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The First Selectman's Corner

On April 9th Guilford residents will go to the polls to vote on the 2019-2020 budget. The Board of Finance approved a budget totaling \$100,600,146, which represents a 3.22% spending increase over the current year and after providing for potential decreases in revenue from the state would result in a property tax increase of \$2,909,222 or 2.41%. Residents will also have the opportunity to vote on bonding packages from the Town and Board of Education. The Town's projects for the upcoming two years total \$3.5 million for vehicles, equipment and town facilities improvements. The Board of Education's bonding package is for one year totaling \$3.0 million and includes HVAC improvements at Cox and window replacement at Melissa Jones.

For fiscal year 2017-2018, the Town received a clean audit for its financial reporting, which is reflective of the hard work and efficient fiscal management of our finance department.

As a result of successful mediation, the synthetic turf field at the high school, which failed last year, will be repaired at no cost to the Town. Although the town cannot be reimbursed for legal fees or the independent consultant that was hired, those costs ensured that town interests were protected throughout the process. The goal is to have the field fully useable by the fall.

The Town of Guilford is applying for a Small Cities Community

Development Block Grant for Housing Diversion funding. The total amount of this grant is \$350,000. If successful the money will allow our Regional Coordinated Access Network (CAN), of which Guilford is a part, to hire additional staff along the shoreline to continue its mission of helping individuals and families threatened

by homelessness. The purpose of CAN is to intervene and assist when people are experiencing a housing crisis and find possible shelter solutions for them so they avoid homelessness.

The Board of Selectmen has updated and enacted several ordinances over the past few months. A new ordinance titled Illicit Connections and Illegal Discharges to Municipal Storm Drainage Systems was established to comply with Connecticut DEEP MS4 Permit requirements. This ordinance protects and improves water quality by providing legal authority to prohibit and eliminate illicit discharges, to find the source of those discharges and to conduct ongoing screening to prevent them from happening in the future. The Floodplain Management Ordinance was updated continued on page 3

to make it consistent with current state building code. The new update requires a one foot freeboard in all Special Flood Hazard Areas and requires Coastal AE zone structures to meet VE zone construction requirements. This update also increases the timeframe used to determine substantial improvements from one year to five years. The selectmen revised the Solid Waste and Recycling Ordinance to make it consistent with Connecticut General Statutes, which includes provisions regarding commercial collectors, annual registration and reporting requirements as well as the adoption of the municipal citation and hearing processes.

The Sustainable Guilford Task Force has been diligently working on its charge to have Guilford declared a Certified Sustainable Community under the Sustainable Connecticut Program. This is a comprehensive, statewide, action-oriented voluntary certification program, built by and for municipalities with the vision that Sustainable CT communities strive to be thriving, resilient, collaborative and forward-looking. They equitably promote the health and well-being of current and future residents. And they respect the finite capacity of the natural environment. In addition, this task force has also been charged with research and education surrounding a possible ordinance banning the use of single use plastic checkout bags in town. A public information meeting/forum about this topic took place last month.


The Town issued and received responses to a Request for Qualifications for Engineering and Design Services for the Route 77 Pedestrian Safety Improvement Project. This project proposes to connect Adams Middle School to the Guilford Arts Center, Guilford Racquet and Swim Club and the Town Public Safety Complex by constructing a sidewalk along Route 77 from Adams through the I-95 interchange at Exit 58. The bulk of funding for this project would come from the Alternate Transportation Grant the town previously received for the Nut Plains Pathway project, but is now being repurposed for this project.

Lastly, the Board of Selectmen enacted an ordinance establishing a Human Rights Commission. The purpose of the commission is to promote mutual understanding and respect within the Town of Guilford among all racial, religious, ethnic, and other groups, and among individuals of differing genders, sexual orientations, ages, and abilities, in a manner not inconsistent with state and federal statutes. The commission will meet its objectives by performing education and outreach to individuals and businesses throughout the community.

Elderly tax relief applications will be taken in the Assessor's Office, between February 1st and May 15th during the hours of 9:00 am and 4:00 pm, Monday through Friday. If you are unable to come in, an agent of your choice may file on your behalf. Please bring all proofs of income for both spouses (for the year 2018), including (but not limited to) your Federal Income Tax Return (if you file or will file), your Social Security (SSA-1099 Form) annual statements, statements of pension, interest or dividends, etc. All information must be in English and U.S. dollars.

HOMEOWNERS PROGRAM, A.K.A. CIRCUIT BREAKER (STATE PROGRAM)

Under this program, the State of Connecticut pays a portion of your tax bill ranging from \$150 to \$1,250. There is no requirement to re-pay the state.

The basic requirements are as follows:

1. The homeowner must be at least 65 years of age as of last December 31st or was receiving 100% disability benefits from Social Security as of that date;

- 2. The homeowner must have lived in Connecticut for at least one year:
- 3. The homeowner must not be receiving tax relief from any other town or state;
- 4. The homeowner must occupy the property as his/her principal residence; and
- 5. The homeowner must have income (including Social Security) of not more than \$36,000 for a single individual or \$43,900 for a married couple.

TAX DEFERRAL, A.K.A. GSTRP (TOWN PROGRAM)

This program allows you to "defer" up to 75% of your taxes (depending upon income) until either the property is transferred or at the time of your death (at which time the taxes must be repaid with interest). The deferred taxes constitute a lien on your property.

The basic requirements are as follows:

- 1. The homeowner must be at least 65 years of age as of last December 31st or was receiving 100% disability benefits from social security as of that date;
- 2. The homeowner must have lived in Connecticut for at least one year;

- 3. The homeowner must not be receiving tax relief from any other town or state;
- 4. The homeowner must occupy the property as their principal residence; and
- 5. The homeowner must have income (including social security) of not more than \$38,000 for a single individual or \$45,900 for a married couple.

ELDERLY TAX RELIEF PROGRAM, A.K.A. ETRP (TOWN PROGRAM)

Under this program, the Town attempts to "freeze" your taxes subject to budgetary restrictions and the requirements of the enabling ordinance.

The basic requirements are as follows:

- 1. The homeowner must be at least 65 years of age as of last December 31st or was receiving 100% disability benefits from Social Security as of that date;
- 2. The homeowner must have lived in Guilford for at least one year;

- 3. The homeowner must occupy the property as their principal residence:
- 4. The homeowner, if eligible, must be on the State Program known as Circuit Breaker (see page 4);
- 5. The homeowner must not owe any taxes (including motor vehicles);
- 6. The homeowner must not be receiving tax relief from any other town or state:
- 7. The homeowner cannot be on both the town's tax deferral and this program; and
- 8. The homeowner's income is based upon residency (as follows):

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

The Registrars of Voters are in the process of conducting an annual canvass of our registered voters. All voters with an active forwarding address order on file with the US Postal Service will be targeted to receive canvass letters from our office. Additionally, voters for whom we have received information that they no longer reside in Guilford will also receive canvass letters.

Also, those individuals who have not voted in the last four years will be getting a letter, just to make sure you still live in Guilford! Please return these letters to us (using the enclosed prepaid return address envelope). If you do not indicate that you still remain in Guilford, we will start the process of removing you from our voter registry. The first step in that process is to put you into 'inactive' status.

She set up a re-filling station for certain products to not only allow for better pricing but also the reuse of the amber glass containers. It is a clean air salon. There are no candles, no incense.

"Our planet is so beautiful. But our world is in big trouble and a huge part of it is us," explains Robyn. Environmental stewardship is core to Robyn's life. She and her husband are vegan, avid composters, and recyclers. With the studio, she can incorporate her well-organized/environmentally conscious lifestyle into her work. She is happy to share knowledge about leading a sustainable life with her clients. "I bring a lot

of my own life into here," she notes.
"People are interested in what they can do. It's a way of spreading the word. There's a big problem, a bigger picture. It's bigger than my business. It goes beyond that now with the way our world is changing."



The CT native recently celebrated her 20th year as a licensed hairdresser in her newly refurbished and recently opened (Nov. 6) salon. The "just off the Town Green" studio is charming, tasteful and welcoming - which is just what Robyn wanted. "People are welcome here and I want them to feel welcome here," she says. "I love what I do. I love everyone who comes in here."

They provide goods, services, employment opportunities and more for all residents and visitors. In collaboration with our Shoreline Chamber of Commerce, we are proud to promote "Be Loyal to Local." That is, we hope all will try to support our local businesses at every opportunity. It is not automatic because they work hard every day to earn our trust and business. And, our local businesses are very generous when it comes to supporting so many events in our community. They often donate raffle items, gift cards, cash, and many forms of sponsorship to school programs, sporting teams, churches, non-profits and more. Being Loyal to Local is certainly a two way street.

Several new small businesses opened in Guilford, including; Water Street Jewelers, a full service retailer of fine jewelry, including repair services, and is located at 23 Water Street. Stony Creek Granite - Statue of Liberty Museum

On the 16th of May 2019 an official ribbon cutting ceremony will take place on Liberty Island in New York Harbor. The National Park Service will open a new multi-million dollar museum.

The 26,000 square-foot site was constructed by the Statue of Liberty - Ellis Island Foundation, a non-profit organization, which has raised \$100 million in private funds for the project. Designed by FX Collaborative, it contains massive amounts of Stony Creek Granite.

The beautiful pink granite which exists from Guilford Point to Branford Harbor has recently been designated with the Trademark name, Stony Creek Granite.

The granite for the pedestal upon which the statue stands was quarried, fabricated and shipped from John Beatties Leete's Island Quarry. That quarry shut down in 1918 and all subsequent projects at the statue such as sea walls, enlarged abutments, repairs and now the museum, which needed granite, called upon the Stony Creek Quarry to provide it.

Spring is Finally Here!

It's April, and the landscape is awakening. Lawns are brightening, and the emerging leaves of trees and shrubs are a special fresh shade of green. Bulbs and perennial plants are sprouting out of their winter dormancy. As exciting as it is to see the daily changes, it's easy to feel overwhelmed by the thoughts of maintenance. Take a few minutes to walk through your outdoor living spaces. Take some photos and make some notes about what you see, and what you envision. Having a simple plan can help you prioritize tasks, save maintenance and planting time, and allow you more hours to relax and enjoy your yard.

Repairing winter damage should be the first item on your list. Snow plow damage needs to be raked out and levelled. Soil may need to be added to fill ruts, and fresh seed should be planted. The area under

your bird feeder should be raked clean of seed hulls and debris. Broken branches on trees and shrubs should be removed, and corrective pruning can be done now. If not already done, the dead stems of perennials should also be cut at this time, allowing space and light for this year's shoots.

Next comes the fun of planting! April is still early for many of the annual flowers, but perennials, trees, shrubs, pansies and early vegetables can readily be planted. Again, a plan of what you envision will help streamline the time spent selecting and planting. If you haven't already started, consider planting some native plants in your landscape. They are adapted to our Connecticut climate, and support pollinators and wildlife.

Don't forget to include mixed planters as

Guilford Preservation Alliance - Guilford & World War I

During WWI, the U.S. supplied major contributions of raw material, money, and mobilized over 4 million military personnel. Offensive weapons of mass destruction and defensive strategies and tactics, unlike anything seen in previous wars, were developed. Tanks were built and used in response to the stalemate of trench warfare. Modernized submarines armed with torpedoes and deck guns were used. Giant zeppelins and airplanes were used for surveillance, bombing raids, and aerial dogfight combat. Poisonous gas killed thousands before gas masks were distributed. Flamethrowers, machine guns, field artillery, and skin burning mustard gas unleashed horrific results.

Local boards were established to register men. Some of those in Guilford who were too old or too young to enlist joined the Home Guard. Women were also allowed to enlist and serve in the Navy and as nurses. Some of the men who served were wounded and gassed, many whose lives were never the same.

DURING THE FIRST WORLD WAR, GUILFORD LOST SEVERAL YOUNG MEN

Burton M. Lee, born 2 Dec 1892, the son of J. Wilson Lee and Edith E. Morse (321 Boston Street), enlisted in the U.S. Navy. He died from blood poisoning and pneumonia at the age of 25.

Frank H. Bishop, born 22 Oct 1895, the son of Frank Bishop and Sophia Spencer (77 Broad Street). enlisted in the Signal Corps serving in the Aero Squadrons. He died from pneumonia while at Blois, France, at the age of 22.

Charles W. Darrow, born 6 Jul 1898, served in Co. D, 102nd Regiment. On 20 Apr 1918, he was killed when 3,200 German stormtroopers attacked Seicheprey, France. The American Legion post, here in Guilford, is named in his honor.

Herbert H. Hall, born 20 Apr 1897, the son of Herbert Hall and Florence Hamilton of North Guilford, enlisted in Co. D, 102nd Infantry. On his 21st birthday, he was captured at the Battle of

Seicheprey. A prisoner for 5 ½ months, he died from influenza 4 Oct 1918 at Bengal, Germany.

Harold C. Davis, born Jan 1899, the son of Wilbur and Amy Davis, served in Co. F, 102nd Regiment. He died from wounds while at Vosge, France, 15 Aug 1918, at the age of 19.

Many other Guilford men and women continued to serve until the armistice was signed ending the war on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month, in 1918.

John J. Sullivan, who served with 6 others from Guilford in the 103rd Field Artillery, wrote in his diary that day: "Germany Surrendered at 5:00 am. We got word at 8:00 am. Guns fired until 11:00 am. Then the WHOLE front stopped. Big time in evening."

In Guilford, 10-year-old Phil Dudley recorded: "When I woke up, I heard the whistles blowing."

Later that evening, the hundreds gathered on the green, sang the Star Spangled Banner and the National Anthem, lit a big bonfire in the middle of the green, set off firecrackers, and dedicated the Honor Roll. From speeches read by Tracy Tomaselli on the Guilford Green, Memorial Day, May 28, 2018 and Veteran's Day, November 11, 2018.

EARLY GUILFORD DAYS

This program will be held May 16, 17, 20, 21 this year. Wait, what are Early Guilford Days? This is a program which grew from the ideas of a group of Guilford women who wanted to be sure Guilford colonial history was taught in the schools. Rebecca Light, a 4th grade teacher at Cox school, Sarah McCulloch and Priscilla Norton, both GPA members organized an initial educational event which took 4th grade students to visit the Hyland House Museum to increase their understanding of colonial history.

This was such a successful outing that it led to the development of a program for all 4th grade students in town and was broadened to include the Griswold House as part of the educational experience. 2019 marks the anniversary of over 20 years this program has been part of the school curriculum. Students participate in early colonial

workshop experiences from hearth cooking to basket making and herbal remedies heightening their awareness of colonial Guilford history. From the beginning the GPA has supported Early Guilford Days with an annual grant.

Second Annual Big Sleep Out to Raise Awareness of Homelessness



On Saturday, April 27, the Guilford Town Green will again host The Big Sleep Out, an event that focuses attention on homelessness and raises funds for Columbus House. Since 1982

Columbus House has served people in the New Haven area who are homeless, or at risk of becoming homeless, by providing them with shelter and housing and encouraging their personal growth and self-reliance.

The moving force behind the event is Ella Stanley, a junior at Guilford High School, who brought the first Big Sleep Out to Guilford in 2018. Reflecting upon its success, Stanley stated, "Last year the support of the community was amazing! We were able to have a successful event that brought participants together for a great cause and raised a tremendous amount of money [more than \$6,000] for Columbus house."

"But more importantly, I think, was that we were able to take this idea of homelessness that carries such a stereotype and redefine it. That these are people not so different from us, just people who happen to be homeless. When participants talked with speakers who were homeless, lived a day in a person's shoes during the simulation game, or slept outside for the entire night, they gained a deeper understanding and compassion for what homelessness is."

Stanley continued, "This year we want to get even more people from our community to join us and partici-pate in the sleep out. My hope is that the more people we reach, the further this message will spread."

Sleep outs, such as the one organized by Stanley, draw attention to the problem, and are gaining greater momentum in the United States. They are better known in other parts of the world, especially the UK and Australia, where the Down Under country has hosted them for three decades.

Stanley is inviting all Guilford residents, their families and friends to join her on the Green to experience a night outdoors. A sleep-out center will be located in the middle of the Green, and security will be provided during sleeping hours. St. George Church will set

up a soup kitchen in the hall, where meals similar to those offered at Columbus House will be served.

Some of the activities planned are a panel of speakers relating their experiences with homelessness; an interactive online simulation game in which people make decisions as if they were living on the brink of homelessness; a cardboard shelter-making competition (more fun than education), a quilt workshop where participants create squares for a quilt that travels to various Guilford locations; as well as a possible showing of movie The Soloist.

The last word... Presented by Forte's Market



A career that began in his family's kitchen continues in the family kitchen today. Whether preparing a lovely scallop or a veal chop with mashed potatoes, dinner is Jacques Pépin's "culmination of the day." The piano, he says, is the nickname for the stove. That makes Pépin a master muscian.

DESTINED FOR THE KITCHEN

Pépin's skills were honed early. Home was working in his parents' restaurant near Lyon, France. A Paris apprenticeship began in 1949 at the age of 13 (interestingly, Julia Child was working in Paris at the same time). His military service in France (1956-58) found him as the personal chef to 3 heads of state (including Charles De Gaulle) at a time when chefs toiled in anonymity. There was no such thing as a celebrity chef. If commanded to the dining room, things had gone awry. "Now, [being a chef], all of a sudden, you are a genius," he quips. "It is a very different world. I am lucky to be a part of it."

A year after coming to the US in 1958, he was working at New York's finest French restaurant, Le Pavillon. He turned down the position of chef to the Kennedy White House. He opted to develop food lines for Howard Johnson. It all worked out. A NY Times food editor connected Pépin with Helen McCully, a food industry icon. She introduced Pépin to then unknown Julia Child. The delightful cooking duo went on to win a daytime television Emmy Award in 2001. Yes, the friends would often argue. "On the whole we agreed on what was important," he recalls. "Quality, simplicity."

"Extraordinary," he reminisces. "Nothing was planned. I am very existentialist that way. You do something and it projects you somewhere else. You do that and it projects you elsewhere." One thing has always led to another for Pépin. Trips to the Catskills in the early 1960s led to his catching the "painting bug." His paintings are now a new business line. This June, his

works will be on display at the Guilford Art Center. At the Catskills, he became a ski instructor. And on those slopes he met his wife of 53 years, Gloria. He calls his daughter (Claudine) and granddaughter (Shorey) his greatest accomplishments. During the 1960s he also earned bachelor's and master's degrees from Columbia University.

A LIFE OF EVOLUTION

No life is without hardship. A 1974 car accident nearly claimed Pépin's life. He could no longer withstand the rigors of 7 days a week, 10-14 hours in the kitchen. His life transformed into "teaching, writing, and just cooking." Since 1975, he has written 30 books. He also became and remains a beloved fixture on television. He isn't a fan of today's harsh reality cooking shows. "You are asked to put a lot of yourself in your food. Love is a very important component. Yelling at you? There is no way you can teach with that approach... Cooking is interactive. You follow your taste. You taste and adjust. You taste and adjust."

At 83, he recognizes his own progression. "For many people in the country, I was known as the quintessential French chef... If you look at my books, there is the soup and cilantro with banana on one page, then the salad and fried chicken, and then the lobster roll. After half a century in the US, I am probably the quintessential American chef." Pépin's life/career has been profiled on the PBS series "American Masters." "I am probably the first cook to have an American Masters," he notes.

The Madison, CT resident continues to teach, paint, and enjoy life. Whether it is a game of boule, mushrooming, or walking his poodles along the beach, food still remains center stage. He is currently the Dean of Special Programs at the International Culinary Institute of New York and continues a 37- year teaching stint at Boston University. He performs countless cooking demonstrations across the country. In 2016, the Jacques Pepin Foundation was formed. His books/manuals of cooking techniques form the curriculum for soup kitchens from Boston to Seattle. The idea is to take what Pépin has created over so many decades to assist disenfranchised individuals - those who may be coming out of jail, are homeless, or are recovering from addictions.

JACQUES PÉPIN...NOT INVINCIBLE?

"Yes, yes," he relates. "One time. It was 30 years ago or more. It was in the early 70s, a 3-hour show with dancing and singing. I did a cheese soufflé." Pépin came on the stage two hours into the show to put the soufflé in the oven. There was no way of checking on the controls so he did not know the oven was set on self-cleaning mode. He went back on stage for the unveiling. "I have never seen anything so burned." He laughs heartily. "It was crust on the outside and still liquid on the inside... There was no recovery on that one. But it was the biggest standing ovation I ever had."

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


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
