and planning. We hope to see all work completed this fall and are very excited in the dramatic improvements that our residents and visitors will enjoy.

We successfully completed our fiscal year 13/14 budget process this past May. A proposed \$6,967,461 town government budget and a proposed \$7,634,917 appropriation for Essex Elementary School were approved. The town government budget, which represents a \$113,821, or 1.66 percent, increase over the current budget, and the elementary school budget, which is up by \$100,326, or 1.33 percent, over the current appropriation, are combined with the town's \$8,081,772 share of the Region 4 education budget for a total \$22.68 million spending plan for 2013-2014.

The Board of Finance has set the property tax rate for 2013-2014 at 18.99 mills, an increase of 0.52 mills from the current tax rate. We do our absolute best to create a budget that maintains a level of service you expect while being very mindful of the economy and the challenges our families face. On another note the town is currently engaged in a full 10-year town-wide property revaluation that includes inspections of all residential and commercial properties. Moving forward, we will refine and update our capital needs list and we are exploring bonding in the fall, for immediate necessary work including the school roof, town bridges, roads and sidewalks, and improvements to Town Hall.

We strongly recommend that our neighbors in Essex be cognizant of hurricane season which is now upon us. Hurricane season is listed as June 1-November 30 each year, though storms can occur outside these dates. We recall well our recent storm events in Essex each of the past two years which is even more reason to have your homes and families ready in case of an emergency. The Town of Essex created the Emergency Preparedness Guidebook for our residents and you may refer to these guidelines to help you prepare. Copies of the guidebook are available for you to pick up at Town Hall, also you will find this document on our website, www.essexct.gov, click Government, click Departments, click Emergency Management.

The Board of Selectmen would like to congratulate Mary Ellen Barnes who was recently hired as Essex's new Social Services Representative, and Belden Libby who was appointed as town's new Animal Control Officer. We are confident they will serve the Essex community admirably. We hope you have noticed the DRIVE LIKE YOUR KIDS LIVE HERE signs in town. Please respect its message and slow down on our roads and help keep everyone safe.

Have a safe and fun summer and no matter where your summer travels may take you, Essex will always welcome you back!

Planning a Home Renovation or Painting Project?

Step One...Plan to Prevent Lead Poisoning. The *Don't Spread Lead Campaign* is a regional effort throughout Connecticut that is dedicated to eliminating lead poisoning in children and adults as the result of home improvement projects. The disturbance of lead paint that occurs during home improvement and painting projects in homes built before 1978 poses a serious threat to the health of adults and children. Many homeowners who are undertaking this type of work are unaware that when they disturb painted surfaces, tiny lead particles can be released that are too small even to see. Lead-based paint can be on walls, ceilings, woodwork, windows, and sometimes floors. When lead-based paint on

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these surfaces is broken, sanded, or scraped, it breaks into tiny, sometimes invisible pieces that a child may swallow. Even a seemingly small repair and renovation job, including repainting projects, can create enough lead dust that when inhaled can cause lead poisoning in adults.

Most homes built before 1978 contain some lead-based paint. Homes built before 1950 used paint having a higher concentration of lead and it was used more extensively throughout the home. The CT Department of Public Health's *Lead Poisoning Prevention and Control Program* has many excellent resources to educate citizens and help them understand the simple measures that they can take to avoid lead poisoning during home improvement projects. 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

The Docents of the Essex Historical Society

Webster defines a docent as "a person who leads guided tours, especially through a museum or art gallery." However, there is more to this job than one would understand from this simple definition. A docent is a goodwill ambassador, as this person is often the first contact a visitor has with the museum. A docent is a tour guide, a source of information, an educator, and sometimes an entertainer, especially with small children. Since visitors usually wish to be involved and not lectured to, a good docent does not merely read a script, but attempts to be interactive and adapt each tour to the individual visitors' needs. A major challenge is remembering not to provide too much information. The goal of the docent is to create a positive experience, to excite, inspire, and transform people and keep them coming back.

The docent program began shortly after the Essex Historical Society acquired the Pratt House in 1985. Approximately twenty individuals currently serve as docents, conducting tours of the House and grounds on weekends from June 1st through September 29th. Experience is not necessary to be a docent, but an interest in people and local history is. Our docents find that what is most attractive about this job is an opportunity to teach or tell a story, learn history from other docents and visitors, and meet new people.

Training is provided to our docents annually, prior to the beginning of our season, and covers the basics of Pratt House



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history, contents, and grounds. This training session serves as a refresher for our experienced docents and a learning experience for our new volunteers. In addition to the basics, this year's session also included information gathered by three of our docents who attended a recent Docent Symposium in Bristol, RI and a detailed presentation by past EHS President Debbie Weinstein on the Pratt House chair collection, which includes: a ladder back with a flag seat which was listed in an inventory belonging to John Pratt, a carver chair, a corner chair, and a nanny rocker. In addition to our training program, our docents are usually reading and learning from other docents and visitors.

The original portion of Pratt House was constructed in 1701 and three portions were subsequently added. The final addition was put on in 1800 and gives the home its unique organic style. The house is furnished with 18th and 19th century antiques. The kitchen includes a large open hearth and an assortment of colonial era cooking implements. Along with the house, the two acre property also includes: a barn with a photo exhibit and antique loom, a restored outhouse, a kitchen and an herb garden, and a 14 plot community garden.

Pratt House is open each Friday, Saturday, and Sunday afternoons from 1:00 - 4:00 pm. EHS invites you to come and enjoy a tour, learn, and be inspired. If you are interested in joining our docent team, please contact coordinators, Mary Ann Pleva 860-767-8560 or Bette Taylor at 860-581-8007.

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New Trees in Essex

With each Arbor Day since 1872, there are new tree plantings all over the country. This year Essex was no exception. In a collaborative effort by the Essex Tree Committee, the Essex Land Trust, the Essex Garden Club, the Essex Rotary Club, the Essex Park and Recreation Committee and the Essex Elementary School, seven new trees were added to the Essex landscape, making a total of 1,736 inventoried trees.

Trees are an essential part of our community. They help maintain the quality of the air by absorbing carbon dioxide during the day and releasing oxygen during the night. They stabilize the soil thus aiding in flood control. They assist in neutralizing waste water.

They provide shade and habitats for birds and reduce noise levels. They add both beauty and value to the landscape. It is no wonder, that on Arbor Day an annual joint effort is made to enhance our town.

On April 26, Augie Pampel, Essex Tree Warden and Chairman of the Tree Committee presented an educational program in collaboration with the Essex Land Trust at the Essex Elementary

school. The Tree Committee planted a new Saucer Magnolia on the school grounds, replacing one that had been damaged during the winter storms. At this program a large group of third graders had an opportunity to ask many questions about trees, tree care and maintenance. Financing for the planting was provided by a combination of monies raised by the school children and a donation from the Essex Land Trust.

On April 27, Augie Pampel assisted the Essex Land Trust in planting three Tupelo trees at Cross Lots Preserve. Preparation for the tree plantings was provided by Landscape Specialties; while the Essex Land Trust volunteers actually planted the three trees. Augie Pampel along with Tom Rutherford of

the Land Trust provided important information about planting and caring for trees answering many of the questions people brought to the event, such as the nature of the Tupelo Tree, the soil required, the depth for planting and root development.

Three other events occurred on April 27. At 41 Main Street, the Essex Tree Committee planted a Valley Forge Elm, donated by the Essex Garden Club to replace a damaged Little Leaf Linden tree. According to Augie Pampel the Valley Forge Elm has proven to be a successful street tree requiring less maintenance than its cousin the Princeton Elm which has a branching habit that is more susceptible to damage.

The other two events occurred on Teal Lane. Here two White Oaks were planted. The first was in memory of Jack Spangler and provided by the Essex Park and Recreation Committee. A second White Oak was donated by the Essex Rotary Club and planted nearby.

The Essex Tree Committee would like to give a special thanks and recognition to the Fred Weber Tree and Landscape Specialties for their assistance in planting the trees on Main Street, Teal Lane and at the Elementary School and to Bartlett Tree Experts for removal of the tree on Main Street.

The Essex Tree Committee from its beginning in 1990 has been responsible for the inventory, preservation and replacement of the street trees. Since 1995, the Essex Tree Committee has removed 304 trees and planted 131 trees. Funding for the plantings comes from the Town, grants and private donations.

The success of the Essex Tree Committee goes hand in hand with the support of Essex community organizations, the expertise of tree specialists and the generosity of individuals and families of Essex. The Tree Committee wishes to thank all those involved in the Arbor Day events and looks forward to our continued collaboration in maintaining the lush, green beauty of our streets and preserves.

The Crime Tip voice mailbox or Crime Tip e-mail account are not designed for filing official complaints with the Police and the public should not use either method to report emergency incidents or crimes in progress. For routine police complaints, please call 860-767-1054.

Evacuation Registry For Citizens with Special Needs

The Essex Health Department maintains a list of seniors and residents with special needs who may require evacuation and shelter assistance during a natural or man-made disaster. Residents with medical disabilities or transportation needs are encouraged to pre-register with the Essex Health Department for these services. The registration form is available on the Essex Town Hall website at www.essex ct.gov under Forms & Documents or in the Essex Health Department.

Citizens who register are asked to keep their information current and to update it annually. Personal information is kept confidential in accordance with state and federal law, and is maintained by the Essex Health Department. Data will only be used by emergency personnel during preparedness planning and evacuations. Registration is FREE and VOLUNTARY. Your information is used solely by those public health and safety agencies that will assist you during an emergency. It does not imply or guarantee any other service.



Summer Beaujolais

Beaujolais is an area in France between Burgundy and Rhone. The most widely produced red varietal there is Gamay, which is light and fruity with bright cherry notes and a mild finish. The most famous style of this wine is called Beaujolais-Nouveau, which is produced in the fall to celebrate the new harvest and is sold on the third Thursday in November. Nouveau is picked, pressed and immediately bottled without any barrel aging. It is a very young wine and must be drunk within 6 months.

Beaujolais-Village can come from anywhere in the village and is sometimes a blend from different villages. It has more structure and depth than Beaujolais-Nouveau, seeing as it is aged before being bottled.

For a slightly higher cost you can purchase a "Cru" Beaujolais. The term Cru represents the 10 villages in Beaujolais which the grapes must be grown in. These wines are more complex due to the soil and micro-climate in the region. The 10 Crus are: Brouilly, Chenas, Chiroubles, Cote du Brouilly, Fleurie, Julienas, Morgon, Moulin-a-Vent, Regnie and Saint-Amour. These wines develop their own unique flavors from the growing area in their particular village. The flavors you can expect are cassis, blueberry and raspberry, with a round mouth-feel and a soft mild finish. Any Beaujolais wine can also be served with a slight chill, especially during these hot summer days. These delicious soft structured wines can be served with fare such as light meats, heavier seafood dishes and grilled vegetables.

There are also two white grapes grown in Beaujolais, Chardonnay and Aligote. These grapes are grown in small quantities and are referred to as Beaujolais-Blanc. The area is made up of limestone soil which is evident in the finish which portrays the minerality of the terroir. The area overlaps Maconnais, so they are very similar to Macon-Chardonnay wines. These can be enjoyed with your light summer dishes, salads and hors d'oeuvres, as they lack the heavy oak characteristics of California Chardonnays.

This summer is looking to be a scorcher, so invite your friends over, turn on the grill, pull out the lawn chairs and entice your pallets with some refreshing Beaujolais wines. They will be sure to cool you down and impress and please your guests!

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A Tribute to David Hyde

He was a good man. We all knew him and loved his solid New England soul. We cheered with him when he decided to retire from his Essex Hardware Store where he was an Essex legend. We were thrilled when he decided to spend the winter months in Florida. Then, before he could begin to enjoy his retirement, we were all devastated to hear that he had been diagnosed with a difficult cancer. But we cheered him on as he courageously went through hospital stays and chemo treatments. We were thrilled to see his cheeks begin to fill out again. We hoped against hope that the treatments were working. Through it all, David was still David—lending a helping hand to those who needed him, working long hours on rehabilitating the Scout building, painting, replacing windows, arranging for cleanup of the interior, picking up trash and hauling it to the dump, and planning for his winters with Maureen in Florida.

David did the simple things. He was always there to help. He was direct. He was straightforward. His philosophy was to get the job done, no matter what it took. You'd see him in his truck, at the Bumpy Warner Scout Building, at the town's parks, at the Pettipaug Club,—where he was always the first to make sure the road was plowed and the potholes filled. David was a doer.

It was David who made sure that Harriet Cheney Downing's wishes for a town park on the site of her family's homestead were followed to the letter. Hattie, as she was known, stipulated that after her demise the buildings on the property were to be taken down and then burned. She wanted the buildings dismantled so that the trees would not be damaged when the buildings were destroyed. David was there each day as

He was there as the wood was crushed and moved to a big hole where it was burned under the supervision of the Essex Fire Department. Shepherding the birth of Cross Lots park, David was instrumental in the many decisions that were required to bring the park to life. Along the way, he worked with the many members and volunteers of the Essex Land Trust in acquiring and maintaining the more than 400 acres on 15 properties that make up today's Essex Nature Conservancy holdings.

David was a lifelong Essex citizen. He loved his boat and his dogs. His family harked back to early times—he's related to half the town. After college he opened the Essex Hardware Store and he ran it for 40 years until his retirement. He was always there to offer advice, find the right tool, give a suggestion about how to do a job more economically. Jay Tonks, who now runs Essex Hardware, was hired by Dave when he was just 11 years old. Jay used to walk from elementary school up the street to help out a few days a week—sweeping, dusting shelves and absorbing everything there was to learn about the hardware business. He spent the last thirty-four years working with David and observing how David operated. Jay says David was passionate about everything he did. He loved a project and nothing was too much work for him. From dismantling a building to moving his hardware store a mile down the road, he did it with enthusiasm. Jay tells about a time when he mentioned to David that there was a shed downtown that he'd like to move to Ivoryton. It wasn't a small shed—it was 12 feet square. Before he knew it, Jay says, the very next day in fact, David jacked up the shed and lowered it back down on a trailer. David told Jay, "We'll get up at 4 am and tow it to Ivoryton" which is exactly what they did—and it still stands in Jay's backyard today. After high school David offered Jay fulltime work and Jay has been there ever since.

"David was generous and caring in his own special way," says Jay, "He told it like it was and was always there with tough love for me over the years. I feel privileged to have been mentored by David. He was proud of his store and I am honored to be able to continue the tradition he built."

David was part of another well-known Essex story that had to do with Brockway Island. The Island, reached by boat, was owned, when David was a boy, by Ernest Fetske, a prominent naval architect who had helped design the U.S Army's amphibious DUKW (the Duck Vehicle) used in World War II and who sometimes appeared in ads for Chesterfield cigarettes. David was only eight the day he and 12-year-old Ned Libby noticed Feske and his wife loading bricks into a boat. The boat partially capsized, dumping the bricks into the river near the town dock where the group of kids were swimming. Feske offered to buy the boys a mask and fins and said he'd pay them a penny for each brick they retrieved. By the weekend, all the bricks had been pulled from the river and a friendship was struck up between the boys and the Fetskes. The child-less couple loved having the young people around and began

inviting them for weekend picnics on the island. When the ice covered the river, they got together for winter skating parties. Ernest Fetske used his professional boat-building skills to design a hydroplane speedboat for the boys. When the couple, first Bettina Fetsky and then, in 1994, Ernest Fetske, passed away, they willed the island to David and Ned. The original Fetske house had fallen into disrepair so over a number of years, David and Ned replaced it on the same footings. For years, Ned and Dave and their wives, Carol and Maureen and their families continued to enjoy their island.

At the time of his passing, David Hyde was President of The Essex Foundation, ably steering it through an important growth period. He was a key figure in guiding the Board of Directors in its dealings with new donations such as funds from the Alice Powers bequest. Over the years, the Foundation, founded 40 years ago, helped townspeople in countless ways. The Bumpy Warner Youth Center Fund has maintained the Scout building with David doing much of the hands-on work. Emergency help has been quickly given to countless families. With the help and cooperation of neighbors, a sunken barge was removed from the Connecticut River. The Town Clock has been kept in running condition. Pond conservation has been encouraged. Help has been available in many small ways to cover important town needs. David Hyde's instincts were pure and direct and were always formulated with the best interests of the townspeople of Essex in view. The Essex Foundation will continue to be led by the visions David had for its future. He will be sorely missed and fondly remembered.



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Helping Seniors Transition to a New Chapter

As senior citizens age, their health and lifestyle needs change, sometimes necessitating a change in their retirement living plans. They may grow tired of caring for a large home, or they may face unexpected health concerns that require more daily assistance, or they simply may want a more care-free living environment. Whatever the catalyst, real life changes may need to take place.

While some senior citizens may welcome the move into a smaller home or into an independent or assisted living community, others may be less enthusiastic. During this transitional time, experts suggest helping loved ones by focusing on the positive sides of the move. If they are going to a smaller apartment or home, remind them of how much easier caring for their home will be. If they are moving to a senior community, they no longer need to worry about shoveling snow, cutting the lawn, painting the house, or cleaning the gutters. Depending on the community, they may not even have to shop for food or cook meals each day – and they will be able to enjoy a sense of security and peace knowing someone is always nearby if there ever is an emergency.

Celebrate the things that do go well during this time and reinforce that the right living decision was made. Have a card or small "care package" arrive the day your loved one makes the move. If you can, join them for a welcome visit to share lunch or dinner right away (remember to set up a date for the next visit before you leave). Also, if they do move into an assisted living residence, try to attend one or two social events held at the community together.

You are helping them start an adventure, another chapter with new friends, group activities, daily walks and exercise, lectures and classes, and more (perhaps even a new garden).

Considering a New Project or Business Venture? Start with Your Local Land Use Department

In an effort to streamline the permitting process for residents and business owners, the Health Department, Zoning and Building Departments, along with Planning and the office of the Fire Marshal have joined together to create one centralized unit referred to as the Land Use Department. The purpose is to make it easier to complete the application and permitting process for construction, changes in use and various other regulated activities with regard to site development.

The Land Use Department is located on the second floor in the Essex Town Hall. Department staff includes the Zoning Enforcement & Wetlands Official, Health Director and Sanitarian, Building Official, Fire Marshal and Town Planner along with two assistants. On-line resources are being developed to help citizens understand the permitting process before starting a project and to provide guidance on what is needed to get the project completed. In addition to the website, a new initiative is the opportunity for Essex residents, contractors, business operators and property owners to meet with all of the department officials together as a group to review the proposed project and to gain an understanding of the application and permitting process and to ensure compliance with various Federal, State and local regulations. Meetings can be scheduled on Wednesdays between 9:30 am and 12:00 pm.

The Land Use Department is the first stop for anyone planning a project. Approval from all Land Use officials is needed prior to the location or relocation of businesses in town, home construction or remodeling, changes in use of an existing building, septic repairs and installations, etc. Please note, anyone who undergoes site development without the necessary approvals risks having to un-do what was done before any approvals are acquired.





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Protecting People from Deadly Listeria Food Poisoning

Many germs can be spread through food. Some, like *Listeria*, can be deadly. *Listeria* strikes hard at pregnant women and their newborns, older adults, and people with weakened immune systems. *Listeria* can cause miscarriage and meningitis. Most people found to have *Listeria* infection require hospital care and about 1 in 5 people with the infection die. Outbreak investigations tell us what foods make people sick and what needs to change to make food safer and save lives. We have made some progress against *Listeria*, which is the third leading cause of death from food poisoning. However, we can do more to protect people at higher risk for food poisoning and make food safer for everyone. If you, or someone you make food for, are pregnant, 65 or older, or have a weakened immune system, you must be especially careful when selecting, preparing, and storing foods.

- Know your risk of food poisoning.
- Select, prepare, and store food safely.
- Follow the safe food guidelines Clean, Separate, Cook, Chill at www. FoodSafety.gov
- Learn more about how to prevent food poisoning and outbreaks.

Listeria is challenging because:

- When someone eats food contaminated with *Listeria*, sickness or miscarriage may not occur until weeks later when it is difficult to identify which food was the source.
- Listeria can contaminate many foods that we don't usually cook, like deli meats, cheeses and sprouts.
- Some foods we might not suspect can be contaminated with *Listeria* and cause sickness and outbreaks, such as cantaloupe and celery.
- *Listeria* is a hardy germ that can even grow on foods that are refrigerated.
- *Listeria* can hide unnoticed in the equipment or appliances where food is prepared, including in factories and grocery stores.

We can prevent *Listeria* infections by

- Identifying outbreaks fast by using special laboratory tests and disease detectives
- Rapidly finding and removing contaminated food before people eat it.
- Using lessons from outbreaks, including environmental investigations, to make food safer.
- Applying new safety measures for food production, like those included in the Food Safety Modernization Act (FSMA), so that food doesn't get contaminated in the first place.
- Reducing *Listeria* contamination of ready-to-eat meat and poultry products by following USDA guidance.
- Having a robust public health system that provides the tools and resources needed to promote food safety.
- Learning more about which polices and practices work best.




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Nelson Retires as Sailing Masters Captain

Ted Nelson, Captain of the Sailing Masters of 1812 Fife and Drum Corps, announced his retirement at a board of directors meeting recently. Nelson joined the Corps in 1971 interested in being a bass drummer. He quickly became proficient in that instrument and shortly after began marching with the Corps.

In 1974 he became Captain, a tall, imposing figure, giving life and meaning to the role of sailing master. One could easily picture him on the foredeck of an 1800's sailing ship, calling out instructions to the crew manning the sails. Over his 38 years as Captain and leader, Ted participated in over 1,000 musters, parades and concerts from Boothbay Harbor, Maine, down the East Coast and over to Bermuda.

A resident of Centerbrook for some 52 years, Ted worked in Research at Pfizer in Brooklyn and Groton, for 38 years before retiring. He served in the United States Army from 1955-1957.

Mark Chiaramonte, President, said speaking for the Corps, "those of us who had the pleasure of marching with Ted knew him as a person who wanted us to always look and play our best no matter where we might be. He took time to see that uniforms were clean, that people knew how to play the music and marched with pride befitting the history and era of the Sailing Masters of the early 1800s. He taught us all a great deal; it was an honor to march with him and we will miss him at the head of the Corps".
