The East Haddam Business Association welcomed spring on April 28 with its "Celebrate East Haddam" festival. 




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Murphy Nips Pugson in a Tight Race

Official ballots and photos for 23 canine candidates vying for the high privilege and distinct honor of being East Haddam's Top Dog were delivered to the Nathan Hale-Ray Middle School on May 18 so students could select the "political pick of the litter."

After due deliberation and voter turnout that topped that of adult participation at referenda, voters who exercised their furry franchise narrowly chose Murphy O'Seamus Shizume,



owned by the Shizume family, over the one-name-wonder, Pugson, who resides with the Buckland family, as the town's alpha pooch.

The race was tight among the top contenders. Murphy, a yearling Pembroke Welsh Corgi, edged out the competition with 25 votes. He receives the #1 dog license for fiscal 2018/2019 and took his place of honor in the Memorial Day

Parade. Pugson, the runner up and a two-year-old pug (dah!), garnered 23 votes. Eva and Cisco were contenders, both tied with 20 votes, and Blu trailed by a tail, with 19.

The fine increases to \$136.00 if rabies vaccine is not documented.

From the Assessor

The Assessor's office began accepting applications for the Elderly and Totally Disabled Renters Rebate Program on April 1, 2018. Applicant's total income must not exceed \$35,300 for a single person, and \$43,000 for a couple (joint income), including Social Security and Medicare. Applicants must be 65 or older or totally disabled and bring all income, rent, and utility information from 2017. The deadline for filing is October 1, 2018.

Residents whose motor vehicles have been sold, stolen, totaled, or who have moved out-of-state may be eligible for a pro-ration of their car taxes.

Two forms of proof are necessary to pro-rate or remove a vehicle from the grand list. Residents must bring a copy of the plate receipt issued by the Department of Motor Vehicles at the time of cancellation of registration, and a copy of one of the following; bill of sale, transfer of title, receipt from junk-yard, notification of total loss, trade-in papers, or some other document showing the date on which the vehicle was disposed. Registrations may now be cancelled online by going to CT DMV Online Services.

The Assessor's office has its own web page on the town website (easthaddam.org). Included is information on real estate, personal property, and motor vehicle assessments; property tax relief for seniors, veterans, and the disabled; renters' rebate; information on revaluation; access to applications and forms pertaining to the Assessor's office.



East Haddam approved the town budget of \$31,562,517 for fiscal year 2018-2019 at a budget referendum on May 8, 2018. There were a total of 721 votes cast, including 5 by absentee ballot and 8 by property owners. 431 people voted yes and 290 voted no. Voting took place at the Old Town Hall. Now that the gymnasium at the new Municipal Office Complex is ready it will be the polling place for future voting events.

At this writing we are expecting Democratic and Republican primaries to be held on August 14, 2018. We are awaiting confirmation of candidates from the Secretary of the State's Office. This will be the first time we will use the gymnasium at the new Municipal Office Complex as a polling place since the building was renovated. Please contact the Town Clerk for information about Absentee Ballots.

There will be an election on November 6, 2018. Polls will be open from 6:00 am to 8:00 pm. Voting will take place at the new Municipal Office Complex gymnasium at 1 Plains Road in Moodus. We will be voting to fill the offices Governor and Lieutenant Governor, U.S. Senator, Representative in Congress, State Senator, State Representative, Secretary of the State, Treasurer, Comptroller, Attorney General, and Registrar of Voters. Both of our Registrars of Voters have now completed

22nd Annual Venture Smith Day Festivities

The 22ND annual Venture Smith Day Festivities will be held on Saturday, September 8th from 1:00 pm to 4:00 pm in the cemetery at the First Church of Christ, 499 Town Street (RT. 151), East Haddam, Connecticut, where Venture Smith is buried (1729-1805).

Son of an African king, Venture Smith became the first black man to document his capture from Africa and life as an American slave and successful black freeman in Connecticut. Well known and respected, Venture Smith spent the majority of his freedom years in East Haddam and Haddam Neck, Connecticut. His grave is one of the original sites on the Connecticut Freedom Trail.

The keynote speaker will be Jesse Nasta, Ph.D., Visiting Assistant Professor of African American Studies at Wesleyan University in Middletown, Connecticut. His presentation is called "Inheriting Freedom, Venture Smith's Descendants and Connecticut Emancipation

1784-1848." At Wesleyan, Dr. Nasta's research focuses on the social and legal histories of slavery, emancipation, and African American mobility during the eight decades prior to the Civil War. He earned his doctorate and Master of Arts degrees at Northwestern University and his Bachelor of Arts degree at Wesleyan University. He began his research on Connecticut's 19th-century African American history when he was an undergraduate student at Wesleyan University.

Dr. Karl P. Stofko, East Haddam's Municipal Historian and Venture Smith family genealogist since the 1970s, will talk about "Slavery in East Haddam during the 1800s according to records of the First Church of Christ." In his second presentation, Dr. Stofko's will talk about

how Venture Smith was helped by his East Haddam and Haddam Neck friends.

Venture Smith's family genealogy and

artifacts and crafts from Ghana and other regions of Africa will be on display. A town proclamation will be presented and wreath-laying ceremony by the descendants of Venture Smith and the annual Venture family reunion photograph will take place in the cemetery by Venture's grave.

In addition, the ladies of "Sisters In Stitches Joined by the Cloth" of eastern Massachusetts will return this year with their magnificent African American quilts.

Adults and children who are interested in learning more about Connecticut history in the 1700 and 1800s are encouraged to attend. Please bring lawn chairs or a blanket. In case of inclement weather the celebration will move into the First Church.

There will be plenty of time to renew old friendships, talk with the speakers, and Venture's descendants, as well as enjoy light refreshments in the Parish Hall next to the cemetery. If you have questions,



A BRIEF BIOGRAPHY OF VENTURE SMITH

Born around 1729, Venture Smith's African birth name was Broteer, and he was the eldest son of King Saungm Furro of the tribe of Dukandarra in Guinea, West

Africa. He was captured about 1736 when he was seven years old and was sold for "4 gallons of rum and some calico" at Anamabo on Africa's Gold Coast to Robinson Mumford, the steward of a Rhode Island slave ship. Broteer was renamed Venture because he was purchased by Mumford's own private venture. Venture grew up as a slave on Fishers

Island, New York, which was being leased by the Mumford family at that time.

Around 1750 he married Meg, another Mumford slave. They had four children. After a failed escape attempt in 1754, Venture was sold to Thomas Stanton of Stonington Point, Connecticut. In 1760, he was purchased for the last time by Oliver Smith, of Stonington. Smith allowed Venture to purchase his freedom in 1765 and in return Venture took the name Smith as his surname.

Venture then lived and worked on Long Island to raise money to purchase the freedom of his wife and children. During these years he cut wood, farmed, fished, and spent seven months on a whaling voyage.

In 1774, Venture sold all his land on Long Island and in Stonington and moved his family to East Haddam. He then began purchasing land on Haddam Neck along the Salmon River Cove from Abel Bingham and others. His farm grew into 134 acres with three houses, twenty boats, canoes and sailing vessels, two fishing businesses and a commercial orchard. His entrepreneurial ventures included river trafficking, lumberjacking, carpentry and farming. All this he accomplished without

the ability to either read or write. In 1798, Venture dictated his autobiography to teacher Elisha Niles, which was then published in pamphlet form by Charles Holt, editor of the New London Bee. It has been reprinted many times. It is the only slave narrative of the 18th century that recounts life in Africa.

His life story has been an inspiration to many over the years. Venture died on September 19, 1805, a highly respected man by all in the Haddams. His wife, two sons, Cuff and Solomon, and several grandchildren survived him. Several of his descendants still live in Connecticut.

EHAA Members attended an EMS conference at Mohegan Sun.

The past few months have been busy for EHAA Emergency Medical Technicians (EMTs) and Emergency Medical Responders (EMRs) with ongoing education, training, and community events.

EHAA has a few members who recently finished an EMT Course at Middlesex Community College. Students learned about patient assessment, cardiac arrest management, airway management, patient immobilization, diabetic emergencies, respiratory emergencies and trauma. Just recently, one member passed her EMT Certification testing and will now ride as a 4th on ambulance calls until she reaches required benchmarks and becomes a full crew member.

The 3rd Annual Evelyn Comer & Alumni Free CPR Clinic providing CPR and AED training took place. Seventeen members of our community participated and were certified by the American Heart Association. Members of EHAA helped with teaching. East Haddam is a HEARTSafe Community and by offering CPR Clinics, our town maintains our HEARTSafe Community status.

EHAA members and Community Emergency Response Team members (CERT) participated in a Stop the Bleed program. Stop the Bleed is a national awareness campaign and call-to-action. Stop the Bleed is intended to cultivate grassroots efforts that encourage bystanders to become trained, equipped, and empowered to help in a bleeding emergency before professional help arrives. Participants learned how to use tourniquets and hemostatic dressings when packing wounds. The class was led by Dr. Ron Gross and EHAA training officer Steve Dorfman. EHAA would like to thank Dr. and Mrs. Gross for donating a Stop the Bleed training kit. The newly acquired training kit will be used to train members of our community in the coming months.

Approximately 12 EHAA members attended an EMS Conference at Mohegan Sun in late May. Attendees participated in various educational learning modules. National and local speakers provided great lectures. The conference also featured a vendor area where the latest EMS products, clothing and ambulance manufacturers were on hand to answer questions and distribute information.





What's Happening?

Keep Your Focus

A number of studies have now linked adolescent marijuana use with a range of detrimental outcomes. Young people who smoke heavily are less likely to achieve academically, less likely to be employed later in life, and are less likely to marry. Teenage use of marijuana has been shown to impact brain development, and potentially exacerbate latent mental illness (including psychosis, depression, anxiety, and suicidality). In addition to its mental health ramifications, marijuana use has been linked to lung damage and serious cardiovascular problems.

The consequences of marijuana use aren't just felt by the individuals using though. Society is impacted as well. This is especially true in those states that have chosen to legalize marijuana. Colorado witnessed a 210% increase in average calls to poison control centers after legalization. Their annual rate of marijuana-related emergency room visits increased 35% between the years 2011 and 2015. Central Oregon hospitals saw a nearly 2,000% increase in emergency room visits due to marijuana poisoning. The crime rate in Colorado has increased 11 times faster than the rest of the country since legalization. Misdemeanor and vehicle thefts have significantly increased in Alaska since legalizing. Their larceny rate has risen so dramatically that they moved from 16th in the country to 2nd. Washington State has witnessed drugged driving fatalities double since legalization.

Due to these and other concerns, the East Haddam Local Prevention Council has made addressing marijuana use a priority in our community. As part of this effort, we are bringing the Keep Your Focus campaign to East Haddam. The campaign was developed by the neighboring Durham Middle Field Local Wellness Coalition and encourages young people to stay focused on what matters in life. It incorporates messages about athletics, academics, and staying safe while driving. The campaign includes participation from our local schools, public libraries, businesses, and more.

Wellness in East Haddam

The Local Prevention Council and Youth & Family Services has had a booth at the East Haddam Farmers' Market this summer to share stress reduction tips and tools with the community. Research shows a connection between stress, anxiety, depression and other mental health issues and substance use. To effectively reduce substance use among our youth we must address some of the underlying risk factors that make them more likely to use. To offer alternative ways to manage these issues, the coalition has been highlighting recreation, exercise, massage, yoga, meditation, and more in partnership with a range of local businesses and organizations.

Our work at the Farmers' Market is just one component of a larger wellness initiative we will be continuing throughout the year. Check www.ehlpc.org/whatshappening/events for more information!

Representative Melissa Ziobron Applauds the Signing of Cottage Foods Legislation

State Representative Melissa Ziobron (R-34) applauded the Governor signing SB 193 'An Act Concerning Revisions to the Consumer Protection Statutes' which included provisions for cottage food production.

The measure finally establishes a cottage food license through the Department of Consumer Protection. It also defined cottage food producers as those who sell directly to consumers and have gross annual sales of \$25,000 or less. The intent of the bill is twofold: to encourage small food producing businesses to test the waters with new product and also enable these small proprietors to sell their wares to farmer's markets and directly to consumers without having to invest in costly overhead.

"I am excited that the Governor has signed this bill to codify regulations and licensing for cottage food produc ers. I worked on this initiative for years, shepherding this legislation through the process," said Rep. Ziobron. "With this bill and the legislation we passed three years ago, we now have a law on the books that sensibly lowers the

barrier for home producers, in order that they may bring their products to market."

This year's effort built off of legislation sponsored by Rep. Ziobron which was enacted in 2015: "HB 5027: An Act Concerning Cottage Food Production," which allowed for the sale of food products prepared in private residences.

Rep. Ziobron said in her public testimony in 2015, "I first became interested in this issue as the former Economic Development Coordinator for the Town of East Haddam. During that time we had several people who were interested in small part-time business for cupcakes and cakes. These women were accomplished bakers and hard working Moms looking to add to their household income... We are one of only nine states that do not allow Cottage Food production unless you are a farmer and use your own produce to make jellies or pickles." The measure passed the Senate unanimously and passed the House 142-8. It was signed into law by the Governor on Monday, June 11, 2018.

Age-Related Macular Degeneration

Age-Related Macular Degeneration (AMD) is the leading cause of severe vision loss in adults over the age of 50. This eye disease occurs when there are changes to the macula, a small portion of the retina that's located on the inside back layer of the eye. Commonly, older people develop macular degeneration as a natural part of the aging process. AMD causes loss of central vision and it can occur in two forms: wet and dry.

With macular degeneration, you may experience symptoms such as blurriness, dark areas or distortion of your central vision, or permanent loss of your central vision. It usually does not affect your peripheral vision. For example, with advanced macular degeneration you could be able to see the outline of a clock, yet you may not be able to see the hands of the clock to tell what time it is.

The majority of people with macular degeneration experience the dry form, which does not have a known treatment, but many people benefit from a vitamin regimen. Unfortunately, vision loss cannot be reversed. The less common wet form may respond to lasers and medical injections if caught and treated early. Smoking and high blood pressure are often associated with the wet form of macular degeneration.

If you have been diagnosed with dry macular degeneration, you should use a chart called an Amsler grid every day to monitor your vision. Dry macular degeneration can quickly change into the more damaging wet form. If you notice any change of vision, you should contact your ophthalmologist immediately.

Master Gardener's Corner

Why are our Ash and Oak Trees Dying?

It's been a few years since I wrote about the Emerald Ash Borer (EAB). I gave warning that we would soon see destruction of our Ash Trees and it would be a serious issue. Well, that time has come! The wood-boring beetle that feeds exclusively on all species of Ash trees has been destroying our Ash Trees for the past few years. So what does this mean? The shimmery green beetle will destroy all Ash Trees in CT towns within the next few years. As the EAB larvae attaches to the tree under the bark, it spirals its way around the tree causing eventual death of the tree. The tree can be affected for a year or two before the mortality of the tree is noted. This Ash Borer started in the Midwest and has migrated east. Currently it is drifting into

Vermont. Most all towns in CT are affected - and we are one of them.

EAB lays eggs in a crevice of the Ash tree bark during the summer, particularly in the crown of the tree. Larvae burrow into the cambial layer under the bark creating 'S' shaped serpentine galleries as they feed until late fall. The following spring, in May or June, as the pupae mature, the EAB emerges from the tree creating a small 'D' shaped exit hole on the tree. The cycle then continues and will continue causing death of our Ash Trees.

If that isn't enough tree death to deal with on our streets and on our properties, we now see multiple deaths of our Oak Trees from the 2016-17 Gypsy Moth infestation. The Gypsy Moth feeds on a diversity of trees and shrubs and Oaks. It causes extensive defoliation causing dieback of branches and death of our older, more vulnerable trees. You must make it your priority to research these issues as the dying trees need management. Dead and dying trees are hazards and impact public safety. Do your homework and take action on your own property.

OK, so what can we do about this hazard? What can we do to ensure safety for human life and our community?

professionals only. Very expensive and needs several applications.

2. The dead trees must be cut down on street areas and anywhere it could cause a hazard to human life or property. By the time the Ash Tree gives us warning of its death with branch breakage, it is too late and already causing safety issues with falling branches. That tree is gone! Likewise, the Gypsy moth outbreak of last year caused many oak trees also to die.

Dr. Rutledge and team from CT

Agriculture Station are working on methods of biological control, but nothing as yet can control the continued death of our favored trees. It is past time to assess your properties, and time to inventory the dead trees along our streets as we plan for management and financial impact.

We Need Your Help to Save Our Lake

The Moodus Reservoir Preservation Group, Inc., MRPG, is a local non-profit, 501(C) (3), community membership organization working to protect and improve the health of Moodus Reservoir located in the village of Moodus in the town of East Haddam, CT.

The Moodus Reservoir supports the town's only public beach and provides two state boat launches for the recreational enjoyment of town and visiting swimmers, boaters and fishermen.

THE MISSION OF MRPG IS TO:

- **a increase public awareness** of emerging and ongoing threats to the health of our lake and
- **b** work with local and state agencies to implement programs to promote, protect and improve the environmental quality of the Reservoir and its fragile ecosystem, to include the development of invasive plant monitoring and control programs.

Our lake, like many lakes, is facing the challenge of managing invasive aquatic plants. After extensive remediation options research and in depth lake studies, we have found the most affordable and effective control method option is the purchase of an Eco Harvester. It is a highly specialized machine that pulls up the aquatic plants, trapping them and depositing them on land for transport.

The Eco Harvester and needed equipment will cost approximately one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000).

By the way, the photograph above shows Commission Chair Rob Smith wielding a chainsaw to remove a seriously large tree across a trail. This does




require some special training... the rest of us stand back, cheer, and help pick up the pieces.

Protect the Miller Farm Woodlands



When you walk or drive through East Haddam and the surrounding region you see trees, lots of trees. But large blocks of wooded acreage – those not dotted with homes or businesses - are in decline in our town and elsewhere in our beautiful Connecticut River Valley.

These large forested areas are exactly what stabilizes our soils and lessens the risk of flooding, cleans the air we breathe, filters rainfall that recharges the aquifers we tap into for drinking water, and supports the birds, mammals, amphibians and other wildlife that make our woods come alive with sounds and activity.

But we cannot take our forests for granted. "For the first time in 200 years, every state in New England is losing forest," warns the New England Wildflower Society in its publication, State of New England's Native Plants. Without our active preservation, East Haddam's remaining large forest blocks could vanish.



The Miller Farm, bordering Tater Hill and AP Gates Roads, is exactly the large, forested acreage that could disappear without your help. Its 87 acres - mostly woodland - maintain the soil health and stability of the wetlands and streams, and filter and recharge the waters of the Roaring Brook and Eightmile Watersheds. Its trees and shrubs, including masses of native winterberry, shelter and feed woodland birds. Salamanders, frogs, and toads - amphibians particularly sensitive to habitat loss - live in its fern, moss, and wildflower dotted wetlands.



The last word...

Joey Logano - Inspiring others to do for others

Professional NASCAR driver Joey Logano started his racing career right here in Connecticut racing quarter midget cars and quickly made a name for himself. Starting at the age of six, the Middletown, CT native started winning championship after championship – to the point that, by the time he was 15, he was already on the radar with NASCAR racing legends. Now, he's always to be reckoned with on the NASCAR racing scene, competing full-time in the Monster Energy NASCAR series and part-time in the NASCAR Xfinity series.

- 49 combined wins in NASCAR's top-three series

There is, of course, the glitz and the glamor that pervades NASCAR as a whole. And there's the occasional race-action controversy. And there are the ups and downs. After early successes (leading to the nickname, "Sliced Bread") and nearly winning a championship in 2016, Joey failed to make the playoffs in 2017. This year could mark a turnaround. Joey notched a win at Talladega Superspeedway in April, which ended a nearly year-long winless streak and, as of press time, he is fourth in the NASCAR Championship Point Standings.

But there's more to the 28-year-old than that. Joey and his wife Brittany, whom he married in 2014, welcomed their first child into the world this past January. Joey and Brittany have also been very committed to giving back. In a previous conversation, Joey mentioned, "If we can touch a few people's lives and help them become contributing members of our community and the world, it's really going to make a difference and it starts one person at a time." That's the crux of the Joey Logano Foundation that invests in organizations offering second chances to children and young adults during times of crisis and works to inspire others to live a life of generosity.

WHY SECOND CHANCES?

First, there was a life-changing visit to Joplin, Missouri in 2011 where Joey helped to rebuild a home for a local family following the tornado that devastated the area. That family needed a second chance. Little did Joey know that he would soon need his own second chance. He had been driving the No. 20 Toyota Camry for Joe Gibbs Racing since the 2009 season, but that ended in 2012. He received his second chance when he was picked up by Penske Racing in 2012. The following year, the Joey Logano Foundation was established.





Since 2013, the foundation has invested almost \$2.7 million in various organizations across the country. Programs include inviting children who are facing tough situations (whether physically and/or emotionally) annually to a NASCAR race to be part of the crew for the day, supporting non-profit organizations during the 10-week NASCAR playoffs in each playoff race market, assembling and donating comfort care backpacks to foster and/or terminally ill children, and an annual fundraiser in Connecticut, called Driving Hope Home. A portion of the Driving Hope Home proceeds are donated to The Ronald McDonald House of Connecticut with the remaining proceeds donated to reputable charities the foundation supports to offer children in need a first or second chance. "It's our responsibility. You have to do it. If we we're not going to do it, who else is going to be an advocate for these kids," says Brittany, who notes that first chances are important too. "They need a first opportunity in life. If we can shed light to this and inspire others to do the same, we can have a bigger impact than the two of us. That's our goal."

There is no doubt that Joey is a fierce competitor and a pure NASCAR racing talent. But don't overlook the other side. "When you are able to make a difference like that, you can see it in that person's face, how much it affects their lives - there's no better feeling than that," he observes. "I can talk about race wins as much as I want and how great that is but there's nothing better than that win - when you're are able to affect something. That's a bigger win than any racetrack can get you."



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
