First Selectwoman's Corner

After a terrific summer of great weather, long days and wonderful community events, it is time to focus on back to school and fall events.

The Lyme Old Lyme High School Graduation Class of 2019

was on full display at their ceremony on June 13th, celebrating their accomplishments in an outdoor ceremony, despite the threatening weather. Special congratulations to all our graduates as they move on to the next phase of their lives, whether it be the military, college or joining the work force.

Our new fiscal year began on July 1st, and with that, the new trash and recycling collection service began with CWPM. As we indicated, most of the routes and schedules remained the same, with two minor adjustments in Rogers Lake and Point O' Woods. Both neighborhoods had their recycling collection days changed, but signs were conveniently posted at the entrance to each neighborhood, notifying residents of the changes. From all reports, the transition went well, with only a few minor glitches, which were addressed quickly. Residents have expressed their pleasure in weekly recycling, and we hope that this will increase our recycling tonnage (which has no tipping fees at this time), and decrease the trash tonnage, which has tipping fees of \$83/ton. Clearly, increasing our recycling efforts will benefit all of us, and to support the efforts, the Town of Old Lyme has procured vinyl labels that can be affixed to your GREEN recycling bin. These labels remind everyone that GREEN is for recycling, as well as the items that can be put into the bin. Volunteers have been distributing the labels, affixing them to containers where they can. Once again, a reminder that yard waste, pots/ pans, building materials, bulky waste, etc. are NOT ALLOWED in either your blue or green bins. CWPM will not pick up containers with these

items in them, and if very heavy materials are put into the bins, the automatic arms on the trucks may be damaged. We appreciate your cooperation in following the rules for trash and recycling collection, which assures that the Town will continue to provide this valued service to our residents.

The Halls Road Improvements Committee hosted an Open House on Saturday, June 15th, and another on Saturday, August 3rd. Both events were well attended and provided an opportunity for residents and business owners to stop in, learn about the conceptual plans, and offer their input. The discussions were robust, and provided feedback to the committee, which will be shared **continued on page 3**

In addition, Committee members provided information at the Midsummer Festival so people could share their views at that time as well. In addition, the Committee continues to reach out to other Boards and Commissions, such as the Planning Commission, to provide information and solicit feedback from those members. Once again, we enjoyed our Annual Midsummer Festival, which took place on July 26 and 27th. The kickoff was the Concert on the Florence Griswold Museum lawn facing the Lieutenant River, and it was well attended and enjoyed by all. The next morning began with the Annual 5K run, walk and kids' fun run at the Lyme Youth Services Bureau, and the full festivities began at 9:00 am, continuing throughout the day with lots of vendors, entertainment, a dog contest, and the Antique Car Show. The weather was excellent and continued to be perfect for the performance of the Old Lyme Town Band in the evening, followed by a most excellent fireworks display! It was wonderful to see our community come out in force to picnic on the back lawn of the Lyme Old Lyme Middle School and enjoy the fireworks.

He joins us with a stellar record of service as a patrol officer and detective and has been quite helpful in covering openings on many occasions. Welcome Officer Sam Barnes! Speaking of Officers, special thanks to Officer Jay Rankin, who successfully apprehended four people who allegedly robbed a woman at the Big Y. His quick thinking upon hearing the report allowed him to track the perpetrators to a gas station in East Haddam and bring them to justice. The woman, who suffered some minor injuries, is okay, and our thanks to Officer Rankin for his rapid response. In addition, I have received communication acknowledging Officer Kevin Roche for his kindness in responding to an elderly resident who was found wandering and confused. The Community Connectivity Grant Committee (CCGC) has met several times to move forward with the project, which is to install sidewalks on the west side of Hartford Avenue from Bocce Lane to Route 156. As you may recall, the Town of Old Lyme completed a project for sidewalks and other improvements on Hartford Ave. from Bocce Lane to Pond Lane. The grant is for \$400,000 for construction, at 100% of the cost. The committee has sent out a Request for Proposals for the design of the sidewalks and received back several responses. The cost of the design will be at the Town's expense, and the committee will work closely with the firm chosen to do the job. The sidewalks, once installed, will provide added safety to the many pedestrians who are regularly on the road. Thanks again to the members of the committee for their work on this project.

There are several other ongoing projects, such as the replacement of the Mile Creek Road Bridge of the Black Hall River. The construction portion went out to bid and came back with a low bid by Machnik Bros. Construction for \$863,805. Because of bids higher than anticipated, the Town voted to approve an additional allocation of \$328,500 at a Town Meeting held on Aug. 5, 2019. With everything in place, the construction should start in the spring of **continued on page 6**

2020, with a time schedule of about 4 months. Mile Creek Road Bridge will be closed for a period of time when the old bridge is removed and new components installed. The Town of Old Lyme was fortunate to qualify for a grant through the State of CT Local Bridge Funding Program, which will pay 50% of the project costs, saving taxpayers over half a million dollars on this project.

The plans for the Hains Park bathrooms are currently being developed, and once finalized, will allow us to go out to bid for the construction. The new bathrooms will be located closer to the road, and the entrance to the bathrooms will face Rogers Lake. This will allow for better visibility and safety, through greatly improved facilities. Unfortunately, due to less than adequate water supply, the project will also include the drilling of a new well.

On August 13th, a referendum for the appropriation and bonding of \$9.5 million to design and construct a sewer system for the Sound View area and Miscellaneous Town Area B (which encompasses the roads north of Rte. 156 to the railroad tracks, from Cross Lane to Gorton Ave.) was held at Cross Lane Firehouse from 6:00 am to 8:00 pm. The vote tally was 883 in favor to 565 opposed. With this result, the Town of Old Lyme will move forward with next steps on this project which is under Administrative Order from the CT Dept. of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP).

As you can see, it has been a busy summer full of great events, important projects and great weather. We look forward to completing these projects as we progress into the fall of 2019.

Sewer Referendum Results

The Sound View Sewer Project in Old Lyme passed with 883 "yes" votes to 565 "no." A total of 1448 residents and/ or property owners voted in person or by absentee ballot.

First Selectwoman Bonnie Reemsnyder commented on the vote: "I think the people spoke and it is time to move on to next steps. We made sure that everyone had a chance to vote with a full day of a referendum, absentee ballots available and several public info sessions."

Transfer Station Information

TRANSFER STATION / LANDFILL HOURS

The Transfer Station is located on Four Mile River Road and is open Tuesday-Friday, 7:30 am - 3:45 pm, Saturday, 8:30 am - 4:00 pm. Closed Sunday and Monday. Taxpayers' vehicles should have a Transfer Station sticker affixed to the right-hand side of windshield. Vehicles without a sticker should bring proof of property address (i.e., tax bill, mortgage statement or closing papers), along with a driver's license and registration.

The Transfer Station will be closed on the following Holidays:

Thursday, November 28 and Friday, November 29, 2019 for Thanksgiving The Transfer Station will be open at 8:30 am on Saturday, November 30, 2019.

Bulky Waste and Demolition: Vehicles will be charged by weight at \$110/ton. Recyclables should not be mixed in the same load with Bulky Waste or Demolition Debris. Loads less than 100 lbs. are charged a minimum fee of \$5. **Brush is charged on a per load basis.** No wood or limbs thicker than four inches are accepted.

Grass clippings are not allowed at the Transfer Station because of chemical contamination from pesticides and fertilizers and cannot be deposited in your trash can. Please compost on your property.

Electronics are now accepted at the Transfer Station. Residents can bring the following items to the Transfer Station **continued on page 8**

on Four Mile River Road: computers (personal computers, mainframes, medrange computers, laptops); networking equipment (hubs, switches, control cards, etc.); computer monitors, televisions, printers, keyboards, mice, adaptors, stereos, speakers, VCR's, scanners, fax machines, copiers telephones and telephone systems, computer wire and cable; computer drives and storage devices (floppy drives, CD ROMs, hard drives), power supplies, circuit boards, microwaves, scrap copper (cable, pipe, etc.), scrap aluminum (machine and machine parts, cable extrusions, etc.), fluorescent light bulbs, UPA (uninterrupted power supply) batteries, and related computer and electronic equipment.

Are You Registered to Vote in Old Lyme?

Register anytime in the Town Hall. You can check your voter registration status on the website for Connecticut's Secretary of the State. The deadline for registering to vote in November 5th's Municipal Election is Tuesday, October 29. The Registrars will conduct special registration on October 29 in the Town Hall from 9:00 am to 8:00 pm. All voter registration questions should be directed to the Registrars of Voters.

Municipal Election

The Town of Old Lyme will hold its Municipal Election on November 5, 2019 to cast votes for First Selectman, Selectman, Town Treasurer, Tax Collector, Board of Finance members and alternates, Board of Assessment Appeals, Planning Commission, Zoning Commission, Zoning Board of Appeals members and alternates, and Regional District 18 Board of Education.

Voting will take place at Cross Lane Firehouse located at 14 Cross Lane, Old Lyme, CT. Optical scan machines will be used. Voter must present identification. The polls will be open from 6:00 am to 8:00 pm. Absentee ballots will be available through the Town Clerk beginning Friday, October 4.

The deadline for registering to vote in the Municipal Election is Tuesday, October 29. The Registrars will conduct special registration on that day in the Town Hall from 9:00 am to 8:00 pm.

All voter registration questions should be directed to the Registrars of Voters. All absentee ballot questions should be directed to the Town Clerk.



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Tax Assessment

The 2019 Revaluation of all property will continue through the fall. The Town of Old Lyme has contracted with Vision Government Solutions Inc to conduct the State-mandated revaluation. This is statistical revaluation and the Vision team will be conducting field reviews but will not be inspecting all properties.

Notices will be mailed to Old Lyme property owners in November of 2019 informing them of their new proposed assessments. If you do not receive notice by December 31, please contact the Assessor's Office.

Owners wishing to meet with Vision appraisal employees to discuss or review their new assessments will be able to schedule hearings after new assessment notices are received.

THE ASSESSOR'S OFFICE WOULD LIKE TO INFORM RESIDENTS OF THE FOLLOWING DEADLINES:

All forms and proofs unless noted must be filed by October 1, 2019 in the Assessor's Office located at 52 Lyme St, Old Lyme CT 06371. Our office hours are Monday - Friday 9:00 am - 4:00 pm.

Assessment Date of Taxable Property for the Town of Old Lyme is October 1st of each calendar year.

Per Section 12-41 of the Connecticut General Statutes owners of tangible **Personal Property**, *other than registered motor vehicles*, such as commercial furniture, machinery and equipment, leased equipment, unregistered motor vehicles, camp trailers, etc., are required to file a personal property list with the Assessor. Declarations are required to be filed annually during the month of October. Failure to file prior to November 1, 2019 forces the Assessor, by law, to file the list and add a 25% Penalty (Sec. 12-42, PA 87-245.)

Totally Disabled Persons are entitled to an exemption if they meet the requirements of Section 12-81(55) of the General Statutes, Please contact our office for acceptable forms of proof.

Any individual who is blind is entitled to an exemption under Section 12-81(17) and shall provide proof to the Assessor.

Veterans must have filed a DD214 in the Town Clerk's office by September 30, 2019 in order to receive any of the applicable exemptions under Section 12-81. Disabled Veterans are eligible for an exemption in addition to the regular exemption with the filing of a disability rating from the Veterans Administration. Sec 12-81(g) provides for an increase in the property tax exemption amount granted to a qualified veteran if certain income requirements are met applications must be filed with the Assessor's Office no later than October 1.

Under the **Federal Service Member Civil Relief Act** persons on active duty must present to the Assessor a current earning and leave statement or a letter from their Commanding Officer along with a yearly application for exemption. Any Servicemen on active duty claiming Connecticut as their legal residence must file prior to Dec 31st. Property owners interested in claiming land as Farm, Forest or Open Space should file an application between October 1, 2019 - December 31, 2019. No extension of this filing period is available, failure to file within the prescribed time is a waiver of the right to the classification for the assessment year commencing October 1st. If you have recently purchased a property and do not know if this applies to you please contact our office to review.

OVER A CENTURY LATER, OUR COMMUNITY IS STILL DEALING WITH MOSQUITOS AS INDICATED BELOW

The Town of Old Lyme is a unique shoreline community with a long history of mosquito control. For over 100 years, as documented by The Connecticut Agricultural Experiment Station, the Town's salt marsh wetlands have undergone efforts to control mosquitoes.

The Town of Old Lyme's mosquito control contractor, Innovative Mosquito Management, Inc., utilizes a program of environmentally compatible, economically feasible and socially acceptable, cultural, biological, and chemical procedures to effectively reduce mosquito populations in the Town.

Treatment strategies emphasize an aggressive use of proven methods for source reduction, site inspections, surveillance, monitoring surveys, landing counts, larviciding and, when necessary, the judicious use of adulticiding products. The result is a dramatic reduction in the development of adult mosquito populations without impacting non-target organisms.

Regular monitoring of mosquito populations in both the larval and adult stages provides the data necessary to support treatment decisions and evaluate program results. The Town's contractor monitors, inspects and treats over 1200 acres of known mosquito breeding habitat, with an emphasis on salt marsh mosquito populations. Catch basins and storm drains are also monitored and treated throughout the Town.

Larviciding is very effective for managing mosquito populations because mosquito larvae are concentrated in relatively small, well -defined, aquatic habitats. When larvae are detected, the Town's wetlands are treated using bio-rationales, a non-chemical approach, which significantly reduces emerging adult populations. This work is performed in the Town's wetlands on a regular schedule from mid-April to mid-September.

When there are hatches of mosquitoes and adult populations reach severe levels, adulticide spray treatment may be used in locations

that are adjacent to breeding habitats to create a barrier that stops mosquitoes from traveling to take blood meals and returning to the wetlands to deposit their eggs. Adulticiding provides an immediate but short-term reduction in adult mosquito populations and is used as a last resort when nuisance levels are extreme.

Residents can assist in the prevention and reduction of breeding sites on their property by eliminating standing water where mosquitoes lay their eggs, i.e., emptying water holding containers, cleaning clogged gutters, replacing birdbath water on a weekly basis, aerating ornamental pools, turning over wheelbarrows and wading pools, etc., when not in use.

The Town does not have the resources to spray private property. If you feel your yard needs treatment for mosquitoes, contact a mosquito control company licensed by the State of Connecticut to perform this work.

How Often Are We Required to Pump **Our Septic Systems?**

The Town's Ordinance requires septic systems to be pumped at least once every 7 years. Septic haulers file records with the Town about systems pumped/inspected. If you are unsure when your system was last pumped, please call the Town to inquire.



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Lyme-Old Lyme Schools **Marketing Initiative Demonstrates Success** in First Three Years

In the fall of 2016, the Lyme-Old Lyme Schools began a targeted marketing campaign to address a decline in student enrollment. We can say with great pride that this effort has achieved significant results. The goals of this marketing initiative focused on the retention of our current students, the recruitment of students who currently attend private or magnet schools, and the recruitment of students who either live in other local towns but wish to attend our schools on a tuition basis or families who may be considering moving to the Connecticut shoreline. We also found additional benefits from this publicity that helped recruit talented faculty and staff, and boosted our reputation in the surrounding area.



"The objective of the marketing initiative underway at Lyme-Old Lyme Schools is to retain and increase the number of students enrolled in the District."

At the June 2019 Board of Education meeting, Superintendent Neviaser reported that 1308 students were enrolled in the district, nine of whom were tuition-paying students from other towns. This is only four students fewer than the number Neviaser reported in June 2018 when there were 1312 students



enrolled, seven of whom were tuition-paying students. While technically this is still a slight decline, it demonstrates a significant change from where the district was prior to the introduction of the marketing program. For many years, the district was losing 30-40 students per year. This is no longer the case.

This positive shift in enrollment, combined with numerous other awards and recognitions, solidifies the notion that the Lyme-Old Lyme Schools provide exceptional

academic programs commensurate and oftentimes superior to both public and private schools throughout Connecticut.

The efforts and monies put toward this initiative are paying dividends, allowing Lyme-Old Lyme Schools to continue to offer a private school experience in a public school setting.



Open Space Commission

On May 20th at a town meeting, the purchase of the McCulloch Farm for open space was approved, via the town's existing Open Space acquisition fund, with no budget appropriation, debt or other expense to taxpayers.

The farm, established in 1929, is considered one of Old Lyme's signature properties and has long been a key priority for open space acquisition.

The roughly 300 acres are ecologically important as part of the upper watershed of the Black Hall River, a tributary of the Connecticut River. The farm also offers linkage to the town's Ames Open Space and to the adjacent Lay Preserve owned by the Old Lyme Land Trust, creating a large naturally significant greenway and forest, akin to Old Saybrook's "Preserve." The new open space also significantly furthers the goal of a cross-town trail system.

The acquisition is expected to close in the 3rd quarter of this year. The Open Space Commission plans to establish three public trails with the Old Lyme Land Trust's assistance, and will explore other potential public uses consistent with preserving the property's natural state.


Woman's Exchange


HEATING ASSISTANCE


Applications are currently being accepted for the Connecticut Energy Assistance Program (CEAP) which may help income eligible households in paying for their heating costs during the winter months.

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What You Need to Know: Endometrial Cancer

Endometrial cancer, the most common cancer of the female reproductive system, begins in the lining of the uterus.

Symptoms include post-menopausal bleeding, abnormal vaginal bleeding and abdominal pain. Risk factors include being obese, the long-term use of estrogen therapy, never having given birth and post-menopausal age.

Like with any cancer, early detection is important. If you experience any symptoms of endometrial cancer, you should speak to your physician. There are several different ways they can test for this type of cancer.

One such test is a pelvic exam, which is a physical examination of the external and internal female pelvic organs. A hysteroscopy examines the cervix and the inside of the uterus, and a pelvic ultrasound scans the organs and structures of the pelvis. There's also a biopsy, which examines tissues for abnormal and cancerous cells; the CT scan, which provides detailed images of the inside of your abdomen and pelvis; and a PET scan, which scans the entire body to determine if cancer has spread elsewhere in the body.

Middlesex Health Cancer Center takes a multidisciplinary approach to endometrial cancer care. Medical providers meet regularly to plan and discuss treatment to ensure that physical, emotional and spiritual needs are all being met. Treatment for endometrial cancer can include surgery, chemotherapy or radiation therapy.

- Our Town Nurse, Karen Veselka, RN, holds office hours at the Lymes' Senior Center each Monday to Friday, from 11:00 am to 1:00 pm. These visits are free and no appointment is necessary.
- Karen also provides free house calls to residents who require assessment at home, and she works with the Visiting Nurse Association of Southeastern Connecticut to coordinate a full range of skilled care.
- In the spring we hold a blood pressure clinic at Lyme-Old Lyme High School.
- In the fall we hold a Flu and Wellness Clinic for residents at the Lymes' Senior Center. Medical professionals at this event provide free flu shots, blood pressure checks, nurse consultations and a variety of medical screenings. Legislation for Our First Responders



This past legislative session, there were several bills I co-sponsored that assist our brave first responders.

AN ACT

Including Certain Mental or Emotional Impairments within the Definition of "Personal Injury" Under the Workers' Compensation Statutes.

This bill allows police officers, parole officers, and firefighters to receive certain workers' compensation benefits for post -traumatic stress disorder caused by their participation in certain qualifying events. Such events include seeing, while in the line of duty, a deceased minor, someone's death, or a traumatic physical injury that results in the loss of a vital body part. This changes current law, which generally doesn't provide workers' compensation benefits for an employee's mental or emotional injury unless it arises from the employee's physical injury or occupational disease. It is my hope that, next year, ambulance service providers and paramedics will be added and will also be able to receive workers' compensation benefits for PTSD.

AN ACT

Concerning Additional Compensation for Certain Retired Public Safety Employees.

This bill authorizes municipalities to compensate, by a twothirds vote of their legislative bodies (board of selectmen,) certain disabled public safety employees who were severely injured in the line of duty and retired from service as a result of their injuries. This resulted from a police officer who was accidentally shot and severely disabled during a training exercise.

AN ACT

Increasing the Property Tax Abatement for Certain First Responders.

This bill increases the maximum property tax abatement municipalities may, by ordinance, provide to certain active and retired volunteer emergency personnel from \$1,000 to \$1,500 for FYs 20-21, and from \$1,500 to \$2,000 for FY 22 and thereafter.


Annual Harvest Festival is Family-Friendly Fun



Fall at the Florence Griswold Museum



The Museum presents a timely and thought-provoking new exhibition, "Nothing More American:" Immigration, Sanctuary, and Community-An Exhibition by Matthew Leifheit, on view September 28, 2019 through May 31, 2020. In the summer of 2018 Brook-

lyn-based photographer Matthew Leifheit provided photography for an article in The New Yorker about a Pakistani family who sought refuge from deportation between May and October 2018 in the First Congregational Church of Old Lyme. "Nothing More

American" uses these photos as a starting point to consider the intersection between the fraught topic of immigration and the history of the Old Lyme church as an icon in American art. Once a symbol of New England colonists' pious ambition to establish a new society, the "meetinghouse" merged religion, government, and community into a powerful civic ideal that prevailed for two centuries. Leifheit's photos evoke what it was like for the family during their months inside the church, creating images of their living spaces, the art they made while there, and the people from the congregation who helped them. Leifheit's photos of the church's neoclassical spaces and architectural details encourage us to approach it with reverence as a sanctuary, as well as with a sense of history.

"As depicted by Leifheit, the Old Lyme meetinghouse is both ark and prison, sheltering and confining a family hoping to partake in the American dream," notes Curator Amy Kurtz Lansing. "We do not expect to create consensus," says Kurtz Lansing, "but we willingly embrace the challenge of creating

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

The Different Styles of Vermouth

There are two different styles of Vermouth. One is red or rosso (also known as Sweet Vermouth) while the other wine is white or bianco (also known as Dry Vermouth.)

Sweet vermouth, invented by Antonio Benedetto Carpano in 1786, is a fortified white wine with grape neutral spirit with herbs and spices. One of the key herbs in Vermouth is wormwood, which is actually where the name Vermouth was derived from. Wormwood was used for medical purpose, including as a digestive.

Dry vermouth was first produced by Joesph Noilly. This wine is made from aged white wine and mixed with fermented fortified grape juice and neutral alcohol. Although these fortified wines were originally used for ailments, they are most noted to be used for drink and cooking recipes while they both average between 16% and 18% in alcohol.

Over the years some of the vermouths are made with a concentrate of blended botanicals and spices to keep them more consistent.

It is also pasteurized, filtered, and stabilized. Sweet vermouth is a bit sweeter than it was originally made. However, you can buy one called Punt e Mes from Italy which has less sweetness and more aromatics and bitterness.

Sweet vermouths are most noted to be used in a Manhattan and other cooking recipes such as chicken cacciatore. One of the uses for dry vermouth is to enhance some flavors in fish dishes.

With gin, you can make the traditional Martini. Also popular are vodka martinis made with vodka and dry vermouth, factoring the higher quality bourbons, whiskeys, gins and vodkas that are now being produced these days. Recently, the market has been open to higher end or supreme vermouths to enjoy and make the perfect cocktail. The newer popular ones are Carpano (Antica Formula) sweet vermouth, and Dolan dry or Sweet Vermouth. Try one of these higher end vermouths and make yourself a superb cocktail.



The water quality of Rogers Lake remains the best of many lakes in the area. Thank you to everyone for your efforts in making this happen. Continue to be carful with the application of fertilizers and please don't feed the geese and other wildlife.

"Do Not Feed the Waterfowl!" The Connecticut Department of Energy and Environmental Protection indicates waterfowl are wild birds that can locate natural food sources throughout the year. Supplemental feeding by people is unnecessary and can lead to malnutrition and disease transmission.

Reminder that the horsepower limit on Rogers Lake is 135 HP. Connecticut Boating Regulations require that no person shall operate a motorboat at a speed in excess of Slow-No-Wake within 100 feet of shore, a dock or other vessel. Personal watercraft (Jet Ski) is required to stay 200 feet from shore, a dock or other vessel. Infractions will be reported to DEEP. **continued on page 42**

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

The Rogers Lake Authority asks for your assistance in reporting unsafe activity occurring on Rogers Lake anytime of the year. To report any unsafe activities, please use the form that is available on the Rogers Lake Authority -: www.oldlyme-ct.gov/rogers-lake-authority. Click on "Report Boating Violation." For situations that require immediate action dial 911. Thank you for your assistance.

Connecticut State law 12-155 prohibits the use of a fertilizer containing phosphorous less than 20 feet from any body of water. A \$500 fine is imposed on violators. If you have questions on the phosphorus legislation or soil testing, call the UConn Home & Garden Education Center at: 877-486-6271.

Conservation Commission

Old Lyme's recycling efforts are among steps Old Lyme's Sustainable Committee took towards achieving Sustainable CT certification. "What's In / What's Out" labels for green recycling bins serve as a reminder of proper curbside recycling. SustainableCT is a statewide program that provides a framework of actions for towns to create a more sustainable community.

An interactive display at Old Lyme's Mid-Summer Festival by Madison Krol and Kylie Dishaw of Girl Scout Troop 63121 challenged visitors to identify appropriate proper curbside recycling materials.

When Sustainable CT began just 2 years ago, 22 towns were certified, and two towns, Middletown and Old Saybrook, achieved Bronze level. This year, First Selectwoman Bonnie Reemsynder and SustainableCT committee members are aiming for Bronze certification, completing one action from 8 different categories ranging from arts & culture to housing.

One focus of the program calls for starting the conversation about creating more inclusive communities. It's a required action that towns must complete to earn certification and Old Lyme is taking the opportunity to evaluate housing needs, especially with a growing senior population.

SustainableCT aims to create thriving, resilient, collaborative, and forward-looking communities and provides tools and resources to help. SustainableCT will be rolling out a crowdfunding grant program soon, where anyone in a registered town can get a dollar-for-dollar matched grant for their sustainable initiatives. Jackie Robinson: An Ongoing Legacy of Impact and Achievement by Sigrid Kun

Jackie Robinson's legacy is stronger than ever. It's not just every April 15th when each Major League Baseball team celebrates Jackie Robinson Day. Through the Jackie Robinson Foundation (JRF) he and his family continue to impact lives and improve the communities in which we live.

BREAKING BARRIERS

Born on January 31, 1919 in Cairo, Georgia, Robinson grew up in Pasadena, CA. He later attended UCLA where he became the only student to letter in four varsity sports in the same year. He was drafted into the U.S. Army in 1942 and became second lieutenant. In 1944, while riding a bus back to Camp (now Fort) Hood, he was court martialed for refusing to move to the back of the bus. This ultimately led to his honorable discharge that same year.

It was around the same time that the Brooklyn Dodgers found it important to integrate Major League Baseball. Robinson signed a contract with the Dodgers in 1945 and began his baseball career with the Montreal Royals. On April 15, 1947, the color barrier was broken. Robinson became the first African American to play Major League Baseball, playing first base for the Dodgers. He carried himself with honor and grace despite facing opposition from crowds and teammates as well as threats to himself and his family. Named Rookie of the Year in 1947, his 10-year MLB career was outstanding - including being named MVP in 1949 and a World Series win in 1955. He was inducted into the Baseball Hall of Fame in 1962.

ADVANCING EQUALITY AND CIVIL RIGHTS

Robinson transformed more than baseball. He and his wife, Rachel, became increasing involved in the civil rights movement in the 1950s and 1960s. It was during this time (mid-1950s) that the family home in Stamford, CT was purchased - not without adversity. "Our parents faced housing discrimination during their search for a home," recalls Jackie Robinson's daughter, Sharon, who serves as Vice Chair of the JRF Board of Directors. "Andrea Simon, a prominent resident, heard of our difficulties and intervened." As Sharon and her brothers integrated into the neighborhood and schools, they faced various levels of racism. The home offered privacy, freedom, friendship, and sports.

And there were the wonderful jazz concerts. "Our family hosted our first 'Afternoon of Jazz' on our Stamford property in June of 1963," relates Sharon. "Dad was a fundraiser for the Civil Rights Movement." Robinson was also working with Dr. Martin Luther King Jr to raise money to rebuild black churches that had been bombed. The first concert was a fundraiser for Southern Christian Leadership Conference and came on the heels of Dr. King's efforts in Birmingham, Alabama.

The concert was managed by a massive volunteer force of family and friends. Musicians (like Dizzy Gillespie) volunteered their time and talents. "My brother, David and I - along with our friends - sold hot dogs and sodas. Dad and Jackie Jr. parked cars. Mom was the directress with her hands in all aspects of the concert," recalls Sharon. The second concert was shortly after the Robinson family returned from the March on Washington. "Dr. King came and spoke to the crowd. It was one of the most amazing days of our young lives." The Afternoon of Jazz became a regular fundraiser for the Civil Rights Movement the State of the compared to support IPE

during Jackie Robinson's life. After he passed in 1972, the tradition continued with proceeds to support JRF.

A LEGACY OF IMPACT AND ACHIEVEMENT

Rachel founded JRF in 1973. JRF not only honors the memory of Jackie Robinson and his heroic achievements but also provides college and graduate student scholarships and leadership development opportunities for students of color with strong capabilities but limited financial resources. It is a two-pronged approach with fouryear grants and hands-on, comprehensive support.

This year, JRF is commemorating the 100th birthday of Jackie Robinson with a year-long series of events to benefit not only the organization's programs but also the future Jackie Robinson Museum. The culminating event will be the opening of the Jackie Robinson Museum in New York City in December of 2019. "It has been our family's dream to have a physical space where my father's legacy and the values and ideals by which he lived could inspire others," says Sharon. "We are excited to shine a light on my father's life, while raising funds to continue to positively impact the lives of others."

"My parents taught me the importance of loving your world," adds Sharon - an accomplished nurse-midwife, professor, author and educational consultant within the Commissioner of Baseball's Office. "We have a favorite Jackie Robinson quote: 'A *life is not important except for the impact on other's lives.*"



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
