

As I write this update for Old Lyme Events, several weeks before you are reading it, I can report that the winter has been good to us - so far! While we have had some cold snaps that gave us single digit temps, they have been short-lived, with no significant snow. Of course, we have had a lot of rain, which is unusual for the season, but residents seem to prefer that to the snow (except of course, those looking for the winter sports requiring snow!). The mild weather is certainly kind to our budget, but as we all know, winter is not over yet!

On Monday, January 28th, the Annual Town Business Meeting was held, and the Annual Report for FY 2018 was distributed. This year's report booklet is quite impressive. The cover photos, by Kathleen Demeo, were simply stunning, and they remind us all why we love our town so much. Special thanks to Kathleen for allowing the use of her photos, and to Michele Dickey, who works so hard to bring together all the components of the report. Chairman of the Board of Finance, Andy Russell, summarized the report, and it was unanimously accepted. You can get your copy of the Annual Report for FY 2018 at Town Hall. Unfortunately, due to a scheduling conflict, the Board of Selectmen did not announce their Citizen of the Year – but this will happen at a future town meeting, so stay tuned for more to come! Those in attendance went on to approve an appropriation of \$46,000 for technology upgrades needed to accommodate a conversion of the Assessors

software, as well as increased cyber-security for the town. They also approved a resolution authorizing the Town to borrow up to \$1.25 million for the PGN Library renovations. Finally, Dave Evers was elected to serve on the Board of Assessment Appeals, and just in time, as we are just beginning a statistical revaluation this year!

We are pleased to report that a contract has been signed with CWPM Waste Removal and Recycling Services to provide collection services for trash and recycling beginning July 1, 2019. Special thanks to Selectman Chris Kerr, Board of Finance member David Kelsey and our current provider, Gary Yuknat for their hard work in developing an RFP, reviewing the bids received and their input on the contract that was signed. The big news is that ALL RESIDENTS will now have weekly pickup of both trash AND recycling, beginning July 1, 2019. It is important to note that in the past, beach areas had trash pickup twice weekly from Memorial Day to Labor Day, but that will no longer be the case. Trash pickup for the entire town will be once weekly throughout the year. Residents should continued on page 3

also be aware that the State of CT is pushing hard for compliance on recycling, and we have gotten several notices from our recycling vendor, Willimantic Waste, pointing out that there are contaminants in the recycling waste they receive from our town. This translates into increased cost to the town, resulting in increased taxes. You may have seen our efforts in the Events Magazines', News and Announcements, and even in the most recent Annual Report to remind our residents on "What's In, What's Out." This is the official list from the State of CT, and their graphic provides an easy reference for everyone about recycling and WHAT to recycle. Please post this handout for all in your family to see, and remind everyone that recycling materials are to be clean. We appreciate your efforts on this behalf, and are sure that you will appreciate the savings in cost!

The Halls Road Improvements Committee continues to work with Yale Urban Design Workshop on draft plans for improvements to Halls Road in an effort to make it more walkable, supportive of businesses, and connected to our Lyme Street and Arts areas. The Committee had a public information meeting on December 6th with the Yale Urban Design Workshop, where they presented some conceptual designs on components of a plan. The original plan was to encourage groups in attendance to work together to provide feedback on specific components, but it ended up being a great community conversation, with questions from the audience and responses from YUDW and the Committee. The workshop was well attended, considering the holidays, and the committee has since discussed many of the questions and comments received. A Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ) document was just published in an effort to clarify the mission, vision and timeline of the committee, as well as some details about the role of the town in the future of Halls Road. There will be additional public meetings in the future, as public input is essential to the success of a plan yet to be finalized. The FAQ document can be found on the town website at: www.oldlyme-ct.gov.

Speaking of the website, our host, Virtual Towns & Schools, has a new platform, and we will be moving to a custom website this spring. With special thanks to our IT committee, we are working closely with our representative to develop a more user friendly website. There will be advantages to Boards and Commissions when posting information, and we believe that it will be much easier for the public to navigate and search. While the current website has served its purpose over the years, we often get suggestions and requests to make navigation easier, and we hope that everyone will enjoy the upcoming improvements. We expect to be live in late spring, if not sooner.

As you may recall, Heritage Consultants of Newington, CT have been working on the Historic Resource Inventory Survey, continued on page 4

which is being funded by a grant from the State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO). The survey is virtually complete, and the committee is now reviewing the final draft. The survey includes about 200 homes and we expect to make it available to the public in the near future. Stay tuned for more information on the survey.

As reported in the last issue of Old Lyme Events, the Town of Old Lyme has received two grants for infrastructure improvements -\$427,400 for the replacement of the Mile Creek Road Bridge over the Blackhall River, and \$348,838 for the replacement of the Grassy Hill Road Bridge over an unnamed brook. Our budget over the last two years has included some funding for the Mile Creek Road Bridge, so our 50% of that has already been allocated. And, Nathan L. Jacobson and Associates (NLJA) has been working on the design of the bridge for nearly two years, and we are just about ready to go out to bid for the construction. That will mean that this summer, the bridge will be closed, and there will be a detour for about 3-4 months, beginning in late June or early July. Of course, we will be keeping all residents posted on the bridge closure through News and Announcements, so be sure to subscribe to our web page if you have not already done so. We anticipate the actual construction on the Grassy Hill Road Bridge is likely going to be the spring or summer of 2021, as we will just begin the design phase in the next fiscal year. The Town of Old Lyme has already issued an RFQ

for qualified engineers, and will be making our selection this spring. Funding for the design will be in next year's budget with actual construction in following years. One thing is for certain bridges are costly, and we are very lucky to have the grants to defray the cost and keep our budget reasonable.

Another grant that is allowing us to complete infrastructure improvements is the Connectivity Grant for \$400,000, allowing us to complete the sidewalks on Hartford Ave. from Bocce Lane to Rte. 156 on the west side. A committee is now being formed to begin working with engineers to develop the design plans. Once meetings of the committee begin, we will have a better idea of the timeline. Thanks to Selectwoman Mary Jo Nosal who agreed to be the lead on this project, as she had so much experience with the Sound View Improvements Project, which was also funded by a grant and came in well under budget.

Once again, the Town of Old Lyme will take part in the Sustainable CT effort through the Connecticut Conference of Municipalities (CCM). We have a great team of individuals who have agreed to work on this initiative in an effort to get certification for the Town of Old Lyme as a Sustainable Town. This involves both acknowledgement of past efforts (such as installation of LED lights, and our efforts on Open Space), and planning for future efforts (such continued on page 6

Some dates to remember: The Board of Finance will be meeting each Tuesday night through February and March to develop the budget for FY 2020, and have scheduled a public hearing on Monday, April 15, 2019, with a vote on the budget scheduled for Monday, May 20, 2019. As Easter falls late this year, Town Hall will be closed on Friday, April 19th for Good Friday, and Monday,

May 27th for Memorial Day. It is exciting to look forward to the warmth of spring!

Assessor's Office

The Assessors Office reminds residents of Elderly Homeowners & Totally Disabled and Additional Veterans tax relief availability. Elderly & Totally Disabled Tax Relief for Homeowners is available from February 1 through May 15th. An additional Veterans Exemption is also available for those who qualify for the above. To qualify, recipients must have reached the age of 65 or older by Dec 31st of the previous year (one spouse if married) or be totally disabled. Eligibility is based on qualifying income requirements as set by the State of Connecticut. The 2018 income limits are \$36,000 for a single applicant and \$43,900 for a married couple. Applicants may not be receiving federal, state, county or municipal financial subsidy or aid. These filings are done every 2 years or if your income has changed significantly. If you are already in the program you will receive a reminder letter if it is your application year. Please call if you have any questions regarding this program. SUGGESTIONS TO REDUCE - REUSE - RECYCLE



"Reduce, Reuse, Recycle," has become increasingly vital for the Town of Old Lyme, as well as for the rest of the world. See: https://www.nationalgeo graphic.com/magazine/2018/06/plastic-planet-waste-polltion-trash-crisis/. Also learn how from

the Old Lyme Conservation Commission at: http://www.oldlyme-ct.gov/Pages/OldLymeCT_Bcomm/conservation. For many years, China has accepted reusable plastics. But that is no longer true. We must be intelligent about what - and how we Reduce, Reuse, and Recycle. For Old Lyme residents, this translates to "proper" recycling, meaning curbside recycling... and that means what to put into your GREEN bins.

Earlier issues of Old Lyme Events Quarterly Magazine have included this helpful page to the right, "What's In, What's Out" to visually communicate what is acceptable curbside recycling. Many materials are recyclable, but not all are curbside recyclable.

Here are some suggestions:

REDUCE... your electrical consumption through Eversource. Contact Eversource and arrange an on-site evaluation of your power consumption: 877-602-7283 or https://www.energizect.com/your-home/solutions-list/home-energy-solutions-core-services.

REUSE... even your ragged clothing into select bins throughout central Old Lyme to produce rags or recyclable fibers. Planet Aid explains their approach: http://www.planetaid.org/what-we-do/for-the-environment/what-happens-to-your-used-clothing.

DONATE... and get a receipt usable against your annual tax payment. Big Brothers/Big Sisters will pick up; intake for the annual White Elephant Sale of First Congregational Church begins at the end of June. Sell or give your books to the Book Barn, Niantic. Supply the Soup Kitchen at the Congregational Church with your plastic bags.



NEW INFO!

The Town of Old Lyme reminds everyone that we must improve our recycling efforts. Please visit the trash and recycling tab on either the town website at: www.oldlyme-ct.gov or the State's at: www.recyclect.com to find out how to recycle or dispose of any item. The town is working to provide easily accessible and current information. Printed information is also available in the Selectman's Office at the Memorial Town Hall, 52 Lyme Street, and at the Landfill/Transfer Station on Four Mile River Road. Please phone Michele Hayes at: 860-434-1605, ext. 212 with any additional questions you may have.

CURBSIDE TRASH AND RECYCLING:

Trash (Blue container) collection is every week. Mixed Recycling (Green container) is currently every other week. Anything in the green container should be reasonably clean. When in doubt, keep it out! We pay additional fees and fines for contaminated recycling.

Please have containers out at curbside by 6:00 am on your assigned day. Containers should be three feet away from any other objects, such as mailboxes, cars, other containers, planters, etc. Please do not block a breakdown/emergency lane with receptacle. Clearly mark your address on recycling and trash receptacles to avoid mix up, removal or displacement of cans.

If you miss your scheduled pick-up, you can bring your trash or recycling to the Transfer Station on Four Mile River Road.

MIXED RECYCLING GUIDELINES

(curbside collection & transfer station)

All items should be empty, rinsed, and clean. Do not shred, box, bag, or bundle.

What's IN? Paper (not shredded), food and beverage cartons (milk, juice, broth, etc.), junk mail, newspapers, magazines, pizza boxes (a little grease ok), cardboard, glass beverage and food bottles and jars, metal cans and lids, food grade aerosol cans like whip cream (not sunscreen, cleaners, etc.), clean aluminum foil, foil containers, plastic bottles (with or without caps attached) plastic tubs and lids, plastic one-use cups (no lids, no straws).

What's Out? Gift wrap, tissue paper, gift bags (reuse!), shredded paper, ice cream containers, paper cups (hot and cold), take out paper food containers, glass/ceramic mugs and plates, aerosol containers (cleaners, pesticides, sunscreen, etc.), foil tops from yogurt, paint cans, pots and pans, scrap metal, spiral wound containers, loose bottle caps, plastic plates, bowls and utensils, prescription bottles, single use coffee containers, styrofoam, water filters, plastic bags & any thin plastic wrap.

SCHEDULE:

There is no curbside collection on the following holidays:

- Christmas Day (December 25)
- New Year's (January 1)
- Memorial Day (last Monday in May)
- July 4th
- Labor Day (first Monday in September)
- Thanksgiving Day (fourth Thursday in November)

For these 6 holidays, curbside collection advances to the following day.

Additional automated trash and recycling containers can be ordered through Michele Hayes at: 860-434-1605, ext. 212 in the Selectman's Office at the Memorial Town Hall, 52 Lyme Street. Containers (cost \$80). Please clearly mark clearly your address on recycling and trash receptacles to avoid mix up, removal or displacement of cans. Homeowners are responsible to replace lost, stolen or broken cans at their expense.

Plastic bags, plastic film packaging, and plastic wrap: never belong in Curbside Recycling! (*It clogs machines at the recycling facility and results in contamination fines.*) Recycle at any store drop-off bin if clean and dry: grocery bags, retail bags, bubble wrap, air pillows, newspaper bags, case wrap around bulk or shipped items, bread bags, produce bags, food storage bags, outer wrapping of paper towels, toilet paper, napkins and diapers. Remove all labels, tape and adhesive strips. (*Do not include*

degradable bags, pre-washed salad bags, frozen food bags, candy wrappers, pet food bags as they are incompatible with this kind of film recycling.) For more information on reducing the use of plastic, go to: www.plasticfilmrecyling.org or www.recyclect.com.

TRANSFER STATION

The Transfer Station is located on Four Mile River Road and is open Tuesday-Friday, 7:30 am - 3:45 pm, Saturday, 8:30 am - 4:00 pm. Closed Sunday and Monday. Taxpayers' vehicles should have a Transfer Station sticker affixed to the right-hand side of the windshield. Transfer Station stickers are available in the Selectman's Office at the Town Hall with vehicle registration and proof of Old Lyme residency. Vehicles without a sticker should bring proof of property address (*i.e.*, tax bill, mortgage statement or closing papers), along with a driver's license and registration.

- Bulky Waste and Demolition: Vehicles will be charged by weight at \$110/ton. Recyclables should not be mixed in the same load with bulky waste or demolition debris. Loads less than 100 lbs. are charged a minimum fee of \$5.
- **Brush is charged on a per load basis.** No wood or limbs thicker than four inches are accepted.
- **Clothing and linens** should be disposed of in a clothing donation box there are a number of them throughout town. Do not put discarded clothing in either your trash or recycling container.
- **Electronics:** Residents can bring the following at no charge: continued on page 14

computers (personal computers, mainframes, med-range computers, laptops); networking equipment (hubs, switches, control cards, etc.); computer monitors, televisions, printers, keyboards, mice, adaptors, stereos, speakers, VCR's, scanners, fax machines, copiers telephones and telephone systems, computer wire and cable; computer drives and storage devices (floppy drives, CD ROMs, hard drives), power supplies, circuit boards, microwaves, scrap copper (cable, pipe, etc.), scrap aluminum (machine and machine parts, cable extrusions, etc.), fluorescent light bulbs, UPA (uninterrupted power supply) batteries, and related computer/electronic equipment.

- **Grass clippings are not allowed** at the Transfer Station because of chemical contamination from pesticides and fertilizers and cannot be deposited in your trash can. Please compost on your property.
- Leaves can be brought to transfer station. Minimum charge is \$5 and residents must empty and remove leaf bags.
- Mattresses can be dropped off by residents at no charge.

HAZARDOUS WASTE & PAPER SHREDDING

Drop off for residents is available on selected Saturdays from April through October at the Regional Hazardous waste facility located at the Essex Transfer Station (opposite exit 4 from Route 9.) 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Economic Development Commission

The EDC believes that Old Lyme should be proactive with economic development by cultivating a competitive advantage using our unique assets to attract new investment and supporting local businesses. The EDC wants to promote a "smart growth" strategy that begins with a focus on helping businesses. For example, the EDC wants to retain existing businesses, as they are the foundation of any economic growth strategy; attract new investment, especially in available commercial properties that are presently abandoned and neglected; and promote entrepreneurship, as local business owners who live in Old Lyme have a vested interest in the community.

To this end, the EDC is seeking assistance from the Connecticut Economic Resource Center (CERC), a nonprofit corporation and public-private partnership that has a proven track record of helping towns across Connecticut strategically improve their economic conditions.

In March of 2019, the EDC will ask the Board of Selectmen to approve a proposal that will include the following three activities that will help the town begin the development of a formal economic development strategy:

- Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, and Threats (SWOT) workshop to obtain input from a variety of stakeholders and determine overarching goals to help guide the prioritization of further collaborative economic development efforts;
- Local business survey to learn about their challenges and explore how an economic development strategy could best support their long-term success;
- 3. Free informational workshop to help answer questions about economic and community development.

The EDC will oversee and coordinate CERC's activities and will ensure the projects stay on track. Moreover, the EDC is committed to working openly and collaboratively with all stakeholders, especially town residents and local business owners.

Stay tuned for more from the EDC in the coming months. We want to encourage local businesses and residents to give us your thoughts and feedback as we do our small part to help maintain the charm and character of Old Lyme while ensuring the economic condition of our town remains strong.

Lyme-Old Lyme Schools Plan Expansion of Pre-Kindergarten Program in 2019-20

TUITION SPOTS WILL ALSO BE OPEN FOR NON-RESIDENTS


Lyme-Old Lyme Schools are planning an expansion of their current Pre-Kindergarten (Pre-K) program at the start of the 2019-20 school year to include all four-year-old residents in Lyme or Old Lyme. Students of the appropriate age, who live outside the district, will also be welcome to enroll on a tuition basis if space is available.

The Pre-K currently run in Center School is a collaborative program for both students who receive special education services along with peer models who are selected through a lottery system. The reasoning behind expanding the program is threefold; first, the benefits of a universal Pre-K program are widely recognized as providing a solid base for learning and the board of education wishes to ensure all children are provided the same opportunity to be best prepared to enter Kindergarten: second, the timing of this

expansion is ideal as the reduction of staff due to fewer sections at Mile Creek allows for a minimal budgetary impact, plus space has become available in Center School with the withdrawal of LEARN; and third, the option of accepting tuition students from out-of -town will help fund the program.

Superintendent Ian Neviaser and the board also feel strongly there are other more intangible benefits for the towns of Lyme and Old Lyme, apart from those identified from the school district's perspective. Neviaser explains, "I believe that offering this program will not only create a stronger school district, but strengthen the community as a whole."

A broad-based community team including parents and











representatives from administration, faculty, youth services, and the board of education conducted extensive research prior to proposing a Monday through Friday, full-day Pre-K program based on Connecticut's Early Learning and Developmental Standards. Class sizes will align with the district class size guidelines and all students will participate in art, music, and physical education courses. Transportation will continue to be provided only for students who qualify for special education services and outside providers will be tasked with offering before- or after-school care as part of this program.

Resident students will continue to receive priority enrollment per current Board of Education policy while non-residents will be charged \$10,000 to attend the program. The existing half-day program for three-year-olds will remain unchanged except for the addition of one day to the previous four-day week schedule.

Neviaser concludes, "We firmly believe expansion of our current, very successful Pre-K program will not only be enormously beneficial for all the children involved but also for the district as an entity. No other suburban town or school district in southeastern Connecticut is offering an equivalent program, so it will be yet another factor that makes Lyme-Old Lyme Schools stand out from the crowd."





The 2019 Legislative Session



LYME, OLD LYME, OLD SAYBROOK, WESTBROOK

On January 9, 2019, the legislative session began. On that day, we heard from newly-elected Governor Ned Lamont and he outlined his vision for the upcoming session with a focus on improving

Connecticut's economy. He was set to provide his administration's two-year budget proposal on February 20th where he will outline his plans to improve our fiscal outlook and overcome Connecticut's budget deficits.

This session, I was appointed to serve on three legislative committees: Transportation, Planning & Development, and Finance, Revenue and Bonding where I will serve as the House Ranking Member on the Transportation Bonding Subcommittee. In addition, I was named an Assistant Leader in the House Republican Caucus.

The Transportation Committee has cognizance of all matters relating to the Department of Transportation, including highways and bridges, navigation, aeronautics, mass transit and railroads; and to the State Traffic Commission and the Department of Motor Vehicles.

The Planning & Development Committee has cognizance of all matters relating to local governments, housing, urban renewal, fire, sewer and metropolitan districts, home rule and planning and zoning; regional planning and development activities and the State Plan of Conservation and Development, and economic development programs impacting local governments.

The Finance, Revenue and Bonding Committee has jurisdiction over all matters relating to finance, revenue, capital bonding, fees and taxation.

Some of the major topics up for discussion this session include the budget deficit, tolls, marijuana, sports gambling, and an increase in the minimum wage.

Social Services Department

As spring approaches, Social Services expects to provide assistance with the Renters' Rebate Program. State law provides a reimbursement program for Connecticut renters who are elderly or totally disabled, and whose incomes do not exceed certain limits. Persons renting an apartment or room, or living in cooperative housing or a mobile home may be eligible for this program. The application period runs from April 1 - October 1.

The VITA (Volunteer Income Tax Assistance) program offers free tax preparation services to individuals and families with a total household income at or below \$54,000. Appointments are available through TVCCA at: 860-425-6597 or call Infoline at: 2-1-1 for more information.

In addition, the United Way has partnered with H&R Block to provide free tax filing ONLINE. If you earned \$66,000 or less in 2018, visit: www.myfreetaxes.com to complete your state and federal tax return absolutely free. For more information, you can call 1-855-698-9435.

Energy Assistance is winding down, with a deadline for fuel authorizations of March 15, 2019. However, applications are accepted through May 1, (if the household is utility heated and they have a shutoff notice the last day to apply is May 15.)

Old Lyme Social Services offers help with information, paperwork and documentation processing for many of the state and federal programs available to residents. Social Services will make appropriate referrals to agencies and programs to help meet the needs of Old Lyme residents.

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Middlesex Health: Helping Connecticut Women at Risk for Breast Cancer

Middlesex Health Cancer Center's Comprehensive Breast Center is specifically designed to help identify women who may be at high risk for breast cancer due to family history or benign breast disease, as well as to monitor and treat women who have an established high risk for breast cancer. It also helps patients currently in treatment or in recovery.

For many women, their primary care doctor handles their mammograms, and that is appropriate care. However, those who are at greater risk for breast cancer would benefit from being monitored more closely, and that's where the Comprehensive Breast Center can help.

Dr. Andrea Malon, medical director of the Cancer Center and Comprehensive Breast Program; Dr. Kristen Zarfos, medical director of the Comprehensive Breast Center; and Dr. Chia-Chi Wang, a surgical oncologist, see patients who visit the Comprehensive Breast Center. Women who are identified as being high risk, or who think they might be at high risk, are encouraged to either make an appointment directly or discuss their concerns with their primary care physician who can make a referral. Within the center, the scheduling of diagnostic tests and a meeting with one of the breast surgeons can happen on the same day.

Overall, Middlesex's goal is to coordinate care in a way that can reduce anxiety, expedite the process and help patients better navigate a cancer diagnosis and treatment.

Middlesex Health Cancer Center is accredited by the National Accreditation Program for Breast Centers. The Comprehensive Breast Center is located at 540 Saybrook Road in Middletown. The same services are also offered at a satellite office at the Middlesex Health Shoreline Medical Center in Westbrook. To contact the center, call 860-358-2780.

The Ruth Ann Heller Music Foundation awards scholarships to instrumental students participating in Lyme-Old Lyme Middle and High School band programs. The 501(c) (3) non-profit foundation was formed in 1999 after the retirement of Ruth Ann (King) Heller, who had a wonderful and long-lasting impact on the District's band

programs. It is due, in part, to Ruth Ann's legacy that Lyme Old Lyme's school band programs continue to thrive under the dedicated and talented efforts of Jay Wilson and Carrie Wind. Scholarships are exclusively for private lessons and are paid directly to the instructors selected by the students and their families. One-on-one instruction provides a valuable opportunity for students to develop their musical skills and enhance the quality of the band performances.

Nearly all donations come from local individuals whose support is sincerely appreciated. Since 2001 over 340 scholarships have been awarded, including 36 this year. All of the tax-deductible donations go directly to student scholarships as board members cover the modest administrative expenses. When she is not playing, Ruth Ann volunteers for the Orlando Philharmonic library and serves as President of the Orlando Concert Band. 

THE MUSEUM'S SPRING EXHIBITION

Who are our national heroes? Albert Einstein? Eleanor Roosevelt? Martin Luther King, Jr.? In *The Great Americans: Portraits by Jac Lahav*, the artist's nearly seven-foot-tall paintings of 30+ famous figures are a celebration of

America layered with references to history, lore, and imagery that shape our understanding of these larger-than-life icons. Through his psychologically complex and cheeky treatment of iconic figures from politicians to celebrities, Lyme-based artist Lahav explores the nature of cultural identity.

On view through May 12, the portraits explore the idea of who we consider "great" and the cultural underpinnings of our perceptions (whether fact or fiction) and call into question the very notion of "greatness" among American historical figures.

In keeping with the Museum's efforts to reflect a distinctly Connecticut point of view in our exhibitions, Lahav curated a selection of Lyme Art Colony works and objects from FGM's collection to appear in conjunction with The Great Americans. The artist created several new Connecticut-related works for his series, including portraits of Florence Griswold and Lyme Art Colony visitor Woodrow Wilson. The exhibition looks first at the cultural big picture of our national heroes, then draw the visitor's eye to see Connecticut-specific resonances-all through Lahav's uniquely 21st century lens.

The Great Americans inspired many great programs, including a new is a series of Saturday afternoon lectures that feature, among others, the artist talking about this body of work and Smithsonian curator Dorothy Moss lecturing on the Obama portraits. A series of gallery talks titled Background/Foreground brings scholars from a variety of disciplines to the Museum to share the history of the people in the portraits as well as their interpretation of Lahav's version

Rogers Lake Authority

DO NOT FEED THE WATERFOWL

The Connecticut Department of Environmental Protection indicates waterfowl are wild birds that can locate natural food sources throughout the year. Supplemental feeding by people is unnecessary and can lead to malnutrition and disease transmission.

Reminder that the horsepower limit on Rogers Lake is 135 HP. Connecticut Boating Regulations require that no person shall operate a motorboat at a speed in excess of Slow-No-Wake within 100 feet of shore, a dock or other vessel. Personal watercrafts are required to stay 200 feet from shore, a dock or other vessel.

The Rogers Lake Authority asks for your assistance in reporting unsafe activity occurring on Rogers Lake anytime of the year. Connecticut State law 12-155 prohibits the use of a fertilizer containing phosphorous less than 20 feet from any body of water.

Wallpaper Trending - 2019

WALLPAPER IS EXPERIENCING A REVIVAL

Started in 2018 it is making a huge comeback and the trend should continue well into 2019 and beyond... And why not? Wallpaper is an ideal product to cover less than good condition walls. If you are nervous about making a commitment or require a temporary installation, self-adhering wallpaper can be a great option. It is convenient and easier to install than the traditional glue down papers. Its clean and easy to apply. There is no need for a paste with adhesives and

bonding materials for both the wall and wallpaper. Another advantage of the self-adhering wallpaper is the ease of removal without damaging the wall. This product is ideal for renters allowing them to bring in a bit of their own personality and then leave the space in its original condition. One caution, as the product is designed to release from walls it has been known to come off walls when something rubs up against it or pulls on it. Careful placement and care should help alleviate this issue.

So, if you are looking to add a pop of color, a bold statement, a bit of texture, a little or a lot of personality, wallpaper may very well be what you are looking for... don't be afraid... since you have both permanent and less than permanent options to choose from... Design well!



The last word... Presented by Mystic Harbor Group

Dr. Robert Ballard - The Race to Save the Human Race by Sigrid Kun



Just back from the last leg of a 7 month-long expedition by his Corps of Exploration, Dr. Robert Ballard was at his Lyme, CT home - busy summarizing the 2018 series of expeditions by his 64-meter exploration vessel, the E/V Nautilus. Yes, he discovered the Titanic in 1985 (old news, he says, of what was actually a cover for a top secret naval operation). Yes, his work caused a wholesale change in how science was taught by uncovering the secrets of plate tectonics and hydro thermal vents (a revolutionary revelation evidencing that sunlight wasn't needed to support life). And the 30-year naval veteran and /geologist/undersea robotics developer/explorer has for so many years revealed to the world human history lost beneath the sea with over 35 National Geographic television specials and countless books. After 150+ expeditions, starting at age 17, retirement isn't in the works for the 76-year old.

Our Oceans - The Last Frontier

Dr. Ballard's unrelenting pursuit of ocean education and exploration through his non-profit organization, the Ocean Exploration Trust ("OET"), is urgent. There are sobering facts: 95% of the Earth's population lives on less than 5% of the Earth's surface; farmland is being replaced with housing tracts; while 95% of all living space is located in largely unexplored international waters. But 90% of all large, predatory fish have been hunted down and killed. The carrying capacity of our planet is already at the brink. By 2050 we will not have enough food to feed everyone.

The Wichita, Kansas-born explorer explains that the Earth's waters, largely unexplored, are the human race's final hope. "I'm worried about the human race," he says. "The big question is, will the human race survive? The Earth will be fine. The planet is a creature. It was born. It evolves. It will die. It just has a long life expectancy. But there's no Plan B for the human race." The key, he says, is to move from hunting/gathering in the ocean to creating productive waters via deep sea farming - just as society thousands of years ago moved away from hunting and gathering on the Earth's lands and into organized food production. Every Ballard/OET/ Nautilus expedition provides vital information as to how our Earth's waters can provide for the survival of humanity. The programs run on

multiple tracks; internships, community STEM and STEAM (to include the Arts) programs, and fellowships. Each ocean expedition includes scientists, student interns and educators as part of the Nautilus corps. The OET website is maintained on a 24/7 basis while the Nautilus is at sea to provide for live communication and interaction. During the last expedition, over 24,000 questions were answered live. Each expedition cultivates a new set of students and mentors (both on and off-board). "The key is to do it wave after wave after wave," he says. To make a difference you needed to reach millions of students.

Dr. Ballard's message, however, is about more than just the ocean. Life's lessons include understanding one's self. Dr. Ballard is dyslexic. For quite a while, he didn't even know it. It took the book "The Dyslexic Advantage" to explain me to me. It was a strange but enlightening experience. Those affected (which is 10% of the population) are often loathe to admit it. To him, it is a gift - an interesting advantage. "I created a dyslexic world that I excel in," he explains. Dyslexia has caused him to rely on visualization and memorization. "It's perfect," he says. "In the sea, it's all dark...it's pitch black. But the water goes away and I see everything." He recalls a dive in 1986 to explore the Titanic. Everything went wrong. No sonar. No tracking. Landing 12,000 feet below surface in the mud, there were no signs of the Titanic to the other crew members. "It's over there," pointed Ballard. And, indeed, the Titanic was.

Dr. Ballard is also a keen proponent for empowering women. As he puts it "males as top leaders is by their design." Empowering women, he maintains, is a key to saving the human race. Accordingly, he mandates that 50% of his team be comprised of women.

Where Do We Go From Here?

Dr. Ballard is a problem solver - from 15 years spent restoring an earlier home to jigsaw puzzles (even when the 1,000 pieces are the same shade of blue, with no border pieces, holes in the puzzle, and extra pieces just for kicks.) But he doesn't have the ultimate answer. Will the human race survive? "I am a realist. The Earth is becoming aware of us and deeming us as a threat," he observes. "We still have time but indications are we are going in the wrong direction." What can we do? "Look at the first 12 feet around you. Look at what you are doing," urges the avid recycler. "Leave things better than you found them. That's what my grandmother taught me."
