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



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Selectwoman's Corner

The warm weather is finally here! What a very long and arduous winter we've had, followed by a cooler than normal spring. Surely, many of you questioned if the flowers would bloom and the leaves open? It is a good reminder to get out and enjoy the good weather while we have it. As usual, things are busy in town, and as we close some projects, we begin to work on others.

Rogers Lake Dam/Fish Ladder: For the first time in hundreds of years, the alewives will be able to return to Rogers Lake to spawn, thanks to the installation of the Fish Ladder at the newly repaired dam. The fish ladder was officially opened in April, and reportedly, a handful of fish have already found their way up the ladder. How would we know that? Well, believe it or not, there is a fish counter installed, so we can definitively say that the FISH HAVE ARRIVED! Well, just a few – but they have. The Committee that worked so hard on this project is planning a little celebration for the installation of the Fish Ladder and return of the alewives. An informational kiosk will be installed at Hains Park, where we will have the celebration. Look for flyers and emails with more information!

Natural Hazards Mitigation Plan: The draft updated plan, required by FEMA in order for the Town to be eligible for Federal grants to fund mitigation projects, was completed in March and submitted for approval to the CT DEEP, after a thorough review by the Committee. I am pleased to report

that the CT DEEP has already approved the plan and has passed it on to FEMA! If approved by FEMA, it will go to the Board of Selectmen for approval and recommendation to a Town Meeting. There is a chance that FEMA will want to see some changes, which will be addressed by the Committee if that happens. Again, many thanks to the Committee and Jeremy DeCarli of RiverCOG for their hard work on this project.

Special Town Meeting: At a Special Town Meeting on March 24th, the town unanimously approved the update to the Design and Construction Standards for Public Improvements (which had not been updated since the 80's); authorized the expenditure of \$148,000 to develop Plans and Specifications for the Route 156 Bike Path/Sound View Improvement Project, 80% of which comes from a grant; authorized an expenditure of \$13,000 for an additional parking kiosk in Sound View; and authorized an expenditure of \$478,000 for the Boathouse/ Hains Park Improvement Project, which is fully funded through a STEAP grant. In addition, the WPCA and Woodard and Curran, our engineering firm, gave a presentation on the status of the wastewater management study that began in

April 2013. The CT DEEP has responded to the study with some questions and requests for further information, and the WPCA and W&C are reviewing the feedback. There were lots of great questions at the meeting, and hopefully some misinformation was corrected. If you are interested in information on this project, or almost any of our ongoing projects, you should visit the Town website and click on "Current Projects" on the left side of the page.

Budget for FY 2015: Like clockwork, the Board of Finance met weekly throughout February and March to review the budget requests for FY 2015. This year's proposed budget would increase the mill rate from 19.30 to 19.66, or 1.87%, which represents an overall increase of \$660,413 over the FY 2014 budget, which is a 2.17% increase. A hearing was held on April 21 at Town Hall with an excellent overview of the proposed budget presented by Andy Russell, BOF Chair. There were about a dozen attendees and questions from some residents. As the RSD #18 budget has just passed, we hope that when you are reading this, the full budget will have been passed on May 19, 2014. Again, thanks to the unsung heroes on the Board of Finance who devote so much time each year to the budget process: Chairman Andy Russell, H. Perry Garvin, Christopher Kerr, David Woolley, Bennett BJ Bernblum, Janet Sturges, and alternates David Kelsey, and Robert Jose. Wayne Devoe recently retired from the board after many long years of service. Thank you, Wayne, for your service - you will be missed!

Rte 156 Bike Path and Sound View Improvements: With the approval of the expenditures for Phase I of this project, BSC Group, Inc. of Glastonbury will proceed with the Plans and Specifications for the Bike Path, Park and restrooms. As this is the time to encourage public involvement, the Board of Selectmen has recommended that the Committee be expanded to include additional members. There will be a public presentation when the plans are about 30% complete in order to incorporate suggestions, concerns and feedback of residents and to assure approval of a final plan. It will be exciting to see the plans progress and to work with the stakeholders to develop a plan that we can all embrace. Stay tuned for updates as we continue with this project.

Boathouse Hains Park Improvements: This committee has been very hard at work through the spring, as they sorted through RFQ submittals, conducted interviews with several firms and made a decision to work with Nina Cuccio Peck Architects on the boathouse expansion and improvements to Hains Park. They have made great progress and will develop a master plan for Hains Park, even though they may not be able to complete all the work through this STEAP grant. This will assure that any work done to the park will not need to be undone when future improvements are made. The Committee meets every two weeks and hopes to see the project substantially completed by late fall. You can find updates on their progress by going to the town website and linking through

New Land Use Coordinator – Keith Rosenfeld: As was previously reported, Land Use Coordinator Ann Brown is retiring, and we posted an advertisement for the position. A search committee that included Tom Risom, Kristen Leverone, Evan Griswold and Todd Machnik reviewed many resumes received and interviewed several candidates. I am pleased to report that Keith Rosenfeld has accepted the position and will start in early June. Keith has served as Town Planner/Inland Wetlands Enforcement Officer in the Borough of Naugatuck since 2001, and was City Planner for Waterbury from 1993 to 2001. He also served in Groton for a short time, so he is familiar with the area. Keith has already visited to meet the staff and we are all looking forward to his arrival. We wish Ann Brown all the best and thank her for her 12+ years of service to Old Lyme.


Revaluation continues: The Town of Old Lyme is still in the process of collecting data for the State mandated 2014 Revaluation and the firm of Vision Appraisal has been hired to assist the Town. The data collection phase continues on both exterior and interior inspections. The town has published several repetitive announcements in an effort to notify everyone that data collectors may be on their property as they work to complete the job. The employees of Vision have ID readily available and their vehicles are registered with the Police

Dept. should anyone call questioning their presence. Please, if you are concerned about anyone on your property, you should not hesitate to call the police. You can also make an appointment to have your home inspected by calling 1-888-844-4300 between the hours of 9:00 am and 4:00 pm Monday through Friday. Your cooperation is greatly appreciated as we complete this task.

Recycling Incentives Grant: A committee has been formed to work with the CT DEEP and representatives of DSM Consulting Group, who has been hired by DEEP to work on recycling incentive programs for the state. As mentioned in a previous newsletter, the Town of Old Lyme has been awarded a \$16,000 grant to adopt policies that would incentivize recycling and reduce trash. In order to be eligible for the funds, the Board of Selectmen must pass a resolution or ordinance committing to Unit Based Pricing. To many, this means buying individual trash bags, unique to our community, for trash disposal. This concept has prompted spirited discussion both on the committee and among the Selectmen. We continue to review this requirement and the impact on our current system before adopting the resolution. Ultimately, the goal is to reduce the amount of trash we generate and reduce the overall cost through increased recycling. You can all be helpful in this goal by increasing your own recycling every day. Recycling is not optional – it is mandatory, and regulated by State Statute. Not sure what to recycle? 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

The Old Lyme-Lyme Volunteer Connection

Volunteering is a great way to learn new skills and meet new people and often prior experience is not required. Have you wanted to learn more about gardening? There are two local organizations listed on the Old Lyme-Lyme Volunteer Connection where you will improve your gardening skills as you work alongside knowledgeable people. Learn all about growing vegetables at the Common Good Gardens in Old Saybrook. Volunteers are needed Tuesday or Saturday mornings or on Thursday afternoons through October. This garden supplies fresh produce for the Shoreline Soup Kitchen pantries. Garden Gang volunteers at the Florence Griswold Museum work with Landscape Historian Shiela Wertheimer in the restoration and maintenance of its beautiful perennial gardens. The Garden Gang works for about three hours on Friday mornings during the growing season. Have you wanted to learn more about horses? High Hopes is always in need of volunteers to assist in its riding program or in the care of the horses. The minimum recommended age is fourteen years. Volunteers are required to attend an orientation and training session and must be available at the same day and time each week for a minimum of one hour per week. Have you wanted to learn about local history? The Florence Griswold Museum needs volunteers interested in assisting the curatorial staff in research for upcoming exhibitions; restructuring and organizing the cataloging database; genealogy, town and object research;

and collection inventory. The Museum also needs docents to guide visitors through the historic house while relating information about the Lyme Art Colony, the Griswold family, and the history of Lyme and Old Lyme. Docents receive in-depth training. Have you wanted to learn about working in a library? At the Lyme Academy College volunteers are needed to assist with multiple aspects of library work. The work is primarily clerical in nature and may involve computer skills, data entry, image creation and editing, sorting of materials, repair and shelf-preparation of library or archive materials. The Old Lyme – Phoebe Griffin Noyes library also has a number of volunteer needs including in its Children's Room, Young Adult Area, and Circulation.

Assessor's Office

Personal Property forms will be mailed at the end of September. Forms are due on or before November 1, 2014. A 25% Penalty is imposed on the assessed value if postmarked after November 1, 2014.

In order for new residents in town to have their Veteran's Exemption on their properties; they must file their DD214 (Discharge papers) with the Town Clerk before October 1, 2014.

Anyone interested in applying for Farm, Forest and Open Space must file an application (available in the Assessors office) and present it to the Assessor between September 1st and December 31st, 2014.

The 2014 Revaluation is winding down with all households in Old Lyme having had an initial visit by a data collector. Letters have been sent so homeowners will have an opportunity for an inspection of their property. Appointments are scheduled through the Vision website and phone number and run Monday through Saturday.

Additionally, appraisers will review all field cards for accuracy. Residents may see them in their neighborhoods this summer.

Those Commercial Properties who were sent Income & Expense forms (I & E) must have them filed in the Assessor's Office by on or before June 1, 2014 or they will receive a 10% PENALTY.

Spectrum is the newest extension of the non-profit arts organization Arts Center Killingworth, whose mission includes providing opportunities for emerging and established artists to display and sell their work.

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Wastewater Management Update

The WPCA contracted with the engineering firm of Woodard & Curran to develop a comprehensive Wastewater Management Plan for the Old Lyme shoreline. W&C was asked to consider all options for alleviating pollution along our shoreline. After considerable testing and data analysis, both the WPCA and W&C agreed that the best option was a local, community treatment solution, rather than connecting to the regional New London treatment plant. The members of the WPCA felt strongly that a community Wastewater Management Plan would benefit the town by keeping treated wastewater in town to help recharge our aquifers. In addition, a community system designed and scaled to meet our town's current and future needs would allow Old Lyme to best manage current and future costs.

Approximately 4 months after Woodard & Curran submitted the WPCA's Wastewater Management Plan to the CT DEEP we received a response, which indicated that they would require more testing. Their review and executive summary of the community wastewater plan made it clear to members of the WPCA that the CT DEEP would not support a local wastewater treatment plan.

At the WPCA meeting in May, First Selectwoman Bonnie Reemsnyder expressed her disappointment in the lack of cooperation from the DEEP, but reiterated the importance of the Town taking a stand on wastewater issues. She said the WPCA should be proud of their resolve to find the right solution. "We started this process to solve a problem," she said, "and we have to keep moving forward."

WPCA members agreed that their responsibility is to deal with pollution along the shoreline, and voted that the Town of Old Lyme should take on Wastewater Management for the entire shoreline through its WPCA. This management will include the development of inter-Town municipal agreements, a centralized pump facility, and necessary infrastructure to connect to the New London Regional facility.

WPCA Chair Kurt Zemba stated that the DEEP made it clear they supported this approach. Management by the Town will offer cost-efficiencies for the private beach associations who have already begun the New London facility connection process.

More information will be made available as the WPCA's management plan proceeds.

Dog Licenses

Dog licenses will be available in the Town Clerk's office in June and should be purchase by June 30, 2014.

FEE: Male or Female - \$19, Neutered Male or Spayed Female - \$8. **PENALTY:** Late Fee - \$1 per month after June.

- All dogs six months or older must be licensed and wear a collar and tag at all times.
- A dog without a tag is presumed to be unlicensed and is not protected by law.
- An assigned tag must be used on the dog described in the license bearing the corresponding number.
- A dog owner is liable for damage done by owner's dog, including damage to shrubs, flowers or trees.
- All dogs must be vaccinated against rabies and proof of the vet's certificate must be submitted to the Town Clerk when licensing a dog. (Per CGS Sec. 22-338).
- Owners of roaming dogs are liable to prosecution.
- When a spayed or neutered dog is licensed for the first time, a certificate from a licensed vet must be presented.
- If application is made by mail, make check payable to: Town of Old Lyme. Please enclose a self-addressed, stamped envelope.

Town Holiday Schedule. Town Hall will be closed in observance of the following Holidays: Friday, July 4 – Independence Day; Monday, September 1 – Labor Day; Monday, October 13 – Columbus Day; Monday, November 11 – Veterans Day; Thursday& Friday, November 27 & 28 – Thanksgiving; Thursday, December 25 - Christmas.

Town Hall hours for most departments: Monday through Friday, 9 am – 4 pm.

Notary Public services are usually available at the Town Hall for some documents and by appointment only. During lunch hours and vacation periods, it is possible that no notary will be in the building. Please phone ahead to be sure a notary will be available.

Trash & Recycling. Curbside trash removal is performed by Shoreline Sanitation (860-434-0052). There is no trash pick-up on the following Holidays: New Year's Day (Jan. 1), Memorial Day (last Monday in May), July 4th, Labor Day (first Monday in Sept.), Thanksgiving Day (fourth Thursday in Nov.), and Christmas Day (Dec. 25). Trash that would normally be collected on Thanksgiving will be picked up the next day, along with the regular Friday pickup. For Monday holidays, garbage pickup will move up a day, except on Thursday and Friday, which will remain on schedule. This does not affect the curbside recycling program. Electronics are now accepted at the Transfer Station. Residents are able to bring the following items to the Transfer Station on Four Mile River Road: computers (personal computers, mainframes, med-range computers, laptops); networking equipment (hubs, switches, control cards, etc.); computer monitors, televisions, printers, keyboards, mice, adaptors, stereos, speakers, VCR's, scanners, fax machines, copiers telephones and telephone systems, computer wire and cable; computer drives and storage devices (floppy drives, CD ROMs, hard drives), power supplies, circuit boards, microwaves, scrap copper (cable, pipe, etc.), scrap aluminum (machine and machine parts, cable extrusions, etc.), fluorescent light bulbs, UPA (uninterrupted power supply) batteries, and related computer and electronic equipment.

Bulky Waste and Demolition: Vehicles are charged by weight at \$110/ton. Recyclables should not be mixed in the same load with Bulky Waste or Demolition debris. Loads of less than 100 lbs. will be charged a minimum fee of \$5.

Brush will be charged on a per load basis. No wood or limbs thicker than four inches will be accepted.

Grass clippings will not be allowed at the Transfer Station because of chemical contamination from pesticides and fertilizers and cannot be deposited in your trash can. Please compost on your property.

Streetlights. Phone Michele Hayes in the Selectman's Office at the Town Hall (860-434-1605, ext. 212) to report a streetlight outage and/or trash or recycling problem. When reporting a streetlight, please make note of the pole location and pole number. Please note that streetlights located on a private road or within a private association are the responsibility of the association, not the Town.

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
A Brief History of the Brief Life of the Old Lyme Trolley



If you enjoy cycling in Old Lyme, it is hard to miss the rippled roadway along the shoulder of the Post Road, most noticeable in front of the Laysville Cemetery. These bumps, formed by pavement sinking around wooden crossties that lie underneath, are remnants of the Shoreline Electric Railway's trolley line,

which operated for a brief six year period beginning in 1913.

In 1911, the first bridge crossing the Connecticut River between Old Saybrook and Old Lyme was completed. This enabled the Shoreline Electric Railway to extend its trolley line from Old Saybrook to Flanders, the construction of which was completed two years later in 1913. In Flanders the trolley tracks connected with those of the New London and East Lyme Street Railway and in Old Saybrook the tracks connected with those running to New Haven. The trolley route ran through the center of every town, but once outside of the centers they frequently followed a straighter and shorter cross-country route. In Old Lyme, after crossing the bridge, the tracks turned right to follow today's Neck Road until they reached Ferry Road where they turned left. At Church Corner the tracks turned left on what was then referred to as "the Street", today's Lyme Street, and then followed the Post Road to Flanders. Trolleys ran hourly in each direction from 5 am until 10 pm. The fare was five cents for each three mile segment. There was one

set of tracks so sidings were built to allow cars to pass one another. This required the cars to adhere to a precise schedule so that cars going in opposite directions would meet at the sidings. The heavy trolley cars could reach 60 miles per hour, although the fastest they traveled on the shoreline was closer to 40 and they probably averaged only 30.

The trolley's brief six year life was due to several factors. First, the automobile was growing in popularity. Second, there were several trolley crashes in 1917 and 1919, one of which

tragically killed fourteen people in the Branford area. Also in 1918, a key financier of the trolley line, Morton Freeman Plant, died. The Shoreline Electric Railway shut down its line between Flanders and Stony Creek. Three years later, the company reorganized as the New Haven and Shoreline Railway and resumed service from Stony Creek to Old Saybrook, but the line to Flanders never operated again. This second iteration of the trolley line was doomed and by 1929, the shoreline trolley was gone. Although the trolleys almost never earned a profit, the reorganized company gambled and switched to buses. This bus line followed the Post Road from New Haven to New London. It operated successfully, lasting until the mid-1950s.

In addition to the rippled pavement from the crossties remaining underneath the Post Road, a large remnant of the trolley line is the building that contained the former power plant that generated its electricity. It is a large block-like building with a tall red and white striped chimney located at a marina in Old Saybrook that can be seen from the Old Lyme side of the river from the DEEP property. Perhaps if the trolley had arrived earlier, before the automobile became the dominant form of transit, it may have been able to pay off its construction debts and could possibly have lasted much longer, as did the city trolley lines which survived into the 1940s.

Community's Support Needed for Grange Hall Purchase

At the end of February the Old Lyme Historical Society, Inc. purchased the historic Grange Hall building located at 55 Lyme Street. The purchase of this building on Lyme Street marks a major turning point for the Society, which was formed in 2005 to collect, preserve, and interpret the rich history of Old Lyme. Once necessary improvements are made, the 2,600 square foot Grange building will meet the Society's current needs for a permanent temperature controlled archive, periodic exhibits, lectures, meetings, receptions, and a shop for the Society's publications. The purchase was made possible through the generosity of charitable contributions from the community, the Society's membership, one hundred percent of the Board Members, and private loans. The Old Lyme Historical Society continues to work towards raising the full amount of their capital campaign goal of \$225,000. Contributions in any amount and/or stock transfers to this capital campaign are greatly needed and will be deeply appreciated. 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News from the Sound View Commission

It's been quite an exciting year: A town meeting was held on March 24 with two projects specific to Sound View. Phase 1 of the Bike-way and Park project design and engineering was passed unanimously! The work began in May and will entail surveying, geotechnical analysis, design and engineering for the Bike-way on RT 156 as well as the Park and Restrooms. BSC Group of Glastonbury, CT was chosen to do the work with Old Lyme's Nina Peck providing the architectural work for the restroom building. Throughout the spring and summer you'll be seeing surveyors and the like in the area. The project design aspects will be open for comment and input at several public information meetings. It is anticipated that we can start construction the Fall of 2015. The second item, the purchase of a new parking kiosk for the town parking lot in the amount of \$13,000, also passed unanimously. With this kiosk, parking attendants will no longer be needed, at a savings of approximately \$15,000 per year. Our Town Rangers will patrol the lot as well as the street.

Community Events: Summer Concert series: The Commission is working towards some community events at SoundView. A special Events Sub-Committee of the Commission is preparing for 3 or 4 family friendly summer outdoor concerts on Thursday evenings (July 10, 24, August 14). The concert location will be Hartford Ave, at the Flagpole. Check the town web site and the bulletin board at the Shoreline Community Center for more info.

More Bocce! In true community spirit, Lenny Corto (Lenny's on the Beach) and Tom Larson (Just Dump It) have volunteered to assist with the Bocce court maintenance. We're thinking about starting a Sound View Bocce tournament.

Parking: Hartford Avenue: Last year we received plenty of comments about the Hartford Avenue parking configuration, both pro and con. The Kiosk pay system was very successful and the present parking configuration will remain in effect this year. Any future changes will be part of the Bike-Way/Park design.

Town Parking Lot: This year the town lot will be under the direction of Public Safety. All parking fees will be paid by means of a new Kiosk located at the lot. The lot has also been modified to accommodate a separate entrance and exit and new parking space delineation lines. Proper turning radiuses and the separate entrance/exit will assist us in providing a safer experience for our guests. Fees for the parking lot will be the same as street parking: increments of \$5 per 2 hours on weekdays; \$7 per 2 hours on weekends and holidays, from 9:00 am to 6:00 pm. Vehicles may remain parked for as many 2 hour increments as purchased. Old Lyme residents with beach stickers will continue to park free on the street or lot as space is available. Our Town rangers will be on patrol to ensure adherence with the program.

Public Works: The challenges of maintaining such a heavily congested and visited area can be daunting, and our Public Works Department performs their task well, but you can help them do even better. If you have trees or vegetation obscuring street signs or the alleys, please do your part to keep these areas clear. The alleys must be kept clear and accessible for emergency and resident vehicle passage and street signage must be visible, for both public safety and pleasant community aesthetics. Our Public Works Department will be checking to make sure we have safe, unobscured signs and alleys and will remove any obstruction by May 30. Over the next few years, we also anticipate doing a survey of the alleys and streets, so make sure you don't have any encroachments.

Public Safety: Reminders from Public Safety: Golf carts, ATVs and similar are prohibited from operating on Town roads. Motor scooters, mopeds or motor-bikes: Driver must have a valid motor vehicle operator's license. All fireworks

are illegal in the State of Connecticut without a proper permit, except sparklers and fountains.

The Size-Up

Here are some safety tips from your Old Lyme Fire Department to help keep Summer dining 2014 fun:

- Before using a grill, check the connection between the propane tank and the fuel line. Make sure the venturi tubes where the air and gas mix are not blocked.
- Do not overfill the propane tank.
- Do not wear loose clothing while cooking at a barbecue.
- Be careful when using lighter fluid. Do not add fluid to an already lit fire because the flames can flashback up into the container and explode.
- Keep all matches and lighters away from children. Teach your children to report any loose matches or lighters to an adult immediately. Supervise children around outdoor grills.
- Dispose of hot coals properly douse them with plenty of water, and stir them to ensure that the fire is out. Never place them in plastic, paper or wooden containers.
- Never grill/barbecue in enclosed areas carbon monoxide could be produced.
- Make sure everyone knows to Stop, Drop and Roll in case a piece of clothing does catch fire. Call 911 or your local emergency number if a burn warrants serious medical attention.

Campfire Safety

- Build campfires where they will not spread, away from dry grass and leaves.
- Keep campfires small, and don't let them get out of hand
- Keep plenty of water and a shovel around to douse the fire when you're done. Stir it and douse it again with water
- Never leave campfires unattended.

Creating a Buffer Garden

Last spring the Conservation Commission installed a demonstration buffer garden at Hains Park on Rogers Lake. The Connecticut Master Gardeners Association contributed a small grant and interns toward the project. The garden will serve as a demonstration of the construction, design and effectiveness of buffer planting to property owners whose land borders the lakes, streams and rivers of Old Lyme. In the period of four seasons, this small garden has held the soil firm against flooding and ice flows. Recently the commission has erected an explanatory sign at the garden. Hopefully residents will visit the garden and watch the sprouting of the foliage on the native plants.

Maintaining a buffer garden at water's edge is one of the best ways to protect against erosion, pollution from lawn chemicals, pesticides and an overabundance of nutrients. A buffer garden on the edge of your property, rather than a lawn going straight down to the water's edge will trap runoff water from rain and snow melt and let it settle into the soil. The water can then be filtered by the soil before it reaches the water through underground routes. Runoff from rain contains phosphorus which is a nutrient that feeds algae that kills fish and turns the water green and ugly and smells awful! Sediment carried into the water settles on the bottom, creating a fertile bed for unwanted weed growth, inhibiting water flow, destroying fish spawning areas and suffocating all organisms living on the bottom.



Creating a buffer garden takes some planning. Before starting you should consider your property's exposure to sun and wind, the soil type, moisture and pH, the slope of the land and the current vegetation in the area. Also, determine if a permit is required prior to buffer construction. Determine how wide your buffer will be. Use native species which will be best suited to the local climate and soil conditions and less susceptible to disease and insect infestation. If maintaining a view is

important, choose low growing shrubs that can be mixed with grasses and perennials. A path leading down to the shore is best designed to curve and meander so that water will not flow directly down the path but settle into the soil along the way. Paths should be made of permeable materials to help water settle into the soil. Many local nurseries sell native plants. A very good list of species appropriate for coastal Connecticut can be found online at www.seagrant.uconn.edu/publications/coastalres. The following are searchable plant databases available on line:

Renters Rebate Program

Connecticut State law provides a reimbursement program for Connecticut renters who are elderly or totally disabled, and whose incomes do not exceed certain limits. Persons renting an apartment or room, or living in cooperative housing or a mobile home may be eligible for this program. Renters' rebates can be up to \$900 for married couples and \$700 for single persons. The renters' rebate amount is based on a graduated income scale and the amount of rent and utility payments (excluding telephone) made in the calendar year 2013.

Applications taken between April 1 and October 1. To qualify renters must be over the age of 65 or legally disabled and receiving social security. Income limits for the program are as follows;

- Married Couples income must be under \$41,600.
- Single must be under \$34,100.

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

Spring Into Rosé

Spring is finally here and I am sure everyone will agree that it has been a long cold winter. As the days become longer and the weather warms up, the perfect wines to drink are Rosés. The rosé style of wine has become increasingly popular every year, and why not? Aside from being refreshing, rosés pair well with a vast array of foods and are extremely palatable to almost any wine drinker.

Rosés are comprised of mostly red varietals but are occasionally blended with a small amount of white grapes. You might ask, where does the pink color come from? Well, the juice from all grapes is clear, the color of the wine depends on how long the skins stay in contact during the wine making process. The longer the skins stay in contact, the darker the color of the rosé. In my experience, the deeper rosés tend to have dark fruit flavors such as blackberry, cassis and plum, while the pale rosés taste of strawberry, cherry and watermelon. French rosés from Provence, for example, tend to be a pale salmon-like color and are light and refreshing in body, while Cotes-du-Rhone rosés are brighter pink and weightier in the mouth.

Because of the long run of White Zinfandel in the United States, many people believe that all rosés are sweet. White Zinfandel is made in a different fashion than true rosés, it has lower alcohol and higher residual sugar. Most rosés are in fact drier than one would expect. This makes them easy to pair with many different foods, from appetizers to entrees and desserts.

It is time to invite your friends over, uncover and strike up the barbeque grill, and crack open a refreshing bottle of rosé, it will surely please your entire crowd. Happy Spring!

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

There is a new online resource for Connecticut residents seeking the data and details on state government. Complete with charts and graphs and available for download in a variety of formats, the Connecticut Open Data Portal has made its electronic debut. The Connecticut Open Data Portal will serve as an online portal where information that is collected across all government agencies can be shared. The portal is now live and can be accessed at http://data.ct.gov.

This electronic data portal provides a useful database that can be used by entrepreneurs, analysts, academics and the general public. Data collection categories include transportation, pub-

lic safety, health, business, environment, education and housing among others. To date, the portal contains more than 100 data sets highlighting traffic counts, crime statistics, and leased and state owned buildings.



While the portal makes data available to the public, it does so while continuing to safeguard data that must be kept secure under state and federal law. Information that would compromise public health, safety or the public welfare would continue to be excluded from public view.

I urge you to make use of this tool for accessing and understanding information relevant to important functions of government that affect your quality of life.

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Facebook Depressive Disorder?

How often do you look at Facebook? Occasionally? Daily? Every 10 minutes, to see what friends are up to? Who are your friends? The people you actually speak to occasionally and enjoy viewing their family pictures? Or every friend of a friend who will accept your invite, so you can stay on top of what's happening out there? Research into the effects of Facebook (and other social media) shows that people who spend a lot of time on these sites often become less satisfied with their lives. They struggle more with depression and loneliness. Not just that lonely and depressed people use Facebook, but that their use actually increases these depressive feelings. Increased envy, wanting to have/look/be like those happy, celebrating people in the pictures also occurs. Yes, we see the posts complaining of a bad day, but they are far outnumbered by the posts and pictures of happy times with friends, everyone smiling and having a great time. We start to think that others live that kind of life, while we are still struggling with work, school, relationships, or boredom. Social media can be a great way to keep in touch, especially with those we can't get together with often. But sometimes the best way to interact with friends is to shut down and call (not text) or get together in person.

Cable Advisory Council


The Old Lyme Area Cable Advisory Council consists of representatives from Old Lyme, Salem, East Haddam, Lyme, and Haddam Neck.



Because we have a hauler contract with one contractor and already charge per item or by weight at our Transfer Station, we have a good system that can be improved.

The committee has been working with DSM Environmental, a consulting group charged with evaluating our current trash and recycling system. Data is being collected, other town systems reviewed, and questions and concerns are being raised.

We would like to hear from you, so please look for the survey in June, and let us know what you think.

Educating Children about Invasive Crabs in Long Island Sound

The Asian shore crab (Hemigrapsus sanguineus) has become a commonly known invasive species along the coast of Connecticut. An "invasive species" is any organism that colonizes an area that is not in its native range.

It is speculated that the Asian shore crab first came to the U.S. in the ballast water of cargo ships docking in New Jersey in 1988. In just over 25 years, the distribution now ranges from Maine to North Carolina. The shore crab has no natural predators, which allows for the population to grow and spread exponentially. This growth causes it to compete with other important species to us, such as: the blue crab, green crab, and lobster. While these other crustaceans have

natural predators, the Asian shore crab does not. Thus, it has the potential to overwhelm and decrease the other crustacean populations, which we rely heavily upon. It is incredibly important to understand the negative impacts of invasive



species such as the Asian shore crab and even more important to teach our youth.

Cedar Island Marina has instituted a summer camp for children between the ages of 9 – 15. These children will have the opportunity to work side-by-side with real marine biologists doing fieldwork. One major focus of this camp will be to educate children about the fragility of our local marine environment and to show them how invasive species can be so damaging.

They will quickly realize that other crab species that were once common, such as: the green crab, Atlantic marsh fiddler crab, and purple marsh crab, have decreased in abundance. It is incredibly important to educate younger generations on invasive

species and their effect on various habitats because they will soon be the "stewards" of our local environment.

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Talking Health & Wellness

What is the problem with losing a lot of weight quickly? Losing weight at a steady pace of two to four pounds per week can be healthy if it is done the right way. However, there are people who want a quick fix and resort to restricted calorie diets or fad diets, which do not work. Creating solid habits with good food choices and exercise is key to weight loss. People who lose weight at a steady, gradual rate by making changes in their lifestyle tend to have better long term success keeping it off because they have changed their habits. It is not entirely about a decrease in weight; it's more important that people learn healthy habits and create lifestyle changes.

Is diet a four-letter word, or should everyone be on some sort of diet to avoid eating the wrong kinds of foods?

I don't like the word "diet" because what we are doing for "diet" in this country isn't working. More than 2/3 of Americans are overweight or obese. I prefer to think of healthy choices and habits, and lose the idea of being "on" or "off" a diet. It's better for your system to rely on food for health, not food for comfort, and focus on fruits and vegetables, nuts and beans, good fats, and lean protein and the phytochemicals and antioxidants in these foods that provide immunity.

Is there ever a reason to be hungry or eat a small portion and remain hungry? It's best to eat three meals and two snacks per day because skipping meals will lead to overeating later. By eating several small meals throughout the day, you will not feel overly hungry at any particular meal. Learning that your brain does not know you have eaten until 20 minutes after you are finished can help slow you down. Focus on one plate of food eaten slowly, savored and enjoyed. Take your time to enjoy the flavor of your food and don't eat to the point where you are uncomfortable.

What are the top five foods everyone should eat for a fatburning diet? Fruits and vegetables, especially cruciferous vegetables, are high in fiber and excellent for burning calories. Five of the top food types include dark green leafy vegetables, foods rich in Omega 3 s, like salmon and walnuts, berries low in sugar and full of antioxidants, like raspberries, blackberries, and blueberries. Nuts and avocados provide monounsaturated fat, which helps maintain a healthy weight.






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
