Dear Friends & Neighbors,

Thank you for re-electing the same team as your Board of Selectmen for the next two years, and special thanks for allowing me to continue as your First Selectman. I am extremely proud of what this Board has accomplished during the last four years by working together for the betterment of our outstanding community.

I'm happy to report that through careful budgeting, the Town is in good financial shape and we've earned an increase in credit rating to AA+ with S&P Global Ratings in the face of a downgraded rating for the State of Connecticut. The capital and departmental improvements accomplished this year through grants and policies implemented will benefit the Town well into the future.

This year the Town is honored to dedicate the 2016-2017 Annual Report to Judy and John Heiser. Their collective commitment to the community and years of public service are admirable and span decades. You can read more about John and Judy in the Town's Annual Report, copies of which are available at Town Hall and on the Town's website under the Finance Department. (www.essexct.gov) We thank them for their many years of service and dedication to the Town.

Preparation for the 2018-2019 annual budget is underway. Letters have gone out to schools, departments, and boards and commissions and they will soon compile and submit their requests. The Town's goal is to continue to meet the needs and expectations of our residents while keeping expenditures low. The schedule of budget meetings has been posted on the website. The budget meetings are public meetings and we hope

you will attend. The Board of Finance has overall responsibility for the budget process and will submit a final budget to a Town Meeting currently scheduled for May 14, 2018 for approval from Town residents.

Several projects that were part of the two year Capital Improvement Plan have been successfully completed. This year the Town Hall bathrooms will be renovated and brought up to code. The Walnut Street Bridge project will get the finishing touches and we expect completion by the end of spring.

The \$491,887 Steap Grant for the Centerbrook Village is anticipated to go out to bid in February and construction to begin in the summer months. The project will focus on sidewalk improvement and replacement along the south side of Main Street where there are currently continuous sidewalks in various stages of deterioration. Street lighting will be installed along the sidewalk area consistent with the character of the Village. This grant will help define a connected area within Centerbrook from the Valley Railroad to Essex Elementary School.

I know many of you have noticed the new LED bulbs Eversource is installing on streetlights in Town. If anyone is experiencing a problem as a result of the new LED bulbs please contact the First Selectman's office at 860-767-4340 x145 with your address and a pole number and we will request shields to be placed on those lights.

I encourage you to go see the new trails that had to be created at Viney Brook as a result of beaver activity. The public has been supportive in the past with donations that have allowed the beavers to stay in their habitat while making it safe for people to visit too. I appreciate the willingness of the public to donate money to maintain the habitat. The fund that was created to maintain this area is almost depleted and donations would be helpful once again. Your continued support makes all the difference. Donations can be made payable to "The Town of Essex" with Beaver Fund on the note line.

The Town of Essex needs your help! So much of what we accomplish is a direct result of the dedicated citizens who volunteer their time for the benefit of the townspeople. Please consider volunteering in some capacity for the Essex Ambulance, Essex Fire Department, a Town board or commission, FISH, the Garden Clubs, or any other non-profit community organization that makes Essex unique. Volunteers are needed to fill vacancies on the Economic Development Commission, the Conservation Commission, and the Park and Recreation Commission. 



# Building a Thriving Music Community in Deschapelles, Haiti

A beginner band 40 members strong, summer camp opportunities for musicians, an avenue for a musician to play with the Port-au-Prince Philharmonic—this and more because of Sister Cities Essex Haiti (SCEH) Music Project in Deschapelles, Haiti.

Sister Cities Essex Haiti collaborates with the people of Deschapelles on projects identified by its Haitian partners as important. Music, a vital part of

life in Haiti, is an example. Most towns have a Fanfare Band for local events. In 2011, Deschapelles wanted to build up its music community, so instruments and music books were sent. In 2011 and in 2015, Paddy Hurley, founder of Essex's Community Music School, ran week-long workshops in Deschapelles with the assistance of Essex Musicians for Deschapelle's Fanfare Band and a beginner band.


Through Twitter, the SCEH Music Project caught the attention of classically trained Haitian bassoonist Daniel Charles who is based in Port-au-Prince. Trained in the U.S. in music theory and with

skills on many instruments, Charles wanted to give back to his fellow musicians. Last summer he and five other musicians held a week-long workshop in Deschapelles for the 40 members of the town's beginner band. Instruction included music theory, lessons in the care and cleaning of instruments, and individual section and group training. It ended with a well-attended final performance of traditional and classical pieces. Daniel Charles and his fellow musicians are committed to continuing their nurture of Deschapelles musicians in future years.

Clarinetist Castillo Armand began his music studies 5 years ago through the SCEH Music Project. With hard work, music camp experiences in Haiti, and lessons with the principal clarinetist of the Port-au-Prince Philharmonic, he now plays with the orchestra. Castillo established a small wood wind group that played at the Hôpital Albert Schweitzer's 61st Birthday celebration.

SCEH is grateful to the many people of Essex and beyond who support its efforts, as well as the investment of fellow Haitians like Daniel Charles and musicians from Port-au-Prince, and the enthusiasm for music of men and women from Deschapelles. This is but one example of what makes Sister Cities Essex Haiti Projects successful.

# **Essex Land Trust Celebrating 50 Years - The Early Years**

Editor's Note: In 2018, the Essex Land Trust will be celebrating 50 years of preserving and enhancing our community's open space and natural resources for the benefit of future generations. We are kicking off the celebration of this landmark moment with a first in a series of articles detailing some of the high points in our history.

In July of 1968, readers of the Deep River New Era or Hartford Courant newspapers found an announcement tucked into the pages.

In the face of growing concern over development in the area, a group of Essex residents had formed a land trust to acquire open space property for public use. It was called the Essex Conservation Trust (ECT) and its mission, said president Thomas S. Willetts, would be "to promote for the benefit of Essex residents ... the preservation of natural resources and the plant and animal life therein ... as well as scenic and historic sites." It would seek to "acquire by gift or purchase ... real or other property ... exclusively for educational, scientific and conservationist purposes."

Henry Tower was named vice president. Mrs. Frederick Dagget, secretary and R. William Bevan treasurer. The directors and the advisory board reads like a "Who's Who" and included Merritt Comstock, Herbert Clark, Charles Doane and Walter Budney. The Middletown Press covered the first meeting, held October 9. Already 258 members strong, the auditorium was "packed" according to the Press. Joseph Ward Jr. of the state Council

on Agriculture and Natural Resources gave a talk and showed a film, "Wingbeats on the Sand." But the highlight was an announcement by Land Acquisition chairman Merrit Comstock that the trust had purchased its first property - a 5-plusacre section on the northeast section of Thatchbed Island.

Thatchbed Island was the early focus for land acquisition. In January of 1969, a group of property owners, led by Chester Bowles, donated acreage on the island's south end. This followed an earlier gift of land on Great Meadows by Mrs. Francis K. Buell in memory of her husband, Fishy Buell.



Membership expanded rapidly and included 47 in the Junior Land Trust, made up of 5th and 6th graders from Essex Elementary School under of the guidance of 6th grade teacher Alouise Keenan. Yearly dues were \$1.

The ECT acquired six more acres on Thatched Bed Island that winter, purchased from Mrs. Edna Pratt Ek and Capt. Walter Rowe. Rowe, founder and first Commodore of the Essex Yacht Club, had bought land there in 1946 to protect it from development, making him one of the town's first conservationists; Ek's property had been in her family since the 19th century, when it was used to grow salt hay.

Thus, by the early 1970s, a new idea was taking hold, the idea of donating, and deeding

or selling land to the ECT. William Mitchell of Ivoryton deeded 4-plus acres on the Falls River, including three acres of valuable wetlands. Mitchell said he hoped his act would "encourage other landowners to follow suit." ECT pres. E.P. Williams lauded the move, which would "help insure the quality of life in this community."

But the trust was about more than saving open spaces; education through talks and presentations were part of the plan, too. The first of the trust's Ecology Walks took place out on Great Meadows, hosted by Conn College student Rob Hernandez, who explained the flora and fauna of the pendant bar to a group of active members. The Old Saybrook Pictorial covered the event, the trust termed it a success and a second walk was planned.

Throughout the early 1970s, a variety of speakers were bringing current issues to the fore; Christopher Percy, executive director of the Connecticut Watershed Council discussed the pros and cons of the plan to build an oil refinery on Long Island Sound; Yale Univ. forestry expert William Burch Jr. talked about the relationship between humans and the environment; Richard Buck, an expert on the Atlantic Salmon, highlighted efforts to bring the fish back to its Connecticut native river.

Membership was now more than 400; in the space of just five or six years, the Essex Conservation Trust, through acquisition and education, was becoming an integral part of the three-village community.



2017 was a busy year for The Essex Foundation, Inc., a nonprofit 501(c)(3) organization dedicated to making a difference in the lives of Essex residents. Much progress on the multi-phased

Essex gateway beautification project was made. Soon after the painting of the Route 9 highway bridge at the intersection of Route 153 and Route 154 was completed, the Foundation moved forward with the installation of twelve Chanticleer pear trees and over 300 low-growing, low-maintenance evergreen and perennial plants in the southeast corner of the state-owned underpass area. Matthew Verry Landscape Design provided the planning and design while Sullivan Lawn Services provided the installation and maintenance services.

The Foundation also provided financial assistance to Essex Veterans Memorial Hall, which serves as a resource for veterans, their families, and the greater community. The donated funds were used to fully underwrite the cost of paving the gravel parking lot on the Centerbrook property. Sullivan Paving Company submitted the winning bid, which included a donation of their time and materials to line stripe and mark the new pavement.

Support was also given for the purchase of furniture for the community room, game room, office and kitchen at the newly constructed Essex Place, an affordable senior housing complex also in Centerbrook. The request for support was made two weeks before the grand opening of the 22-unit complex developed by Essex Elderly & Affordable Housing and the Women's Institute of Housing & Economic Development when it was realized that last minute adjustments to the overall project budget left no available resources for the furnishings.




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# **Valley Regional High School**

On the morning of September 24th, five students from Valley Regional High School, accompanied by Interact Club advisor Ms. Hambor, set out for New Haven. The goal of this group of six was to help make a difference in the lives of people who are less fortunate. The Interact Club at Valley was established with the intent of getting students involved with the community. One such opportunity is Habitat for Humanity, a non-profit volunteer-based group that builds houses across the nation for those in need.



The participating Valley students arrived on site at nine in the morning, ready for the hard

labor that greeted them. On site, the students were able to work alongside Habitat house owners. "... I really enjoyed working alongside the other volunteers," explained Freddie Kerr, a Valley student partaking in the Habitat for Humanity program.... They [the other house owners] were all very friendly which created a



very positive work environment." This environment was a factor in the amount of work that was completed on that day. Not a single member of the Habitat team grumbled at the tasks at hand, but rather jumped at the chance to get involved. Students learned how to apply insulation and drywall, as well as how to operate a power drill to effectively drive

screws into boards. This hands-on, learning-as-you-go-technique really gave volunteers a chance to explore something on their own.

When seeing high school students partaking in volunteer work, it is not unpopular for others to believe that the work is being required by the school that the students

attend. This is what sets the students at Valley Region apart from others. Valley students are not required to turn in volunteer hours in order to graduate, thus making volunteering in the community completely optional. When asked why students like Kerr would still fill their already busy schedules with



volunteer work, he responded, "Even though it seems cliché, I joined Habitat to make a positive difference in my community. I knew I could physically make a difference in somebody's life. That's something you can't really do every day."



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
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### **Essex Court and Essex Place**

This past year has been full of activity for Essex Court and its new neighbor, Essex Place. The Essex Housing Authority was the recipient of a third Small Cities Grant, sponsored by the Town, to fund kitchen and bathroom updates for all 36 units of Essex Court. Essex Court was built in 1984 as affordable housing for seniors and, over the last seven years, has been performing needed capital maintenance. This latest grant funded septic systems repairs, kitchen cabinet, countertop, and appliance replacements, and bathroom fixture updates. Now, thanks to the three grants, Essex Court exteriors are attractive and the interiors are in good working order for the comfort and safety of residents.

Essex Place, the new 22-unit facility for senior affordable housing on the Essex Court campus, opened in October for occupancy. Interest has been strong and all but three units are now occupied. Residents seem pleased with the spacious apartments and latest appliances. The large Community Room at Essex Place hosts social events for both Essex Court and Essex Place residents. When completed, the kitchen at Essex Place will serve all residents on the campus.

Construction overruns limited funds available to furnish Essex Place. The Essex Foundation generously agreed to fund the purchase of furniture for the Community Room and the Game Room. Also, the kitchen has not been completed, and Essex Savings Bank has provided Community Reinvestment Act funds toward the costs of kitchen completion. The Management team and the Board of Directors are most grateful to The Essex Foundation and Essex Savings Bank for their generosity.

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### **Glaucoma National Awareness Month**

January is National Glaucoma Awareness Month. Glaucoma affects 60 million people worldwide and more than 3 million people in the United States. Glaucoma is often called the "thief of sight" since often there are no symptoms and glaucoma related vision loss is permanent. As much as 40% of vision can be lost without a person noticing. If not diagnosed and treated, 1 in 10 people go blind from glaucoma. Glaucoma affects people of all ages, even infants.

There are two main types of glaucoma: Primary Open-Angle Glaucoma and Angle-Closure Glaucoma. Open-angle glaucoma is dangerous because most of the time a person affected will not notice any symptoms until vision is severely damaged. The vision loss isn't noticed because it often starts with your peripheral vision and the brain makes up for what you don't see. The inner eye pressure (IOP- intraocular pressure) rises because the correct amount of fluid can't drain out of the eye, this occurs usually deep into the drainage canals. Closed-angle glaucoma occurs when the drainage canals get blocked or covered. Angle-closure glaucoma is dangerous because, while there are often symptoms of pain including headaches, nausea, and eye pain they happen rapidly and without warning.

It is very important to get an annual dilated eye exam. As you age or if you have a family history of glaucoma you may have the visual field test performed. This test checks your peripheral vision and the loss of your side vision is one of the first signs of glaucoma. If you are diagnosed with glaucoma there are ways to manage it. In the early stages you might be prescribed eye drops or have laser surgery performed. Other ways to manage glaucoma are done by performing filtering surgery or a drainage implant.

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


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### 7th Annual Run For Chris 5K with the Y

The fund is intended to perpetuate Chris's vision by helping local area high school students travel abroad.



After reading about a similar donation in Chester in 2017, the Committee agreed that every fire station in Middlesex County could benefit with such a tool. That started the "Mission Possible" ball rolling to secure the Wag'N O2 Fur Life Oxygen Mask Kits for all.

Recently the ARF! Fund Committee made a surprise visit at Essex Fire Engine Company to make the special presentation at the company's monthly meeting. The Wag'N O2 Fur Life kits come with masks in three sizes, tubes to connect to traditional oxygen tanks, training materials, and emergency responder documents. The Committee is presenting each department in Middlesex County with a kit for every physical station. However, the vision is even greater: a kit for every truck in the county, and everyone can help make this a reality.

The idea is simple and easy to make happen. Through the ARF! Fund at the Community Foundation or independently, individuals and businesses can work together to provide at least one pet oxygen mask

kit for each truck at fire stations across the county. This would ensure that our local fire departments have the essential equipment to respond to every emergency – human or animal – that may arise at the scene of a fire.




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
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
