

### Office of the Assessor

In accordance with Connecticut General Statute 12-40, all persons who are liable to pay taxes on tangible personal property belonging to them on October 1, 2017, must file a declaration of their personal property on or before November 1, 2017, with the Assessor, or be subject to an estimated assessment and the statutory 25% penalty. Various exemptions are explained on the declaration and available if filed on time.

#### NO DECLARATION IS REQUIRED FOR MOTOR VEHICLES REGISTERED IN EAST HAMPTON, CT NO DECLARATION IS REQUIRED FOR REAL ESTATE

Personal property includes, but is not limited to, non-CT registered motor vehicles, unregistered motor vehicles (including junk autos), campers, all business machinery, equipment, tools, commercial furniture and fixtures. If you no longer own a motor vehicle and have

cancelled the registration at DMV, please bring the DMV plate receipt and one of the following forms of proof in order to receive a tax credit. The documentation must have the VIN number and all the corroborating information.

#### **UNREGISTERED VEHICLES** STILL OWNED AND LOCATED IN EAST HAMPTON WILL REMAIN ON THE GRAND LIST.

- B. A copy of the transfer of title (i.e., receipt from junkyard, trade-in paperwork, donation receipt).
- C. A copy of the original registration issued to the person to whom you sold the vehicle.
- D. A copy of the registration in another state.
- E. Documentation from an insurance company, i.e.; payment for a stolen vehicle, payment for a totaled vehicle, cancellation of coverage due to sale of vehicle.

The Assessor's office may require a combination of additional information or verification of the preceding items, as necessary, for the removal or crediting of a motor vehicle assessment.

#### TRANSFERRED PLATES

When the registration is transferred to a new or replacement vehicle, the adjustment follows the plate. The over payment on the July tax bill is applied to the supplemental tax bill in December. The filing deadlines for various exemptions and classifications are as follows:

#### **PUBLIC ACT 490**

All applications for classification of farm or forestland must be received by October 31, 2017.

#### **VETERANS**

All property owners claiming exemption due to military service must file their DD214 form with the Town Clerk by September 30, 2017. Veterans claiming disability exemption must submit proof from the Veterans Administration.

#### DISABILITY

Persons totally disabled receiving SSD benefits may be eligible for a \$1000 property exemption. Proof of award and application must be submitted by January 31, 2018.

Delinquent notices will be mailed out at the end of July if you did not license your dog in June. Dogs must be licensed at 6 months of age or 30 days after receipt of an older dog. You may use our online dog renewal program as long as the rabies certificate is up-to-date. If you would like to update the information, you may either come into the office in person with a new rabies certificate or scan the certificate and forward it to the

# **EVENTS PRESENTS ~ PAUL'S & SANDY'S TOO**



This year marks 45 years in business for Paul's & Sandy's Too Inc., East Hampton's 2nd generation Garden Center & Hardware Store. In 1972, Paul & Sandy Peszynski opened a toy and sporting goods store with a sprinkling of home and garden supplies and named it Paul's Home Supply, located at 93 East High St, East Hampton, the same property that Paul sold fresh fruits & vegetables during his summers to pay for his college tuition as a young man.

As the years passed, Paul & Sandy found that the demand for toys and sporting goods declined, but the need for home and gardening supplies soared, and the transition to green goods and hardware was a natural. In 1984, Paul & Sandy decided to incorporate the business, so along with that, a name change was due. There were always customer questions as to why Sandy's name wasn't included in the name of the business, and Paul's & Sandy's Too Inc. was born! Paul and Sandy have 4 children, Mark, Jill, Dan & Karen. Mark runs his own successful painting and home repair business, Mark's Painting. Jill, Dan and Karen stayed with the family business to help it grow and succeed.

In 1991, during one of their road trips to Vermont, Paul & Sandy came across these pumpkin-headed scarecrows along the side of the road. It stopped them in their tracks. They took pictures and their wheels started turning! What a fantastic way to drive some business in the fall, a time generally slow in the garden center business.

In 1992, the creation of what is now known as Pumpkintown USA was started. First came a few pumpkin-headed people, then the town we all know and love. Most recently added, The 'Ride' at Pumpkintown, features a mile long hay ride through the woods with over 30 additional Pumpkin Heads and their dwellings. This local attraction hosts over 20,000 people during the short 7 weeks it is open from the middle of September through Halloween.

In 1993, when Sandy's breast cancer returned, they decided it was time to fully pass the torch to the children so they could enjoy retirement together. Jill, Dan & Karen took the reins and ran with them, finding strengths in all aspects of the business and working together to increase sales and their customer following. They took the values instilled in them by their parents, Paul & Sandy, about superior customer service and how important it is to give back to the community that supports them.

In May of 2007, Sandy lost her long battle with breast cancer and although the family was devastated, decided to create a fund in her name. The Sandy Peszynski Breast Cancer Foundation was created and to date has raised over \$325,000. This foundation differs from others as 100% of what is donated goes directly to the hospital's cancer programs to help local women.

# **East Hampton Municipal Campus**

Background - For nearly thirty-five years, the Town of East Hampton has been discussing the need and possible location for a new town hall, police department and board of education building. These three facilities, in their current conditions, represent a significant liability to the Town of East Hampton. In recent years the Town Council established a commission to identify the best site for the new municipal building. Of the eight properties submitted for consideration, the Edgewater Hill property was ranked the highest by six of the seven East Hampton Town Council members. The Edgewater Hill proposal was also the most cost effective and affordable with a price tag of approximately \$18.5 million. The final price tag may be offset by the sale of the existing Town Hall, Police Station and Board of Education properties.

#### CONDITION OF THE CURRENT POLICE FACILITY, TOWN HALL & BOARD OF EDUCATION BUILDING

- Noncompliant with ADA
- Limited work, meeting & storage space
- Inadequate parking
- · Outdated & inefficient HVAC Systems

#### The current Police Station also lacks:

• Lobby space for public interaction.

- Adequate space for prisoner transport and appropriate holding cells.
- Separate cells for juveniles, women & men and no locker facilities for female officers.
- On-site parking for police cruisers.

The current Town Hall has no drinkable water, corroding pipes, deteriorating foundations and persistent flooding and water damage.

#### Why not locate the new municipal building in the Village Center or the former Center School?

- The cost of renovating Center School and building the municipal building addition at Memorial School is \$44 million.
- The cost of renovating the Center School alone is approximately \$29 million.
- Renovating old buildings is more expensive than new construction and even more expensive when remediation of contaminated soils is required, as is the case in the Village Center, Center School and the existing Town Hall

# **Planning & Zoning Department**

It's been a busy spring and early summer for the East Hampton Planning and Zoning Department. Several new projects are on the horizon in town having received approvals from the Planning and Zoning Commission, including a new NAPA store at 72 East High Street (just beyond CVS), and the new Connecticut Draft Horse Rescue facility on Chestnut Hill Road.

The RiverCOG, our regional planning agency has chosen Tighe & Bond to lead the Route 66 Corridor discussed in the last Events magazine. This study will be a comprehensive look at the road starting at the Arrigoni Bridge to the Marlborough town line. They'll be looking at safety and operational improvements, zoning and land use, development potential and other factors that will impact the road in the years to come. We look forward to working with T&B as they are local (Middletown) and knowledgeable of the needs along Route 66.

Connecticut has a new regulation on the books streamlining the placement of temporary health care units for elderly and disabled loved ones to be able to live on your property in the comfort of their own space. Zoning standards must be adhered to, and permits are required, but this presents a new option for caring for loved ones. Please feel free to call our office at: 860-267-9601 with any questions.

Finally, we would like to remind all residents that Zoning Approval is required before any structure is placed on a property, including but no limited to decks, sheds, "temporary" hoop houses and small plastic sheds available at most home improvement retailers.

# **Public Works Department**

Summer work for the Public Works Department is now full speed ahead.

Potholes are being patched as weather allows. Once the majority of all these are addressed, curb repair will be scheduled. Road sweeping is near completion, with second-round sweeping in some areas due to parade routes and the mess due to the gypsy moth infestation. Roadside mowing is ongoing.

The Town properties and five cemeteries have been mowed three times with some clean-ups required.

Catch basin cleaning in the Lake
Pocotopaug watershed area is also
ongoing, with the process expanding
outwardly from this area. Unwanted
vegetation growth around guard rails and
Town facilities is also being treated. These
two processes were done by contractors
under the supervision of Public Works



Department personnel. Our tree contractor has also been called upon to remove unwanted or unsafe trees.

Interdepartmental cooperation has been provided to the Board of Education for high school graduation and Police Department. Other projects have been Old Home Days, the 250th Anniversary, and tree plantings for the Park and Recreation Department. Touch A Truck Day at the Educational Play Care, which gave over three hundred children an opportunity to see and experience a variety of Public

Works equipment, fire trucks and police cars as well as the completion of an Eagle Scout project and the installation of a bench at the Community Center.

The Christopher Brook culvert project has been completed and dedicated on June 17, 2017, "Jim Morris" bridge.

Public Works equipment is being repaired and maintained both in season and for winter work.

Brush at the Transfer Station has been processed and removed, making room for new material brought in by residents. New stickers are on sale for \$10 at the Transfer Station, open Saturdays from 7:30 am until 3:00 pm.

Facilities maintenance focuses on the Town Hall and Police Department facilities which continue to be a challenge with the deteriorating condition of the building.

#### **Lake Commission**

#### **EDGEMERE CONDOMINIUM RUNOFF RETROFITS**

Edgemere Condominiums will begin improving the quality of the runoff from portions of their property which currently drain directly to Lake Pocotopaug. These water quality improvements will be achieved by the installation of two Bioswales along the edge of North Main Street to filter and infiltrate runoff from a portion of two of their driveways and/or parking areas.

Bioswales are Low Impact Sustainable Development (LISD) practices which use a filter media of sand/leaf compost and vegetation (in this case, dense grass) to trap, uptake pollutants and then allow the runoff to infiltrate into the native soils. In addition to the Bioswales, downspouts from the roof gutter systems on each building will be addressed in one of two ways:

- Runoff will be directed to Bioretention systems (aka rain gardens) and allowed to filter through the soil media and then infiltrate into the native soils. This will allow pollutant loads, particularly nutrients to be reduced.
- Runoff will be directed to a 55 gallon rain barrel with an
  overflow being directed to a small Bioretention system. The
  rain barrel will allow collected runoff to be used to irrigate
  flower or vegetable gardens at the condominiums.

Over time, these LISD stormwater systems will result in less pollutants, particularly phosphorous and nitrogen from entering Lake Pocotopaug from their property. The implementation of these LIS systems at Edgemere Condominiums will serve as a demonstration project as how the water quality of runoff from developed areas can be treated to improve the water quality in the last over time.

The Friends of the Lake are working with Edgemere Condominium Association, the largest private waterfront property, with the goal to reduce run off to the lake. Keep your eyes on the North Main Street condominium property as it takes the lead in improving water quality at Lake Pocotopaug.

# **WPCA** of East Hampton's Pursuit of a Reliable **Public Water System**

The Town of East Hampton has historically relied upon individual on-site wells for water. Over the last several years an increasing number of quality and quantity problems, incidents of contamination, iron and manganese problems, as well as decreasing water table levels, have been identified in the area. In some areas, these incidents of contamination have rendered the water unsuitable for drinking. The full extent of groundwater contamination in East Hampton is not known as groundwater moves very slowly and it may take many years before an affected area is recognized.

In addition to individual residential wells, there are over 55 public (community) water systems in the Town, which are under continuing State regulation. These range from those which serve housing developments on an annual basis to those that serve public buildings, schools, churches, campgrounds, stores, restaurants, etc. which serve 25 individuals or more of an intermittent basis. Included among these is the Village Center.

The Village Center Water System was mandated by the State in 1989 and built in 1991 to alleviate serious chemical contamination in the center of the Town. These fragmented community water systems are required by the State to perform regular maintenance, monitoring and reporting. Health Department files are replete with reports of non-compliance with health standards requiring corrective actions on these systems.

In November 2004, the Town submitted an Initial Water Supply Plan (IWSP) to the State Department of Health to comply with its December 2002 order. As ordered by the State this plan addresses the potable drinking water needs of the Town for the present as well as for the projected 5-, 20-, and 50-year periods. Water sources, purification, distribution, storage, expenses, and revenue and funding concerns are all subject to inclusion in the planning process. To date, there has been no action on creating a municipal water system. This proposed municipal water system will mitigate the increasing water quality and quantity problems by interconnecting numerous community water

systems operating in the Town along with the Village Center Water System. The system will not be extended to those systems owned by others except under written agreement.

The water system will be administered by the Town's WPCA as an enterprise fund. Financing for this project will be through federal and state grants and loans, with the balance being paid for by the users of the system. An independent rate study will determine the rates to be utilized. As planned, the project will be built in three phases. Initially, the project had a targeted completion date of 2010 for phase one and the total project completed by 2014. Approval by a public referendum will be required for the project to proceed. To date, this project has not been initiated due to the high projected cost.

The development of this system hinges upon locating a new, safe, and reliable supply of high-quality groundwater. The Town has identified the aquifer running along the Connecticut River as the most likely spot for the development of this ground water resource. The proposed municipal water system will mirror the existing wastewater system, plus serve portions of Cobalt and Middle Haddam. The plan is to service all households, commercial enterprises, and industrial properties below elevation 650' or an estimated population of 9,000 people or 75% of the population of the Town. In addition, fire protection will be made available to the residents of East Hampton for the first time. The water provided will meet all state and federal drinking water standards. The development of this new water system will undergo extensive scrutiny by local, state, and federal officials and will meet or exceed all requirements. Any water connection would need to be approved by Town Council. Currently, there is a Water Supply Task Force working under the direction of the Town Council to develop the best plan for water supply in Town. This Task force recently hired a Consultant to do an interconnection study. The results of this study will help the Town Council move forward on how best to provide adequate clean drinking water to residents and businesses.

# **Youth and Family Services**

Youth and Family Services, in conjunction with the East Hampton Police Department, will be implementing a Juvenile Review Board. The purpose of a Juvenile Review Board (JRB) is to offer a meaningful alternative to criminal court for East Hampton youth, ages 9 - 17. Youth are referred by either the East Hampton Public Schools or the East Hampton Police Department. This alternative is an option for first time offenders who have committed a misdemeanor offense and admit responsibility. The parent/ guardian also consents to their child's participation. If at any point in the process, the youth and family do not agree to participate or accept responsibility, the case is returned to the referral source and/or sent to Juvenile Court.

During the JRB process, the youth and his/her family meet with a JRB Case Manager. Then a Contract of Participation is developed with the Juvenile Review Board, the youth, family, and case manager, which includes, but may not be limited to: Actions to repair the harm, such as offering an apology or completing community service. Participation in activities to gain insight from the experience and learn how to be successful, such as counseling, mentoring or researching a topic. And a date to complete agreements.

If the youth and family agree, they will sign the Contract of Participation. The typical contract lasts six months. If the youth fails to work toward completion of agreements or meet with the JRB Case Manager, the case is returned to the referral source and/or sent to Juvenile Court. Upon successful completion of all JRB recommendations, the youth's case is closed. The case will not appear in criminal records.

#### EAST HAMPTON PREVENTION PARTNERSHIP

As a Local Prevention Council, the East Hampton Prevention Partnership is dedicated to reducing substance abuse among young people. Our mission is to foster a culture that values the wellbeing of East Hampton's youth. We strive to instill self-acceptance, self-confidence and goal-setting to promote healthy choices. In collaboration with community stakeholders, we offer educational programs and outreach initiatives.

The East Hampton Prevention Partnership meets on the 3rd Tuesday of each month to discuss local efforts aimed at reducing the rates of youth substance abuse in East Hampton. can also be accessed through our department. Appointments will be available beginning in September.

**Operation Fuel** provides a one-time grant of up to \$500.00 to assist families with their energy bills. Operation Fuel is energy blind, meaning it assists with all energy types - oil, electric, natural gas, kerosene, wood, propane, pellets, and other energy sources. If your grant is being applied to an electric or gas utility bill, Operation Fuel's grant can be used to prevent a shutoff or restore utility service. You will need to bring proof of the last 4 weeks of income for all household members, the name of your fuel vendor (for deliverable fuel customers, only), or your utility bill and payment history (for electric and gas utility customers, only).

New Start through Eversource will review your account billing history and set a monthly budget payment based on the average of your regular monthly bill. You will need to pay this amount on-time each month to remain in the program and continue to receive year-round electric service. When you make your New Start monthly payment, a portion of your past due balance will be eliminated, or "forgiven," thus reducing the amount you owe. The amount forgiven each month is calculated by taking your total past due balance and dividing it by 12.

For example, if your budget payment amount is set at \$150 per month and your past due balance is \$1,200, for every month you make your required \$150 budget payment towards your current bill, we will reduce your past-due balance by \$100.

As long as you continue to make your New Start payment, your electric service will not be shut off for non-payment.

#### To be eligible:

- You must be a current Eversource residential customer.
- Your current account balance must be \$100 or more and at least 60 days overdue.
- Your income must fall at or below 60 percent of the estimated state median income.
- You must have applied for, and be eligible to receive, energy assistance funds, or be able to provide other proof of income.
- You must continue to pay your monthly budget amount on-time each month.
- A "good faith" payment is required for enrollment in the New Start program and varies by customer based on payment
- If you miss one month of payments, the entire balance of your electric balance will be due immediately- no exceptions.

your fuel vendor (for deliverable fuel customers, only), or your current utility bill (for electric and gas utility customers, only), copy of your lease or mortgage payment, and very latest bank statement for all open bank accounts.

# **East Hampton Volunteer Fire Department Welcomes New Junior Firefighters**



The East Hampton Volunteer Fire Department recently welcomed five new members to its Junior Firefighter Division. The junior firefighters will operate under the tutelage of a pair of advisors appointed by Fire Chief Greg Voelker, Lt. Robb Rainville from Company 1 and Firefighter/EMT Donald Scranton from Company 2. Initially, the advisors will focus on familiarizing the new "recruits" with the different functions of the various apparatus, the type, location and function of the tools and equipment on each truck and, most importantly, the policies, procedures and protocols that are in place to insure the safety of everyone and everything involved in the fire service.

As their training progresses and as their abilities dictate, the Junior Firefighters will be introduced to more complex tasks and techniques that require gradually increasing levels of age-appropriate ability and skill. The objective of the Junior's program is to provide young individuals with opportunities to explore the fire service, obtain a basic understanding of the services' organization, equipment and operation, and to prepare those individuals for potential entry into formalized fire training once they achieve the age of 18. A large number of past and current firefighters, members of both career and volunteer departments, began as juniors.

Junior Firefighter programs are generally split into two agedefinitized sections, a section for ages 14 and 15, another for 16 and 17 year olds. With safety being paramount (and as legislated by state law), there are limitations placed on each section that define which skills, techniques and activities are permitted to be taught and practiced at each level. Adherence to this protocol insures that the young individual receives appropriate training at the appropriate time and demonstrates the appropriate level of both physical and cognitive ability to handle the particular activity.

# **East Hampton Community Emergency Response Team**

East Hampton is looking for a "few good people" to get more involved when emergencies happen, by joining the Community Emergency Response Team, or CERT. Presently about 25 local citizens have been trained as volunteers, but more are needed. CERT volunteers receive an initial 20 hours of training, with supplementary training provided throughout the year. This gives us the background to provide local and immediate support to emergency responders during a disaster. We are available to perform duties such as shelter support, crowd control, and assistance in evacuations. We help year-round with preparedness outreach, drills, and education.



We undertook our first response work immediately after Hurricane Sandy, by providing coverage at the East Hampton High School convenience station. Fortunately, since then East Hampton has been relatively spared emergency situations, but our volunteers continue to train in "search and rescue," CPR, and traffic control - among other things. We have helped direct parking at the Fire Department's Fireworks and at the Turkey Plunge. We recently volunteered assistance with Old Home Days' Glorious Gallop 5K Road Race. We have provided emergency readiness information to local groups and at events such as the Health Fair.

Persons of all skills and abilities can make a contribution. You are encouraged to investigate whether this volunteer opportunity is right for you. Rich Klotzbier, East Hampton's Emergency Management Director and Fire Marshal, is the director of East Hampton's CERT. The team meets one evening a month. Training is sometimes scheduled to occur during a regular meeting, or at another appropriate time. Events requiring CERT response can happen at any time throughout the year.

that can change the look of the breast." Oncoplastics essentially involves filling any "gaps" in the breast left by the removal of the tumor by reshaping the surrounding tissue, preserving a natural look. "With the oncoplastic technique, my goal is to leave the breast looking like it did before surgery," explains Dr. Bassin, "with as small a scar as possible."

Dr. Bassin performs both the lumpectomy and the oncoplasty at the same time, which can also be a big plus for the patient. The entire procedure usually takes only about an hour. In addition to the oncoplasty procedure, Dr. Bassin provides patients with complete breast care, including:

- High-risk patients
- Atypia (presence of abnormal cells in breast tissue)
- Breast infections
- Breast pain

- · Breast cancer
- Consultation for abnormal breast imaging
- Benign breast disease

Dr. Bassin also collaborates with Middlesex Hospital breast surgeon, Dr. Andrea Malon, as part of the Surgical Alliance; along with local plastic surgeons. "Providing patient-centered care is extremely important to me, adds Dr. Bassin. "I am with my patients every step of the way."

# Summer Eye Health
