligible households pay their heating bills. State Appropriated Fuel Assistance (SAFA) helps the elderly and disabled individuals with their heating bills. If you received assistance last winter, you must reapply each year to receive additional assistance. Deliverable fuel applicants, (oil, propane, kerosene, coal, wood) are urged to apply early, as deliveries will begin November 15th. Eligibility is determined by Chester Social Services and is based upon review of a client's completed application and satisfactory documentation of household's income, liquid assets, and crisis situation. For the 2015-2016 program year, household income for a 12-month period must fall between 151% of the federal poverty guidelines and 100% of the state median household income.

The Operation Fuel season begins December 1, 2015 and runs through May 30, 2016 or when funding runs out. Contact Human Services (860-526-0013 X213) to see if you qualify.

Preparing for a Hurricane

Hurricane readiness should begin long before the event occurs. If you live in a hurricane-prone area, you can prepare far in advance for the possible dangers to health and safety resulting from a hurricane by learning about your community's emergency plans, warning signals, evacuation routes, and locations of emergency shelters.

- identify potential home hazards that could develop during a hurricane, such as those involving gas, electricity, chemicals, and structural damage
- install a smoke detector
- buy a fire extinguisher and make sure your family knows where to find it and how to use it
- conduct an evacuation drill for at least two ways out of your home
- provide escape ladders for multi-story structures
- establish an assembly point where the family meets in the event of fire or if a disaster occurs when the family is not together at home
- give your relatives and friends the name of a contact person who will know where you are and how you are doing
- know the location of your important papers, such as insurance policies, wills, licenses, stocks, etc.
- instruct family members about how to shut off the gas, water, and electric mains
- post emergency phone numbers at every phone; l inform local authorities about any special needs, i.e., elderly or bedridden people, or anyone with a disability
- properly dispose of all chemicals, pesticides, and solvents not being used

You should stock your home with supplies that may be needed during the emergency period. These supplies should include:

- several clean containers for water, large enough for a 3-5 day supply of water (about five gallons for each person)
- a 3-5 day supply of non-perishable food
- a first aid kit and manual
- a battery-powered radio, flashlights, and extra batteries
- sleeping bags or extra blankets
- water-purifying supplies, such as chlorine or iodine tablets or unscented, ordinary household chlorine bleach
- prescription medicines and special medical needs
- baby food and/or prepared formula, diapers, and other baby supplies
- disposable cleaning cloths, such as "baby wipes" for the whole family to use in case bathing facilities are not available
- alternate heat and cooking sources, such as a kerosene heater and a camp stove use these only in well-ventilated areas
- shovels and hand tools
- candles and matches
- a mop, bucket, and towels
- one or more rolls of plastic sheeting, a staple gun with staples, and duct tape

- plastic trash bags and ties
- an emergency kit for your car with food, flares, booster cables, maps, tools, a first aid kit, fire extinguisher, sleeping bags, etc.
- a citizens band radio or a cellular phone, if possible
- extra cash
- pet food
- insect repellent
- rubber boots/rubber gloves

During the Storm

To get through the storm in the safest possible manner:

- monitor the radio or television for weather conditions, if possible
- do not go outside, even if the weather appears to have calmed the calm "eye" of the storm can pass quickly, leaving you outside when strong winds resume
- expect the loss of electricity, gas, and water
- stay away from all windows and exterior doors, seeking shelter in a bathroom or basement.
- prepare to evacuate to a shelter or to a neighbor's home if your home is damaged
- if you should lose electrical power, eat perishable food first






