

Hammonassett Festival

The 6th Bi-Annual Hammonassett Festival will take place at Meigs Point, Hammonasset Beach State Park, in Madison, CT on October 3rd and 4th. Hours are 10 am to 5 pm on both days. This event honors Native American culture and tradition and celebrates our natural world.



Returning for multiple performances each day will be the award winning Native American recording artist Arvel Bird (Paiute), as well as the Native Nations Dance Troupe led by Erin Meeches (Schaghticoke). Allan Saunders (Mohegan) will lead an opening blessing and smudging ceremony each morning at 10:30 am. Authentic Native American arts and crafts will be available for purchase, including beadwork, gourd art and wood carvings, wampum jewelry and knotted

jewelry, clothing and accessories, and much more. Non-profit museums and learning

centers will present cultural and educational exhibits and demonstrations and will be offering books for sale.

The New England Atlatl Championships will take place during the festival. Public participation is available for those wanting to learn an ancient skill. Flintknapping and archaeology exhibits will be available for viewing. Friends of the Office of State Archaeology, the World



Atlatl Association and the Museum of Natural History at Uconn will also have displays. A Place Called Hope, a Killingworth based wildlife rescue and rehabilitation facility, will offer live raptor shows each day at 2 pm in the Discovery Tent. The Meigs Point Nature Center will offer live reptile shows both days, and will exhibit along with Ansonia Nature Center (Saturday only.)

Environmental and nature groups including the Shoreline Greenway Trail, Shoreline Outdoor Education Center, Coast Guard Auxiliary, Connecticut Audubon, Menunkatuck Audubon, and Sierra Club will have exhibits. Trout Unlimited will offer fly casting to attendees both days. Vendors will be on-site preparing and serving a variety of foods, including traditional and contemporary Native American cuisine.

The Hammonassett Festival is presented by Friends of Hammonasset (FOH) and supported by the Madison Foundation and the Madison Jaycess. Handicapped parking is available. Pets are not permitted in the event area. For more information visit hammonasset.org, or call 203-245-9192.

The Water Pollution Control Commission

The Water Pollution Control Commission continues to meet with neighborhood groups to hear public opinion and questions about the Town's wastewater problems and the Draft Facilities Plan.

In June the WPCC engaged business owners in the downtown area to hear their concerns and answer questions. We heard that the timing of construction projects greatly impacts their business if conducted during the peak summer tourism season. And in August to a standing room only meet and greet, Coastal Area residents came well prepared with questions and concerns for the WPCC, making for a lively discussion on a Saturday morning. Discussions involved locations for discharge, different configurations for piping, winterization, referendum questions, and opting out.

The WPCC wishes to entertain other small group meetings in an effort to answer questions, hear concerns and gain insight for consideration for developing the final plan. The next neighborhood group to meet with will be the Harbor View Association.

In conjunction with the Public Involvement Program the WPCC is reviewing the Draft Facilities Plan, recently submitted

by CDM Smith. Our consultants continue efforts to work on a parallel path to balance the need for off-site treatment with areas which are able to continue to support on-site sewage disposal systems. This investigation is nearing completion and is part of the commissions due diligence efforts, keeping in mind that investigations at this stage are 55% reimbursable through the Clean Water program.

Public Health Consultants LLC has looked at existing property files, specifically information about septic systems and soils, and compiled this into a spreadsheet. Properties with high ground water, ledge, poor soils, densely developed neighborhoods and proximity to Long Island Sound were designated to go off-site.

A draft map of the results should be available for public viewing on the web site sometime in October. A formal draft for review by the Department of Energy and Environmental Protection will be submitted in December while some final chapters, such as the Decentralized Wastewater Management Plan and The Environmental Impact Evaluation will be completed over the course of the coming year.

Control Your Cholesterol Levels

Cholesterol is a soft, waxy substance in your blood. It increases your chance of heart disease, stroke, and other problems. Many things may put you at risk for high cholesterol. You can't control some of these risks such as your age, gender, or family history. Fortunately, the list of things you can control is longer: It includes your weight, diet, exercise, blood sugar, and smoking. Let's take a look at what this might mean for you: Maybe you've put on a few (or more than a few) pounds in the last couple of years. Or your recent New Year's resolution was short-lived, making that gym membership a bit of a waste! Don't scold yourself. Just start over.

The good news is some changes may give you a "twofer." For example, eating healthy foods can reduce the amount of cholesterol you are taking into your body. It can also help you lose weight, which lowers LDL (bad cholesterol).

Try eating:

• More fresh fruits, vegetables, and other

foods high in fiber such as whole grains and beans.

• Fewer foods that contain cholesterol, trans fats, or saturated fats such as fatty meats and whole milk, cream, butter, cheese, and ice cream.

Increasing your exercise not only lowers your LDL. It also raises levels of HDL (good cholesterol), which carries bad cholesterol away. Take steps to enhance your chance of success, especially if exercise is a bit foreign to you. Gradually increase the intensity and length of your exercise routines. Or find an exercise partner to help you stay motivated Sometimes lifestyle changes are simply not enough to get your cholesterol into a safe range. In these cases, your doctor may prescribe a special medicine to lower your cholesterol. Make sure you take it exactly the way your doctor directs. If you don't, it may not work. Just remember: I can double check to make sure you're on the right track. And, if cost is an issue, ask me whether a generic version of your

medicine is available.

Statins are one type of medicine commonly prescribed for high cholesterol. You've probably heard a lot about this medicine. Recent studies have added encouraging news about statins. For example, statins may help kids who have a genetic type of cholesterol disorder. They may also help boost survival rates after people have a certain type of stroke. Statins may even prevent common and serious complications from diabetes. They apparently protect against damage to small blood vessels that can lead to blindness or amputations. None of this means medicine gives you a free pass to smoke, overeat, and be a couch potato. Instead, lifestyle changes can work together with medicine to improve your cholesterol levels even more. And, as you already know, these changes can really improve your overall quality of life.

CT River Area Health District

(CRAHD) Receives Approval For Environmental Class For Real Estate Agents

The Connecticut River Area Health District has received approval from the CT Real Estate Commission for its course offered to real estate agents titled: *Environmental Health And The Real Estate Transaction*.

Jim Monopoli, director of health at CRAHD, challenged his staff of 3 Sanitarians, Scott Martinson, Steve Yenco and Ryan Grenon, to develop a course that would encompass most environmental issues that arise during the real estate sale. "Our staff deals with these issues as part of their daily jobs, and they also receive ongoing training to maintain certifications and to be better Sanitarians" stated Monopoli, "They are our local subject matter experts in these matters, and it is just a natural fit for our staff professionals to pass on their knowledge to RE agents. The better informed the agents are, it certainly makes for an easier transaction for all involved."

The 3 Sanitarians worked on the course and completed it in time to offer it last winter of 2015. The course was well received and feedback from attendees indicated it is a good quality environmental primer for RE agents. During the early part of 2015, Monopoli worked with the New Haven/Middlesex Association of Realtors to get the course approved so that attendees would earn continuing education credits to attend. He was informed recently that the 3 hour course was approved for 3 CE credits. A total of 12 credits are required by agents to maintain their licenses.

The course covers topics such as asbestos, lead paint, moisture and mold, radon, drinking water wells and treatment, septic systems and lot improvement requirements.

For more information or to register for the course, Monopoli recommended that agents go through their respective realtor associations. "We anticipate that this course is one that could be offered annually, on an ongoing basis."

The Connecticut River Area Health District is the local health department for the towns of Old Saybrook, Clinton, and Deep River.

Clinton Police Department

The news surrounding CPD will be covered below, but first some background. The Clinton Police Department patrols and investigates crime in the town's 17 square miles and over its' approximately 95 miles of local and state roads. Animal control services are provided. We also patrol the shore line and Clinton Harbor on weekends and holidays and respond to emergencies anytime. The Department provides a School Resource Officer. The town's population of 13,500 permanent residents swells to over 20,000 in the summer months. In addition the Clinton Outlet Mall draws a staggering 4,000,000 visitors a year, straining the resources of the department on peak shopping days.

In addition to that the department had 18,187 calls for service as of July 31st which is likely to track to over 36,000 calls for the year. As perspective, on the same date in 2014 and 2010 we had 16,947 and 15,010 calls respectively. To cover this demand the department employees 27 certified (sworn) officers, 3 full time civilian and 2 part time employees. In addition 6 full time and 2 part time personnel work in 911 dispatch operations handling routine and emergency calls for Police, Fire and Ambulance. Police are also the designated first responders for medical emergencies which is an invaluable service.

The big news is that 28 year CPD officer and Chief, Todd Lawrie has retired and we wish him well. This is a big loss, but change always presents an opportunity if handled sensibly. The Commission has voted to open up the hiring process to outside as well as internal candidates. We believe the town wants and deserves an open process. We hope to complete this process expeditiously in two to three months.

Hired in the last few years were officers, Adrian Santiago, John Harkins, Joseph Popovich, Jacob Owczarski, Spencer Mangs and Brian Corbin providing needed shift relief. They are all proving to be superb officers. What this really means is that the department is changing or "turning over". Our new officers help the department manage potential shortages and be more prepared for the eventual retirement of up to 5 additional officers in the next few years. In the improve morale department we are trialing a 4/2 work schedule. A trial was agreed to in the last labor negotiations. In the crime department it's sad to say that, "crime never takes a holiday"; here are a few trends from 2010 to 2014. Larceny (from MV) +314%, Drug/narcotic/paraphernalia violations +74%, Fraud (credit cards, etc) +43% and Family NV Offenses +127%.

So there you have it. The Commission is working hard to manage this change, none larger that the departure of our Chief. At the present time the department reports to Deputy Chief John Carbone. If you have questions you may email me at psengle@gmail.com.






