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Tax Collector

A reminder to all Guilford Taxpayers, especially new homeowners, that taxes are due on July 1, 2016. If you own real estate, there are now taxes due. If you do not escrow your real estate taxes and have not received a tax bill, call or stop in the Tax Office. Failure to receive a tax bill does not invalidate the tax nor does it prevent interest charges from accumulating. We do not send bills for the second installment of real estate taxes that will be come due January 1, 2017.

If you no longer have the vehicle for which you are being taxed and did not transfer the registration to another vehicle please contact the Assessor's Office immediately at 203-453-8010. Please do not ignore the tax bill because you still may be responsible for all or part of the tax.

The Town has implemented an advanced online payment system which allows taxpayers to view an online replica of their paper bill (no fee to view). You can now "Go Paperless" with e-billing. Electronic check/ACH payments are accepted online as well as credit cards (there is a fee to make payments). To access the new system, go to www.ci.guilford.ct.us and click on "View or Pay Tax Bill".

Payments online or by mail are encouraged and will save a trip to the Town Hall and avoid standing in long lines. When making your payment by mail, be sure a check or money order in the exact amount accompanies the tax bill.

Mail all payments to the Tax Collector, 31 Park Street, Guilford, CT 06437. For your convenience, there will be a drop box located in front of Tax Office during regular hours.

The Tax Office is in the Town Hall and is open from 8:30 am - 4:30 pm daily, Monday through Friday, except Holidays.

Once a motor vehicle or personal property bill becomes delinquent a follow up notice will be sent out with interest added accordingly. If the tax bill is still not paid, the account will be turned over to American National Recovery Group for collection with added cost to the taxpayer.

If for some reason you are having financial difficulties and you cannot pay taxes in full, please call the Tax Collector, Deborah Milano, at 203-453-8016.





Assessor's Office

MOTOR VEHICLE TAX BILLS were mailed in June. If between October 2nd and August 31st if you sold or totaled your vehicle and did not replace it, or if you registered your car out of state, then you may, with the submission of acceptable proof, be eligible for a tax reduction for that motor vehicle tax bill.

PERSONAL PROPERTY DECLARATION FORMS will, as a courtesy, be mailed in September to all persons known to be conducting business in the Town of Guilford as of October 1, 2016. Said forms must be filed by November 1, 2016. If not penalties will be applied. Forms will also be available on-line on the Town's website under the Assessor's Office.

The following is an abbreviated look at some of the exemption programs that the Assessor's Office administers. Some programs are State Programs which means it is available in all towns. Some programs are Local Programs which means it is available in Guilford and only available in other Towns that have also passed an ordinance authorizing that particular program. If you think you might be eligible for any of these programs, please call the Assessor's Office, Monday through Friday, 9:00 am to 4:00 pm for more information. There is also additional information about these programs (and other important information) on the Town's website: www.ci.guilford.ct.us under Departments: Assessor's Office. Please note: Exemptions are always stated in assessment dollars. To calculate the actual tax savings, multiply the assessment exemption amount by the appropriate mill rate (e.g., the assessment exemption amount is \$1,000 and say the mill rate is 22.36 so the tax savings is \$22.36 or \$1,000 times 0.02236).

VETERANS (STATE PROGRAM) must have their honorable discharge papers (full copy DD-214: must contain Block #24) on file with the Town Clerk by September 30, 2016 in order to receive a \$3,000 assessment exemption on the October 1, 2016 Grand List. Once filed in Guilford, there is no need to re-file. Veterans moving into Guilford from another town must re-file their DD-214 in Guilford by September 30, 2016 to receive this exemption. Administratively, the exemption is applied to real estate, even if recorded in the spouses name only. If real estate is not owned, then it is applied to one's motor vehicle.

VETERANS (LOCAL PROGRAM) who qualify for the above-described program, may, depending upon income, qualify for an additional \$10,000 assessment exemption. Income, including Social Security, cannot exceed \$60,200 for a single individual and \$67,900 for a married couple. Applications must be filed no later than September 30, 2016.

VETERANS (STATE PROGRAM), who qualify for the Veterans State Program (described above), may qualify for an additional exemption depending upon income. The amount of the assessment exemption will vary. Income cannot exceed \$35,200 for a single individual or \$42,900 for a married couple. Applications must be filed no later than September 30, 2016.

DISABLED TAXPAYERS (STATE PROGRAM) must file their Award Letter (issued by the Social Security Administration) with the Assessor's Office by September 30, 2016 in order to receive a \$1,000 assessment exemption.

DISABLED TAXPAYERS (LOCAL PROGRAM), who qualify for the above-described program, may qualify for an additional \$1,000 assessment exemption depending upon income. Income cannot exceed \$35,200 for a single individual and \$42,900 for a married couple. Applications must be filed no later than September 30, 2016.

BLIND TAXPAYERS (STATE PROGRAM) must file a Certification of Legal Blindness (issued by the Board of Education and Services for the Blind, State of Connecticut, Wethersfield, CT) with the Assessor's Office by September 30, 2016 in order to receive a \$3,000 assessment exemption.

BLIND TAXPAYERS (LOCAL PROGRAM), who qualify for the above-described program, may qualify for an additional \$2,000 assessment exemption, depending upon income. Income cannot exceed \$35,200 for a single individual and \$42,900 for a married couple. Applications must be filed no later than September 30, 2016.

FARM AND OPEN SPACE (STATE PROGRAM) applications must be filed between September 1, 2016 and October 31, 2016.

FOREST LAND (STATE PROGRAM) applications must be filed no later than September 30, 2016.

FARM BUILDINGS (LOCAL PROGRAM) used exclusively for farming activities by farmers who are receiving an exemption for their farm equipment may be exempt. An application must be filed no later than October 31, 2016.

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Acupuncture for Animals

Acupuncture is a technique that has been used in veterinary medicine in China for at least 3000 years, and can be defined as the insertion of needles into the body. In the last 20 years, there has been significant scientific research on the subject of acupuncture, supporting the practice and proving that this aspect of physical medicine works, primarily through modulation of the nervous system. Needles are inserted into internationally recognized points that are typically near nerves, arteries and veins. These points are rich with neurologic influence, and send signals to the brain and spinal cord to modify pain response, encourage circulation and healing, and to reduce spasm.

Acupuncture is indicated for most maladies, but can be particularly effective for musculoskeletal problems (i.e. injury, arthritis, disk disease), nervous injury (i.e. paralysis), skin problems (i.e. allergies), gastrointestinal problems (i.e. constipation, nausea), and respiratory problems (i.e. asthma). Introducing acupuncture as a neuromodulatory technique can speed recovery and reduce reliance on drugs. It is a great option for dogs and cats who may not be surgical candidates for their condition, or adjunctively following surgery.



Summer Pet Care

As summer vastly approaches and school is letting out, many families and their pets will be spending plenty of time outdoors. Whether you'll be spending lazy days in your backyard with your pets or traveling with them it is important to make sure our loving family friends are protected and kept safe.

With warmer weather and temperatures climbing into the 80's, 90's and beyond our pets can be at great risk for a number of potential hazards and dangers that can affect our loved ones. Various parasites that can affect both dogs and cats are prevalent during the summer months. Intestinal parasites such as hookworms, roundworms, tapeworms and heart worms can be transmitted by mosquitos, fleas and ticks. They can enter our pets through oral ingestion or by bites through their skin and enter their blood stream. Owners can prevent intestinal parasites and heartworm infestation in their animals by using products such as Heartguard Plus, Interceptor or Sentinel. Owners can also prevent spread of disease by fleas and ticks by using such products as Frontline, Advantage and Nexgard. All of these products should be given once monthly throughout the summer and should be continued monthly throughout the year depending on the time of year.

One of the most important things for pet owner's to remember during the summer months that dogs and cats can easily overheat when exposed to higher temperatures. Warmer weather can make it increasingly for difficult for dogs and cats. Elderly, overweight and pets with short snouts and muzzles such as Boxers, Pugs, and Bulldogs can easily become overheated in higher temperatures and even suffer from heatstroke. Owners should walk their pets during the cooler parts of the day such as the early morning or late evenings, avoiding peak hours in the afternoon when animals are more likely to have adverse reactions from the sun.

hike it is important to always have plenty of water available as dogs will require more water to keep cool. Avoiding hot pavements is also essential to our pets as it can cause burns on the pads of their feet. Walking dogs on grass is recommended over pavement on very hot days. Keep dogs and cats indoors on extremely hot days where it is cool or air conditioned. Leaving dogs in the car even for a few

minutes or with the windows cracked open slightly can cause heatstroke and death. Temperatures in our car can exceed outside temperatures by 20 to 30 degrees Fahrenheit in as little as 10 minutes. Signs of heatstroke/exhaustion can include heavy panting, vomiting, thick drool, dry or bright red gums, wobbly legs/ataxia and diarrhea. Normal body temperatures for dogs are between 100 degrees to 103

degrees. Temperatures greater than 104 degrees can lead to heatstroke, seizures and death. If heat exhaustion occurs owners should avoid ice bathes as this can cause shock, rather owners should move the animal to a cool place and drape a damp towel over the body.

Economic Development Department

Time seems to pass by more quickly these days. Here we are, starting our 3rd Quarter and into our summer months. Summer is a great time in Guilford with so many activities and events happening around town. The town "expands" somewhat as many part-time residents return to Guilford along with the tourists who want to experience our many assets. Our businesses look forward to the summer as this influx of people contributes to their success and viability in town. Continue reading for a brief update on some of our economic development.

D'Vine Bistro – 25 Whitfield Street (formerly Whitfield's), opened for dinner during the past quarter. Effective June 1, they expanded their hours to include lunch service from Monday



through Saturday, 11:30 am to 4 pm, with dinner available after 4pm. On Sunday, they offer their dinner menu beginning at 1pm. Their rear patio is open for the season, weather permitting. Down the block, at 2 Water Street (former Color's Café), expect **Carson's on Whitfield** to open by August. Carson's will be open for lunch and dinner, and Sunday brunch. The interior is undergoing a total renovation with seating for 84 people. Co-Owner Jim Kirtopoulos indicated the cuisine will be an upscale American menu, with a nice size bar area, overlooking the wonderful Green. Right next door, the former Rituals Spa location has opened as **Distinctions Hair Studio Day and Med Spa.** By the time this issue is distributed, they should be in full operation following a "soft opening" during June. The location features many of the former massage therapists and a hair salon has been added. Owners Jennifer and Hector Alers realize many former Rituals customers had purchased gift certificates and they have indicated they would like to do something for those customers. They are requesting you bring in your former Rituals gift certificate and they will try to work out a mutually satisfactory solution. Additional retail locations are being added to Guilford Commons, including PetCo and Hair Cuttery. A new gas station and convenience store, Wave, has opened at the corner of Church Street and Rt. 1. Wave will be open 7 days per week from 5 am to 11 pm. On the recreation and training front, Batter Up! has opened at 1 Shoreline Drive-Unit 5 (off of Soundview Road). This location features indoor batting cages. For more information, call 203-533-7360 or www.BatterUpCt.com.

The majority of the Whitfield-Water Street Parking Project has been completed. If you have driven in the lot you will notice a new asphalt surface throughout, complete with striping, directional arrows and some new parking orientations. Sidewalks have been added to create store fronts for some of the businesses, while enhancing the pedestrian experience with a safer walking environment. Trash enclosures have been added in a couple of places, providing a consistent appearance while servicing this need. The center island has been landscaped and additional greenery and vegetation will be added by the business owners. The remaining major element is the installation of the light fixtures, which we are expecting to complete during July. The fixtures will be the same as

those on our town Green. Please use caution proceeding through the lot. Some of the vehicle traffic flow and pedestrian walkways have changed and we want all to remain safe. We want to thank our businesses and their customers for their patience and understanding while construction was underway. A special thank you is extended to State Representative Sean Scanlon for supporting the town of Guilford in our pursuit of the state grant of \$446,000, which covered the majority of the expenses associated with this project.

An RFQ/RFP has been issued by the town, focusing on parcels of land owned by the town, commonly referred to as the "Pages Lane" property. This parcel was acquired by the town during the early 70's with the expectation it might be needed for future septic disposal. It was also identified in the 2007 Town Center South Plan as a potential site for septic disposal, enabling redevelopment opportunities for surrounding parcels. A committee has been formed to evaluate the RFQ/RFP submittals and to interview

potential developers. A recommendation will be presented to the Board of Selectmen. Assuming the project continues forward, more detailed RFP's (Request for Proposal) will be solicited and evaluated. A town meeting will be held, assuming we are going to implement one of the proposals. Much is yet to be done, but the exploratory process has been initiated. The town has the right to reject any and all proposals should we feel none meet our intended objectives.

Numerous projects are on the drawing board and will be moving through the developmental processes during Q3 2016. Stay tuned, it is an exciting time in Guilford. Should you have any questions about these businesses or any other in town, do not hesitate to contact me.

You provide the conversation, we provide the coffee. The Guilford Police Department is hosting Coffee with a Cop at 2 locations in July and September. The idea behind Coffee with a Cop is to bring police officers and members of the community they serve together, to discuss issues and learn more about each other. Coffee and conversation with no agenda. Join us for Coffee with a Cop on July 7th from 9-11 am at the Guilford Community Center and again on September 6th at The Fresh Market from 9-11 am.

SCAMS

Unfortunately there are scams that target members of our community. Scams are a billion dollar industry and there are thousands of victims targeted daily for money or identity. Phone scams are the majority of the complaints we receive here in Guilford. Scammers will call the victim sometimes dozens of times. Each time the scammers call, they claim to be from a different company, have different numbers, and have more information about the victim. By the last call, the scammers will utilize all the information they have obtained and trick the victim into believing that they are a real organization, like a bank or credit card company. They may have the victim confirm facts about the account, and when the scammers are wrong, the victim corrects them with the right information.

Another type of phone scam is one that includes threats. The victim will pick up the phone and the scammer will state that they have a family member or friend in their custody and will not release them until the victim sends money. Sometimes the scammer claims the relative was in an accident and the scammer threatens to harm the relative if the money is not sent. Other times the scammer will claim that the relative is out of the country and broke a law. The scammer will indicate that the relative needs money to bond out of jail and does not want

other family members to know about it. The victims believe this situation to be real and pay the amount requested to free their family member. In general, the money is being sent out of the country and is rarely recoverable.

The IRS scam is very common. Scammer claims to be the IRS and indicate that the victim owes back taxes. The scammers will threaten the victim with arrest if the money is not paid immediately. Unfortunately, there are many people who pay and lose the money to an overseas scam. The IRS will not call you for back taxes. They will send you a certified letter with tax information if you owe back taxes. If you do receive a letter, call the number listed for the IRS online, not the one listed in the letter, in case the letter is also fraudulent.

Business phone scams are on the rise in Guilford. Scammers will call businesses and identify themselves as the electric company. They will tell the manager or owners that the bill has not been paid for the electricity and that they will be shutting off the electricity if the bill is not paid immediately. This has been a very effective scam and unfortunately, even local businesses have been scammed with this one. The electric company will not call or threaten to shut off power. They will send numerous letters prior to shut off so it is always worth the time to check your bill status.

A few things are important to note here. These scammers will request that you go purchase a card at a local store, a green dot card or pre-paid card. They will have you load that card with money so that it is not traceable out of your own bank account. They are smart, so it is important that we be smarter. Are you caring for a loved one with a cognitive disability, like autism, Alzheimer's, or Dementia, who tends to wander?

The Guilford Police Department participates in Project Lifesaver to help bring your loved ones home safely. The program is free of charge and provides a transmitter wristband or ankleband for the client. Each transmitter has its own radio frequency which is logged by our department. If your loved one should wander off, the caretaker calls us immediately and we respond with a receiver.

Both the

Shakespeare on the Shoreline


Shakespeare on the Shoreline presents The Two Gentlemen of Verona

Shoreline Arts Alliance celebrates its 15th year of bringing FREE Shakespeare on the Shoreline performances to the historic Guilford Green. This summer, in collaboration with Shakesperience Productions, Inc., Shoreline Arts Alliance will present Shakespeare's comedy The Two Gentlemen of Verona, August 3 – 7, 7:30 pm nightly.

In this early comedy Shakespeare cheerfully delves into love and friendship as two best friends fall for and have a falling out over the same woman. The story is centered on Proteus and Valentine. Valentine and Proteus are best friends, until they fall in love with the same girl. Having travelled to Milan in search of adventure, they both fall for the Duke's daughter Silvia. But Proteus is already sworn to his sweetheart, Julia, at home in Verona, and the Duke thinks Valentine is not good enough for his Silvia, who is betrothed to Thurio. With the friendship severed, the rivals' affections quickly get out of hand and the four young lovers find themselves on a wild chase through the woods, confused by mistaken identity and threatened by fierce outlaws before they ultimately find a path to reconciliation and forgiveness. It is a love triangle with twists, disguises, and a pair of hilarious servants named Speed and Launce who provide elements of comic relief throughout the play. A precursor to Shakespeare's later great comedies (this is the first of the Bard's plays to feature a woman disguised as a man), the seeds of Shakespeare's developing genius are on full display in this farcical romp.

Though written more than 400 years ago audiences will identify with its young characters and their search for identity and love. It's a play about the impulsive nature of youth, the consequences of daring choices, and lessons learned about loyalty and love. The characters are very young and everything that happens to them



is deeply serious. Yet this is where much of the humor lies. 

Mosquitoes - Using Repellents

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Updated information regarding insect repellents (from the CDC)

WHAT IS DEET?

The chemical DEET - N,N-diethyl-meta-toluamide - is the most widely used insect repellent in the country. It can reduce the risk of mosquito and tick bites, but products containing DEET must be used properly.

HOW SHOULD REPELLENTS CONTAINING DEET BE USED?

Read and follow the instructions on the label.

Avoid over-application. Products with 10% to 35% DEET will provide adequate mosquito protection under most conditions - concentrations should be based on the duration of protection needed (e.g. for 1-2 hours use <10%, for 2-5 hours use 20%); For protection against tick bites, at least 20% is necessary. Use just enough repellent to cover exposed skin and/or clothing. After returning indoors, wash treated skin with soap and water. Wash treated clothing before wearing again.

Do not spray directly on face, spray into hands and then apply to face.

Do not apply over cuts, wounds, or irritated skin.

Do not use under clothing.

Do not spray DEET-containing products in enclosed areas. Is DEET safe to be used on children?

Use caution when using repellents containing DEET on children. According to the American Academy of Pediatrics, repellents with up to 30% DEET can be used on children over 2 months of age. Dress children in long sleeves and pants and, when possible, apply repellent to clothing rather than skin.

Do not apply on hands or near eyes and mouth of young children. Do not allow children to apply repellents themselves.

After returning indoors, wash any treated skin with soap and water.

WILL USING REPELLENTS CONTAINING DEET AFFECT MY HEALTH?

DEET has been used for more than 40 years by millions of people worldwide. Products containing DEET have been occasionally associated with some health problems such as skin reactions, including rash, swelling, itching, and eye irritation. In very rare circumstances, slurred speech, confusion and seizures have been associated with the use of DEET, particularly in children. The risk of experiencing any adverse health effects is reduced when products containing DEET are used according to label instructions.

WHAT SHOULD I DO IF I HAVE MEDICAL QUESTIONS ABOUT DEET?

If you suspect that you or your child are reacting to an insect repellent, discontinue use, wash treated skin, and call your physician.

If you feel that it is an emergency, call 911 or your local emergency service. If you go to a doctor or hospital, take the repellent with you. You and your doctor can get specific medical information about the active ingredients in repellents and other pesticides by calling:

National Pesticide Telecommunications Network (NPTN) at 1-800-858-7378 from 9:30 a.m. to 7:30 p.m. (Eastern Time) seven days a week or visit NPTN's website at http://ace.orst.edu/info/nptn/

Information can also be obtained from the Connecticut Poison Control Center, 24-hours a day, 7 days a week at 1-800-222-1222.

CAN I USE A REPELLENT THAT DOES NOT CONTAIN DEET?

Registered products that provide repellent activity sufficient to help people avoid the bites of disease carrying mosquitoes include Picaridin, Oil of Lemon Eucalyptus and IR3535.

WHAT IS PERMETHRIN?

Permethrin is an insecticide and repellent that can be used on clothing or camping equipment to reduce the risk of mosquito or tick bites. It can be used in addition to DEET as extra protection when the risk of exposure is high and other protective measures may not be sufficient. It should not be applied to skin.

If you find it necessary to use a permethrin-containing product on your clothing, the following recommendations for proper use will minimize the risk of adverse reactions:

TREAT CLOTHING ONLY-DO NOT APPLY TO SKIN. If you accidentally get the product on your skin immediately wash with soap and water. Apply to clothing in a well ventilated outdoor area, protected from the wind. Only spray permethrin-containing products on the outer surface of clothing and shoes before you put them on - do not apply to clothing while it is being worn. Only spray enough product to lightly moisten the outer surface of the fabric causing a slight color change or darkening; do not saturate clothing. Read the application instructions carefully and do not exceed recommended spraying times. Pay special attention while treating socks, trouser cuffs, and shirt cuffs to ensure complete coverage. Hang the treated clothing outdoors and allow to dry for at least 2 hours (4 hours under humid conditions) before wearing. Do not treat clothing more than once every two weeks. Launder treated clothing, separately from other clothing, at least once before retreating. Permethrin treated clothing can remain effective for 2 weeks or more. Treated clothing should only be worn when needed and then placed in a separate bag when not in use.

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


Guilford Dog Park

Time to Raise the Bar & Reduce Our Waste

A longstanding group of environmentally minded citizens is rising up in Guilford, proud of helping eliminate Styrofoam from the Guilford Public Schools and poised to help the town with the much-admired Green lead the way to a greener Connecticut.

The number one objective? Inspire individuals to create less waste. Limit use of single-use plastics, not just the bags. Avoid products with unnecessary packaging. Whenever possible, repurpose or donate unwanted items. As a community bounding the Long Island Sound, we carry a special burden to safeguard the ecology of our shoreline vistas.

Educating about proper recycling is vital. State mandate requires we sort our trash, but it's our responsibility to know what goes where (see chart at directional tk).

Follow the town's lead and make sure a recycling bin is placed next to the trash can in your workplace, church, and home.

How green is your Guilford? In a town where haulers collect "single-stream recycling" (mixed plastics #1-7, paper, cardboard, glass, metal) curbside and the transfer station takes recyclables at no charge, our weekly trash output should be a fraction of our recycling.

Know what's accepted at the transfer station and the stump dump.

By reducing our waste and upping our recycling game together, we paint ourselves as a town to be admired for being green.

Next up? A bid to make Guilford an even greater example.

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

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


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
